Stockholders Of Ruidoso State Bank Favor Additional Capitalization



In a unanimous standing vote, more than three dozen stockholders of the Ruidoso State Bank Tuesday afternoon expressed their desire for an additional capitalization of \$25,000 for the institution, and sentiment expressed by the several who spoke before the vote was they wanted the board of directors to do everything in its power to secure Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation affiliation as soon as it could.

The meeting was led by Bank President Kenneth Watt, who introduced the new executive vice-president and manager, Townsend Flood of Roswell. Also introduced were Lake Frazier, Roswell attorney, who assisted in the legal work of charter application; Miss Betty Cleaver, an employee of the bank, and board members Ralph Brown, C. A. Eiland, Jack Hull and L. L. Butler.

Eiland was called on, as chairman of the board and one of the committee, with Butler, to tell of the bank's new building. He said the plant with fixtures and some equipment, will cost \$26,000—almost all of which is now paid for. Butler designed the building and other directors assisted in its planning. Eiland estimated that with the land given on which the fine new structure stands, the bank's physical assets amount to well over \$35,000.

Frazier, in a brief talk, said the establishment of a bank in Ruidoso was the most stabilizing influence which could ever be completed here. Bert Rice, one of the stockholders, expressed the opinion that no other project ever attempted in Ruidoso had received such complete support of both the citizens of the town and residents of the nearby areas. He called for a vote of thanks by applause for the work of the building committee.

President Watt told that requirements of the FDIC, or "recommendations of that government agency as so called, it was that the directors must hold more shares than the present organizing board members now hold, and that the agency also wanted the bank to add another \$25,000 capitalization to the financial structure.

The problem was discussed by almost all of the stockholders, with favorable reaction on almost every hand. The bank was set up originally with a capitalization of \$87,500, but the FDIC said it recommended a larger backlog of \$100,000 be set up before it would incur its deposits.

In Eiland's report, he said among the fixtures secured for the bank was an assortment of safety deposit boxes for rent to the bank customers. In talking of the staff of the bank, Watt said that in addition to Hood and Miss Cleaver, who were present, Mrs. Warren Tucker would be a member of the staff. Ralph Brown, operator of Brown Air Service, and a member of the board, received public thanks from Watt for his contribution of our transportation for the board members and the original Chamber of Commerce organizing committee to the several conferences held in various cities of the Southwest.

The interior of the storeroom was badly charred and the projection booth, directly above, received smoke and some water damage. Loss was estimated at a few hundred dollars. The theatre cancelled its Friday night show, but was back in operation again Saturday night.

Interstate Streams Commission Takes Lead In Seeking Survey Of Water Availability In Area

A hearing held Monday by the Interstate Streams Commission of New Mexico in the office of Governor Edwin L. Mechem drew an interested audience of 13 Lincoln County residents, and several representatives of the county and Roswell. Outcomes of the meeting was the car-marking of a \$4,000 fund for employment of Carlos Phillips, an engineer, for the purpose of submitting a feasibility report on the watershed of the Bonito, Eagle Creek and Rio Ruidoso rivers. The survey is intended to give water rights in the three streams are recognized, there is sufficient water left available for uses of the expanding communities of the town of Ruidoso, the Ft. Stanton Medical Center and Capitan.

In Tuesday's club meeting, Dr. W. D. Horton, Carmon Phillips and Carl DeBord, Lions club's Christmas lighting committee, announced that plans were being realized to erect a twenty by thirty foot illuminated cross for the Christmas Lighting Program. The cross will be placed on the Ruidoso Lookout Tower if permission can be secured from the Forest Service. If the cross can not be placed on the Tower then it will be erected on the uppermost tower of the Ruidoso Skyride.

Carmon Phillips, committeeman in charge of the project, said Wednesday, "We plan to do this through local contributions. Anyone wishing to contribute to the project may do so by contacting any one of the committee members or by bringing their contribution up by that date. There is no contributions totaled \$29.60 at the Tuesday night Lions Club meeting. Contributors thus far are: Carl DeBord \$2.00, Dr. W. D. Horton \$3.00, Dick Crosby \$2.00, Joe McClure \$1.00, Zack Collier \$2.00, Pat Chubbuck \$2.00, E. C. Bruce \$3.00, Bob Kaufmann \$1.00, Herb Greggerson Family \$7.60, Harold Graham \$2.00, Weldon Garner \$2.00, Dr. Bram Vanderstok \$2.00, Vic Lamb Family \$1.00, C. W. Millers \$1.00 and Carmon Phillips \$1.00. An estimated twenty five dollars is needed to build, erect, maintain and light the cross.

Dr. Horton, committee chairman, commented: "There are only ten days left until December first. We would like to see all the lighted crosses in the area by that date. There is no community in the United States that lends itself so perfectly to a massive Christmas lighting program. Ruidoso could become famous for it if we will only put forth the effort to do bigger and better displays each season. Currently, only five dollars is needed for every one, to at least light one outdoor tree or put up some unusual display.

Contest prizes will be announced in next week's issue of the News. The massive star atop Star Tower will carry the greetings "Merry Christmas" from one building and "Happy New Year" from the other. They will be illuminated by floodlight.

After it is determined sufficient water is available. Almost all of the people from Lincoln County were heard from in the hearing. At one point in the hearing, the commission leaned to the idea of providing all of the \$4,000, but after securing the views of Gov. Mechem, who cited it was a precedent which might lead to many similar demands on the commission from all parts of the state, and indicating it would be better for interested communities to share in the expense, the commission adhered to Mechem's suggestion. The \$3,000 voted by the commission is subject to the approval of both the governor and the state finance board. It is likely work will begin very soon on the survey, and further steps in Ruidoso's continuing campaign to secure more water will be made after the feasibility report is turned over to the Interstate Streams Commission sometime this winter.

An editorial entitled, "The Wealth of a Small Town" was recently published in the Congressional Record. The editorial, as it appeared in the surface Creek News, is as follows: "The Wealth of a Small Town: A small town is where everybody knows your business and yet they will make it their business if anyone in the community needs help. It is where the folks will talk about you and then later on you'll see the chips falling down where there has to be a fire to get anyone on the streets after 9 o'clock and yet there will be square dancing until 2 o'clock in the morning and not dependent on hot music and cold drinks to keep you on the floor. A small town is where there is a common bond during a disaster and a common thankfulness for rain, or a beautiful day, or a new fire hydrant. There is little thought paid to social position, and the judging of a man is based on his own values and their values.

It is where a person speaks to his friend as many times as he sees him during the day, not worrying over the social graces as to whether they have already greeted each other previously. It is where a neighbor's hurt becomes your hurt. The freedom and dignity of the individual is practiced in a small town without a lot of paid coaching by experts who think they know the minds of men. A man expects to earn what he gets and get what he earns. The building of a park or the paving of a street becomes a personal thing in which the majority of folks see a tangible part of themselves. The yardstick is not set in degrees that ask "What is there in it for me?" A stranger becomes the focus of honest curiosity and the returning native always seems to have added a little glamor. The deeds of the town—and its men often shine brighter in a far away place. The words of a stranger often seem like important words. A small town is where the lack of convention allows for more time to live well and think clearly. The veneer of fatuous arguments is a shell which comes closer to allowing the rest which could be shown through. The problems of the people are concerned with nature and close attention with others—with things as they are.

This, in part, is a small town and the people who live in it. It is close to the center of freedom, individual initiative, and self-realization that any other segment of the land except the remote rural. It is the balance wheel in our social order. May there be enough vision to see that the wealth of our small towns is far greater than that which could be measured by smoking stacks and production lines.

Santa Fe (Sp.)—State Director Alva A. Simpson stated today that according to current data released by the Department of Public Welfare, 191 needy cases in Lincoln County received a total of \$10,161 for maintenance requirements during the month of September.

Of this amount, \$3,127 was paid to 131 children under the Aid to Dependent Children program, \$6,218 was paid to 12 Old Age Assistance cases, \$172 to 3 cases receiving Aid to the Needy Blind; \$595 to 15 Aid to the Disabled cases; and \$48 to 2 General Assistance cases.

In addition, 2 children received care under the Child Welfare Services program; 35 children were assisted under the Crippled Children's Services program; and 6 persons were aided by the Division of Services to the Blind. 8 cases received other special services.

The county 4-H award night will be held at the Honda Gym starting at 7:30 p. m. November 21. The program will include a candle lighting ceremony, skills and recreational games as well as the presentation of awards. ### Transportation Clerk Examinations Set For Postal Service

Denver (Sp.)—Announcement has been made of a new Federal Civil Service examination for filling Substitute Postal Transportation Clerk positions. The examination is open for residents of Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming and applicants must be bona fide residents of one of these states. William H. Haslam, Chief of the Examining and Placement Division of the Tenth U. S. Civil Service Regional Office said that appointments from the list of eligibles established as a result of this examination will in most cases be made for duty in cities which railway postal terminals are located. Where original appointments are for duty in terminal vacancies on railway post office lines are generally filled by transfer from the terminals, in accordance with seniority rights.

The starting salary is \$1,714 an hour and the duties include the separation, distribution, and routing of mails in transit. The duties are of an arduous physical nature and involve the handling of parcels and heavy bags of mail as well as individual letters. For this reason, Haslam stated, the Post Office Department wants men.

No previous experience is necessary to qualify for these positions. However, all competitors will be required to take a written examination designed to test aptitude for learning and performing the duties of the position. The test consists of two parts—one concerned with sorting and the other with address checking—two important phases of the duties of a Postal Transportation Clerk. Applicants will be rated on a scale of 100 and a passing grade of 70 must be made in each test.

Haslam emphasized the need for competitors to study the sample questions available before attempting to take the examination. "The test is not a difficult one," he said, "and only a short practice exercise will be given in the examination room. Our past experience has proved that the most successful competitors are those who have made themselves familiar with the type of questions which are asked before going into the examination." The written test will take about an hour, and all applicants will be notified of the exact time and place of the examination.

Haslam pointed out that substitutes are required to be available for duty on short notice and their hours of duty may vary considerably. The amount of work may also vary, but under normal conditions substitutes are employed full time. For any night work, between the hours of 6 p. m. and 6 a. m. the basic rate of pay is increased by 10 percent.

### State Helps 17,613 During September

Santa Fe (Sp.)—State Director Alva A. Simpson stated today that according to current data released by the Department of Public Welfare, 17,613 needy cases in New Mexico received a total of \$911,696 for maintenance requirements during the month of September.

Of this amount, the largest payment was \$481,037 to 10,221 Old Age Assistance cases. \$360,115 was paid to 4,904 families including 13,743 children under the Aid to Dependent Children program; \$14,880 to 342 cases receiving Aid to the Needy Blind; \$66,622 to 1,790 Aid to the Disabled cases; and \$9,040 to 356 General Assistance cases.

In addition, 1,677 children received care under the Child Welfare Services program; 3,452 children were assisted under the Crippled Children's Services program; and 325 persons were aided by the Services for the Blind. 1,558 cases received other special services.

Medical care expenses for the month totaled \$37,288 for 3,461 cases. Of this amount, \$18,669 was paid to Old Age Assistance cases; \$12,144 was for Aid to Dependent Children; \$801 for Aid to the Needy Blind; \$3,187 for Aid to the Disabled; \$1,702 for General Assistance cases; and \$785 to children under the Child Welfare Services program.

The Department also provides assistance for needy Indians in New Mexico, making payments to 1,903 cases, including 3,707 persons, totaling \$87,868.

### FARMERS URGED TO SIGN UP FOR CONSERVATION PRACTICES

The Agricultural Conservation Program sign-up period is from November 1, 1953 to December 10, 1953, the Production Marketing Administration reports.
