Ruidoso is urged to have a large delegation present Sunday, Aug. 1, when U. S. Highway 54 celebrates the completion of the final gap in the paving of this important central national route. Rep. L. S. (Heavy) Drake said this week it looked like only a handful might get to attend from this resort center, which will benefit greatly from future tourist business funneled into Ruidoso from the mid-west via this new tourist route. L. P. Bloodworth, former Ruidoso News editor and publisher, was the master of ceremonies for the dedication, at which Gov. Ed Mechem will appear. The program will be held on the northern end of the old paving out of Carrizozo, where the new project just completed ties in, said Drake. The program starts at 2:30 p. m. The tour of White Oaks starts from Alamogordo at 8:30 a. m. Holloman AFB has informed Vernon Petty, Highway 54 president, that the Army will move special equipment to the dedication site and launch a small guided missile. ## Old-Timers Get-To-Gether Is Feature In Old Lincoln Program In August

For a day or two the clock will be turned back to the pioneer times of early Lincoln county at the annual Day in Old Lincoln to be held August 8 in Lincoln. A feature of the celebration will be the historical pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid." There will be two shows this year: Saturday, August 7, and Sunday, August 8, both beginning at 8 o'clock in the evening. The day in old Lincoln Sunday program honoring the old-timers of Southeastern New Mexico will begin some time around noon. Included in this get-together will be introduction of old timers, old-time singing, fiddling, Spanish dancing, and other features.

Year by year as the legend of Billy the Kid grows, people are beginning to wonder just what kind of fellow he really was. The annual Lincoln County Historical Pageant, which is presented in the very shadow of the old court house from which the Kid made his spectacular escape in 1881, represents a lot of hard work in an attempt to bring back the old times for a day or two and to make the famous "Kid come back to Lincoln, so that all can get a glimpse of him. The people doing this job are really cut out for their work. Most of the actors in the play are lifetime residents of Lincoln county, and many are actual descendants of prominent figures in pioneer Lincoln county history. They have grown up with the story. You might say, they have it in their blood. Then, too, there is something about putting on the play about things that actually happened, right almost at the place they took place. Maybe the imagination of the actors fits well into their parts—some so closely that you could hardly tell them from the real character they represent. I should like to tell you something about all the players. . .

Tickets went on sale Tuesday morning for the Charity Downs sponsored by Ruidoso Downs. ## Rotarians Hear Of Mogollon Discoveries

Lieut. Col. G. Merton Sayre of the Modern Languages department of the New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell was guest speaker at Ruidoso Rotary Club's luncheon session Tuesday, telling Rotarians and guests of recent discoveries in the search for information about the inhabitants of this region from 900 A. D. until 1500 A. D.—the Mogollons. Earliest known residents, some 9000 years ago, did not make pottery, he said, but lived in caves over the arid desert. They were a pear-shaped region in which Ruidoso is the very heart, extending north above Corona in Lincoln County, south into Old Mexico about as far, west beyond El Paso, and east to and including the country around Roswell. The finding of different kinds of pottery denotes various centuries in the residence of the Mogollons. Many sites have been explored in Lincoln county, including near Corona, at Glencoe, around Captain, around Lincoln and of course in Ruidoso. He said archeologists and anthropologists are continually seeking the answer as to why the Mogollons became extinct. He presented colored slides of "dwellings" near Roswell at Glencoe and near Corona. Col. Sayre, who is sectional director in the American Radio Operators League of amateur radio operators, and who owns a summer home in Ruidoso, said when such sites as that at Glencoe are uncovered, they are done so with painstaking care, so that what artifacts are classified as to what level they are located—which can indicate the century the area was occupied. Mottled masonry, projectile points, pottery and other items are found. Sometimes small stone carved animals are unearthed. Visitors at the meeting Tuesday included H. C. ## Water Rights Cost On Eagle Creek Due In 60 Days

The Inter-Community Water Association officials who traveled to San Francisco last week-end returned Saturday night to Ruidoso after brief talks with officials of the Southern Pacific Railroad, concerning the securing of land and water rights in the Eagle Creek watershed. On their return Mayor Dan Swearingin told the News "The Southern Pacific officials were very receptive to the delegation's offer to purchase the Eagle Creek water rights. We will have a definite commitment from them regarding the price within the next 30 to 60 days." The group spent only one day in San Francisco, but completed all details for securing the land and water rights with the exception of price before they embarked for the return trip, Swearingin said. Besides Swearingin, James Earl Harrower of Captain, Frank Boyce of Carrizozo, Attorney Halb representing Ft. Stanton, and Attorney General Dick Robinson made the flight to the West Coast city.

## Widely Known Carrizozo Athlete Drowns After Rescue

A Carrizozo high school sports star drowned in the Applegate River near Meador, Oregon, last Wednesday after he had saved a girl from mid-stream. He was identified as Samuel Charles Wedell, 18, of Ancho. State Police said Wedell had gone to the rescue of the girl, and after a struggle brought her near shore while others waited. The girl was brought ashore. No one noticed that Wedell, apparently exhausted, had gone down himself. His body was recovered. Wedell graduated from Carrizozo N. M. high school this spring and was captain of the football and basketball teams. He won a scholarship to New Mexico University and planned to enter this fall. Ticket Sales Lag In New Car Contest. C. ### Mrs. Tom Charles Tells Lore Of Ghost Town, White Oaks

Mrs. Tom Charles, Alamogordo, area historian, this week recalled the lore that makes White Oaks in Lincoln county a historic site and where tourists will meet for entering the old gold mine and have a picnic lunch on Sunday, Aug. 1. Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the White Oaks trip in connection with the dedication of Highway 54, north of Carrizozo.

Wernon Petty, of N. M. Highway 54 association, announced a free barbecue would follow the dedication ceremonies.

Dave Jackson, resident of White Oaks since 1937, will join the tour as special guide. Jackson will relate the town biography and its fabulous riches, its heartbreaking wait for a railroad that never came, and finally the Exodus which made White Oaks a ghost town.

John J. Baxter, a Missouri prospector, Mrs. Charles reports, was the original discoverer of gold in the White Oaks district. Baxter arrived in Lincoln county in 1878 with a couple of mules, a miner's pick and shovel and a bit of acid for assaying.

The mountain on which his discovery was made became known as Baxter's mountain and the camp quickly became White Oaks. Baxter was satisfied with a return of a few hundred dollars in gold left the country, drifted into Silver City where he was shot and injured on the Gila river in an Indian raid in 1885. When he returned to White Oaks in the late '80s he found a rip-roaring camp and the claim which he had abandoned had become important and valuable property.

There are conflicting stories about the gold strike at White Oaks. Mrs. Charles writes, but one published version is that into Baxter's camp in late '79 there wandered a stranger named Tom Wilson. Wilson asserted was a fugitive from Texas law. In search of a feasible route for his next day's travel Wilson started up Baxter mountain about sundown, jokingly remarking he might find a gold mine.

Toward the top, Wilson sat down to rest, idly pecking away an exposed ledge, dropping a few of the rock slivers into his pocket. On his return he dropped the samples into Baxter's hand—and Baxter let out a whoop that it was the richest ore in New Mexico.

Though it was pitch dark, Baxter insisted on staking the claim that night. With a coal-oil lantern they started back up the mountain. A man named Jack Winters accompanied them and proceeded to count himself in. Wilson then disclaimed any part of the gold when it came to staking the claim, saying he had no use for gold.

This was incredible to Baxter and Winters but they acceded to his wishes and insisted that he take \$9 in cash and a good pistol as token of his services. It was great reward for the discovery which developed in the "North" and "South" homestakes, two of the greatest producers in the White Oaks area.

When the Homestake was struck, tradition has it, Mrs. Charles recounts, that Winters brought a wagonload of whiskey, passed around tin cups and invited the town to have a drink.



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



### Timely Thoughts on Traffic Toll

Vacation time is here again. That means millions of Americans will soon be piling in the family car and taking off for a motor trip. Automobile accidents resulting from these pleasure jaunts killed 22,200 people last year—and almost half of the deaths occurred on weekends. Another 1,250,000 were injured.

To avoid a similar toll this year safety experts are advocating the following automobile safety rules. Memorize them—they may save your life:



- (1) Never drive after drinking—and don't drink alcoholic beverages if you plan to drive.
- (2) Don't pass or file or curves—and never cut in sharply.
- (3) On long trips be sure to take a break every two or three hours. A stop for coffee or some similar beverage keeps reflex action at a peak.
- (4) Never get closer than 90 to 100 feet behind the car ahead of you. The military uses one yard per mile per hour as a standard.
- (5) It's a good rule. If you're going 50 mph stay 50 yards behind the car in front.
- (6) Don't try to keep up with the speed limit—make it a habit never to drive too fast for highway conditions, no matter what the speed limit is.
- (7) Don't cross intersections unless you're sure you have the right of way. And don't insist on the right of way. It's often safer to let the other fellow have it, whether he is entitled to it or not.
- (8) Don't drive if you are at all drowsy or sleepy. Pull off the road and have a cup of coffee and get a better arrive late than at all.

### Driggers Ordered To Cite Residents Without NM Tags

State Patrolman Bill Driggers, Green Tree, said last week-end he had received instructions from State Police Chief Joe Roach to cite all motorists in the Ruidoso area who do not have 1954 New Mexico license plates on their vehicles, who have made their residence here 90 days or longer, who are gainfully employed or are in business. ## Buzzin' Around Lincoln County

News Notes from Farms, Ranches, Orchards  
By TRAVIS B. HOOKS

Maintaining the feed consumption of chickens during hot summer months is of utmost importance to the poultry raiser. This is true of growing birds as well as layers since feed intake affects both growth and egg production.

To begin with, birds that are not comfortable will not eat. Therefore, such things as adequate drinking water, a well-ventilated house and plenty of shade are important when it comes to a bird's eating habits. By helping your birds to keep cool you also help maintain feed intake.

The diet should be nutritious, that is, it should supply the various nutrients in proper proportion to insure birds a well-balanced feeding program. But even a nutritious diet sometimes fails to do

a satisfactory job. When this happens, the raiser should check his feeding program for such factors as freshness, palatability and bulkiness of feedstuffs.

Fresh feed is always more palatable than stale feed. This is particularly important when feeding mash mixtures. Mash remaining in hoppers for several days loses some of its value as a source of Vitamin A. On each visit to the flock during the day, stir up the mash in the feeders to encourage birds to eat more.

For laying hens, a moist mash

### Texas Tech Explores Indian Ruins Near Glencoe

Again this year, as has been done in the last several years, a field trip of Texas Technological College archeology students is camped on the Ruidoso River on Bonnell's Ranch at Glencoe, and its members are engaged in unearthing early Apache and still older, Mogollon artifacts, including stone implements, tools and bowls at a site just above Shorty Ellis' store.
