
The couple was registered at Alpine Motel.


"NOB HILL







Eight Game Schedule Will Open For Warriors Here September 9

Leland Is Optimistic: Squad Has Heavy Line

Ruidoso's high school football team will open a tough eight game schedule here September 9, but Coach Cy Leland Jr., after viewing his squad, expects to finish high in the conference.

Only five lettermen return to bolster the Warrior squad, but with new players and promising reserves stepping up, Leland expects to field a team that will average over 100 pounds. The forward wall will probably reach a 174 pound average.

Opening Game Here

Roswell high school's B team, traditional opening game foe for the Warriors, will come to Ruidoso this year for the first time Sept. 9. The powerful Hobbs' B team visits Ruidoso the following week-end, Sept. 16.

Ruidoso faces a decided disadvantage when it enters into conference play Sept. 23, when it faces Carrizozo under the lights in Carrizozo. The following week arch rival Capitán visits Ruidoso for the second conference game of the season.

October 7 the Warriors move into Roswell to face New Mexico Military Institute's B team, and then to Capitán Oct. 14 for a return battle with the Tigers. The teams will play under the lights.

Another night battle is on tap for the Warriors when they travel to Melrose Oct. 21 for a non-conference clash. Final tilt of the season is the conference game with Corona in Ruidoso. This is the first year the two Lincoln county teams have met.

Coach Leland is putting lots of faith into two newcomers this year. Bob Pior, a transfer from Phoenix, Ariz., has been receiving extensive drilling in the backfield. Pior was a letterman on the Phoenix B team last season.

Barry Swanson is an unknown quantity. Swanson hasn't arrived yet, but the 155 pounder played junior varsity ball for a Key West, Fla., high school last year.

Leland is also putting lots of faith in his returning lettermen and reserves. Ivan Donathian, 160 pound tackle, and Ronnie Chastain, 155 pound lineman, will anchor the forward wall. Captain Nyles Lackey, 145 pounds, and co-

captain Bingo Morales, 145 pounds, will settle down in the backfield. Jim Wilson, the other returning letterman, is being transferred from his center position to the backfield. "Wilson was an excellent center, but we can't afford to let his speed go to waste," Leland explains the move. Wilson is a heavyweight at 160 pounds. Heaviest man on the squad, Pat Rooney at 193, is expected to be a keystone in the forward wall, and 140 pounder Max Jones will likely see lots of defensive action.

After viewing the men and their ability the coach readily admits it might be a bit difficult to pick a starting squad. "Lots of talent has been displayed in every department," he grinned.

How To Paint A Highway

Blood spattered on a highway is not a very pretty sight. And yet it seems like there are a number of New Mexico residents who would rather have it colored that way. That's the group that continues to rail about the "un-sporting" and "un-ethical" methods now employed by the State Police to aid in checking the rising highway death toll.
 It still seems that a breach of ethics is better than a broken law and broken bodies.
 If they're so determined to color New Mexico highways they might write to the State Highway Department and request a liberal coating of red paint. A little more sanitary.—J. L.

How To Ruin Democracy

On September 20 New Mexico voters will try for the seventh time to amend the state's constitution and allow for absentee voting.
 There are few, if any points that should cause the amendment to fail. The big hurdle is allowing Democracy to function in a modern manner in New Mexico is the way in which the constitution calls for amending the voter qualifications.
 Three-fourths of the voters must approve the change and

every county must register a two-thirds majority in favor of Amendment No. 2. "The Legislature may enact laws providing for the voting of qualified electors absent from their place of residence on the day of an election."

Those disfavoring the proposal seldom need to put up any argument against the measure—they just sit back and let voter apathy thwart the attempt to pass the amendment.

The only remark against absentee voting is that it would allow for crooked elections and stuffing of ballot boxes. To date there's never been a law enacted that could prevent moral corruption in an individual. If he's determined to try to juggle an election he won't wait until absentee balloting is allowed.

The big crime in New Mexico's voting system is the way the service men are not allowed to voice their opinion on the land they're defending. A major portion of the men in Armed Forces are called; it's not their decision; and often their whole economic career is interrupted. It's not surprising that some New Mexico service men are discouraged at the treatment and hesitate before returning to a state that allows them no say in the democratic process—the one they're defending.

It's common knowledge that those who oppose Amendment No. 2 have no fear of its successful passage. They're out to check Democracy by using one of its greatest benefits—the right of the people to vote or stay home.
 Don't stay home and ruin democracy.—J. L.


