
MFSCALERO

RUIDOSO GAS CO. NEW PLANT AND TRUCKS

Joe Hawkins of Ruidoso Gas Co. announces that his new propane bulk storage on U. S. Highway 70, east of Ruidoso, has been completed and is now in operation. The new plant is a completely new gas storage plant. The bulk and bottle service in addition to the pumping and metered service that he has operated in downtown Ruidoso here since 1950. The gas truck shown above will soon be equipped with a two way radio so that customers may contact the operator of the truck at any time by calling the company's office at the Hawkins residence dial 2935. Hawkins declares he is the truck driver, serviceman (with the aid of D. B. Salas), and bookkeeper (all mistakes in the bookkeeping, however, is credited to his wife). His ambition is to build the use of propane gas to a volume here large enough to attract the attention of the natural gas companies.

Hawkins, who was raised in Roswell, has been in the butane and propane business since 1940. During World War II, he served in the Army from 1940 until 1946. The Hawkins have three children: Thomas G. Joana, 5, and Joe, 3 months. The family moved to Ruidoso in 1949 and served with Sierra Bros. Co. in Roswell and Ruidoso for eight years.

The Hawkins own their own home here. Joe has been very active in community work, having been vice-president of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, a president of the local Lions Club and an organizer and worker in many projects, sponsored by the C. of C. and the Lions. He is at present lending an able hand in the work of Scouting in Ruidoso.

Portales—For the folks who are remorseful over the apparent disappearance of "the boarding house reach," it might do you some good to know the habits of boarders have not changed before the dogmas of Emily Post.

It's becoming more and more difficult to find an old style boarding house, but usually there are a few in any college town. The records set by the host carriers and gandy dancers of yesterday are falling every day before the rush of hungry college students when the bell sounds.

The meals are still served family style. (Of course it would be difficult to FIND a family who could devour so much at one sitting.) Interesting traits develop at different tables. Occasionally novices, who bear the most fork wounds, wait hand and foot on the head man. He is rewarded by getting second choice. But woe unto him if he ever feels that he can emulate with the head man and try to pre-empt the meat tray. He is soon sent to the foot of the table, bearing a newer and deeper gash.

Another diversion is effected if the head man decides to actually "pass" the butter. After all plates are filled, he slices the butter into thin crystals and using his knife blade for a spring catapult flings the patties of butter down the table. The boarders hold up a saucer

Father Of Geronimo Is Source Of Legend Of Tucumcari Peak

sent for the two young men and heard the proposition made by the Chief, Wautonomah, and to them: "I know you both love White Flower, (meaning Karl). Annual Sale Of Easter Seals Now Underway

The 1935 Easter Seal campaign in New Mexico and throughout the nation is scheduled from March 10 to Easter Sunday, April 10, according to Charles C. Broome of Albuquerque, president of the New Mexico Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

Easter Seals will be mailed to more than 150,000 residents in the state, beginning on March 9. Crippled children's colorful messenger, the 1935 Easter Seal, is oblong in shape this year. It displays a white, lily symbol of the Easter Seal society on a pink background. A bright blue ribbon imposed on the lily says, "Help Crippled Children."

Over 90 percent of the funds received in this annual drive remain in New Mexico for local use, Broome said. The remaining ten percent supports a nationwide program of education, direct services and research including the Easter Seal Research Foundation.

The campaign is held simultaneously by 1,500 affiliates of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults in the 48 states, District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.



Good orchard pest control is dependent on the timing and thoroughness of the spray application. W. J. Wilbanks, extension horticulturist and R. C. Dobson, extension entomologist at New Mexico A & M College, authors of a new extension circular "Fruit Sprays for New Mexico" Spraying failures are more frequently due to improper application, rather than to the type of materials in the spray tank, the specialists point out.

"Fruit Sprays for New Mexico" contains suggestions and precautions on control of certain mites, insects and plant diseases which are common in New Mexico. It gives special recommendations on the use of dormant oils and summer oils, insecticides, fungicides and miticides.

Home and commercial orchardists and others may procure a copy of "Fruit Sprays for New Mexico"

Extension Circular No. 256 from their county extension service office or by writing to the Department of Information, P. O. Box 757, State College, New Mexico.


