The County Agent Reports

(By RALPH DUNLAP)
Signs to locate the various farms and ranches will be sold by the Hon. 4-H Club the signs will have the name and distance to the place on it. Prices are \$1.50 for the sign, and 50¢ extra for it installed on a post. The proceeds from the signs will be used by the members to help pay their way to 4-H camp June 10-13.

Although scattered freezes have affected small areas of fruit in the Hon. Valley, the general prospect is for a good crop of apples and peaches as well as some pears.

Growers should have applied a calyx spray and possibly a cover spray by now. Lead arsenate is the best insecticide for the calyx spray with DDT or Malathion for the cover spray. Some growers use DDT in all sprays to help control mites and retard mite build-up.

At the Tom Knight ranch, we noticed some lice on the yearling cattle we were working. The lice would not have been noticed if we had not been clipping the sides of the calves. The lice eat the dead skin and hairs and seldom cause much trouble. These lice, as well as other cattle insect pests, can be controlled by putting a 5% oil base insecticide on a scratcher as described in a recent extension circular. This publication, Stop Those Horn Flies, can be obtained at the County Agent's office in Roswell.

over in the county, and some of the ranchers had to pay as much as 40¢ per head to have their sheep shorn. Wool is selling fairly well now, although it is generally 5¢ to 8¢ under last year's price. Prices range from 36¢ to 54¢ per pound.

Brucellosis testing is getting started in this area with many of the ranchers having the test done at the same time as they brand. Brucellosis can strike fast and hard once it gets into a herd, as a dairyman in the Tularosa area can readily say. This dairyman had a clean herd 30 days before the test when he got cows out of 31 were reactors. Another test later brought four more reactors. The dairyman is now planning to dispose of his entire herd at a loss because of brucellosis. The infection seems to have been brought in by two untested cows he bought.

If as calves, the cows had been vaccinated for brucellosis, his loss would have been small as a vaccinated animal seldom contracts the disease. Even though the farmer or rancher does not have brucellosis, he can very easily insure his breeding herd by vaccinating his calves at 6 to 12 months of age.

Dr. Bob Bond is doing the testing and vaccinating in Lincoln County.

It makes me happy to know that I am the daughter of a wonderful mother and father who have worked so hard to make me contented. I like the cactus and the desert flowers, the apple orchards, and the tiny bubbling streams of the Hondo, Bonito, and Ruidoso. I like to get up early in the morning and see the hills bathed in the first rays of the sun. After a rain, I like to smell the wet earth. To most people, perhaps, these things would not bring happiness. To me, however, they do.

Along with the scenery of Lincoln County, I like the people. The people here are friendly, almost to

a man. There is practically nothing they will not do to help a friend. The acts of kindness my friends and neighbors do for me each day is another reason why I like life here in Lincoln County. I wish more people could live here. I think what has caused half the world's troubles is that people have lost contact with the simpler things of life. What could give a person more happiness and content than to live as we do, close to God and Nature?

As I watch each season come and go in the valley, I believe more and more in my theory. When winter comes, with its white mantle, frosting the trees and ground, it gives me a feeling of security and of happiness. Then comes spring, and with spring comes the first tinge of green and the apple trees blossom. In spring comes sheep shearing time and the promise of summer. The valley is very pretty then, with the blossoms of the fruit trees ranging from a pale lavender to a creamy whiteness. And then comes summer in all its splendor, making the valley a carpet of multi-shaded green, broken here and there by brilliant patches of yellow. Then comes fall, when the leaves of the trees turn beautiful shades of red and gold, then a deep russet, and finally, brown. Autumn in the valley is one of the most beautiful times of the year. As these seasons change each year, they bind me closer to the valley, and I emphasize and strengthen my faith in God.

Once again I say that I would not trade my life here for a life anywhere else on earth. No doubt

I shall leave here soon to "make my way in the world." Sooner or later, however, I will be back! Fred P. Bowser.


