### Service Station Operators Okay Gas Tax Here

Ruidoso this week-end is host to one of the largest conferences ever held, with some 500 persons expected to attend the seventh annual Tri-State Conference for Alcoholics Anonymous. Leaders of the giant meeting remain anonymous, as is the custom of the organization. The Ruidoso, Hollywood and Green Tree chapters here are assisting in some of the arrangements.

## George Trimble New Rifle Champ In Texas Meet

The new 30 calibre rifle champion of Texas is a New Mexican. George Trimble of this city, holder of the New Mexico state title in 1950 and 1951, who last week-end in competition with 45 other gunners from the Southwest, won a mark of 654 out of 700 to take the Lone Star State's championship away from that state. The meet, attended by Trimble and R. H. Hedgecock, was held at Brownwood, Tex., Friday and Saturday.

Trimble's record came by firing 40 rounds offhand at 200 yards; 40 rounds rapid fire at 200 and 300 yards; 40 rounds at 600 yards and 20 rounds at 1,000 yards. Hedgecock came in tied for second, but ended up with third place honors through some halfbreath scoring to break the tie.

Mrs. Mary Jackson, pioneer resident of White Oaks, passed away May 5 at her home. Mrs. Jackson had been in ill health for a year. She was 73 years of age.

With her husband she lived through many pioneer experiences in White Oaks during the days of the mining boom. Epidemics were frequent and Mrs. Jackson and her husband were always ready to lend a helping hand to their neighbors in hours of sickness and need.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 2 p. m. at the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo. Interment was in the cemetery at White Oaks.

## Two Are Killed On Border Hill

Two women died Tuesday in the head-on collision of two cars, at the intersection of Border Hill, 48 miles east of Ruidoso, and their husbands were in critical condition in a Roswell hospital.

Dead were Mrs. O. F. Miller, 66, of Fence Lake in western New Mexico, and Mrs. Tom J. Teel, 55, of Comanche, Oklahoma. Teel, in serious condition in a Roswell hospital with a punctured lung and internal injuries, was not expected to live.

Miller also suffered internal injuries and was bleeding from the mouth when carried to the hospital. Both women died on the way to the hospital.

The accident occurred about noon Tuesday on U. S. 70-300. Border Hill has been noted for numerous accidents.

State Policemen D. W. Smith and Bill Allen, both of Roswell, said it was impossible to determine how the accident happened and in which direction either car was going.

They said both cars were facing west when they arrived at the scene and the impact must have been tremendous since the motors of both cars were blown back into the front seats. Both cars were demolished. Wreckage and personal belongings were strewn on the highway.

The officers said both cars appeared to be at the top of the hill at a high rate of speed.

Officers theorized that the Teels were either on their way to visit or returning from a visit to their son, S-Sgt. Millard F. Teel of Long Beach, California.

The deaths raised New Mexico's highway toll for 1954 to 124.

## Valley Couple See Fireball

Paging Dr. LaPaz!  
The noted New Mexico University professor, who spends his summer months in the Southwest, was called to Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Longbottom of Green Tree, who saw a blue fireball fall between a smaller mountain near their home, and a larger one further away on Sunday evening at shortly after sundown. They waited to see if a fire might have been started by the ball in the timber in which it fell—but none was noticed. Since they have made several unsuccessful searches for the object, which they believe fell within three-quarters of a mile of their home.

After seeing the local fireball, they read the following account in an Albuquerque paper of another having fallen in the state last week:

One of New Mexico's fabulous—and frequent—fireballs streaked through the skies last night, but, like the nursery rhyme, where it fell, nobody knows.

Momentarily after its disappearance, phones started ringing in the Journal office. Mrs. Lincoln LaPaz, wife of the famed meteor expert, placed numerous calls inquiring about the fireball's flight. Dr. LaPaz is out of town on another assignment and isn't expected to return until late today.

The fireball's journey apparently began at 8:15 p. m. and ended at 8:10 Thursday night. From all reports it was "very big, very bright, and very blue."

It was not, however, very close, Mrs. LaPaz said her informers in the northwestern part of the state apparently "a little west of north of here."

Witnesses in the northeastern part of the city described seeing the object, "like a Roman candle," in the northern skies, traveling east to west.

## RESOURCES AT BANK TOP \$1 MILLION

Hood reported Tuesday. He said at the close of business on Monday, resources stood at \$1,009,822.15. Of that amount, deposits totaled approximately \$875,000.00.

## New Garbage Pit Site Selected

In Monday night's lengthy Village Council session, Dean Cutler, supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, met with the local city council and discussed moving the city's garbage pit from its present location on Mechem Drive to another area. Fire danger as well as sanitation problems were reasons for seeking a new location. Also, the present pit is not large enough to care for Ruidoso's growth. It was pointed out. Tentative site for a new pit is 2 1/2 miles north up Gavelin canyon, and application is being made through the Forest Service for a suitable plot there. Problem of financing graveling a road, digging a pit and providing fire protection all must be worked out before the new site can be put in use, probably early this fall. The project is under the jurisdiction of Sanitary Commissioner Luther Bynum. He said Monday night private subscriptions might be sought to finance part of the move.

## Proposed New School Building On Nob Hill May Be Used For Elementary Grades Here; Present High School May Continue As Such

(Editor's Note: Below is reproduced a recommendation submitted to the Ruidoso Municipal School Board by Superintendent J. Howard Morris, concerning proposed changes in new school building construction in Ruidoso. The community voted heavily in favor of leasing bonds recently to augment a federal grant for construction of a new high school plant. Immediate needs, and possible solving of some of the facilities now in use by the high school, brought about a suggested change in use of the proposed new structure. Morris' suggestion comes from his own ideas and those of one or two other patrons of the school. The school board, upon lengthy study of this recommendation, has moved to accept it. It is being published in the public interest so the patrons may study it and know what action is being taken.)

## CITY ANNEXES LARGE AREA SURROUNDING GOLF COURSE

Ruidoso gained about 100 in its official population an enlarged area about a mile Monday night when the village council acted favorably on a petition presented by residents north of the city, seeking annexation into the village proper.

The petition, presented along with a map by Jack DiPaolo, was voted on within 10 minutes after presentation. In the area annexed are 109 lots, in some dozen blocks which surround Cree Meadows Golf & Country Club. The new limits were moved northward from Rainbow Drive in Rainbow Terrace about five blocks. The golf course was excluded from the annexation, but all of Cree Meadows subdivision is included. Residents of the area affected were almost 100% represented on the petition. DiPaolo said. He and R. A. Bennett, whose residence is on Mechem Drive, were instrumental in seeking the annexation.

Ruidoso stands to gain something in the neighborhood of about \$500 in taxes yearly by including the area in the village, Mayor Dan D. Swearingin estimated recently. Considerable development has been underway in that region in recent months.

## Hobbs Firm Gets Contract On Water System

Western Construction Co. prominent New Mexico construction concern which has handled many municipal and school projects in recent years throughout the state, and whose headquarters are in Hobbs, was successful bidder on the proposed water system improvement job, the Ruidoso Village Council announced last Friday. The council opened "seven or eight" bids, said Mayor Dan D. Swearingin.

The bid was for \$156,565, he added. "That will leave us almost \$30,000 out of our issue of \$186,000 in bonds, sold to a Denver firm, which we can use to buy some storage facilities," the mayor said. "We are at work now attempting to find and erect a storage tank of some 600,000 gallons," he added.

Actual work on the improvement of the water system here, which will include replacement of small mains with larger size pipe, replacement of worn-out mains with new ones, to be laid deep, an improved filter system and some added lateral lines, is expected to begin before the month ends.

## SOTO NOMINATED IN COMMISSIONER RACE

Final unofficial figures on outcome of the race between Soto and Geo. Sineres on the Republican ticket, seeking nomination for the office of Commissioner of District 1 revealed Soto received 302 votes to Sineres' 242. This count was not carried in full by News last week in its report of county wide results of the primaries held May 5.

## Museum Commission Leases Old Store At Lincoln

John Boylan, Custodian of the Old Courthouse Museum in Lincoln announced this week that the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission has again leased the Old Tunstall store in Lincoln, and will open it to the public as a museum. The Commission, which administers the Courthouse Museum and maintains the old Torreón in Lincoln, opened the store as a museum during the summer months of last year. A landmark in the town of Lincoln since before the days of the Lincoln County War, the old store's historic significance and picturesque architecture have attracted tourists from all over the United States. Its first owner was John Tunstall, whose murder by a sheriff's posse was the spark which touched off the Lincoln County War. After Tunstall's partner, Alexander McSwain, was killed and his house burned during the three-day battle of the War, the store, left unattended, was looted by the Seven Rivers Gang. The store's lead-lined doors and window shutters still give evidence of the trouble its early owners took to protect themselves against the gray bullets of street forays of those turbulent days. Some of the original fixtures are still part of the store's furnishings, and even items of merchandise preserved from earlier days fill the show cases. One exhibit, a silver measuring cup, once dipped whiskey from a barrel for celebrating a customer's having paid up his year's account. The store and its contents have been preserved by the family of John Penfield, pioneer Lincoln merchant.

Attendees at the Museum will be Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Hulbert, long-time residents of Lincoln. Hulbert, for many years powder man at the Old Abe gold mine in White Oaks, also holds the record for having shoveled the greatest number of carloads of ore in one day. His father was E. W. Hulbert, Lincoln attorney, who was county clerk, county treasurer, and probate judge in Lincoln County before the county seat was moved to Carrizozo. The museum will be open every day from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Admission is free to residents of Lincoln County.

## County Farm Bureau Urges Passage Of Two Bills

Directors of the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau at a recent meeting took emergency action in recommending the passage of two measures pending in Congress—Senate Bill 2,911, as originally drafted and known generally as "the wool bill" and HR 6,729 which provides for disposition of 27,000 acres of federally owned land in the Ft. Stanton Reservation, proposing to give some 1,500 acres to the State of New Mexico for building sites and turn the remainder back to the Federal Government to be administered by the Bureau of Land Management in accordance with rules and regulations of the Taylor Grazing Act. It was pointed out in the wool bill resolution that Lincoln county is the largest wool producing county of the state. Copies of the resolutions were sent to Senators Anderson and Chavez and Representatives Fernandez and Dempsey. In Hondo. Burial was in the Hondo cemetery.





**Prevent Disease By Vaccination**  
 Outright prevention of disease is a sure way for poultrymen to ward off profit losses and disappointment later on.  
 Not many poultry diseases can be effectively prevented by vaccination but some of those that can are very destructive if allowed to break out. It doesn't pay to forget this important management step.  
 Newcastle is one of the foremost poultry diseases preventable by vaccination. Poultry raisers who have knowledge that this disease has occurred in their area should be sure to vaccinate.  
 Excellent immunity is gained with Newcastle can be gained with an extremely mild virus administered by the intranasal method. Immunity develops rapidly and chicks are protected in 10-14 days.  
**MND Strain**  
 With the mild strain of virus, chicks can be vaccinated at any time. It is preferable, however, to vaccinate intranasally at 5-10 days of age since immunity response is better at that time. It is wise to revaccinate pullets shortly before they begin laying.  
 Another type of vaccine used against Newcastle disease is called wing-web. This vaccine, from a different strain of virus, is recommended for use on birds between 4 and 16 weeks of age.  
 Fowl pox is another disease that succumbs to vaccination. If there is a previous record of fowl pox in your area, it is advisable to vaccinate. This is ordinarily done most successfully when birds are 6 to 12 weeks old. Reliable fowl pox vaccine provides nearly 100 percent protection for growing birds. Use the wing-stab method.  
**Bronchitis Vaccine**  
 Infectious bronchitis has been added recently to the list of serious poultry diseases that are preventable by vaccination. Vaccinated flocks exhibit a mild distress that occurs any time from 24 hours to 10 days after vaccination. This condition lasts for a period of 5 to 10 days. Healthy birds of any age, except those in production, can be vaccinated intranasally for protection against infectious bronchitis.  
 Vaccination against fowl laryngotracheitis is recommended in areas where the disease is common. This vaccination is done by the vent method with birds usually at 6 to 12 weeks of age.  
 Chickens suffering from worm infections, lice infestations or other diseases may react unfavorably to vaccines. Therefore, vaccinate only healthy birds.
