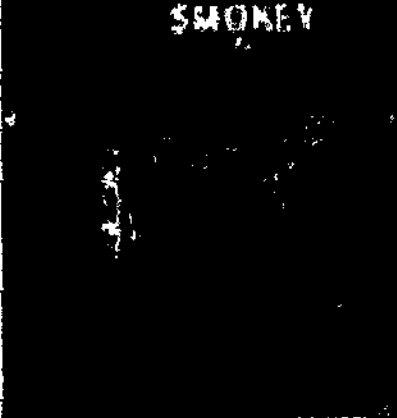
The graduates of St. Edward's School of Carlsbad and their teachers were here for one day last Thursday for an end-of-school trip. . . .

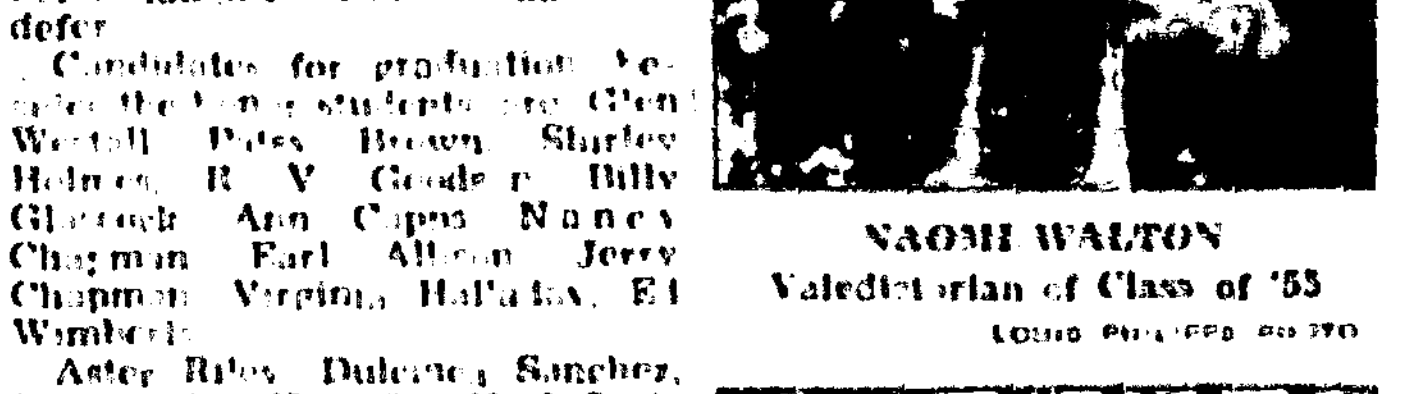

AUTO DEATH MARS SORORITY HOLIDAY HERE

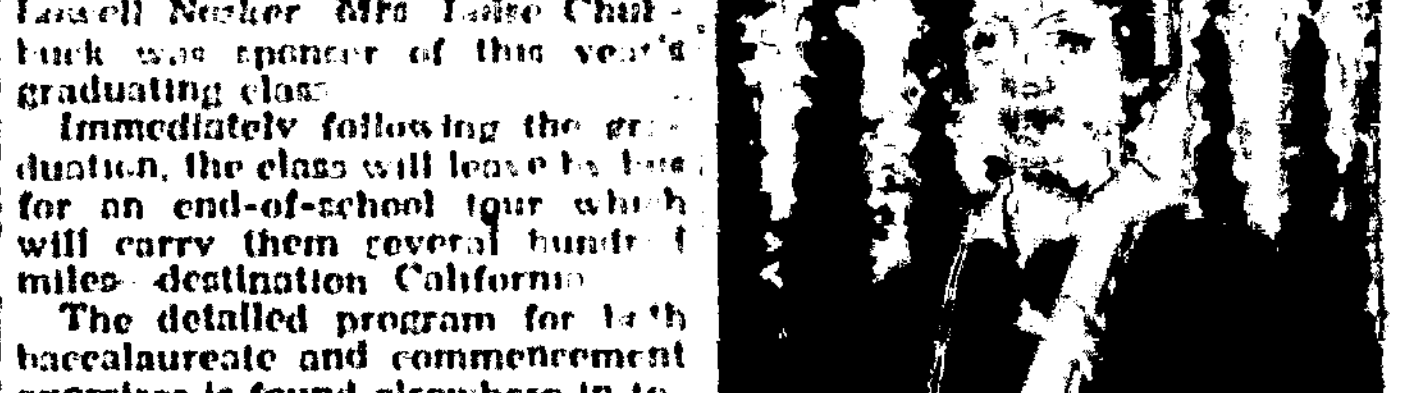
The death of a 17-year-old Odessa girl here in a one-car crash on a gravelled road in the Mesalero Indian reservation last Saturday afternoon threw a pall of gloom over a holiday of a girls' high school sorority over the week-end. The victim of the crash, in which a late model Cadillac went out of control as it skidded on gravel about six miles south of Ruidoso near the old Carrizo community, was Susan Fulcher, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. O. A. Fulcher of Odessa. She was a passenger in the car, driven by Georgia Hubbard, 18. Miss Hubbard suffered a crushed vertebra and was flown from Ruidoso to Odessa early Sunday morning. The third passenger in the car, Mary Gail Thomas, 17, received cuts and abrasions. She received emergency treatment in the local hospital, as did Miss Hubbard. The trio had arrived in Ruidoso last week-end to attend a holiday sponsored by the Koshari chapter of the Tri-Hi-Y Sorority of Odessa High School. The group, including 22 girls and their sponsors, spent two nights in Ruidoso at Carrizo Lodge. State Patrolman R. W. Driggers investigated the wreck. He said the girl was thrown from the car and was killed almost instantly. The victim was crushed by the large car as it rolled over. She died of a broken neck, crushed chest and broken left arm.

An author and an attorney collaborated on a new book that will likely raise some eyebrows here in Lincoln County.

Written by C. J. Sonnichsen, chairman of the English Department of Texas Western College, El Paso, and with El Paso Attorney William V. Morrison as collaborator, the document brings new evidence to light on the death of Billy the Kid and some doubt, perhaps as to whether it was William Bonney or Brunsy Bill Roberts—who was the actual outlaw known far and wide as Billy the Kid.

Morrison, who did a great deal of research among old legal documents to aid in the book's theme, is to be in Ruidoso Tuesday of next week, to autograph copies of the publication "Alias Billy the Kid" at Buckner's gift and appliance store. He also is to appear at the Ruidoso Rotary and Ruidoso Lions club meetings that day, according to Raymond Buckner, who invited the writer here.





W. H. BAKER RITES HELD IN CARRIZO

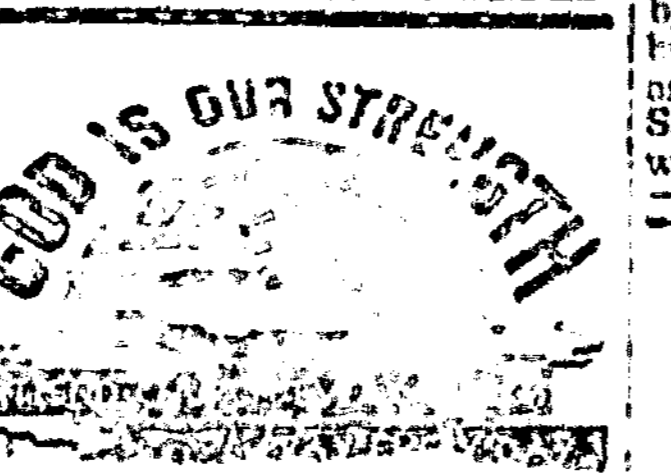
Private services were conducted in Carrizo Saturday afternoon for W. H. Baker, 83, who died Thursday in Carrizo Hospital.

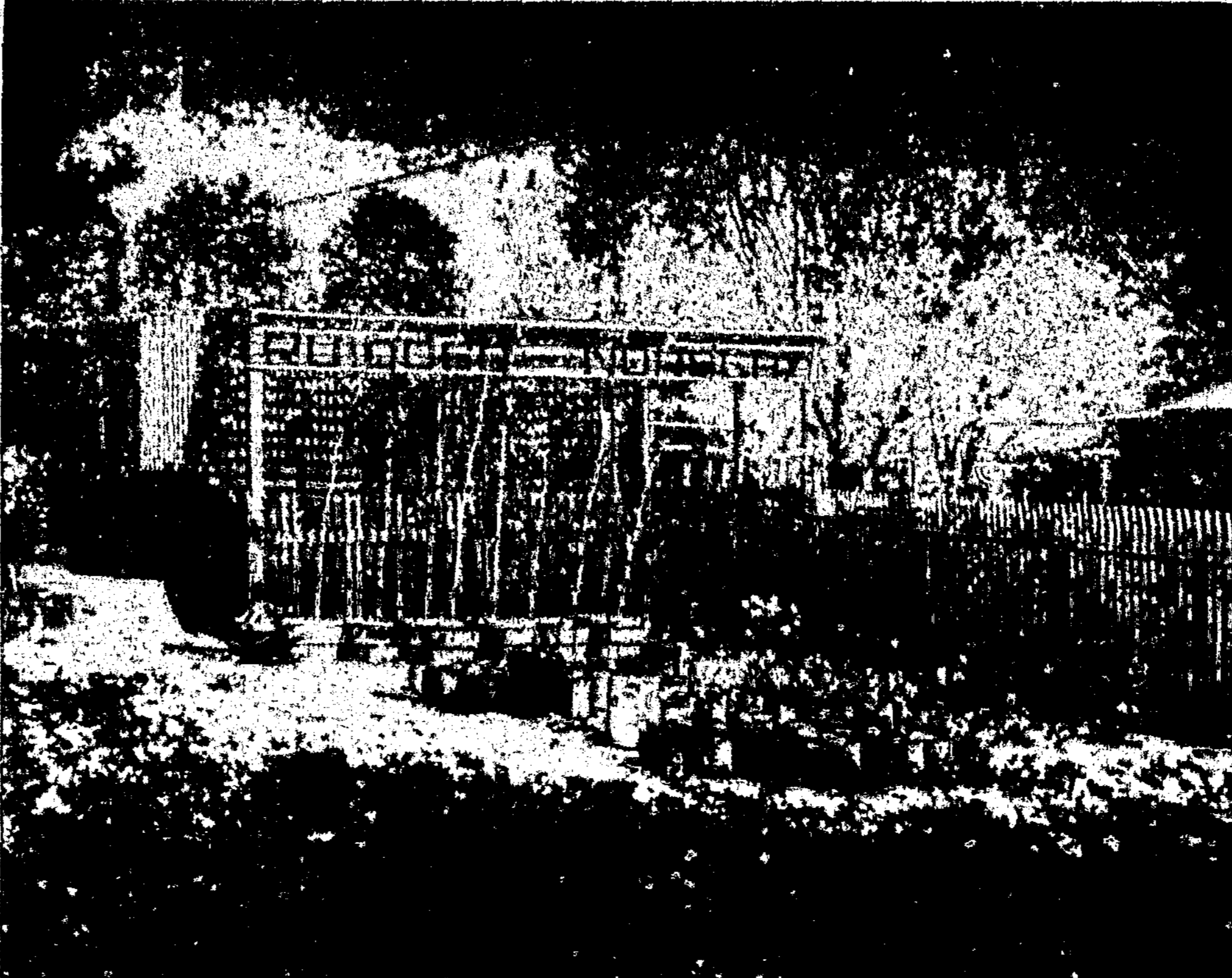

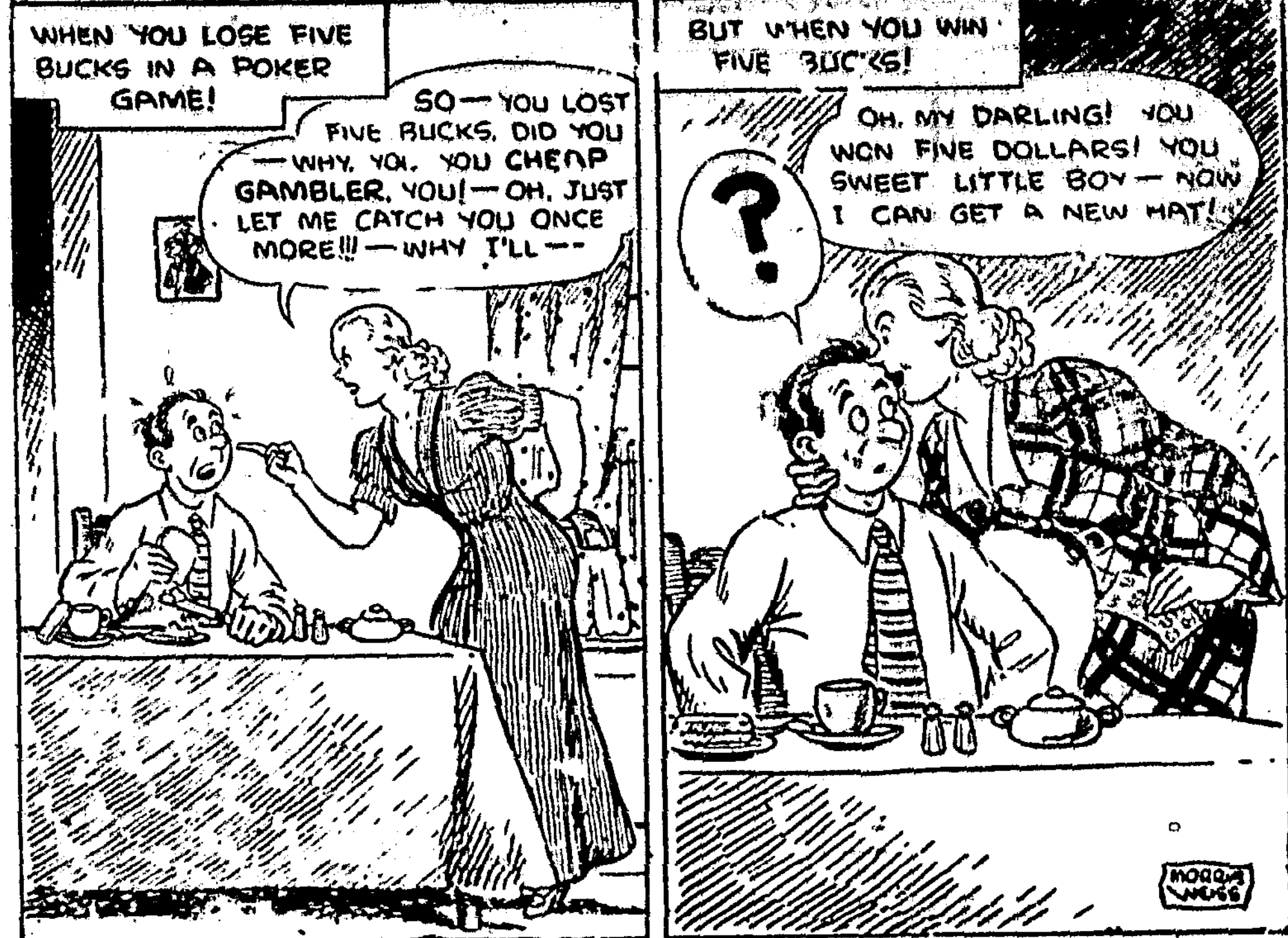
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The County Agent Reports

(By RALPH DUNLAP)
With their eye on the County Achievement Day on September 3 in Capitan, the 4-H boys and girls are really getting down to work on their projects. The 4-H members taking fat lamb are planning to get their lambs at the 916 ranch on May 23, or the Skeen ranch on May 28, if they do not already have one. Along with the choosing of lambs, a judging session will be held, starting about 10:00 a. m.
The Corona 4-H Club held a

picnic Sunday in Red Cloud Canyon with a good turnout. George Shanks, local leader, was in charge of the activities.
Ranchers are becoming increasingly aware of the weight-for-age program in selecting replacement heifers. The New Mexico A & M has just released the results of an eight year experiment along this line. The cows in the experiment were divided into two groups; one group was the compact cattle selected on show type; the other group were selected for size and thriftiness with no attention paid to type.
The large cattle outproduced the compact cattle all the way around. The larger cattle had bested the others by 10% in calving percentage and the calves were 47 lbs.

heavier.
This advantage carried over into the feed lot, as the calves from the large cows gained better. The fat carcass grade ran about the same for both types.
Last year Fred Pfingsten, along with rating his calves according to its weight-for-age, used the record of each cow for the past years to cull his breeding herd. As he had to make a reduction in num-

bers, he used this method and yet did not hurt his breeding herd.
J. R. Callahan of Claunch has been using the weight-for-age program in selecting his replacement heifers.
A rancher wanting to improve his commercial herd can very easily do this in the fall by cutting out the calves and from these calves select the best 40 or 50 calves. He should then mother the

calves up and mark these cows which are the best producers. Looks can be deceiving, as the good milking cow is likely to be only in fair condition; whereas the poor milking cow is likely to be fat.

Annual Boys' State To Again Be Staged At NMIMT, Socorro

Socorro, N. M., (Spl.)—More than 265 junior students in 110 New Mexico high schools are now being selected to attend this year's New Mexico Boys' State in Socorro next June. Earle W. Stark, of Albuquerque, Boys' State director, has announced. The high schools are located in 102 New Mexico communities, and represent all but a very few of the accredited secondary schools in the State.
Delegates from Ruidoso High School this year are Ronnie Perry and Max Jones.
The 1955 citizenship school will be held on the campus of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, June 5 to 12. At this time, dormitories and other facilities of the Institute will be available to accommodate the boy citizens and the administrative staff of the state-in-miniature.
"Socorro was chosen as the 1955 Boys' State city because of its central location and excellent transportation facilities, and because of the unusually fine accommodations offered by New Mexico Tech during the past sessions held there," Mr. Stark said here in an interview. "The American Legion is grateful to the Institute president, Dr. E. J. Workman, and to the regents and staff of the institution, for making facilities available for our yearly 'laboratory in citizenship.'"
Boys' State, a national institution sponsored on a statewide basis by the New Mexico Department of the American Legion, is supported by local civic, service, and patriotic organizations, including the Legion posts, DAV, VFW, Kiwanis, Lions, Rotary, Knights of Columbus, FFA, P-TA, Optimist, 20-30 clubs, Chambers of Commerce, church societies, student bodies, and other public groups. The week-long program is designed to acquaint the high

School junior with the responsibilities of citizenship and various practical aspects of governmental procedure at the state level. Each delegate participates actively in a simulated state; the participants are assigned to "political" parties and thereafter they elect their own leaders and enact their own laws, under conditions which seek to duplicate conditions in the actual state of their residence.
Each boy's expenses are paid by the local sponsoring organization, but selections are made by the

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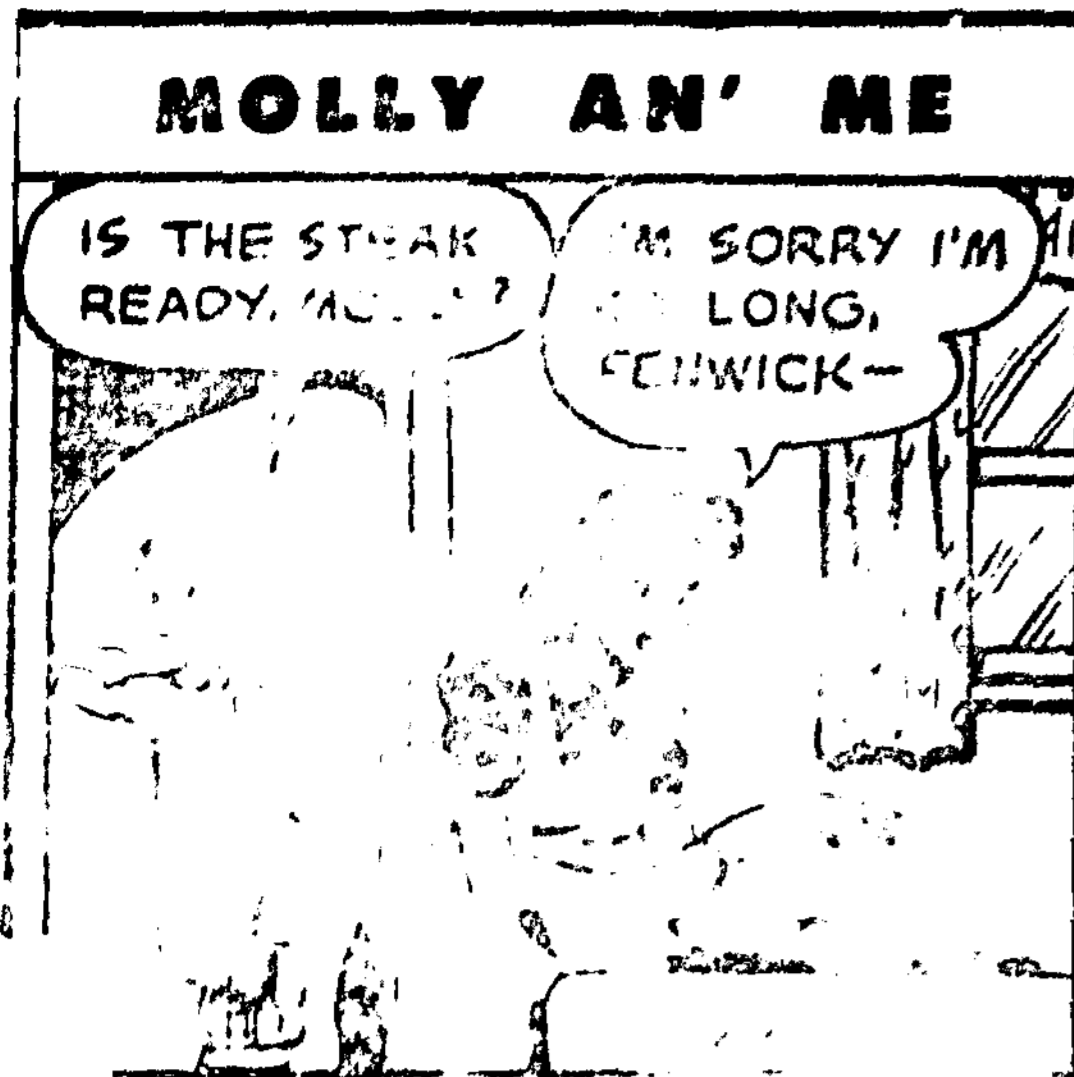

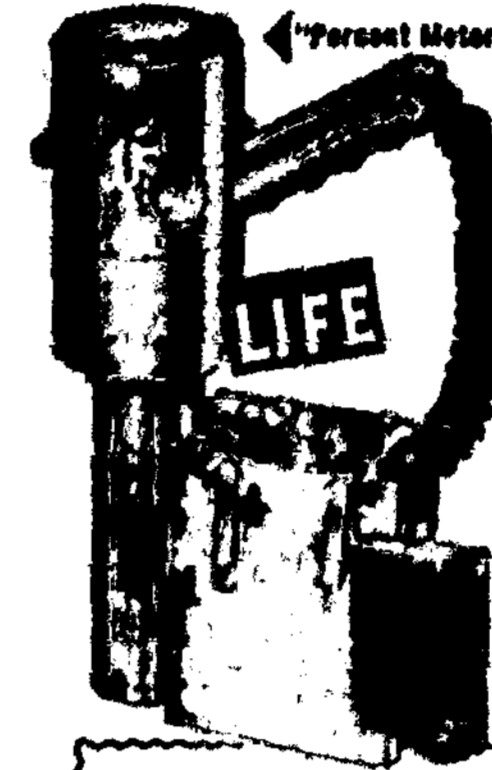
