

Meeting At 2 Here This Afternoon May Decide Ruidoso C. of C.'s Future

The hour for decision for the future of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce is two o'clock this afternoon at the Pueblo Theatre.

Every member of the Chamber of Commerce, every merchant and resident of Ruidoso MUST be present to hear the facts which have brought about the closing of the office Monday of this week, March 1.

The C. of C. at the present is practically non-existent. Its budget for 1953-1954 was only half raised, and that half has been spent, with still four months to go.

Financial obligations of the C. of C., such as rent, postage, utilities, salary, etc., "stacked up" for several weeks since December 31, but with full financial success from the recent sports car project, enough funds were realized to "pay up" its book indebtedness up to March 1. There is no money on hand now for the balance of the fiscal year.

The C. of C. has further needs—such as additional publicity folders, maps, stationery, etc., which should be ordered now before the summer rush. Now, the questions to be discussed this afternoon are: should the C. of C. try to go ahead with a part-time employee or with volunteer help... shall it try to continue with a full-time office... how can the balance of this year's budget be financed? Or shall it be closed for good?

County Farm And Livestock Bureau To Observe New Mexico Week; Membership Drive Opens March 7

Lincoln County will take an active part in the state-wide observance of FARM BUREAU WEEK, New Mexico March 7 through 13, Kenneth Neaker, President of the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau, announces.

Aims of the Week, Neaker states, will be to bring to the attention of New Mexicans the importance of agriculture, the state's largest industry, in their economic and social welfare, and also to acquaint them with the part being played by the development of agriculture by the Farm and Livestock Bureau.

Recognizing the fact that the national, state and county Farm Bureau organizations are playing a major role in the advancement of all branches of agriculture, governors throughout the state are officially observing FARM BUREAU WEEK, dedicating it to the purpose of continued progress and development of rural America.

Civic and community organizations throughout the state are planning special programs during the week in recognition of the service of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, largest farm-ranch organization in the state, not only to agriculture, but the New Mexico citizens as a whole.

Marking the week, county Farm Bureau and all of their hundreds of local units will hold meetings with appropriate programs, Delmar Roberts, state president, announces.

The week also will be observed by Farm Bureau in the launching of a state-wide membership campaign, county president Neaker states. Plans for the special events in Lincoln County are well advanced.

The Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau is one of 5277 county organizations in the 40 states that form their respective State Farm Bureaus and ultimately affiliate into the American Farm Bureau Federation.

These county units are the foundation of Farm Bureau. All policies of the American Farm Bureau Federation must have originated in one of the county units. They then must have a majority vote of the voting delegates of their state meetings, and further, a majority vote of the voting delegates from the forty-eight states of the national meeting. The result then, of this procedure of developing policy is "grass roots" thinking—thinking of the farmers and ranchers who are on the land.

This procedure of county organizations being the starting point for Farm Bureau Policy, reflects the highest type of American Democracy. As farmers and ranchers, this is your opportunity to join the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau and make it work for you.





The May and June turkeys make more profit on the feed consumed because we do not feed them as long as we do the earlier turkeys, but of course these do not get ready for the fall shows.


