Year after year he works and works to get others as enthused as himself—and now and then someone does—like Iva Coleman, who, with her sister, has gone all out for lighting for Christmas. Her place is a special treat to the kids who can see lights glow, Santa Claus cutouts, gift wrapped packages, hanging stockings and everything.

In the talking stage right now for Ruidoso is a new super night club that may be operated by Linda Darnell, Hollywood star who has a ranch down the valley, et al. . . . Dan Griffith, Green Tree, who was managing editor of the Belton News-Bulletin, left that paper Oct. 1 to work for a year with the Air Force. Several families here, who cannot now get television because they are tucked behind a hill or down a canyon, are interested in a "community" television aerial being built from a mountain top to secure television via cables. In other places, folks pay a monthly rental of from \$3.00 to \$5.00 for such a service, and the guy putting up the main aerial has a pretty good income from his investment of \$20,000 to \$30,000. We believe it might work here.

When I get to reflecting sometimes in the great amount of community work our friends, the Nolon Haris, have done for Ruidoso, I sometimes think that a mere "well done" is not quite adequate.

We'd like to have other families join us in this—for it's a great loss to cut a tree. After serving as a tradition for cutting the tree, it will still be useful for many years as a natural beauty wherever we plant it. If 20 other families would do this with us, we might get a custom started that would ward off in time, the almost certain prohibition of cutting our Christmas trees against the law now to cut Christmas trees in the New England States!

Giant Plane Out Of Control Crashes On Northwest Slope Of 'Old Baldy'

An unmanned B-17 type drone plane from Holloman Air Development Center in Southern New Mexico, flying under the radio control of another plane, crashed Friday in an unpopulated area on the northwest slope of Old Baldy Mountain.

The mountain is in the Sierra Blanca Range near Ruidoso.

The drone was directed in flight by the crew of another B-17, which could destroy the drone instantly if it got out of control in a populated area, the center said.

The pilot of a chase plane which was flying on the mission as an additional safety precaution to shut down the drone if it got out of control let the drone crash because it was headed for an unpopulated area.

The B-17 was assigned to the 3225th Drone Squadron commanded by Lt. Col. Louis Bennie.

Bennie said the drone was on a routine flight.

Drone planes often are used for targets. Guided missiles are tested at Holloman.

The estimated cost is approximately \$60,000 for the completed building according to the plan and specifications, with furnishings, of which the church has in its building fund something more than one fourth. When completed, the building along with appropriate landscaping of the grounds, will be a credit to the entire community and in due time will be dedicated with fitting ceremony.

Gifts Bought For Indians In Hospital

Mrs. Paul Wild of the Capitan Forest Ranger Station telephoned the News this week information relayed to her by Dan Kuslanovich, personnel director, at Ft. Stanton Medical Center, that the Indian tubercular patients at the hospital may go without any kind of a Christmas unless the people of Lincoln county get in high gear soon.

Boy and Girl Scouts of Capitan have arranged for toys and some sweets for the approximately 54 youngsters in the hospital, but to date nothing has been done for the 80 adults there.

"We've just got to round up some kind of Christmas gifts for them—they are just lying there in their beds, with nothing to do to break the monotony of their incapacity," Mrs. Wild pleaded. "They can use gifts which will occupy their hands, at least," she suggested.

The News will serve as a receiving depot for anyone in the county who wishes to give presents for the Indian patients. Mrs. Wild said she would come and pick up whatever is left here at the News and transport it to the hospital before Christmas.

MELLOTTONES HAVE FULL WEEK OF APPEARANCES



Public Welfare rolls in New Mexico have doubled in the past decade, from 32,000 persons to the present annual total of around 65,000 receiving relief benefits. Meanwhile, costs of the welfare service have risen from \$2,500,000 to almost 15 million dollars a year in this state—Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

Per pupil operational costs of New Mexico's public schools have almost tripled during the past 10 years, having increased from 62 cents to the present cost of approximately \$1.75 per pupil for each day of school—Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

Highway travelers from other states pay more than six million dollars in direct taxes to the State of New Mexico each year. Tourists and non-resident truckers pay more than two million dollars annually through the 2 percent school (sales) tax on motor vehicles and retail sales in this state, as shown by figures compiled by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

Old age assistance payments go almost tripled during the past 10 years, from \$12,500,000 to \$36,000,000 in the State Welfare Department of New Mexico each month.




