## CITY PASSES CIGARETTE TAX

Publication this week of City Ordinance No. 80 makes a law of the cigarette tax in Ruidoso—a cent a pack tax on packages of 20 cigarettes. The tax goes into effect June 28th, Wednesday. The village council passed the tax ordinance in its meeting last Thursday night. All money received from the tax, which will be collected through wholesalers—will go into a special fund for recreational facilities for juveniles—the only legal use it could be put to under the New Mexico statutes. First expenditure of the money likely will go toward improving the city's park land at the mouth of Carrizo Creek and the Rio Ruidoso.

Mayor Dan Swearingin mentioned in a recent council meeting that a park commission likely will be appointed in Ruidoso to handle this project. Funds from the cigarette tax accumulators.

Ordinance for placing a cent a gallon tax on gasoline retailed within the village limits was read for the first time Thursday night last week, and was scheduled to be passed Monday night this week in a second and third reading. It is to go into effect in mid-June, also to be collected from wholesalers. This money, also, is earmarked for special use—recreation and improvement—the only use it can be put to under New Mexico statutes. Other business transacted at last week's council meeting included the purchase of a new building for the Butler and W. A. Hart to turn the Youth Center gymnasium and adjoining grade school buildings over to the city for possible use as a city hall and municipal building. The charter was read for consideration, and whether or not the village will accept is yet to be determined, said Mayor Swearingin. The third annual New Mexico Camp Farthest Out will convene at Carrizo Lodge, Ruidoso, Tuesday, June 1. It seeks to show people how to make Christ more real in personal living, in family life, in church life, in education, in business and industry, in national and world affairs. The Camp Farthest Out is in existence for only one great reason and that is to make Jesus Christ a vital and dynamic experience in the lives of people as Lord and Savior. Great emphasis is placed upon prayer, repentance, forgiveness, commitment and joyous fellowship. The name Camp Farthest Out originated when the first camp was being planned. Glenn Clark as a Christian layman and author had been college president, football and track coach and earnestly sought to make God in Christ a genuine personal experience in the lives of people. He sought to draw together a group of people who would go all the way with God, who would go further out in their effort to find and follow God's will. So they took the name, Camp Farthest Out and it has remained such ever the years.

**ORDINANCE NO. 80 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF A SPECIAL TAX UPON THE SALE OF CIGARETTES SOLD WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR SELLING CIGARETTES UPON WHICH A TAX HAS NOT BEEN PAID; LIMITING THE USE OF SUCH TAXES FOR RECREATIONAL PURPOSES.**

Section 1. A special tax is hereby assessed upon the sale of cigarettes in the Village of Ruidoso as follows: five (5) mills on each package of ten (10) cigarettes or less; one (1) cent on each package containing more than ten (10) and not more than twenty (20) cigarettes; and an additional five (5) mills for each ten (10) cigarettes or less over twenty (20) cigarettes contained in one (1) package.

Section 2. The word "cigarette" is used in its most common acceptance, and shall mean all rolls of tobacco or substitute thereof wrapped in paper or other substance.

Section 3. Every person, firm, or corporation, selling cigarettes in the Village of Ruidoso, is liable for the payment of the tax imposed by Section 1 hereof.

Section 4. All wholesale dealers in cigarettes doing business in the Village of Ruidoso shall, on or before the 10th day of each month, make a complete report to the Village Clerk upon forms to be furnished by said Clerk of all cigarettes sold during the preceding month either to consumers or retail dealers within the Village of Ruidoso and shall remit to the Village Treasurer with such report payment to cover the tax upon the basis as specified within this Ordinance.

Section 5. Any retail dealer who may buy cigarettes in interstate commerce and not from a wholesaler doing business within the Village of Ruidoso shall, on or before the 10th day in the month make a report and pay the tax on any cigarettes so bought and sold at retail.

Section 6. Every wholesale dealer in cigarettes doing business within the Village of Ruidoso shall keep records showing all sales of cigarettes to retailers in the Village of Ruidoso, which records shall be subject to inspection by the officials and agents of the Village.

Section 7. Retail dealers of cigarettes shall procure and keep inventories of all cigarettes, showing the dates and amounts of each purchase and shall open them for inspection of the officials and agents of the Village.

Section 8. All money collected under and by virtue of this ordinance shall be deposited to the credit of the Village of Ruidoso in a special fund, designated "Recreational Funds" and shall be used exclusively for playgrounds and similar recreational facilities for persons within the Village.

Section 9. Any person who shall knowingly sell or distribute any cigarettes within the Village of Ruidoso without having complied







Getting rid of birds that are lagging in development not only reduces the feed bill but gives the producer an opportunity to have a uniformly better flock by fall. Culling is one of the most financially rewarding practices that a poultry raiser can observe.

The art of culling is not at all limited to the poultry "expert." An alert poultryman can learn to cull his own birds and, by observing such points as rate of growth, feathering, body shape, fleshing and egg production, will develop into a more efficient poultry producer in the process.

There is a minimum of equipment required for culling. To catch the birds, a hook or net is ordinarily used. Many poultrymen keep these items in the house at all times and immediately remove any bird that shows signs of un-thriftiness.

By placing burlap sacks over the windows to darken the house, culling will cause less excitement in the flock. To prevent injury, handle the birds carefully, especially

when using a hook to catch them. Catching crates with sliding doors at the ends are handy for culling. A piece of heavy wire netting is quite satisfactory for driving the birds to the crate. Birds should not be crowded into the catching crate because some may suffocate.

Market Cockerels Cockerels should be separated from the pullets as soon as possible, preferably by the time birds are put on the range. Market all cockerels, keeping only those which appear to have the best breeding qualities.

In selecting cockerels you are going to keep, pick those birds that had long pinfeathers in their wings at hatching time or tail feathers at 10 days of age. This means marking the promising cockerels early in life.

Usually it is desirable to retain enough cockerels to maintain a proportion of one male to 15 females in medium and heavy breeds. For Leghorns, keep only one rooster for 20 hens.
