**Farm Bureau's Record In Congress:**

**MARKET EXPANSION** took definite form with enactment of the Agricultural Trade Development Act authorizing sales of farm surpluses for foreign currencies, and with development of various industry self-help programs.

**TAX LAWS** received a long overdue revision, correcting many inequities, and important reductions were approved. As a result taxpayers will save an estimated \$7.4 billion a year.

**PRICE SUPPORT PROGRAMS** were revised and it was recognized that a variable pricing system will, over the long run, encourage farmers to produce what the market wants, with the highest return to farmers, without government price fixing, and without accumulating more price-depressing surpluses.

**MODERNIZED FORMULA** for calculating parity prices, which yields a better price-relationship between farm products, was reaffirmed and becomes applicable to "basic" commodities on a gradual basis beginning in 1956.

**EFFECT OF DIVERTED ACRES** on prices of other commodities was recognized by legislation to authorize programs emphasizing soil-conserving use of such land.

**AGRICULTURAL RESEARCH AND EDUCATION** got a boost with increased federal appropriations—\$10 million more for research, \$3 million for extension, \$5.5 million additional for vocational education—aimed at helping farmers to produce and market more efficiently.

### Field Representative For Social Security To Be In Ruidoso Thursday Of Next Week

New Benefits For Farm Families Outlined

Ralph H. Yowell, Field Representative, of the Roswell Social Security Administration Office, will be in Ruidoso Thursday, January 27, to assist local residents in making application for old-age or survivors insurance benefits and to give general information concerning the Social Security Act. He will be at the Post Office Building, between the hours of 8:00 a. m. to 11:00 a. m.

In January, the self-employed farmer, rancher, or cotton ginner will begin to have the same sort of protection for himself and his family against income loss by reason of old age or death that other self-employed persons gained in 1951.

The old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act have a purpose that might be summed up in this short phrase: "Replacement of a portion of a lost income where the loss is caused by old age or death. Later articles will deal with how large a replacement is possible, and to whom such payments are made."

There are no set rules or particular bookkeeping systems prescribed by the law. However, the records, of whatever nature they may be, must be sufficiently complete to support a finding that there was or was not a net profit for the year. And, to keep his social security protection in force even through drought or other bad years, the farmer who has a gross income of more than \$1800 may claim credit for either his actual net income or a special figure of \$900 if he failed to net that much. The farmer whose gross income is below \$1800 may also take social security credit for either his actual net income or one-half of his gross income, but here that figure must be at least \$400 or no social security credit is possible. Farmer A grosses \$3700 but his true net profit is only \$500—he can legally report \$500 or \$900. Farmer B grosses \$1700, but nets only \$500—he can report either \$500 or \$900. Farmer C grosses only \$799, but nets less than \$400—he can have no social security credits for that year.

The records of the self-employed farmer must be complete enough to show his gross income from his farming operations, his operating expenses, and finally, his net profit. Income from renting out a pasture, or a part of the farm itself, on a true rental agreement does not count toward social security credit for the farm owner. Only income traceable to actual operation of the farm or ranch can be used in building up a social security account.

For further information, write to the Social Security Administration, Roswell, and ask for the leaflet called "Apply for Farm Family."

### Driver's Tests Given Students

About 100 high school students participated in an auto-driving test at Ruidoso High School Wednesday. The Hondo High School driver education instructor brought 17 of his students and the Ruidoso school allowed their driver education classes plus any other students who desired to take the tests as long as time permitted.

The scientific equipment used in the tests was brought to Ruidoso and operated by Frank Martin and assistant, John Lopez, who are with the Governor's Traffic Safety Co-ordinating Committee in Santa Fe.

Martin and Lopez work in close connection with the Lincoln County Safety Council and it was in answer to a recent request by the local council that these men came to make the tests.

The school students were very interested and enthused in having such things as their union, depth perception, and reaction time tested. Time did not allow all who wanted to take the tests since the equipment had to be set up by Roswell. However, Mr. Martin assured the Council that he would come back to finish the job possibly on the same day of a Lincoln County Safety Council general meeting in the near future.

The information obtained by these tests is strictly for the students' personal aid and satisfaction. A student may discover that eye glasses are needed or that he needs some treatment or correction for various other conditions, and if this is known at an early date corrections may be effected easily. Another important point is that the young people become more conscious of safe driving and the necessary habits and thinking.

Mr. Martin commented, "If people would find out their faults, admit them and then take steps to correct where possible and most of all make needed allowances for their lack of ability when behind the wheel of a car, our accident rate on the highways would decrease immensely."

Drought Committee Meets  
The drought committee met on Tuesday, January 18, and recommended that the drought feed program be discontinued as of February 1, 1955, and that the drought be resurveyed in April for possible re-instatement of the care trees.

Pruning of Fruit Trees Is Important Winter Job  
The quality and quantity of fruits produced in New Mexico's home orchards in 1955 will depend to a large extent on the care trees are given this winter. One important job that must be done properly—preferably during February or March—is pruning.

Pruning shapes a tree and determines the distribution of fruit when it starts bearing. It controls quality and quantity of fruit production. It removes dead and diseased wood and helps combat insects and diseases. Pruning also lengthens the life of trees by protecting properly shaped trees against limb breakage and decay.

Apple and pear trees do not require such severe pruning. After the trees are shaped, all they need each year is the removal of dead or diseased wood, removal of rubbing or crossing branches, a little thinning, and the removal of enough branches to keep growth under control.

January is the ideal month to check over your orchard equipment to make any needed repairs. Doing this job now will frequently save you considerable time and may possibly prevent costly breakdowns.

Weight Loss Dangerous In Ewes Due to Lamb  
Ewes that lose weight during late pregnancy are easy victims of lambing paralysis.

Another danger for ewes due to lamb is vitamin A deficiency, especially in sections of New Mexico which were unusually dry this past summer and fall.

Symptoms of the deficiency are blindness, a watery discharge from the eyes, and still-born or weak lambs that die shortly after birth.

Green pasture and green, leafy, legume hay are the best sources of vitamin A. If good legume hay cannot be fed for about a month ahead of lambing, it would prob-
