The Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, met in Special session in full conformity with law and the ordinances and rules of said Village, at City Hall, being the regular meeting place of said Board, at the hour of 7 o'clock, P. M., on Monday the 8th day of March, 1954. Upon roll call, the following were found to be present, constituting a quorum:

Thereupon, the following proceedings took place, which were taken and read in full, and as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 78
AN ORDINANCE RATIFYING ALL ACTIONS TOWARD THE CONSTRUCTION OF A WATER SYSTEM FOR THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO AND ISSUING ITS BONDS THEREFOR, PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION OF THE QUESTION OF ISSUING SAID BONDS TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE AT THE REGULAR ELECTION OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS TO BE HELD THEREIN ON TUESDAY, THE 6th DAY OF APRIL, 1954, PROVIDING THE FORM OF THE BALLOT, THE FORM OF THE ELECTION NOTICE AND FOR THE SUBMISSION OF THE QUESTION OF ISSUING SAID BONDS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the Village of Ruidoso, in the County of Lincoln, and State of New Mexico, is legally and regularly created, established, organized and existing municipal corporation under the laws of the State of New Mexico, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of said Village, is legally organized and does hereby determine to construct a water system, and

WHEREAS, the statutes of the State of New Mexico authorize the issuance of negotiable bonds for the purpose of securing funds for said purpose, and

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of New Mexico further provide that no such bonds shall be issued until the question of issuing such bonds shall, at a regular election for municipal officers or other officers of said Village, or submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the municipality as have paid a property tax thereon during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting upon the question be in favor of creating such debt, and

WHEREAS, in order to provide funds with which to defray the cost of the construction of a water system, the Board of Trustees proposed to make and issue its negotiable obligation water bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$150,000.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That all action (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) heretofore taken by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, and the officers thereof, directed toward the construction of a water system, and the issuance of its general obligation bonds to defray the costs thereof, including, without limiting the generality thereof, the holding of the polls to authorize the issuance of said bonds and the publication of notices thereof, be, and the same is hereby, ratified, approved and confirmed.

Section 2. That at the regular election of municipal officers to be held in the Village of Ruidoso, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, on Tuesday, the 6th day of April, 1954, there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the Village who have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year, the following question for vote:

"Shall the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, be authorized to incur an indebtedness for and on behalf of said Village by issuing its negotiable coupon, general obligation bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$150,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, bearing interest at a rate of not exceeding six per centum per annum, for the purpose of constructing a water system for said Village?"

The polls for said election will be opened at 8:00 o'clock, A. M., on the day of said election, and shall be closed at 7:00 o'clock, P. M. The polling place in said Village shall be located at City Hall, the same being the polling place established for the general Village election to be held on that date.

No ballot for or against said bond question shall be received by the judges of election unless the person offering the same shall be a qualified elector of the Village of Ruidoso under the laws of the State of New Mexico now in force and, in addition to such qualification, shall have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year.

The ballots to be used in voting upon the question submitted shall be furnished to the voters by the judges of election and after being marked, shall be deposited in a separate ballot box, which shall be provided for that purpose.

Section 3. That said election on the bond question submitted as above set forth, shall be held and conducted in as near the same manner as possible as that prescribed for general municipal elections.

Each elector shall prepare his ballot, indicating his approval or disapproval of the proposition submitted by placing a cross (X) on the ballot which expresses his choice, and shall then deposit his ballot in the ballot box provided for such purpose.

Section 7. That no ballot for or against said proposition shall be accepted by the judges of election unless the person offering the same shall be a duly qualified elector of the Village of Ruidoso as defined by the laws of the State of New Mexico now in force and effect, and shall have paid a property tax therein during the preceding year.

Section 8. That the election on the bond question hereby submitted shall be conducted by the judges and clerks named as judges and clerks for the election of municipal officers at said regular election of April 6, 1954.

Section 9. That the vote at the election on the bond question submitted as aforesaid shall be separately canvassed and returned to the Board of Trustees, as nearly as may be, as is provided by law for the canvass, return and declaration of the result of votes cast at the regular election of municipal officers.

Section 10. That a notice of the submission of the aforesaid question to the qualified electors as above defined at said regular election shall be published in English at least once a week for four weeks immediately prior to said election, in Ruidoso News, a newspaper published and of general circulation in the Village of Ruidoso. The Village Clerk is hereby charged with the duty of effectuating this provision. Such notice shall be in substantially the following form:

take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the printing of ballots, instructions and supplies, and the publication of notices.

Section 12. That if any one or more sections, sentences, clauses or parts of this ordinance shall for any reason be questioned or held invalid, such judgment shall not affect or impair or invalidate the remaining provisions of this ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the specific sections, sentences, clauses or parts of this ordinance so held unconstitutional and invalid, and the applicability and validity of any section, sentence, clause or part of this ordinance shall not be affected or prejudiced in any way by the applicability and validity of this ordinance in any other instances.

Section 13. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 14. That this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and that this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure, on the ground of urgent public need, and therefore, immediately upon its adoption by at least three-fourths of the fully authorized members of the Board of Trustees and upon the approval of the Mayor, shall be in full force and effect, and shall be published in the book of ordinances of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, and the signatures of the Mayor and Village Clerk, shall be published in the Ruidoso News, an official newspaper of said Village, and shall be in full force and effect five days after such publication.

This is the golden thread that runs through human history. It is the key to all the uncertainties and sorrows. It is the light that has guided man's footsteps into his eternal future.






