26 Below Zero Is Coldest Mark Here In 9 Years

The coldest temperature recorded here in the nine-year weather-reporting by C. A. Culver, cooperative weather observer for the U. S. Department of Commerce was 26 below zero in 1951, which occurred between Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 that year, he said. The coldest in nine years was 1947 when on Jan. 14, 15 inches of moisture was recorded. Wettest year in the last nine was 1949 when 24.88 inches was measured.

Highest temperature recorded was 97 in 1950, greatest snowfall in nine years was 65.10 inches in 1947. The comparative data for the last nine years as reported by Culver is given below:

Early Chicks Boost Profits
For poultry raisers who like to sell eggs when the price is high, it will soon be time to start chicks. Early started chicks bring in more egg dollars because egg prices are higher during the last six months of the year—the time when early chicks are laying.

In some years, egg prices are higher during every one of the last six months of the year (July-December) than during any one of the first six months of the year (January-June). Generally, this same price relationship has existed for more than 50 years.

More chicks are started in April than in any other month. These chicks start to lay as pullets sometime in September or October. By November, they are in good production, in December, as the pullets continue to lay well, egg prices start downward. The pullets lay most of their eggs in the first half of the next year—when egg prices are lowest.

Compare the above schedule with that of early chicks, started in January. As pullets, egg prices these birds will start to lay. By late July they will be in top production. Top production will coincide with top prices in August, September, October and November—a profitable combination.

Some poultrymen delay starting their chicks simply because of habit. However, the milder weather in the spring is probably the main reason for late chicks. Poultry raised in the beginning to get green; a chick is soon able to help raise itself.

But a fact that no poultryman can afford to overlook is that, over the past 40 years, the man who started chicks in October and June about one-third more for his eggs than the late starter. This price advantage has been more than enough to offset extra cost of caring for chicks in cooler weather.

So it's time to place your order now for chicks in January or February over the business session which followed.





Whirl of Sports

To date the only comments received about the proposed restrictions of guns in New Mexico have been ones that point out the fallacy of laws in other states.

City Marshal Dewey Gann remarked that there is a need of some restrictions, but care must be made in enacting those laws, to keep New Mexico from becoming another New York.

He held the same opinion concerning the proposal to register guns as this corner holds—it sounds wonderful, but it has yet to work.

Just a question—you who would support such a law—if you were going to commit a crime using a pistol, would you register the gun? We think not!

Gann very aptly put it when he said "So much pleasure is derived from guns that it would be almost a crime to restrict their use."

And there's always the fear that if this country is invaded by a foreign power it would be simple to check such records to find the location of most of America's small arms. R. H. Hedgecock recalled such a case in Norway when Germany overran that country. After the weapons were confiscated there was little that the underground could use to fight back.

And don't dream yourself into the idea that we can't be invaded. It's highly improbable, but not impossible.

We wouldn't fight gun laws, provided that they're sane and safe laws. Very likely New Mexico needs some, but until some careful time is directed to a study of such needs, we'll holler whenever a law comes up that isn't fair and just from every angle.

Draft Boards Have Many Responsibilities

Major General Lewis B. Hershey called attention today that efforts are being made by representatives of the Selective Service System, including uncommitted Local Board personnel, to emphasize its many responsibilities in addition to the induction of registrants. There are many difficulties involved in the allocation of the amount of time spent by each member of the Selective Service System on each of the many functions of the System. Any member of the System may at a given time be engaged on two or more projects simultaneously. The administrative nature of the operations of a large majority of the personnel inevitably curtails the use of much time outside of working hours. Innumerable home telephone calls and conversations on the street, in the home, and elsewhere outside the office, with registrants and members of their families cannot be avoided by a majority of those operating the Selective Service System. The type of service which the System tries to extend to the registrants and their families has resulted in letters, requests for interviews, and advice on a wide variety of problems over which the Selective Service System has tremendous responsibility. The fact that it deals with the lives of young men augments attempts to aid a very large number of people.

Brigadier General John P. McFarland, New Mexico Director of Selective Service, has conducted a statewide survey, reflecting the time devoted by New Mexico Local Boards to the various services rendered. This survey reflected that approximately 10% of time and monies are spent on registration; 28% on classification; 14% towards forwarding notices for Armed Forces Physical Examination including meals, lodging and transportation; 18% on sending selectees for induction; 1% conscientious objectors projects; 2% servicing of records; 8% in training reserve units; 5% answering miscellaneous inquiries other than those identified herein; 3% on miscellaneous projects and 15% on administrative causes.
