## San Juan Orchardists Pattern Company After Hondo Plant

Fruit growers of San Juan County recently organized a new fruit company which will handle the grading, packing, and marketing of their apples and peaches. . . C. R. Keaton, extension economist in fruit and vegetable marketing in New Mexico A & M College, announced today. . . The new company, patterned after the White Mountain Fruit Growers' Association in the Hondo Valley, will be incorporated under the state laws with an authorized capital stock of \$100,000. At least 50 percent of the stock will be owned by fruit growers, 40 percent or less will be owned by non-fruit growers. Membership on the board of directors will be limited to fruit growers. . . The company estimates that they have received \$100 per bushel more on an average for all the apples grown in the valley since they set up their consolidated grading, packing, and marketing operation. . . The meeting was held at the San Juan Valley Fruit Growers should receive a comparable increase in the price of their fruit after their new organization begins operation.

## 'Old Baldy' Is Not So Old—

### Carmon Phillips Gets The Facts About Sierra Blanca Peak's Age

(Editor's Note: Carmon Phillips, operator of an assortment of enterprises, has been the Old Baldy Hounding Post, in his several years' residence of taking a peek at "Old Baldy" every morning, decided one day to find out some facts about this day's trade mark mountain. He set out on a hike to the peak, in Sierra Blanca, and this is generally considered, by the boys who should know, to be the southernmost point of glaciation during the great ice age on the North American continent. . . One should not conclude from this that the glacial sheet extended from the north all the way to Sierra Blanca, but, rather that there was a small isolated mountain glacier at this point during the time of glaciation on the continent. . . Visitors to this famous resort should be happy that the main part of the glacier that crawled over our continent did not extend this far. It might have chopped the top off our beloved mountain and spoiled its majestic features. . . Regardless of whether Old Baldy is old or new, it sends a thrill to the hearts of some three quarters of a million human beings each year as they gaze at the view of S. Highway 70 and breathe a sigh of relief that they finally made it to Ruidoso, New Mexico, the "world's largest year around mountain playground area."

## Trucker Discovers Stein Park Fire

A truck driver on U. S. Highway 70 in the early hours of Sunday morning noticed a rental cabin at Stein Park on fire. In the next few minutes he was a mighty fellow, recalled H. H. Allison, owner, who said the trucker aroused his family, sleeping in a nearby building, shut off the butane gas leading to the cabin, and moved Allison's car which was parked near the burning structure. We were very grateful to him, Allison said, "and also to the fire departments in Green Tree, Hollywood and Ruidoso who all answered the call in a very few minutes. The fire had gained too much headway to save the rental cabin, but they did protect our other properties."

He surmised the fire must have been started by a hot water heater. The loss was estimated at from \$5,000 to \$4,000, and he said there was \$3,000 insurance on the place.

## Carrizozo Soldier Aboard Bomber Reds Shot Down

A Robert C. Berry, 21, of Carrizozo, was one of the 10 survivors of an American B-29 shot down Sunday by Red jets off Hokkaido Island, Japan, his family was notified Monday. . . Berry's mother, Mrs. R. E. Berry, two sisters and a brother live in Carrizozo. Another sister lives in Albuquerque and another brother in Lorraine, Ore. His father died last September. . . The young airman was serving as a radio operator aboard the U. S. bomber when it was shot down by two Communist fighters off the northern coast of Japan. All 11 crew members parachuted from the burning plane. One was killed in the descent. . . Berry attended the Carrizozo public schools until his junior year of high school. He then went to the University of Oregon in Lorraine and was graduated there. He had been active in athletics and was elected the president of the senior class in Lorraine. . . Shortly after his graduation in 1952, he enlisted in the Air Force. He returned to Carrizozo for the second time after his father's funeral in September. Berry is not married.

## HURD'S MURAL IS COMPLETED AT TEXAS TECH

Lubbock—A pictorial monument to the pioneers of West Texas Tech on the campus of Texas Tech. . . Artist Peter Hurd applied the final touches on a 10-pane fresco mural in the Museum at Tech that will commemorate, so long as the Museum stands, those men and women who carved an empire from the Plains. . . The mural, forming a continuous landscape around the Rotunda, was completed early in November. Hurd began actual work in February, 1953, following almost two years of preparation. . . Each panel depicts the likeness of a man or woman who made a significant contribution to the development of West Texas. While actual persons are portrayed, each is cast or chosen to represent a class or type of a block above. . . These persons honored are: Morley Thomas Dupre, school teacher; D. R. Couch, farmer; Crane Webster Furr, merchant; Dr. Clifford B. Jones, civic leader; Mrs. Dora Roberts, pioneer woman; W. H. Bledsoe, lawyer; James L. Dow, journalist; M. V. Brownfield, town builder; the Rev. R. Robert F. Dunn, Circuit rider; Sid Richardson, oilman; Sam C. Arnold, cowboy; Walter S. Pacey, freighter; D. M. Moore, doctor; Charles Ernest Maedgen, banker; and William E. Hartzel, rancher. . . To complete the mural, a panel devoted to the chronicles of West Texas is being done by Hurd. . . A panorama of the rugged West Texas landscape dominates the background and serves to bind together the individual panels. . . Live models were used for all portraits and where possible and feasible, the persons posed for the artist. In the case of those who were deceased or unable to pose, the heads were done from photographs. Models of approximately the same size and shape were used to get proper body dimensions. . . Hurd signed a contract to paint the mural, the largest in Texas, in November, 1951. He began with charcoal sketches, advancing to a miniature model of the Rotunda. On the model the landscape, buildings and background were carefully reproduced with portraits of the persons to be memorialized being blocked in. From there, the artist prepared full scale cartoons or drawings. These were done to exact scale as they today appear on the walls of the Rotunda. He began actual work on the walls in January, 1953. All together, he has spent approximately one full year in the Museum painting the mural. A formal dedication has been scheduled for November 18.

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## Deer Slaughter Is Terrific In Greatest Hunting Season

The greatest hunting season in the history of New Mexico, and of Lincoln County, was underway this week with an estimated 5,000 hunters combing the brush, the hills and the forests in the county after buck, doe, fawn; bear and turkey. At least 2,500 deer have been slain in Lincoln County, from figures released by the game department on the first two days' kill. Since Saturday and Sunday, many more head have been slain to add to the official checking station reports given below:

## CITY OUTLINES PROPOSED \$57,000 PAVING PROJECT

Acting on a furor raised here early this year by a minority that sidewalks, curbing, gutters and wider paving were needed to do away with mud and slush in a heavily traveled part of "downtown" Ruidoso, the Village Board of Trustees Monday night unveiled a proposed \$57,000 project to improve three and a half blocks in that manner at an average, approximate cost of \$6.31 per front foot. . . The project was drawn up after Tom Mann, Ruidoso's village engineer whose home is in Roswell, Mayor Dan Swearingin and Street Commissioner S. K. Kuykendall conferred with State Highway Commission officials in Santa Fe regarding that body's possible participation, and to learn of specifications that must be met. The trio found that the commission would contribute 50% in the cost—paying 100% of paving a center strip of 24 feet, and one third of the widening. . . To go ahead with the project, at least 51% of the frontage owned must be pledged; then a special assessment bond issue must be voted to take care of the city's portion. The assessment will be against each piece of property, whether the owner agreed to participate or not, and a lien of that amount will be placed against it. Financing of the individual's part in the project will be worked out in ten equal payments on principal, plus interest of 6%, to be paid off in five years; i. e., a payment each six months. . . The estimated frontage would be \$315,000 or \$6310 per year in two payments of \$3155 every six months, plus interest on the balance owed each time at 6%. . . This cost would cover the paving, gutter, curbing and sidewalk of 10 1/2 feet width. The state will not participate in the sidewalk cost. . . The area to be figured in the proposed Paving District No. 1 would be from Riverside to the east (the George McCarty corner) to about half a block above the Ruidoso Telephone Co. office. It would cross Juanita, Center and Fern streets and would join in with the State Highway 37 improvements at the curve near Tom Jones residence and office of Ruidoso Realty. . . Mann outlined some details of the improvements, in that there would be four parking lanes and two parallel traffic lanes on the street where as much as 62 feet of paving can be put down, which would be the lower portion of the District. In the upper portion, where only 44 feet of paving can be put down, there will be two traffic lanes and two parallel parking lanes. . . Mayor Swearingin said the village would have to enlist the aid of the people to secure easements in those few trouble spots where added right of way would be needed. He said the city had no funds to buy rights of way and that failure to secure easement on one piece of property might stall the entire project. . . He added, however, that one block might be improved, where considerable favorable response has been secured. If all of the District would not get a 51% favorable response. . . Mann said at this point that its additional blocks could be added to Paving District No. 1 once it was set up. Additional districts can be set up at a later date, he said. . . There were 25 people present at the meeting, at least 15 of them owners of property among the 50 in the district involved. They expressed themselves generally in favor of the improvements, only a small portion saying they would not favor the move. . . The council moved to have a committee of six property owners appointed as a Citizens Committee to work on securing easements for the project. . . J. H. Hackfield, Lubbock, Tex., was a visitor here this week.

## Two Honors Earned By Wade Hedgecock At Texas Western

El Paso—Wade Hedgecock, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Hedgecock of Ruidoso, is one of 30 students elected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities at Texas Western College. . . Hedgecock, a senior, is a member of the football team, M Club, ROTC Association, Rifle team and Sardonys. . . Students are selected by a faculty committee to Who's Who. To qualify for consideration, students must be graduating in May or August of 1955, and have maintained a grade average of "B" or higher and be members of the Student Association. . . Students were selected on the further basis of excellence and sincerity of scholarship, leadership, and activities. Hedgecock and Sardonys. . . The students were elected to the honorary group by a special faculty committee. To be eligible for Men of Mines, the senior men must be scheduled to graduate in May or August of 1955. They must have maintained a grade average for the four years of "C" or higher, and attended only Texas Western College. . . Further requirements include participation in campus student affairs and at least one administrative elective office in student organizations.

School children in Corona will get wild game in their hot lunch program this week—because a hunter lined up in his sights what he thought was an over-sized deer and plugged an elk.

Dist. Game Warden Marion Embry said the name of the hunter wouldn't be disclosed unless charges were filed against him for bagging illegal game.

Embry said the hunter "sought out a game warden and told him he made the mistake because of poor light and distance."

Embry said the hunter thought he was "shooting at a giant buck." The 1800-pound kill was made early Saturday morning in the Jearilla Mountains north of Carrizozo.

The hunter helped the game warden haul the elk to Corona, and rancher Willis Lovelace of Corona, who was instrumental in getting the big animal planted in the area, suggested the meat be used in the school hot lunch program.

Ralph Brown, camping at about 10,000 feet with three fellows from Plainview, Tex., Ernest and Albert Samman and Albert Scheele, who each, incidentally, got their deer, said that while he folks down in the lower regions had weather down to about 15 degrees at night, and ice and frost was heavy each morning, they never had a freeze up there. "Buckets of water we set out did not have ice in them on two mornings," he declared. Ernest McDaniell, his always contended it was warmer at his level up the Ruidoso than down here.

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

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

### Methodists Ask Aid For Korea

(By CHURCH REPORTER)  
A worship service emphasizing emergency needs in Korea will be held in the Community Methodist Church in Ruidoso, Sunday, November 14, at 10:55 a. m. According to the Rev. H. L. Atkins, III, pastor of the local Methodist Church, Methodist congregations all over America will be conducting similar services on the same day.

It is hoped that in response to a presentation of facts about the situation in Korea today, American Methodists will answer the "Blingsop" Appeal for Korea with a special offering of at least one-million dollars. The purpose of this offering is two-fold: (1) to help with the great task of rebuilding the Korean Methodist Church, and (2) to provide for relief and rehabilitation—feeding and clothing the orphans of Korea who have found their way into Methodist homes, caring for the aged and the indigent, providing artificial limbs for those who have lost arms and legs in the war, helping to give employment and a new faith in life for unfortunate but diligent people, and many other equally important projects.

The Korean Methodist Church, under the leadership of its dauntless bishop, Dr. Eyringki J. Lee, is laying plans for restoring its destroyed and damaged buildings. At the same time, it intends to carry the Gospel to every corner of South Korea in evangelistic effort and in the erection of new places of Christian worship. This program calls for the reconstruction or the erection of 762 church buildings within the next three years. Parsonages, schools, hospitals, and social settlements are also a part of this magnificent program.

Korean Methodism has established 128 new congregations within the past fifteen months and has now a complement of over 700 full-time pastors and women evangelists. In spite of the war and the many still unrehabilitated refugees, more than 25% of its churches are entirely self-supporting. The percentage is rapidly rising. The Korean Christians say, "Help us to get a church and Sunday School building, and we will make our congregations self-supporting within 3 years."
