\$200,000 School Building Is Proposed Near Bent For Indian Children Under Otero County Guidance

The Otero county school system will assume jurisdiction over Indian schools on the Mesalero reservation beginning in the fall of 1956, and will incorporate the present Indian schools into the county system in a new \$200,000 school plant to be built between Bent and Mesalero.

The school will be located on the reservation, on land already obtained from the Mesalero Tribal Council, between Bent and Mesalero. The present county school at Bent and the Indian school at Mesalero will be consolidated into the one new building, which will serve the entire reservation area.

The new plant will consist of an eight-room elementary school, with an additional multi-purpose room with stage, kitchen, administrative suite, book room, boiler room, auxiliary area, well and septic tank, driveways and parking areas, and the necessary equipment.

He served in the Army in World War II and was a member of St. Joseph's Mission Church in Mesalero.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Neva Lester, three sons, Edwin, Walter, and Leo Lester, and three daughters, Mrs. Beatrice Volk, Allie and Jack Lester.

Columnist Hal Boyle Deeply Stirred By Old Cemetery Near Ft. Stanton

(Editor's Note: This is the last of a series of five columns written about the historic country around Ruidoso by Hal Boyle, world famous Associated Press columnist, when he toured this region in company with the Ruidoso News editor. We enjoyed the experiences he writes about with him when he visited the old and the new cemeteries at fabulous Fort Stanton. This column is reprinted by special permission of the Associated Press.)

 Fort Stanton, N. M. (AP)—What's new in cemeteries? Well, if you are really a cemetery connoisseur, there are a couple of interesting ones here by this century-old former Army post where "Blackjack" Pershing, later a famous general, earned his nickname playing cards.

Some people like hospitals. Some like night clubs. Some like cemeteries.

I'm a cemetery man myself, and I suppose most people are. Night clubs cost too much. Hospitals make you nervous. But nothing gives you a better perspective on the importance of life than a visit to a cemetery. No other place is as restful. Only in a cemetery do the dead generally have to pay an admission fee, while the living can enter and leave free.

The older cemeteries of the eastern section of the United States are usually well-cared for. But they are also often grimly trimmed and patterned and have a caught-as-it-is-forever look, as a flower imprisoned in glass does.

The two cemeteries here are somewhat careless and unkempt. They wear their grass long instead of trim and tidy. They have a frontier down-to-earth expression, if you can think of cemeteries as having individual expressions. And of course they do—just as trees and people and pigeons do.

Both cemeteries seem to have had a "welcome stranger" attitude, giving shelter to anyone overcome by the storms of the world.

The bigger cemetery is the newer one. More than half a century ago the Army post was turned into a national hospital for tubercular members of the American Merchant Marine.

It seems, apart from the benefit of climate, an odd place to cure sailors homesick for seas far away. But the vista of bending grass on rolling hills reaching to distant mountains gives one the feeling of being aboard a ship straining toward a high shore.

Many of the 951 mariners buried here must have thought of this before they died an inland death. Most of the graves have lost the identity of a name and carry only the tag of a numbered stone. Nobody cared to index them but the government. A few graves have rude, weathered wooden crosses adorned with a faded hand-carved anchor. Many of those with names bear Scandinavian names.

In a separate corner, lined up forever, rest four sailors from the imprisoned crew of the German raider Graf Spee, scuttled off South America early in the second World War.

Does any fraulein still wonder what happened to Herman Neuhoff, born Aug. 8, 1910; or Otto Zeltsch, born April 1, 1910? Well, here they tarry, eternal classmates, under the Iron Cross and burgeoning cactus plants.

The older cemetery is the smaller one. It must have been started shortly after the fort was established in 1855.

Here are buried a number of cavalrymen who rode to death to make the frontier safe. But time has destroyed most of their headstones. Who knows what man lies below, and how he died, and why? Their true monument: The great wide West itself.

Hospitably interred with them are a few civilian pioneers. There is also a small, boy's size grave, lovingly outlined with pebbles, and bearing a headstone that says simply: "Charles." The grave is sunken, but flowers still bloom upon it. Somebody remembers Charles.

As I walked toward the gate a dove whirred up with a soft-feathered thunder. I saw two small eggs in the nest she had made in the dry parched grass, and knew that

as soon as I was gone she would return to that nest, and that out of this old home of death new life would hatch and fly.

A cemetery is a pleasant place—if you aren't in a hurry.

Albuquerque Minister Asks Horse Racing Be Banned On Sunday

An Albuquerque minister's attempt to prohibit Sunday horse racing in New Mexico caused a brief flurry of excitement here late last week, but interest in the proposal quickly faded.

The Rev. Bluford Finch of Albuquerque asked for an immediate injunction to close the Sunday sport. He cited an 1875 New Mexico statute that bans many sporting and entertainment activities on Sunday. The Rev. Finch called upon the state's Attorney General to enforce the law by issuing an immediate order and to follow that up with a permanent injunction.

Three Ruidoso ministers voiced their approval of the move last Thursday and all were in accord that Finch should be supported in his move, not only to stop Sunday racing but to restrict any activity associated with wagering.

An official of Ruidoso Downs was surprised by the move but said he expected little to come of the action. State Fair officers in Albuquerque remarked that if the law is enforced the entire state fair exhibit will be forced to close on Sunday.

Many people here in Ruidoso expressed the opinion the minister was making a bid for publicity in his action.

LAMB STEW . . . Little Rest, Lots Of Action Keep ENMU Students Busy In Summer Theater At Ruidoso

From the first jarring rays of the morning sun until the final curtain falls, New Mexico's summer theater is a camp of frayed nerves, exploding energy, and a never ending treadmill of activity.

The thirteen students enrolled in Eastern New Mexico's summer session will expend more effort this summer working eight credit hours than the average student does in nine months at a regular college.

The reason for the wealth of activity is simple. Besides having the mountainous task of producing four shows this summer the crew has another time consuming task—living.

The school at Portales sent barracks, dining hall, cooks, and a few modern facilities—but the rest of the camp is left to the inventive minds and agile hands of the crew.

Supervising the entire camp is Dr. R. Lyle Hagan. Besides being director, producer of the four shows, he is also a combination camp chief, trouble shooter, chaplain, and general adviser on problems ranging from "The men's wash room is out of order again," to a hurried search for props 30 seconds before curtain time. Hagan is wearing a pretty tired look these days and as yet he doesn't see any end to his daily problems, but there haven't been any problems that he hasn't solved with amazing celerity. Hagan, professor at the school, is also leading the two classes a day.

First problem of the year was the turnout. So far there haven't been any "Standing Room Only" signs hung out, but as interest in Ruidoso grows the audience increases. Members of the crew were also responsible for the local publicity.

Another big problem one that could have been more disastrous than the turnout, was heating. The giant tent, in which the stage is housed, couldn't hold the heat long enough to make it comfortable for patrons and actors. But Dr. Hagan has spent every spare moment under the big top patching here, rewiring there and only last week supervised the installation of steam heat.
