**Ruidoso Women Aid In Securing Projector For Ft. Stanton Tot's**

Ft. Stanton, N. Mex. (Sp.)—Young patients at Fort Stanton Medical Center have a new educational aid that will make school more fun—thanks to the generosity of women's groups in southeastern New Mexico. Dr. James J. Barfield, medical superintendent of the sanatorium, announced today the receipt of an opaque projector for the sanatorium's school.

Many of the young patients at the tuberculosis sanatorium are able to attend school part time while undergoing treatment. The majority of the youngsters are Navajo children who learn to speak English after coming to the hospital. The opaque projector, which is considered a modern teaching aid for any group, is especially valuable in handling the language barrier. Dr. Barfield commented the projector will also be used in classes for adult Navajos and at social functions.

A fund for the projector was begun at Christmas time by women's groups interested in giving the young patients a gift that would bring pleasure during the entire year. Supporters of the fund were District VI American Legion Auxiliary, Pecos Valley Diocese of Episcopalians Women and Roswell Woman's Club. Contributions making the projector a reality were received from Episcopalian women of Roswell, Alamogordo, Fort Stanton, Artesia, Carlsbad, Lovington, Ruidoso, Glenade and El Paso; American Legion Auxiliary units of Roswell, Tatum, Hobbs, Artesia, Lovington; and the two sections of Roswell Women's Club. Mrs. T. B. Hood of Ruidoso served as chairwoman of the Episcopalian women in the project.

## The County Agent Reports

(By RALPH DUNLAP)  
**Orchard Prospects Good**

The cold weather during January and February has held the fruit trees back and helped to slow the development of the bud. The weather from now through May 15 will finally decide whether the fruit is frozen or not. Several of the fruit growers have commented about the cold weather and indicated that it was the coldest average temperature for several years.

If a full fruit crop is grown in the Hondo Valley, you can look for maximum use to be made of all market facilities, especially the packing shed. Estimates of a full fruit crop run up to 400,000 bushels of apples, not including pears, peaches, or other fruit.

**First Grasshopper**  
 Fred Pringsten was in the office Saturday, and told of finding the first grasshopper of the 1955 crop west of Captain. He made sure to kill the hopper so that no winter-hardy grasshopper would develop. Last year a severe infestation was located on Nogal Mesa and surrounding areas. As the severe infestation still exists, there is a possibility that an extensive control program will be carried out in that area.

**Hart Elected**  
 At the Ruidoso-Angus-Alto road meeting, Wm. A. Hart was elected delegate, and George Dingwall alternate, to the County Road Committee which will meet March 7, 1955, starting at 10:00 a. m. at the courthouse in Carrizozo.

News Notes from Farms, Ranches, Orchards

**Feed Pullets for Most Eggs**  
 With pullets now in the laying house and the high-priced egg season ahead, poultry raisers have a common goal—getting the most eggs possible from their flock.

One of the important factors in egg production is a good feeding program. Such a program must not only make hens lay more eggs but must cut feed cost per dozen of eggs, reduce feeding labor and keep the poultry house dry.

High-energy all-mash rations (in either mash or pellet form) have already been recognized as good for chickens converting feed into eggs because of the easy digestibility of the feed. Considerable evidence is now available to support an all-mash feeding program for the entire flock the year round.

**Water Needed**  
 Hens should always be supplied plenty of water. Oyster shell and granite grit should be provided. One pound of oyster shell contains lime enough for the shells of 7 to 8 dozen eggs.

The American Feed Manufacturers Association reported that in 1951 one ton of feed produced an average of 4,200 eggs compared to an average of only 3,200 eggs from feeds used in 1933. Although other factors helped account for this 31 percent increase, better feeds was undoubtedly an important reason.

## Red Cross Work In Saigon, Vietnam Described In Letter To Ruidosoan

(Editor's Note: Dr. N. B. Armstrong, one of the professors at Sul Ross College, Alpine, Tex., under whom Mrs. Violet Kilgore, Ruidoso elementary school teacher, studied last year, has sent a letter to her in which he describes work of the Red Cross there. He was appointed by the federal government as a member of the educational groups of the U. S. O. M. to Indo-China because of his outstanding work with the Red Cross in Europe during World War II. Other professors in the group are from Harvard, Yale and other such large universities.)

Friends Firm and Faithful:  
Greetings from CAMAU, at the southern tip of the Peninsula, and presently the land of "Operation Brotherhood." The final evacuation of the Communist Vietnam (by the Geneva Accords) from south to North Vietnam has just been completed. "What is that jumping Jack Armstrong (immature all-American boy) up to now?" is your very appropriate question. My reply is that I am very much down to dusty earth, surveying existing educational needs, and supplying as many as I can in the land crushed by eight weary years of attritionalist Vietnamese warfare. By plane, jeep, cyclo, bus, station wagon, car, truck and boat I have dashed thither and yon over highways and byways reminiscent of the crater-filled roads over which we tortuously moved in the Battle of the Belgian Bulge, exactly a decade ago. Again the stakes in freedom are equally high and formidable. Consciously or subconsciously I feel that precious time is of the essence.

(It has been my good fortune to participate in the vital "Operation Brotherhood," conducted by the enthusiastic volunteer Philippine doctors and nurses, under the auspices of the International Junior Chamber of Commerce (Jaycees). In response to a call issued to Manila, for 20 volunteers, over 60 responded, just clamoring to come over! I was with the first group that flew down from Saigon to Soc-Trang Feb. 6. The dynamic civic ball of fire, Oscar Arrellano, led the first group that set up a clinic in CAMAU. I watched last Sunday these heroic doctors and nurses, in snow-white uniforms with the conspicuous red cross, administering to the endless stream of human wreckage. Any supposed encouragement from me was superfluous. The spirit of Florence Nightingale was right there, suggesting that we could help by bringing in the material supplements—all a hospital needs with which to operate effectively. It was a big order but a great challenge.) Incidentally, two nights later at their headquarters in Saigon, Sr. Arrellano (International vice-president of Jaycees) pulled me in with a shout: "Pecos, Texas, Jaycees was the first club in the United States to send in a contribution to our work!" They surrounded me and burst into "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You," really singing it just like real Texans, believe it or not. I couldn't sing, for the tennis ball in my throat. Attention, master of ceremonies, Jack Hawkins! It is a must that this news item be broadcast over the Cactus network. (In the

Big Bend of Texas). They bounced back over the trail today, in a Vietnamese Army truck, a pallote occupant frantically waved us down. Two doctors jumped out, appraised the situation, threw several of us out, bag and baggage, put the agonizing patient into a swinging hammock, and rushed off to what would serve as an emergency operation place in the next village. One doctor shouted as they were lost in a cloud of dust. I have been in several villages where there was not even a trace of medicines of any kind! The mere thought should prevent any of us from ever again cussing out our local doctors and medical facilities.

The field work and office routine alternate in rapid succession. Someone asked me the other day, "Armstrong, just what is your specialty?" My reply indicated that it is quite similar to the fireman who seeks to prevent the spread of fires. We are combating educationally the ever-spreading Communist miasma. In that sense we have all willy nilly become specialists. The problem is a genre of world-wide magnitude. But the shifting scenes do present contrasts, often unexpectedly. Never can I forget the joys of dinner and house guest. I wondered what that night and the next day would reveal. Surprise of the type only too rare awaited me.

On pre-dawn's gentle zephyrs there floated strangely subdued, but celestial harmonies. I awoke with a start, listening intently to this musical apparition. As the light etched objects into relief the strains were correspondingly increased. The mystery continued to baffle me as I prepared for petit dejeuner. Then just at sunrise the mansion grounds were flooded with the glorious full symphony. It was a happy in uncertain territory. We always start the day with cheerful music. We treasure our record player, and want our neighborhood to share with us through its abundant amplifier. It fills our hearts with good cheer for the work of the day. Then with a mischievous twinkle he grasped my arm, confiding that we should get off to ourselves for a tete-a-tete as we breakfasted before the arrival of the others. Never once did he ask for money. He told me of the most urgent, emergency needs existing in his province.

Later that day, under heavily armed guard, I penetrated into the province, verifying first hand the urgency of his petitions. I saw the wounded being brought in from the previous night's fighting. But the visits to schools afforded a dramatic contrast. Pupils lined the entrance, waving flags and shouting their welcome. Inside, the school director usually delivered a formal speech of welcome and gratitude for their school, built by

American aid. The Vietnamese interpreter gave me on-the-spot translations of the ornate speech, reciprocating with my off-the-cuff, but none the less sincere, replies. What would you have thought had you received by complete surprise the four gigantic floral offerings handed me by lovely ladies that day? My comment: They were more than enough to cover my casket. In this land of perpetual outdoor flower gardens one does not have to wait until his funeral to get gorgeous floral tributes. That's appreciation aplenty for our American aid.


In the same region I went by jeep over thirty kilometers of trails to road's end. Thence by boat for three hours a distance of 45 kilometers to Long My. When I specialized in the possibility of going overland, they advised that there was no kind of trail inland; and if there were, that I must be trying to emulate the ex-

ample of Little Black Sambo, for we were sure to meet a host of hungry tigers along the way, so would have to talk our way out of jungle trouble in tiger language only. Lacking the golden parasol and purple shoes with crimson soles and crimson linings, we stuck to the boat rides on the canals in this eerie, isolated region. They had improvised little place cards at the Vietnamese officers' mess where we had dinner. Mine read underneath the name, "Enseignement U. S. A." All they could figure out was that teaching was my business and that to be safe they should put broad enough territory—the U. S. A. Could any gesture to a Texan have ever been more polite?

It is with humiliation that I have discovered recently that Indo-China has a Texas river. As I have flown so many times over the vast Mekong, and particularly its eight-pronged delta, each one

a mighty tide in its own right, I began to speculate on its unbelievable magnitude. On consulting a noted engineer stationed at my Mission, I was informed that the flow has been clocked below Phnom Penh, before branching out into the delta, at 45 million gallons a minute, or 750 thousand gallons a second. When it reaches flood crest during rainy season one million gallons churn along each and every second! That's 60 million gallons a minute. You are so right—that is larger than the Pecos River. To save face I commented to some Cambodians at Anghor Wat the other day, as I noticed some big turtles waddling along. "In Texas we call those fellows bedbugs." After persistent effort they finally caught the joke and coughed up a weak chuckle. Bye for this time. Our task is certainly worth the try.

### County Organized For Serum Drive On Dread Polio

(By BOB KAUFMANN)  
An organizational meeting of the Lincoln County Polio Foundation was held in Carrizozo Monday night where details of a proposed serum campaign to inoculate children of the first and second grades of schools of the county against infantile paralysis was outlined.

The individual localities of the county to prepare and administer to first and second graders the Salk polio vaccine early in April. This is to be done, provided Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., of the Polio-vaccine Evaluation Center gives the "go ahead" signal, signifying its value after the first year's trials in 1954. The vaccinations will be given almost simultaneously to 9,000,000 youngsters throughout the United States. It will not be given to others at the time because the National Foundation simply cannot afford it, nor can the pharmaceutical companies produce enough.

for such a wholesale campaign, the Carrizozo gathering was told. The course of shots will be free, and will consist of a series of three given over a span of five months. Last year 6,000 children in Bernalillo county were given this series. "A few sore arms and temperatures were in evidence, but only a few, and in no case was there an outbreak of a rash or a serious illness," the meeting was informed. Parents are urged to give their consent that their children may be vaccinated, as a precaution against the dread disease. They are also urged to co-operate further if called on to assist in carrying out the program on the days of the wholesale vaccinations. It was noted that this year's nationwide campaign will likely be the last time the shots can be given free. In the future they will likely cost \$25 to \$30 when purchased commercially from druggists and physicians, the group


### Democrats Hear Representative Ortiz Report On Legislature
