Signboard Tax Held Invalid By Scoggin

Carrizo, N. M. (Sp.)—A section of the New Mexico signboard act of 1933 is unconstitutional, District Judge W. T. Scoggin stated in an opinion given last week in District Court in Carrizo. His statement regarding the act was part of a ruling in the case of the State of New Mexico against Bill Brem.

The case was an appeal from the State of a decision in Justice of the Peace Court in Green Tree wherein Brem was cited for maintaining an illegal highway sign without purchasing and displaying a permit tag.

The State sought to establish through Atty. Richard Van Heuven of the State Highway Department that the sign was illegally situated.

The part of the act which, in the opinion of Judge Scoggin is unconstitutional, is that which assesses an annual fee varying with the size of the sign. That stipulation, the judge stated, is designed to raise revenue and does not come within the scope of "police powers" as defined in the act.

Both attorneys for the defense and for the State spent some time arguing whether or not the signboard act was beyond the normal police powers of a state.

Judge Scoggin ruled that the act does come within the state's police powers, inasmuch as it is safety highway legislation and that signboards require some regulation.

He further ruled that the sign in question was not a hazard and recommended that the Highway Department grant Brem a license upon being presented with proper application and payment of \$5 fee. Judge Scoggin commented that the signboard act does not set up standards and that it should be amended by legislation.

As now set up the act assesses a \$5 fee with application to erect a highway signboard to defray the cost of investigation. An estimate is then assessed, based on the size of the sign; 50 cents if the advertising area does not exceed 50 square feet; \$1 if such area exceeds 50 square feet, but does not exceed 100 square feet; \$2 if such area exceeds 100 square feet. Brem was represented by Atty. G. T. Watts and Geo. L. Zimmerman.

HOSPITAL BENEFIT DAY SET AUG. 19 BY DOWNS

Tickets were on sale here in numerous Ruidoso stores, this week for the annual Ruidoso Downs Charity Day to benefit the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital. All gate receipts for Friday, Aug. 19, at Ruidoso Downs will be turned over to the hospital here, Downs officials announced.

Ruidoso residents are urged to participate in the charity day by buying a ticket at whatever amount they wish, for all moneys collected on the ticket sale will go to the hospital.

The total of \$3,700 was raised for the hospital by a similar charity day on a Friday late in August, this year the Downs officials are hoping the total will go beyond \$4,000.

Service clubs, including the Lions, Rotary and Chamber of Commerce, have been called upon to assist in pushing ticket sales.

W. A. Hart, president of the board of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, said Monday night "We'll have to work hard on this year. It is a great opportunity for our hospital to benefit greatly." During the 1934 hospital drive under auspices of the Downs, community workers had almost a month to work in the campaign. This year, only a ten-day campaign is being allowed.

Apple Packing To Start Aug. 22 At White Mountain Fruit Growers Plant

(By RALPH DUNLAP) Lincoln Agricultural Agent Apple packing operations are planned to start about Aug. 22 at the White Mountain Fruit Growers shed, Mr. Baxter, the operator of the packing shed, indicated that the growers will receive a good crop for early, high quality fruit. Plans to run the shed as many hours a day as required to get the fruit out.

Fruit prospects in the valley are good, but there is considerable hail damage in some areas. The Glenn Co. area has a full crop on all its trees, including apples, pear, plums and peaches. Last week I visited the Elzy Perry orchard and he was putting up a fruit stand to help handle early apples, as well as peaches and pears. He had a large quantity of each, many ripe and ready to eat. Many of the trees in the Glenn area are bending to the ground because of the heavy crop in the area.

A few worms were noted just starting into the apple. An immediate spray of malathion would stop these worms as well as control the spider mite which is causing damage throughout the valley. The addition of ovator to the spray would also kill the mite eggs or else you should use the malathion a week later to kill the mites that hatch. Any time over 12 miles are noted on a leaf, you should spray.

Along the line of sprays, I talked to county agents from Washington, as well as Ohio, and the growers in those areas have to spray 11 to 14 times, whereas the grower in this area seldom sprays more than 6 times. It is a tremendous problem in those areas.

Barbershop Quartets Will Invade Ruidoso For Annual Song Fest

Encouraged by the welcome received here last year the El Paso chapter of the Society for Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. have decided to return to Ruidoso for another season.

Members of the El Paso organization have decided to make an annual trek to Ruidoso for their "Mountain Glow" which was held here last September.

Due for the one day song fest filled with the history of the El Paso time quartets from El Paso and other groups invited from all over the southwest will gather at the Navajo Lodge.

Dick Crosby, one time member of the El Paso Barber Shop Quartet, hopes for a large turnout of all the people to the "Mountain Glow." No admission will be charged. Crosby, releasing the date of the song fest, added that he hoped that a similar group could be started in Ruidoso. He noted that the potentiality of such a group here and could invite quartets from surrounding chapters here through the winter, to join with the local organization.

The different quartets are conspicuous by their costumes. Each group has its own uniforms. He said the Mountain Glow members of the visiting singers usually break off into groups and sing for their own enjoyment, called "woodchopping."

Work on one section of the building were built recently, and it is the hope of the O. E. S. building committee and ways and means committee to hurry completion of that portion. The campaign to finance the work will continue until enough is secured to do the job.

Construction Starts On New Building Here

A new building may soon be built in upper Ruidoso directly across Main Road from the Ruidoso Hotel.

Arnet Dorbandt, Sweetwater, Tex., recently purchased the land across from the post office and indicates that he plans some extensive improvements on the property.

The land runs very sharply down hill toward the Rio Ruidoso and will require considerable filling before any construction can begin. Trees on the site were being felled this week.

The possibility exists that Dorbandt will build a structure to a lesser specification.

Property Owners Voice Opinions At Paving Hearing Monday Night

Fail To Pass Entire Paving District A proposal to pave, gutter and install sidewalks along Ruidoso's main street in Ruidoso's paving district No. 1 was partially stymied by property owners along the street when they voiced their opinions at a public hearing Monday night.

A possibility that part of the district may be improved still exists, however, when owners holding property in the district agreed to the project.

As it stands as of Tuesday morning paving on Main from Riverside Drive to some 100 feet beyond the junction of Junilla and Main will be improved. City officials will not be in a position to take any action when they remarked that it might be difficult to secure a contractor to take such a small job.

The Community Public Service company added a note of incentive to property holders when it indicated that it would install mercury vapor lights along the stretches of road that will be improved.

Present at the hearing held in the Ruidoso Municipal Building were members of the Village Board of Trustees, Mayor Dan Swearingin, a Roswell attorney, Sneed, and 30 property owners.

Some of the objections which had been received prior to the hearing were accepted as valid by the trustees.

In the upper area of the paving district a required easement would have been necessary as well as a majority of property pledged a single easement refusal would have stopped the project.

A need to widen the present street dedication in the upper section of the district called for a need of the easements. City finances at this time do not allow for monies to be used in condemning property for public use. All projects must be voluntarily donated by the property owners.

Reasons for protest and refusal to grant easements varied from the cost to the individual to one owner's stand against having to give up a portion of his property. Some owners, although favoring development of Ruidoso's main thoroughfare, decided to wait until the entire project can be approved.

The original proposal to improve the street came as a result of petitions circulated among property owners along the main street several months ago calling for opinions of those affected. At that time a majority of property owners gave a "go ahead" signal to preliminary surveys and plans to begin the cost and extent of paving.

The state highway department has agreed to share in a major portion of the cost of actual paving.

Roswell Man Buys Anderson Lumber Firm

Announcement was made this week that negotiations were near completion for the purchase of the stock of R. H. Anderson Lumber Co. of Hollywood by M. M. Roberts of Roswell. Roberts has been manager of the Bowman Lumber Co. in Roswell. Recently he purchased the Calle Bada cabins in upper Ruidoso and moved here with his family. He is married and has three daughters, Rosemary, 11; Millicent, 8, and Colleen. The older of the three girls will be enrolled in Ruidoso elementary school this fall.

The Andersons said when the deal is completed, they plan to take a long rest, to include some of their favorite recreation—fishing. They have not sold their home here, and plan to continue making Ruidoso their home. "We'll be active in some form or other in the business life of the community," Roberts is saying.

Roberts is buying the stock of the company, and the Andersons will retain ownership of the building. Only recently an additional 20x36 storage warehouse was erected just east of the original Anderson building.

State To Get Ft. Stanton Hospital, 5,000 Acres Of Land From U. S.

State Welfare Director Murray A. Hintz, in a meeting of the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association in Carrizo Tuesday night said that final papers are being drawn up now for signature by Governor John Simms for acquisition by the state of the hospital and some of the land surrounding it at Ft. Stanton. Exhibiting a map of the property, the amount of land to be acquired in the transfer from the federal government to New Mexico will total about 5,000 acres of the estimated 27,000 in the original Ft. Stanton tract. He said the state could not

acquire the hospital in the name of the State of New Mexico, but could acquire it through the name of the State Department of Public Welfare.

"We will get the hospital and the land at 100% discount," he said. The land would be in two parcels, a narrow strip containing the hospital and its grounds, and lying along the Bonito creek (or watershed) running through the Ft. Stanton ranch, and another smaller area containing the hospital's unimproved airfield, a little more than a mile square. He said an inventory of the holdings and land was estimated at \$1,250,000.

(Hintz was meeting in Carrizo with representatives of Ruidoso and Carrizo on the board of directors of the Eagle Creek Water Association, to discuss with them the hospital part in the project of a new water supply for the two communities. Ft. Stanton, which has a prior water right in Eagle Creek, was automatically made a member of the Inter-Community Water Users Association, and the state was invited to be a member of that board.)

The acquisition has secured a conditional sales contract from the Southern Pacific Railway for purchase of water rights on Eagle Creek and some 1,045 acres of land in that area, and is now engaged in the study of financing the development with storage and pipelines for distribution to the communities in the association. The association is one year old, and at the meeting this week, Mayor D. Murphy of Carrizo was elected president, succeeding Mayor Dan D. Swearingin of Ruidoso.)

Members of Ruidoso First Baptist Church, and a large group of summer visitors, in a standing vote during the morning services here last Sunday, expressed their disapproval of horse racing in this community, and urged the local church's views on horse racing, especially on Sunday, is to be made shortly to Governor John Simms, and to state legislators of this district, asking them to take whatever authority they might have to limit or prohibit the minister, the Rev. Walter L. Brian, reported. Other action on the church's stand may be taken in the future, he added.

New Mexico Youth Invited To Rodeo

The eighth annual Billy the Kid's Rodeo at Three Rivers has been set for Sunday, August 21. The rodeo, for New Mexico boys and girls only, is sponsored annually by the Tularosa Lions Club and T. E. Ryan, owner of the Three Rivers. A new division for boys from 16 through 18 has been introduced. The only event in this division will be calf roping.

Grand prize for the rodeo will be a \$200 hand made saddle. An attraction to boys and girl competitors is the absence of an entrance fee. Contestants will compete in age divisions of 9 through 12, 13 through 15 and 16 through 18. Entry blanks are available by writing to the Tularosa Lions Club or Chamber of Commerce or C. C. Johnson, Three Rivers.

Six of the officials of the rodeo will come from Lincoln County. Fletcher Hall, Captain, and Wilbur McKnight, Glennco, will be two of the time keepers. Eagle Creek Water Users Group Now In Second Year Of Work; Purchase Of Rights, Land Near

The Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association has entered its second year—a year that promises to be filled with many conferences and lots of hard work for the members from Ruidoso, Carrizo and the State Welfare Board, which represents Ft. Stanton Hospital in the organization.

A new president, D. C. Murphy, will step into the leadership of the association at the next regular board meeting, set for Aug. 30 at Ft. Stanton. Murphy is mayor of Carrizo. He succeeds Dan Swearingin, mayor of Ruidoso, who is completing the association's first year of organization as its head. Swearingin swaps roles with Murphy as vice-president for the next year. The election was held in the regular board meeting Tuesday night of this week in Carrizo, and in the voting Jack Earling of Carrizo was returned as secretary-treasurer.

Discussed in the meeting this week were such items as giving approval to Ruidoso Telephone Co. for use of the association's pipeline right of way for installation of additional long distance toll lines out of Ruidoso to Carrizo, Jack Hinchens of the local company was present for the session.

Murray A. Hintz, state welfare director, representing Ft. Stanton Hospital, attended the meeting at the association for the first time, and was briefed on the group's action to date and future plans for development of the Eagle Creek watershed to supply Ruidoso, Carrizo and Ft. Stanton with water. Hintz represented the meeting at the meeting was Dan Kusanovich who has been a regular attendant at almost every meeting of the association since it was organized a little more than a year ago.

"First Year's Work Outlined" In his report, the Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Users Association has done these things: 1. Upon study of a feasibility report of the possibilities of developing a water supply source on the Eagle Creek watershed, completed by a Santa Fe engineering firm, the association has set up a permanent charter organization, with a board of seven, including three from the two towns and one representative from the State Welfare Board.

2. Employed an engineer, W. F. Turner, who compiled a second feasibility report, with more attention on the ways and means of developing the watershed.

3. Employed an attorney, Frank Boyce of Carrizozo, to assist in legal work of the association.

4. Signed a contract and secured a deed for the purchase of the Southern Pacific Railway for acquisition of the Eagle Creek water rights and 1,045 acres of land. The price to be paid by the association is \$10,000, with \$1,000 having already been paid. Captain and Hintz stepped to forward the purchase of the water rights and the land from both the U. S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior, which will take Congressional action and make the acquisition final.

5. Had enabling legislation passed by the New Mexico state legislature which will allow the association to issue revenue bonds for developing the water source, such as erecting storage dams, pipelines, etc.

Work For Another Year The big hurdle in the second year of the organization will be the securing of a transfer by the state of water rights from the Southern Pacific to the association. Attorney Boyce told the meeting Tuesday night it might be done within 60 to 90 days. Another hurdle is the securing of title to the land from both the U. S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior, which will take Congressional action and make the acquisition final.

Other than these named, others attending the meeting this week in Carrizo were Fletcher Hall, Captain, Harold Jones and Vic Lamb, Ruidoso.

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs has certainly been slugged around in the press of late. Irresponsible reporting, exaggeration of facts and editorialized phrases in straight news reporting is leaving a stigma on Ruidoso and the track that may

take years to erase. Example: In a news story in Sunday's papers sent out by the United Press, nationwide news gathering agency, the U. P. referred to the local situation as "scandal-ridden Ruidoso Downs." If that is not against all rules and ethics of journalism, it just don't know. In journalism classes, students are taught to write "Ruidoso Downs" and leave off the editorialized, opinionated phrasing "scandal-ridden." Another example: Wednesday afternoon's daily papers of the state carried a bulletin from the Associated Press, another usually dependable news gathering agency, stating flatly that the state would

take control of Ruidoso Downs. Such was not the case, yet three afternoon newspapers we have seen of that date carried 8-column banner headlines saying "State Takes Control of Ruidoso Downs." To date no retraction of that incorrect bulletin has been made by the Associated Press—nor any of the papers that carried the sensational scare headline.

Willians of all the reporting on the Downs, and from which many of the wire reports were taken, were Bill Bailey, sports editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican, and Neil Addington, the "crime" reporter for that "esteemed" newspaper, who came here, and in two days' time, gathered enough "information" to smear the Downs and some of its personnel in column after column of "exposes" for more than a week.

Typical example of their reporting: They said the spectators at the Downs had to stand in a quagmire of mud in front of the grandstand to watch the races. That area has been paved with cement for nine years—and regardless of that, how could there be a quagmire of mud when there was no rainfall during the month of June here? That is typical of several such lies the paper printed. They dare not dispute us. Their several lies are in black type, printed and circulated.

And—to emphasize the ridiculousness of all their series of articles—not yet has anyone come up with any incident of a rule of the racing commission having been broken. One minor violation of telephoning results before the day's program ended was cited, but that is being allowed again by the commission with an accredited newspaperman handling the chore—so, was that so serious? Behind that infraction of a minor rule were extenuating circumstances known by all newsmen of the state—that of getting the news out of this remote area quicker for early editions of some of the morning newspapers who wanted to print results of the local program.

The public seems to feel Ruidoso Downs is o. k. Witness the extra large attendance last weekend here, 33% above the same dates last year—and with the pari-mutuel handle up 20% over last year on the same days. Maybe the

LAFF And You'll Live Longer

Driving through a sleepy little Sussex (England) village one evening our headlights suddenly picked out the figure of a woman running for all she was worth down the road. Close behind her followed a man who appeared to be gaining at every step.

"Oh, no thanks," she panted. "My husband and I always race home like this from the cinema. Last one in does the supper dishes."

Ouch!

A little chap was offered a chance to spend a week in the country, but refused. Coaxing, pleading, arguing, promises of untold wonders, alike brought from him nothing but the stubborn ultimatum: "I'll only go if you'll pay publicity is paying off in advertising the Downs for free, hey?"

Below are a couple of items we picked up from some of our state papers, you might want to read:

From the Roswell Record: "After a Ruidoso race track publicity man had been chastised for telephoning race results to a Texas newspaper before all the races had been completed, the Carlsbad Current Argus says of the commission, "We wonder when it became so pure as to pounce with such fury on a man for what appears, at worst, to have been a technical violation of a commission rule. At Carlsbad proponents of a race track discovered last year the commission has not always been so careful about toeing the mark itself on rules and procedure and common courtesy."

From last week's issue of the Carlsbad daily paper: "Stay off Highway 70 between Roswell and Ruidoso on Sunday if you're in a hurry. The traffic is thick and slow. It is so difficult to pass on this narrow, winding road, that traffic is paced to that of the slowest vehicles—usually a Sunday joy rider or an overloaded truck."

Forest Service Announces Long Range Plan For New, Larger Camp

The U. S. Forest Service announced last Wednesday night that Ruidoso will have a new and larger camp ground for picnickers and visitors who prefer to pitch a tent and sleep out in the woods, or who bring their trailers for camping that is not quite so rustic.

The announcement was made by Dean Cutler, Lincoln National Forest supervisor, who came here from Alamogordo to meet with members of the State Health Service and the Ruidoso Village Board. The meeting was the outgrowth of a protest having been filed with the health service by a resident living near the present camp site in Palmer Gateway, who objected to the use of open pit type toilets in that urban setting. Upon investigation the health service found the state's sanitary laws were being violated by the park's not having enough toilets to accommodate the average number of week-end campers in that site. The health service had notified the forest service the camp would have to be closed unless the facilities were improved and additional toilets were provided.

The Village Board of Trustees then stepped into the picture when it was learned of the possibility of the camp's being closed. Mayor Dan Swearingin outlined the city's wishes that the camp be kept open for a while longer, citing the danger of possible forest fires if campers were moved from the site in the Gateway where there was supervision, and would then be allowed to scatter to all parts of the forest around Ruidoso. He said also the board felt the sanitation problem would be increased if the campers did not have the use of any facilities at all, even the open pit type toilets now provided here.

Forest Funds Limited

Members of the state health department at the meeting readily agreed to realizing the possible improvement in the sanitation problem as well as the danger of forest fires where campers were allowed to pitch their tents almost anywhere in the area.

Cutler explained there were no funds available for further improvements of the present park. The money for the local branch of the service have been allocated in such small amounts it could not fill the need. He said all moneys received by the forest service for timber sales, concessions, etc., goes into the nation's general fund. "We do not keep our receipts for spending on our own needs, but must operate from allocated funds, which are always less than what we make. The forest service is one of the very few governmental agencies which usually makes a profit every year—turning into the U. S. Treasury more than is given back to us," he explained.

Members of the health department and the village board during the meeting embarked on an auto tour of a site the Forest Service plans to improve in the next few years for a new camp ground. The new camp ground, located west of State Highway 31 will completely take the place of the Gateway camp. Cutler declared. He said he did not know when it would be completed, in that such small sums were allocated each year for the service to improve its recreational areas.

The Eastern New Mexico University's Summer Theatre now is located in a part of the present new camp ground. Recently a ranger station and residence for a local forest coverer personnel were completed near the entrance to the new park site. Part of the area once was used for a Civilian Conservation

vice, and all members of the local village board.

Three-Day Racing Slate Opens Today; Attendance Still Climbs

Racing resumes Friday at Ruidoso Downs for a three day season. Approximately 7,000 people attended the past week-end. The pari-mutuel wagering went past the quarter million mark.

Two feature races, one for colts, geldings and horses, at a distance of four hundred yards, and one for three year old thoroughbreds, at seven furlongs, will draw equal billing on Sunday's fine card at Ruidoso Downs. The Quarter Horse Feature, the Peter McCue Stakes, so named in honor of one of the greatest of all quarter horses, has attracted a total of eight head of stand-out speedsters including Brigand, a winner last week. Balmby Eleven, who won last Sunday's featured quarter horse race at Raton; Palomino Joe, who finished a surprising second to Brigand last week; Barjo, a winner of a good race in Tucson during the winter and a host of others.

The Derby Prep, for three year old thoroughbreds, which were nominated for the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby, has attracted a total of eight head including the fast stepping Alto Star, top weighted at 120 pounds, and a winner of four races this year, most of them against older horses at Tucson.

Ak-Seno, a winner of a good three-year-old race last week, has drawn second top weight at 118 pounds. Equal weights in the race at 116 pounds have gone to Clarks Victory, a winner of two; Expressional, making his first start after arriving from California; Come Ahead, a winner of two races of the claiming class; Aunt Frank and Red Air round out the field at 112 pounds.

The Lincoln Forest Handicap, a middle distance sprint for three year olds and upward which carries 110 pounds, was won by the season (\$750 and 5%) has attracted six of the top sprinters on the grounds in what may well prove to be one of the best handicap races of the year. Mr. Drive and War Tuck, who have taken turns beating each other in their past two meetings, have both drawn equal, and top, weights of 122 pounds. They must give 2 pounds to their toughest competition, Sierra, a winner of three starts at the meeting. Clear Day, a winner over War Tuck in an earlier meeting and who has won two races including a handicap and an allowance event, has drawn 118. True Step, who won last Sunday's Daily Racing Form Handicap in rather easy fashion, has drawn 114, while Diem, also a winner of last week's fine card, has drawn the light impost of 112 pounds.

On Saturday the Thoroughbred Futurity, carded of one half mile, will find the favorite, Androlit, gunning for her fourth straight win. She has drawn the outside.

Ft. Stanton Land Hearing is Set Next Wednesday

Sen. Dennis Chavez announced Wednesday a conference of federal agencies and state representatives to be held in Santa Fe next Wednesday to work out a means of disposing of the 26,000 acres of federal land adjoining the Ft. Stanton Hospital.

The senator said he has called the meeting with the hope an agreement can be reached on the federal property, which was retained by the U. S. when it turned the old Marine tubercular hospital over to the state several years ago. New Mexico acquired some 1500 acres of land with the buildings.

State officials invited to the meeting include Gov. John Simms and State Welfare Director Murray Hintz.

Others invited include Mesalero Indian tribal representatives and the Bureau of Indian Affairs as well as the General Services Administration, the Bureau of Land Management and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The Senator's office announced that Chavez "has acknowledged that the area should be used for the benefit of the Mesalero Indians and surrounding stockmen."

The land is now held by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, with the disposal authority in the hands of the GSA.

State Police Increase Surveillance Of Roads

Spurred by the sudden increase the past week of highway fatalities in New Mexico State Police-men are now conducting a state-wide crackdown on traffic law violators.
