CITY TO USE REVENUE BONDS

The Village of Ruidoso moved to institute a sewer system improvement project as soon as possible when its city council voted last Friday night on an ordinance calling for the issuance of \$180,000 in revenue bonds for that purpose.

It is expected the bonds will be sold within 60 days and contracts may be let within 90 days on construction of most of the city's main water pipe-lines. Extension and additional improvements are to be figured in the project, as well.

First talk of the bonds which bear 5 1/2 percent, about \$147,000 will be bought by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. The balance must be sold "locally," Mayor Raymond Buckner said.

State Of Texas Asks Receiver Be Appointed For Insurance Firms Owned By Local-El Paso Commuter

Trehanne Declares United Lloyds 'Is Solvent'

Spencer Trehanne, owner of a home in Ruidoso, and who commutes to and from his El Paso businesses via plane daily, continued to fly there early this week, but broke his usual week-end rest-at-home routine last Sunday by going to El Paso to issue a statement regarding his various businesses. The statement appeared in the El Paso Times and is reprinted below.

Spencer Trehanne, whose insurance companies here were served with a court restraining order Friday, returned to El Paso Sunday and met with officials of the Texas attorney general's office and the Texas board of insurance commissioners.

Trehanne had been in Albuquerque, where he was Friday when the order was served. Commenting on the action taken against his firms, Trehanne said: "United Lloyds is solvent and we will prove that to the court. Only a part of the facts has been presented in court. I returned after the office of United Lloyds were Rudy G. Rice, assistant attorney general of Texas, Rennie Allred and G. W. Carson, examiners for the Texas board of insurance commissioners, and V. F. Taylor, special assistant to the attorney general.

A hearing will be held in the 98th District Court in Austin Saturday to determine whether a temporary receiver should be named and whether a temporary receiver should be appointed. Trehanne has until Feb. 22 to file an answer to merits of the petition for appointment of a permanent receiver.

'Offices' Enter In Case

In a long-distance telephone call to the Ruidoso News, Wednesday, Trehanne repeated his statement that he was solvent and that he will be forthcoming through efforts of his lawyers, he declared.

He said the future raised in El Paso newspapers over the incident might be labeled "politics" since some of the men pressing the matter for the court were of the office, and this is election year, you know. He said they were mostly interested in "getting their names on the front page."

WHEREAS the Village of Ruidoso in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico is a legally and regularly created, established and organized and existing municipal corporation, its full corporate name being "Village of Ruidoso" and has existed since the 19th day of November, 1945 and






