Jockey Injured, Horse Destroyed After Sunday Accident At Downs

One jockey was injured and one horse was destroyed as a result of a three horse collision in the eighth race at Ruidoso Downs Sunday.

Jockey Herbert Claggett was taken to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital for treatment of a fractured collarbone and the mount of another rider, Out of Snuff, was destroyed early Monday morning.

At the time of the accident officials feared that Out of Snuff had broken on the track as a result of a broken neck. Later the horse revived but apparently suffered a concussion and was paralyzed. The other two mounts involved in the pile-up were injured slightly.

Duane Graham Burned Seriously By Gasoline

A San Patricio man has been confined to an El Paso hospital after being doused with burning gasoline last Saturday.

Duane Graham, formerly of Green Tree, was in the El Paso last Saturday when the accident occurred. Graham suffered burns on his right leg and both hands.

Doctors handling the case say that it will be from six to eight weeks before Graham will be able to leave the hospital.

Graham, of the G. and W. Drilling Co., San Patricio, was burned by a gas flare which exploded back from a truck motor.

Mrs. Graham, reporting the accident, said that it may be an entire year before Graham can return to work.

 Peaches and pears have come into their full season in the Three Valleys, and they are better than ever due to timely rains. Along with these are plums of several kinds. The season for this kind of fruit does not last long, so folks are asked to get their peaches, pears and plums within the next few days.

Roadside markets are open all along the Ruidoso, and Honda and part of the Bonito. Bring cartons or boxes if you can as this will help the fruit grower keep his bushel and half bushel baskets to measure out fruit.

The packing shed of the White Mountain Fruit Association opened up Aug. 27 and will go steadily into the late fall. A full program of operation of pears and all kinds of apples is expected.

Wilbur F. Coe and Ralph Bonnell have taken a few loads of pears to the shed for packing, out for the national market. Elzy Perry, Tom Babers and others will have Double Red Delicious apples soon for the packing plant.

Coe's new cold storage unit is in operation now, insuring fresh fruit of all kinds including early apples, several kinds of pears, plums and peaches.

Elzy Perry of Glencoe has a new fruit stand on the highway next to the Glencoe post office. Every kind of fruit is available here in highest quality: prune plums, golden delicious apples, pears of several kinds, and the best peaches. Johnny Thomas, San Patricio, has his stand in full operation.

One large bus, driven by Mr. Gabriel Frins, one small bus, driven by Mr. Albert Robinson, and one luggage truck, driven by Mr. Lewis Corbin, left with the children and luggage.

With the recent consolidation of the Elk-Silver School and Mescalero School at Mescalero, the school now has an enrollment of 156 girls and boys. When total enrollment is completed, there will be about 200 pupils attending. The school also has an excellent staff of two new teachers, Mr. William Clegghorn and Mrs. Virginia Smith. Mrs. Smith formerly taught at the Whitetail Day School, Mrs. Dorcie Kazhe, formerly of Whitetail School, is the new head cook at the school. The assistant cook is Mrs. Eloise Shields, formerly of Elk-Silver School. World's Largest Tractor



It takes no less than a mechanical Paul Bunyan to expedite the building of modern highways such as those to be built in Michigan this year. Here is the world's largest tractor, a 35-ton Caterpillar, loaded aboard a goose-neck machinery trailer and hauled by another heavy-weight, a huge A750 V-8 tractor about to start a 285-mile journey. The total weight of this outfit is in excess of 117,000 lbs., and the big Cat can be loaded and unloaded by the driver of the truck with no other help than the winch behind his cab. A special permit is required to haul this mighty earth-moving monster over public roads. It is 12 ft. wide and 12 ft. 6 in. high, is powered by a Diesel engine and can move up to 10 yds. of earth at a time.

Grades 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 will attend school at the old Hondo elementary school temporarily. Mrs. Louise Ferguson will teach the fourth and fifth grades. From the high fifth through the eighth grades the work will be departmentalized among the three elementary teachers—Messrs. Pavey, Radcliff and McTeague—and three high school teachers—Mrs. Arabella, Tinnie and Hondo. Mrs. Ruby Douglas will be coordinator of the English department in the Hondo and San Patricio Elementary Schools, and will teach eighth grade English. Mrs. Irene Stevens will head the physical education department of the Hondo elementary school, and will teach seventh and eighth grade girls' physical education. Jera Lara will assist Pavey with the music in the Hondo elementary school.

Barton Pavey will be the homeroom teacher for the high fifth and low sixth grades, will teach music in all the grades, and classes in social studies and English. Rad-

ORDINANCE NO. 88

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT ALL NEW CONSTRUCTION BE SET BACK FORTY FEET FROM THE CENTER OF MAIN STREET WITHIN THE FIRE LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO AS THEY NOW EXIST OR MAY HEREINAFTER BE EXTENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO:

Section 1. That it is necessary for the protection of the safety, health, and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso that all buildings along Main Street within the limits of the Fire Zone as it now exists, or may hereafter be extended, be set back forty feet (40) from the center of said Main Street.

Section 2. That the provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all new construction and additions to, or alterations of, existing structures, and any such construction in violation of the provisions hereof shall be unlawful, and shall be punished as provided by the general penalty Ordinance of the Village of Ruidoso.

Section 3. That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Think about it, will you, the next time you read about an accident in your local paper.
