Should something like that ever come to pass—we'd be among the first to decline another Lincoln County War. With Uncle Sam's purse strings open to those who would divert this water for "defense," just how can we preserve the water? There, we cannot use it very often, but for it to remain in our own county.

Chavez' remarks sound more political than helpful. He has been out of touch with the hinterland so long he evidently does not know that we have just about accepted the fate of Bonito and that three communities, Capitán, Ruidoso and Ft. Stanton, have organized a water board to try and secure the "leavings," that water right Ft. Stanton has in Eagle Creek, a trickle out of the Bonito watershed. Perhaps he might assist us in the further development of that. Press releases won't help so much as a little shucking of the shirt and some downright labor for our interests.

start acting up and a general wave of indignation flared. We think you'll agree that it is something to get mad and angry over such a thing. At Shelby last week junk dealers raised the bid on surplus "brass" that the U. S. Air Force was selling from five cents to \$4 a pound. The word leaked out that the "brass" was actually silver. The Air Force was selling 52 tons of surplus emblems and decorations in auction at the Shelby Air Force Base Depot.

Newspaper stories say that "High Air Force brass was asking some embarrassing questions about how tons of silver and silver plated emblems and decorations were put up for auction."

The taxpayers would probably like to know how the Air Force (that's 52 tons) of silver in surplus decorations. We expressed it in terms of ounces because silver sells at 85¢.

If the Air Force had 52 tons of surplus emblems and decorations at just one Air Force depot, how much did it have all over? How much did the Army have, and the Navy?

By should there be 52 tons of surplus Air Force decorations at the Shelby depot? How many war bonds bought by patriotic Americans went down this rat hole?

This is just a new variation of an old, old theme—the criminal waste of taxpayers' money by the Armed Services.

How many times have you read about the Army or the Navy buying enough of a certain item to last 100 years? Here's a new one to remember—52 tons of emblems and decorations at just one Air Force depot.

It was just a few years ago that we were told and Congress was told that it was all right to cut the federal budget, but not at the expense of our nation's defense.

"Defense" of course included 52 tons of surplus decorations for the Air Force. It included emblems and other stuff that was auctioned off to junk dealers at a few cents on the dollar.

How long is this nation going to stand for the taxpayers' dollars being spent, not like "drunken sailing" but the way the high brass of the Army, the Navy, the Marines, and the Air Force spends it? Yes, the high brass pulled a boner in auctioning silver costing 94¢ cents a pound, which is still too cheap even for brass.

But a bigger boner was pulled when some member of the "high brass" in the Air Force squandered our War Bond money on 52 tons of surplus decorations.

Senator Suggests Cities Organize To Keep Bonito

Washington (Sp.) — Senator Dennis Chavez suggested today the four New Mexico towns most interested in Lake Bonito as a source of water, organize into a water district in order to argue their interests in Lake Bonito. (Ed. Note: See Half & Half column this week.)

The lake, water in which has been developed in past years by the Southern Pacific Railway, which is falling to permit use by Holloman Air Force Base. The Southern Pacific has declared Bonito no longer necessary for the railroad purposes.

One of the four towns, Capitán, has been unable to develop a water supply which is suitable for human consumption. The Senator said while Ruidoso faces short supply, Fort Stanton probably has a small senior water right to part of Bonito water, and the fourth town, Carrizozo, will be dependent upon Lake Bonito.

If the federal government attempts to withdraw the entire right of Lake Bonito for Air Force purposes, it will leave at least four towns in not too good condition," the Senator said. "The alternative, and more lasting solution, is the development of an alternate water supply in the area, and a water district probably would be necessary for this development, or to argue the matter of federal acquisition."

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R. C. Garland of Las Cruces and James T. Jennings of Roswell were elected to the board from the Third and Fifth Judicial Districts, respectively.

Just before adjournment late in the afternoon, the convention engaged in a lively debate before voting to recommend changes in the basic organization of the State Bar.

Take Away Powers
Herbert B. Gerhart of Raton, former clerk of the State Supreme Court, commented that in his belief the changes take away dictatorial powers from the Board of Bar Commissioners.

He objected, however, to one recommendation that the bar commissioners constitute a nominating committee which would name persons for office in the State Bar.

Chief Justice James B. McChesney, at the morning session, told the lawyers of an idea he has for forming a judicial council, a majority of whose members would be laymen representing various branches of business and industry. He said he believed such a council, which has been tried in other states, would prove a great help in such matters as obtaining needed legislation. He said New Mexico needs such a council.

The ordinary person, given a chance is interested in learning of legal matters which could affect him.

This has been indicated in Oklahoma where a brand new public relations program by the state legal profession now is being tried at the state level.

It was described in an interview by G. Ellis Gable of Tulsa, president of the Oklahoma Bar Assn. He was guest of honor at the New Mexico Bar Assn. convention here.

"We are immensely pleased with the reception our program has had on the public," he said. "We consider this one of our profession's main problems—letting the people see their lawyers in their true light. Too many people's ideas of lawyers have been gained from sensational stories and movies and television."

The three-point Oklahoma Program consists of columns for newspaper use on "It's the law in Oklahoma," Pamphlets for distribution to the public, and weekly radio programs. Topics discussed include such things as the advisability of making a will and the good or bad points about joint tenancy.

"The idea is not to advise the public on the law," Gable said, "but to let the public know that such problems exist. If they want to do anything about it, then they can see a lawyer."

John D. Donnell, Fort Sumner, was elected chairman of the Junior Bar Section of the state organization, succeeding James A. Maloney of Albuquerque.

The new vice chairman of the junior group is Timothy Woolston of Albuquerque, who succeeds S. E. Kitta of Santa Fe. Richard A. Stanley, Alamogordo, was elected secretary-treasurer, succeeding J. R. Nelson, Truth or Consequences.

The Junior Section, made up of attorneys under 35, is five years old. Jesse D. Weir, Las Cruces, president of the entire organization, praised the younger group for its work during the past year. He declared "New Mexico is a great state."

A medical spokesman told New Mexico lawyers Friday the problem caused by "professional witnesses" might be solved if the

medical profession could provide panels of qualified experts.

Dr. John F. Conway of Clovis, president of the New Mexico Medical Society, told the State Bar Association convention that professional witnesses have not become a problem in New Mexico as they have in some states.

He said such witnesses pose as experts on everything.

Frequently they are received in court as experts although their fellow doctors might not agree.

Conway suggested the courts could assure themselves of unbiased medical testimony if the medical profession were to make lists available of persons able to testify in any given case.

He said he knew of no reason why differences existing between the legal and medical professions could not be satisfactorily solved.

Conway appeared on a panel with A. H. McLeod, Albuquerque attorney.

McLeod noted that doctors frequently are reluctant to give up the time to talk to lawyers. He agreed that such extracurricular work is becoming more and more part of a doctor's business. He said

Work Starts On Water Improvements Village Property Sold, Other Matters Handled By City In Last 30 Days

(Editor's Note: Below is the fourth monthly report written for the Ruidoso News by Mayor Dan Swearingin, concerning activities of the Village during August. The report touches on the major projects and does not go into the many and varied other matters discussed, not acted upon, tabled or in abeyance.)

(By Mayor Dan Swearingin)
 September 3, 1954, marks the fourth month of the current administration.

During this last month bids were accepted on the Village property for sale. Three tracts were sold to Jack DiPaolo as high bidder. Mr. DiPaolo was also high bidder for a lot inside the city limits. Proceeds from these sales will go for the construction of a vitally needed jail. This jail will be located at the new city hall.

Village was informed by County Commissioner George Fuchs of the possibility of the Indian service constructing a better graveled road from the city limits to the main road on Carrizo Creek road.

After considerable discussion the Village called for bids on various size water storage tanks. These new tanks will give the Village approximately 5 times the treated water storage as is now available. Bids will be opened this Friday.

Mr. Jennings and the Village are still negotiating on TV central antenna franchise.

Due to the many complaints that the Village has received on unlicensed dogs running loose within the Village notices has been given that after Oct. 1, a drive will be made to correct this situation.

The roof has been replaced on the new city hall and work is going forward on needed repairs on the interior. As soon as painting is completed the city offices will move to the new location. This move will take place probably October 1.

Western Construction Co. is hauling materials and the filter plant near the reservation line is under construction. If all goes as is expected the company will have completed its work by the first of December.

The \$50,000 bond issue has been duly processed and approved and the money should be forthcoming. Money for the storage tanks will come from this C. O. bond money.

The Village has contacted the State Health Department on the possibility of a Sanitary Land Fill of garbage disposal. This method requires the covering of the garbage with earth and no burning. It is the most desirable type of garbage disposal. There is a possible site located on State land one mile north of the airport.

I am contacted every day by individuals who have various complaints. I would like to stress the fact that the work of the Village is under various departments. The departments and the department heads are as follows: Sanitary (garbage, sewerage, loose stock, etc.), Luther Bynum; Water, Harold Jones; Street, S. K. Kuyken; Parks, Village real property, D. E. Snyder; Police, Dan D. Swearingin. The Village Clerk is responsible for keeping the records of the Village, and acts as treasurer of the Village. The mayor is also responsible in seeing that all departments function.



Many complaints are being received by the Board of Trustees and the Police Department of this Village regarding unlicensed dogs, abandoned dogs, dogs running in packs, female dogs not being kept up etc, and a program of licensing, impounding and destroying of stray dogs will be started immediately after Oct. 1, 1954.

A great number of local citizens have not licensed their dogs and the same are running loose with no collars or tags—these dogs will be impounded and destroyed after the proper period of time if no license is procured.

All dogs abandoned by summer residents, and which are strays, will be impounded and destroyed after proper time, if same are not claimed and licensed.

The above program is deemed necessary to rid the Village limits of numerous unwanted and stray dogs which are causing complaints from all areas.

Please Note: Ordinance No. 10 requires the licensing of ALL dogs regardless if they are kept up or not. Owners of female dogs who do not keep such animals secured while "proud" will be fined on immediately.

American Bar Association President Among Distinguished Visitors Here Attending State Lawyers' Meeting

Editor's Note: Below is some biographical information about Lloyd Wright, president of the American Bar Association, and who was principal speaker in the final session of the New Mexico Bar convention in Ruidoso last week-end.

Mr. Lloyd Wright of Los Angeles, president of the American Bar Association, the chief executive officer of the largest and most influential national organization of the legal profession. He took office on Aug. 20, 1954, and holds the distinction of being the first ABA president to have his official headquarters in the new American Bar Center in Chicago. Long active in bar association affairs in his home city and state as well as in the work of the American Bar Association, Mr. Wright brought to his national office a broad experience in organized bar activities and a valuable background of practical experience as a practicing attorney. The nature of his bar association work has given him a close familiarity

with the public service responsibilities of the profession.

A practicing attorney in California since 1915, Mr. Wright is a former president of the State Bar of California (1940-41) and former president of the Los Angeles Bar Association (1947-48). He has been active for many years in the American Bar Association and is a former member of its Board of Governors. He was a member of the House of Delegates, ABA policy-making body, from 1940 to 1953.

His numerous other bar activities have included service as a director of the American Judicature Society, director of the National Legal Aid Association, and as a member of the board of directors of the American Bar Association Endowment.

A graduate of the University of Southern California Law School in 1915, he lectured on corporate practice at that school from 1921 to 1926. He has always maintained his own law office, engaging in a general civil practice including representation of a number of corporations and businesses. He is a director of several corporations, including: Trans-World Airlines; Roscoe Moss Co.; United States Spring and Bumper Co.; Southern Pipe and Casing Co.; and Reserve Oil and Gas Co.

His present law firm is Wright, Green and Wright. During the first World War he was a lieutenant of infantry and served overseas.

It was during Mr. Wright's term as president that the Los Angeles Bar Association became the first local bar association in the nation to establish a Lawyer Reference Service. While he was president of the State Bar of California, that association's public relations program was initiated. As head of the state association Mr. Wright also was instrumental in carrying out a successful state bar crime prevention study and an investigation of the operations of administrative agencies and bureaus which culminated in the adoption of California's Administrative Practice Act. Also created during his term was a special committee to investigate the court system in California, which was a forerunner of legislation overhauling the entire
