## Lincoln County's Lava Beds Prove Interesting Attraction

Many people who have lived in New Mexico all their lives and some well known scientists and geologists, on the search for strange and beautiful geological formations, have never seen the unusual volcanic lava beds, in the weird country of two extinct volcanic areas, in the northwestern, and the south central sections of New Mexico.

In the south central there is a 45-mile-long area of the Mal Pais, or lava beds in Lincoln County, about 17 miles west of Three Rivers, situated in the western part of Sierra Blanca Mountains.

In a rugged unexplored country west of Albuquerque, there is one of the largest areas known as "Mal Pais Land" covering approximately 10 townships, lava and ash deposits, and deep canyons and gaping crevices, formed by erupting volcanoes. In that northern country of New Mexico, over a million years ago.

Here, there are great slabs of burned, black slag, and ash, spewed-out from rivers of red-hot molten rock, from the interior regions, by a power many times greater than the atom, or the H-bomb. Even at present when viewing the appalling spectacle of miles and miles of huge black rocks, and flat slabs, piled symmetrically, as if by human hands, just as they come from the burning mountain, any one more fully realize, what the destruction of the ancient city of Pompeii, meant to the thousands of people of Italy. They, half-crazed with fear, fled from what they thought was the wrath of God, during an eruption of Vesuvius in 79 A. D.

In the rugged country of the northwestern Mal Pais, there are what appears to be made-to-order hiding places for loot, probably never used, however, by thieves or robbers, because of the weird, spooky-looking formations, exciting superstitious fears.

There was one instance, probably, where a reported \$100,000 in gold was hidden in a Santa Fe passenger train by bandits Grants, N. M., in 1897, was thought to have been hidden in the desolate Mal Pais area near Grants. Although sought by many treasure seekers throughout the years, unless the gold was afterwards "tossed by the bandits, it will probably remain hidden in the weird Mal Pais country until the end of time.

Old Spanish Trail and George Congdon, both of Gallup, New Mexico, on a week's exploration trip through the Albuquerque and Grants country of Mal Pais, reported discovery of an old Spanish trail, possibly the route traveled by Coronado, seeking the fabled golden "Seven Cities of Cibola." The two modern explorers, who reported finding on the old trail, pieces of gold dishes, an old axle of an ox-cart, a yoke and bones of oxen, a grinding stone, a gun and holster, made of buffalo hide, declared their intention of returning at a later date for further explorations in the mysterious Mal Pais Land.

There is a spring in the Mal Pais country, 17 miles west of Three Rivers station on the Southern Pacific Railway, two miles northwest of the south end of the 45-mile-long Mal Pais, in Lincoln County. Called "Mal Pais Springs" by explorers of the S. I. Redfield party in 1897, who camped beside the 60 by 150 foot phenomenon, it flowed probably 2,000 gallons a minute (Meinzer and Hart, Water Resources of Tularosa Basin). The spring was said to be noteworthy because of its size and location, in the barren Mal Pais, without other springs or running water for many miles in any direction.

The clear cold water flows directly from a crevice in the lava. It is brackish, and alkaline, but is usable for limited use of humans, especially while camping, and for use of stock, but it is too highly mineralized for continuous use.

Said the late W. L. Patterson several years ago, in his description of the spring: "The outflow is through a mile of ditch constructed by a settler for irrigation of a tract of land, which proved to be too 'sippy' for successful cultivation."

The spring flow spreads out into marsh land, before the main stream sinks into sand a mile or two south.

The spring is reached from the Three Rivers station by an unpaved, but generally passable dirt road, through the old Hatchet Ranch, then west and southwest around the south end of the Mal Pais. This road, formerly a main route to the Rio Grande Valley, through Lava Beds, between Capitol, and Rattlesnake peaks in San Andreas Mountains, is used but little at present.

The highest point in the Mal Pais country," described by Explorer Redfield in his 1897 description of "Mal Pais Land" is a great mountain of ashes and cinders, by the crater."


### BOY WEIGHS IN



News Notes from Farms, Ranches, Orchards

**Chickens Face Summer Diseases**  
Growing chickens usually do well in warm weather if they can avoid certain diseases. The poultry shelter affords fresh air to be brought in without the chilling blast of winter winds. Respiratory troubles are less severe. Sunlight and green forage add to the general well-being of the flock. The disease causing the most trouble in growing birds is coccidiosis. When young chickens are put out on range there is a good chance they will be exposed to coccidiosis. When birds are placed on land that has been poultry range before, the chances are increased. Overcrowding and damp litter invite coccidiosis. Fuddles and ponds provide moist conditions favorable to develop-

ment of coccidia. It is wise to select a well-drained range and to move waterers, shelters and feeders regularly.  
**Preventive Drugs**  
Coccidiosis preventatives can be used in feed or water. These preventatives are drugs given at low concentration on a continuous schedule. To get the most out of the drugs, use them wisely. The objective of the poultryman should be to keep the coccidia (tiny parasites that cause coccidiosis) at a minimum even if drugs are being used.  
Some poultrymen prefer to let the disease break out and then use a coccidiosis control. This method works fairly well if the control is applied promptly.  
Internal parasites have become a summertime problem for chickens. Worm eggs accumulate in old litter and need only moisture and shade to develop. Shaded, wet areas on range should be fenced off or eliminated. Large roundworms can cause serious trouble when young birds are heavily infested. There are several good treatments for worms.  
**Fowl Typhoid**  
Fowl typhoid occurs suddenly during warm weather. The disease can be brought into a flock by any-

thing that moves such as trucks, dogs, people or birds. All dead and sick birds should be removed and destroyed when fowl typhoid occurs. Sanitation is a major factor in preventing the disease. Certain bacteria have been used to increase resistance against fowl typhoid.

Blue comb, sometimes called pullet disease, is a hot weather problem although not all outbreaks occur during the summer. Here again, sanitation is important in preventing the disease. By doing routine vaccinations (fowl pox, Newcastle, etc.) early in the season rather than late and by not subjecting the birds to sudden change, threat of blue comb is lessened.

# Blazer's Mill, Historic Old Landmark In Reservation, Crumbles Away

Blazer's Mill, the historic old landmark on the Tularosa River is almost gone.

The weight of the snows of many winters have, at last crumbled the old adobe walls until only a corner of the original building is still standing, supported by a few posts and the bullet-scarred timber around the empty doorway.

Located beside the main highway No. 70, through Mesquero, the Apache Indian Reservation, few of the thousands of travelers passing by give more than a glance to the old ruin.

In a year or so it will be completely obliterated as are the graves of at least three of the men who died violently in or beside it.

Late in 1860, Dr. Joseph Hoy Blazer, a Civil War veteran who had been involved out of the Union Army and had gone into freighting, drove his outfit of mules and wagons through the beautiful timber-studded mountain country. He saw and wanted the little water-powered sawmill on the Tularosa River.

Built by the early Mexican settlers many years before, it was known then, simply, as La Maquina—the Machine.

Although it was located in the heart of the Mesquero Apache's stronghold, during a time when all Indians were "wild Indians," the former dentist from Penney, Va. wanted that mill so badly that he traded his entire freighting outfit for a share of it.

Several men before him had tried to make a go of the mill, but because of the Indian predations had failed. Dr. Blazer won the

confidence of the Apache chief, Santana, and signed a peace treaty with him that eventually resulted in a close friendship between the two men, and the mill's safety from Apaches, at last.

There were still other wondering tribes to fight off, and during the widespread Indian troubles of the 1880's, the notorious chief Victorio camped at the mill just before he made the bloody raids that rocked the entire west.

Dr. Blazer had, by this time, brought his children down from Iowa, and together they ran the mill and served food to travelers in a sort of road-house arrangement.

During the Lincoln County War, a bitter and bloody battle was fought in and around Dr. Blazer's Mill, when Billy the Kid, Dick Brewer and eleven others attempted to arrest a man, "Buckshot" Roberts, whom they suspected of having a part in the murder of the Kid's friend and employer, John H. Tunstall.

Roberts was an ex-soldier, who had been, at sometime or another, riddled with bullets by Texas Rangers. He lived, though badly crippled in the arms and upper body, and earned his nickname from the fact that he carried so much lead around inside him.

Roberts refused to submit to arrest, even in the face of such odds as thirteen to one, and that thirteen including such noted fighters as Billy the Kid, Frank and George Coe, Dick Brewer, Charlie Bowdre and others.

Roberts, laden down with weapons, arrived while George Coe and John Middleton were on guard duty and before the posse were inside Blazer's Mill eating. Just

then Frank Coe walked out and tried to persuade Roberts to surrender peacefully to the posse. But the doctory little man although he must have known it would mean his death, refused.

In the daylight that followed, Roberts, shot through the stomach by Bowdre immediately, managed to kill Brewer, and wound Bowdre, Middleton and George Coe. Dragging himself inside an outbuilding across from the Mill,

Roberts pulled a featherbed onto the floor near the doorway, and lay there groaning and shooting at any portion of anatomy he saw. For some time, he held the posse at a standstill.

Finally, Dr. Blazer, hoping to put a stop to the fight, went as close to the outbuilding as he dared and called to Roberts.

"I am Dr. Blazer, the man of the house. May I come in and help you in any way?"

Blazer entered, looked at Roberts, then went out and told the posse:

"Boys there's no use fighting any longer. That fellow won't last an hour."

The posse left, and Blazer sent for a doctor from nearby Ft. Stanton, but Roberts died before he could arrive.

Both Brewer and Roberts were buried on a knoll near the mill; some say in the same grave, but the exact location is lost.

Later, even the Kid said, admiringly:

"Yes, sir, he licked our crowd to a finish."

Dr. Blazer, himself, died at the mill of diphtheria in 1898, and was buried on the hillside overlooking it.

Soon, without doubt, the lush mountain grass and seedling pine will have covered the location of Blazer's Mill, as it has the graves, and nature will have taken back what was once hers. But there will always be a few who remember the men who played their various parts in the winning of the west.

Corn and beans were leading crops raised by New Mexico Indians near their villages, or pueblos, as early as 1,000 years ago.





**The County Agent Reports**  
(By RALPH DUNLAP)

The problems of pest in orchards can become very destructive in a hurry. The Circle Diamond Ranch has a very severe infestation of spider mites which cause the leaves to lose color and will cause the fruit to fall if they are not controlled. The leaf takes on a bronze appearance due to the mites taking the sap out of portions of

the leaf. The mites have been noticed on several other orchards in that area. The best control of mites is obtained by applying a dormant oil before the trees leaf out in the spring. If you are having mite trouble you can control the mite with Aramite with two sprays 7 to 10 days apart. DM-11 may be used but tends to burn the leaves in the hot summer days. If the mite is not controlled the tree is likely to lose its fruit this year and lack the vigor to set a crop the next year.

Many growers are applying wettable sulfur at 8 lbs. per 100 gallons in their summer sprays. Sulfur helps to keep down mites as well as powder mildew in apples. Sulfur will not control severe infestations.

**Engineers Needed For Panama Canal Electric Work**

The Panama Canal Company, the corporate agency of the United States that operates the Panama Canal, has announced that electrical engineers are urgently needed to begin the electric power conversion program in the Canal Zone. Applicants for positions paying \$10,450 a year must have construction experience in conversion from 25- to 60-cycle. All applicants must be American citizens of good character, physically sound, and preferably under 40 years of age.

Additional information may be obtained from V. R. Brown, Personnel Representative, Panama Canal Company, Washington 25, D. C. Standard Form 91, which may be obtained from most post offices is required for these positions. Interested candidates are urged to file their applications with Brown immediately.


At a later date Green Tree will cut to dial and the new numbers and instructions will be mailed to all customers.
