Long-Range Beautification Program To Begin This Year On Campus Of Two Ruidoso Schools

The first steps in a long range beautification and landscaping program for the campus of Ruidoso High School and the present elementary school (which is to become Ruidoso Junior High School) in Palmer's Gateway have been taken, and still further steps will be made this school term. Initial action in turning the school grounds into a park-like scene was getting up of a fund of \$100 by the Ruidoso Municipal School board for the hiring of a landscape artist to plan the beautification. Fred Day of New Mexico A. & M. College, Los Cruces, recently submitted a plan for the beautification of the school grounds. The plan includes planting of trees, shrubs, flowers and grass. The sketch he drew earned instant approval of all who have seen it—and it is on display this week in the postoffice in Ruidoso for people of the community to study. The main idea of his plan is to draw the two buildings, high school and the present elementary school, into one spread by creating their nearness to one another through the use of walks, properly placed trees and shrubs. At present the two structures seem far apart, but after viewing Day's sketch, he has created an illusion of the two structures being much closer.

Second phase in the long range program will be done this semester sometime with installation of a pipe for irrigating the proposed lawn. Mrs. Georgia Griffith, member of the local school board, and Mrs. Jack Hull, longtime booster for Ruidoso's schools, are serving voluntarily as a committee to aid in the beautification plan. They have given \$100 towards the cost of laying the irrigation pipe. Many others here have expressed the desire to help with finances on the program—and now is the opportunity for them to extend a helping hand—a hand of currency, you might say. Water for the irrigation system will come from the excellent well drilled last year for watering the athletic field lying alongside the river just north and below the bluff on which the school buildings stand.

Mrs. Griffith, in telling of the move for beautifying the school grounds, has asked the News to stir up interest in the project—which we are glad to do—and is calling on various organizations in the community to take part in the beautification plan. Leaders of the various civic and social organizations are invited to study the landscape artist's proposal, and perhaps select some portion of the over-all plan as their own project. To assist in the financing, the News will act as a headquarters for any money anyone wishes to contribute to the cost. The News will print such a fund with a each gift of \$10 this week. Anyone who to join it?

Two Suits Filed As Aftermath Of Gambling

Two civil suits have been filed in district court in Lincoln, Lea County, as the aftermath of an alleged gambling game in Ruidoso the night of June 25 this year. On record there is a suit by Bob Smith of this city, who named F. B. McCater of Lovington as a defendant, and another named Jack Newsome and W. B. Gilbert as defendants, in which he seeks to recover \$3,000—part of which was in checks which his petition alleges were not honored and part in a mortgage on an automobile. In a cross action, McCater, as plaintiff, named the Lovington Auto Co., filed an answer in which he alleges \$300 in cash and a large amount of checks he issued were in payment of debts incurred in gambling in Ruidoso the night of June 25 this year. He names Gilbert and Newsome as third parties in his answer.

Ruidoso Favors Six Amendments, Hospital Levy

Ruidoso voters, about 100, voted in favor of every one of the proposed six amendments to the state constitution in the special election Tuesday, Joe F. Drayden, election judge, reported. All passed by a heavy vote here, each one about 75 to 25, except the levy on utilities, and No. 6 concerning regulation of utilities, and it passed by a bare 50 to 42.

The local tax levy called by Lincoln County for hospital aid, passed in Ruidoso 70 to 10.

Green Tree voted down Amendment Six but favored all others in state balloting, the proposed absentee voting amendment was defeated and results on Amendment Six were in doubt. Totals were so close. The other four amendments carried in the state.



Dear Vic:

We will know before another year rolls around who will get the Ft. Stanton pasture land, the equity of Lincoln County hope that the men on whose shoulders the responsibility rests will use every angle to determine who shall have the land. This is a far bigger project than most people realize. The outcome of this decision could affect the economy of not only Lincoln County but the adjoining counties, providing the land is in the hands of responsible, progressive and future minded people. To let some small company or an individual acquire the land would be bad judgment in the eyes of most. As we know by experience that the small ranchers live from year to year and a lot of the time are spending the bank's money in our pockets, until another fall sale comes around.

The Mesquero Indians are one party who are bidding on the land. The whole Ft. Stanton reservation once belonged to the forefathers of the present Apaches. They have a first hand claim to the land. Here is a people who are experienced in range management and the cattle industry; who have the backing of Uncle Sam and the Federal Government. Under the supervision of the Apaches, the Ft. Stanton reservation would provide additional jobs in a part of the country where employment is at a standstill. A new industry would be born that would continue to operate. They have the cattle to properly stock the pasture, more tanks and possibly more wells would be drilled. The Apaches have a range management program that is being copied everywhere. One look at their Mesquero reservation proves this. We feel that a big corporation like the Apaches will do more toward developing a new industry in Lincoln County than a smaller operator who in a period of years would possibly try to publicize or sell out to someone else.

An experiment farm deal has been mentioned. We feel anything in the experiment field is also not considered sound judgment.
