## Occupational Therapy Courses Are Offered At Ft. Stanton

Utilizing equipment already in the hospital when it was transferred to state ownership, seven occupational therapy courses have been started at Fort Stanton Hospital. The courses are being conducted by the State Welfare Director, Alva Simpson, announced today that Mr. Earl G. Simmons, a trained professional occupational therapist will be in charge of instruction.

The courses include carpentry, leather work, weaving, light metal work, heavy metal work, mechanical training, newspaper composition and type-setting.

Simpson said it was hoped that a coordinating policy could be worked whereby convalescents from both Fort Stanton and the tuberculosis sanatorium at Socorro would be able to participate in the occupational therapy cases. # Sermon On Man's Disease And Cure By Ruidosoan

(Editor's Note: This is the final part of a two-part sermon prepared for the Ruidoso News by A. Elkins, Church of Christ Minister of Ruidoso.)

(Conclusion) Baptism is found to be a part of this remedy also, and has just as much importance as faith, re-

pentance, or confession. He will be baptized with water and the Holy Spirit (which is the Holy Spirit speaking through Peter) convinced the Jews that they were "pricked in their hearts" and asked Peter and the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? (about this awful thing which this dread disease had caused them to do) Then Peter (the Holy Spirit speaking through him) said unto them, Re-

pent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost. Acts 2:37, 38. Jesus said to his disciples when he gave them the commission to preach the gospel, He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned. Mark 16:16.

Q. Did all those who were sick submit to baptism, or accept it in the great prescription? A. No, only the ones who realized their condition and were GLAD to receive it. Acts 2:41. We find a man named Naaman mentioned in 2 Kings 5, who was afraid of water just like many are today; he wanted to be healed of his leprosy (which is a type of sin) but he wanted to be healed by his own prescription, and he went away in rage when the prophet of God told him what to do to be healed. (The prophet told him to dip seven times in Jordan) however, after his own servants told him if the prophet had said to do some great thing, would he have done it, he returned and obeyed the physician. (Too many people are like Naaman, they want to write their own prescription). Q. Is there a scripture which states that baptism will save you? A. Of course; if baptism had no value in this prescription it would be held guilty for adding to the word of God; notice, The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God), and the resurrection of Jesus Christ; 1 Pet. 3:21. It takes the same thing here to accomplish the healing that it did in Naaman's case, the "answer of a good conscience toward God" (a good conscience will not argue with God). Q. There are many modes of baptism, how may I know which one to have used? A. There is ONE baptism, One Lord, one faith, ONE baptism, Eph. 4:5. There are as many baptisms for us as there are faiths, Lords, and Gods, and no more. Q. Where in the bible may I find an example? A. Acts 8:14-17. The apostle Paul gives a vivid picture of the scene of baptism, the baptism mentioned in Eph. 4:5, in Romans 6:3-8, and the evangelist Philip is seen administering this baptism in Acts 8:26, 39.



## Additional Water For Ruidoso May Be Secured In Studies Being Conducted By Officials

(Editor's Note: Below is the first of a series of articles reporting the minutes of several meetings that have been held by state, county, village and Ruidoso Valley officials in regard to securing additional water for Ft. Stanton hospital and possibly the Village of Ruidoso. Minutes of succeeding meetings, held since the original one reported below, will be carried in later issues of the News.)

**MINUTES OF A MEETING AT FORT STANTON, NEW MEXICO**  
September 15, 1953, 2:30 p. m.  
The meeting was called by The New Mexico Department of Public Welfare at the suggestion of the Ruidoso Water Users Association.  
There were present: Mr. James V. Tully, President, Mr. Wilbur Coe, Secretary-Treasurer, Ruidoso Water Users Association.  
Mr. Elia Bonnell, Mr. R. C. Buckner, Mr. Daniel Swearingin, Ruidoso, Attorney Daniel R. Brenton, Carrizozo, Mr. A. F. Brown, Ass't State Engineer, Mr. Alva A. Simpson, Jr., State Director, and Mr. Herbert A. Holt, Legal Consultant.  
Mr. Daniel Kusianovich, Business Manager, Fort Stanton Medical Center, of the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare, was present as chairman.  
Mr. Tully stated that the village of Ruidoso and the Ruidoso Water Users Association were interested in the construction of an impounding reservoir on Eagle Creek and a connecting pipe line to Ruidoso to receive local water shortage. The conference planned by Mr. Brenton with officials of the Southern Pacific Company in San Francisco on September 17, 1953, afforded an opportunity to discuss this project with the railroad company.  
Mr. Brenton explained that he represented the town of Alamogordo in the negotiations pending with the Southern Pacific Company. The Railroad Company did not consider the sale of any water rights but only the sale of water. That he would be glad to discuss the Eagle Creek project at the conference in San Francisco.  
Mr. Simpson raised the question whether the construction of a reservoir on Eagle Creek would violate the Pecos River Compact. Mr. Brown expressed the opinion that the plan would not result in the prohibited depletion of the water supply by man's activities. The plan would change the place of storage but not increase the use of water.  
Mr. Tully pleaded for the cooperation of interested state agencies
