APHIDS APPEARING ON FRUIT TREES
The plant louse or aphid has been noticed on fruit trees, especially peaches in many parts of the county. This small green soft bodied insect causes the leaves to curl, become yellow and die if no control is applied. Aphid control is honeydew on the leaves, this honeydew is eagerly sought by ants. The presence of the ants on the tree indicates that aphids are present. The aphid can also be found on roses, flowers and in the garden.

The aphid may be controlled by Malathion or nicotine sulfate which is commonly called "Black Leaf 40." Nicotine sulfate requires direct contact for a kill. Malathion is relatively non-toxic to warm blooded animals and may be used safely on the tree, in the garden or around the home. Malathion which may be applied as a dust spray, also effective against spider mites and is effective for 7 days after use. It has a very pronounced odor.

TEST PLOT SET AT GLENCOE
A woolly ariet control test plot was established in the Gladys Noyes orchard at Glencoe. The woolly ariet control test plot is in an orchard owned by entering the roots of apple and pear trees and thereby shortening the life of the trees as well as decreasing production. As this is a young orchard showing a light woolly ariet infestation, the ariet control test plot more readily established. A spray containing Benzene Hexachloride and Malathion was applied on the tree and around the base of the tree. The treatment will be applied at regular intervals during the year.

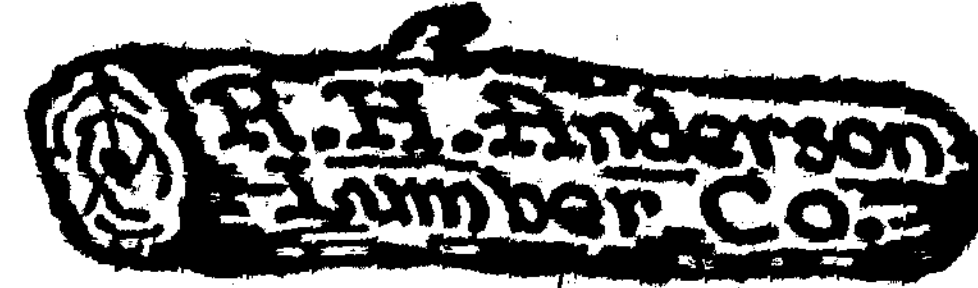

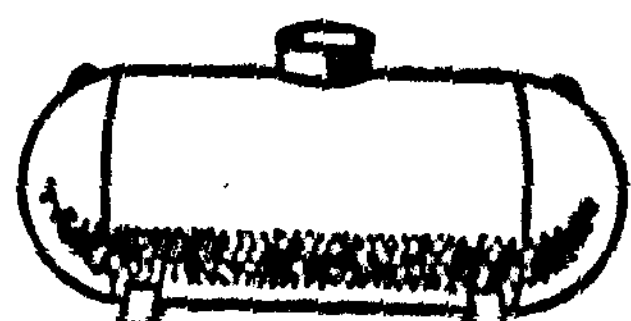
