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

**HOW TO RESTORE SERVICE WHEN A FUSE BLOWS**

If your lights go out suddenly when you plug in an appliance or flip a switch, a fuse has probably blown or a circuit breaker tripped open.

Your trouble may be an overloaded circuit (too many lamps and appliances on a single circuit) or a short circuit (usually caused by a defective appliance or cord).

By keeping spare fuses of the correct size on hand you can easily restore service without waiting for a service man. Just follow the instructions below.



**EASY AS CHANGING A LIGHT BULB**

- TO REPLACE A BLOWN FUSE**
1. Locate the blown fuse. The metal link showing through the window will be broken or the window itself may be scorched.
  2. Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short circuit or overload.
  3. Stand on a dry surface and pull the main switch to OFF.
  4. Unscrew the burned-out fuse and replace it with a NEW fuse of the correct size (usually 15 amperes).
  5. Throw the main switch back to ON position.

- IF YOUR HOME HAS CIRCUIT BREAKERS INSTEAD OF FUSES**
1. Locate the tripped-breaker. It will be in the OFF or TRIPPED position.
  2. Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short or overload.
  3. Reset the breaker to ON position, following manufacturer's instructions on breaker panel.

REMEMBER, a fuse or circuit breaker is designed to protect your wiring from "short" or overload damage. Never use a penny or other object instead of a fuse. It's dangerous.

**Business Classes Active**  
Mr. Barnett has two typing I classes. Both are full, with one boy renting his own machine. One or two are using portable machines. The two classes are made up mostly of Juniors with two or three Seniors and one Sophomore. Several of the students in the two classes are typing 30 to 40 words per minute, which is quite good for typing I students.

In Typing II Mr. Barnett has 15 Seniors who are ahead of schedule at this time and are doing better than average. He has been using some typists out of all three classes for practical work, such as correspondence for the Lincoln County Safety Council. Also, since Mr. Barnett is secretary of the Safety Council, all the typing classes have been getting practical experience doing some of his correspondence.  
The typing classes are anxious

for the delivery of four new Royals to replace the old Underwoods and Mr. Barnett expects them to come any time now.

The Shorthand I class had 14 students at the first of the school year but there are only 10 now. He says this is a "very nice class—all girls." They are doing well in their work and at present are taking dictation of 30 to 40 words per minute on new material and 50 to 60 words on old material.  
In the Bookkeeping class Mr. Barnett had 22 students at the first of the school year, but now has only 18. This class is made up mostly of Seniors and all are doing well in their work. They have finished 16 chapters in the bookkeeping textbook and are preparing to start on their first practice sets this week.

Mr. Barnett says all bookkeeping students are getting a reasonable amount of learning "and a few are getting rest before basketball practice."

**To Study Literature**  
Mrs. Knox states the second semester of English will consist of literature as before in the past years. The Juniors have new textbooks which is the same series as the previous ones. However, they will continue outlining the American authors.  
The Sophomores are going to continue reading the Reader's Digest along with their literature.

**Shop Class To Work On Relief For Cemetery**  
The Freshman shop class boys are making a plaster relief of the Ruidoso cemetery. This project is sponsored by the Rotary Club and is to be put on exhibit in El Paso during the second week in March.

During the second semester the eighth grade will learn to check and audit the family budget. They will also learn to sew and will make a skirt. Sickness in the home will be studied also.  
The Home Economics I classes will be studying simple family meals, managing personal resources, managing personal appearance and new spring clothing.

The Home Economics II will study the livable home, the family foods, being attractively dressed, and understanding and guiding the growing child.

From 9:00 to 9:15 Kermit "Bud" Lasab, chairman of the Third Judicial District Youth Commission, will present the introduction of the guests. Following at 9:15 Dr. Claude C. Dove, Professor of Psychology, New Mexico A. & M., will speak of psychological aspects of Juvenile Delinquency. At 10:00 School W. Barnhart, captain will be held. This consists of Student Council representatives from Hondo, Carrizozo, Alamogordo, Ruidoso, Hatch, Capitán, Tularosa, Las Cruces, and Cloudcroft represented to their enrollment. **HOW TO RESTORE SERVICE WHEN A FUSE BLOWS**

If your lights go out suddenly when you plug in an appliance or flip a switch, a fuse has probably blown or a circuit breaker tripped open.

Your trouble may be an overloaded circuit (too many lamps and appliances on a single circuit) or a short circuit (usually caused by a defective appliance or cord).

By keeping spare fuses of the correct size on hand you can easily restore service without waiting for a service man. Just follow the instructions below.

- TO REPLACE A BLOWN FUSE**
1. Locate the blown fuse. The metal link showing through the window will be broken or the window itself may be scorched.
  2. Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short circuit or overload.
  3. Stand on a dry surface and pull the main switch to OFF.
  4. Unscrew the burned-out fuse and replace it with a NEW fuse of the correct size (usually 15 amperes).
  5. Throw the main switch back to ON position.

- IF YOUR HOME HAS CIRCUIT BREAKERS INSTEAD OF FUSES**
1. Locate the tripped breaker. It will be in the OFF or TRIPPED position.
  2. Disconnect the appliance or lamp that caused the short or overload.
  3. Reset the breaker to ON position, following manufacturer's instructions on breaker panel.

REMEMBER, a fuse or circuit breaker is designed to protect your wiring from "short" or overload damage. Never use a penny or other object instead of a fuse. It's dangerous.

The Mescalero Apache Business Committee began the first in a series of education, information, and news broadcasts over Radio Station KALG, Alamogordo, at 9:30 a. m. last Saturday, Jan. 22. Wendell Chino, president of the Business Committee, was the main speaker on the first broadcast. Chino, in his speech, first outlined the reservation as to location, acreage (irrigable, arable, grazing, forest, and miscellaneous), and by what executive orders the reservation was established. Secondly, the population of the reservation. He also explained the sources of Tribal Income, Tribal Enterprises, what assets the Tribe has, the cattle industry, how the Tribe is organized under its charter, constitution and by-laws, tribal code, and generally gave information pertaining to the Tribe. On Jan. 29 from 8:30 a. m. to 9:45 a. m. the 4th grade of the Mescalero Day School will be heard on this radio program sponsored by Miss Stella Toole, reservation principal. Claude Taylor who was appointed chairman for the March of Dimes in the Mescalero area reports that so far the Mescalero American Legion Post 48 donated \$10.00 and the Mescalero Women's Club donated \$5.00. The Mescalero Apache Tribe recently transferred its accounts to the Gero County State Bank in Alamogordo. The Tribe now draws its own checks and keeps its own books. Kent Fitzgerald, relocation officer, and Harold Mann, relocation officer, both of the Bureau of Indian Affairs were at Mescalero on Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and met with approximately 50 or more individuals regarding their possible employment outside of this area. Employment on the reservation is considerably low at present and many of the Tribal members are seeking employment elsewhere. Mann will be at Mescalero on Feb. 1 and 2 to further assist individuals on the job placement. A delegation representing the

is scheduled to make a trip to Albuquerque regarding the handling of certain Tribal matters. On Thursday, Jan. 27, the Business Committee has an appointment to meet New Mexico Gov. Simms in Santa Fe. The Business Committee will then take part in the Annual Winter Conference on problems in Indian affairs on Friday and Saturday. This conference is being sponsored by the New Mexico Association of Indian Affairs, Inc. Miss Mary G. Davalos visited at the Agency Office on Monday of this week. Miss Davalos is presently making her home with her sister, Anita, in Silver City, but plans to return to her employment in Los Angeles soon. The parents have to be interested before the 4-H member does his or her best in 4-H work, and they are welcome at any 4-H meeting.

The Hondo 4-H Club plans to hold its next meeting on Feb. 1 at the Picheo school. The El Capitan 4-H Club met January 25 at the home of Mrs. Marie Walker in Capitan.

### Cy Leland, Jr., To Represent New TV Service
