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Objections Raised In School Ground Beautification Project

The proposed beautification of Ruidoso's school grounds, connecting the high school and present club, school, outlined before Ruidoso Lions Club in its Tuesday night session at Carrizo Lodge, drew some objections from several members of that organization.

Protests were made against removal of several trees that are now growing beside the high school building, and the destruction of the paved strip, which recently was closed as a roadway for auto vehicles, east of the high school. Those voicing objection said they hoped that the landscape plan, drawn by a New Mexico A. & M. college faculty man, could be altered to save those two things.

The landscaping plan, for which the school board paid \$160, has been approved.

Mrs. Jack Hull appeared before the club, listing his aid in the long-range beautification project. She had copies of the landscape artist's sketch of the grounds for the Lions to view.

She said there might be some minor changes made to the project, but at present the plan stands as approved by the school board. She mentioned the plans had been on view for some time here in the postoffice for school patrons to see and to express their opinions.

President W. A. Hart appointed a committee of four, with Carl Halladay as chairman, and Rev. H. L. Atkins, A. B. Harris and Carmon Phillips, members, to meet with the school board committee, composed of Mrs. Georgia Griffith and Mrs. Hull, to plan for the improvement. Also on Tuesday this week, the Rotary Club named a three-man committee, composed of Raymond Buckner, Roy Baker and Bernard Rooney, to perform the same service for that organization.

Vic Lamb, Ruidoso editor, also spoke briefly on the beautification project.

Lion Joe Coe reported on a zone meeting in Tularosa he attended with President Hart last week-end, and the program concluded with the showing of a motion picture presented by Paul Vance.

The County Agent

Reports (By RALPH DUNLAP)
Sheep Grazed Present in County
I have noticed a few herds that have heavy infestations of sheep grubs in Lincoln County. The grub causes a discharge of blood with blood from the nose. These grubs are the larvae of the bot fly and are most satisfactorily controlled after the first heavy frost in the fall. The method of control is by thoroughly irrigating the nasal passages with a 3% Lyol solution until the sheep sneezes out the grubs. The sheep is then quickly put back on its feet to prevent strangling.

If you are interested, I will be glad to give you more information on the control of the head grub.

Grashoppers cover a larger area of Lincoln County than I had originally anticipated. Through reports from ranchers and a survey by the state grashopper control personnel, hopper infestations are being reported from Carrizozo on the Nogal Mesa area, Fort Stanton area, north of the Capitan Mountains, and in the Tinnie-Arabela area.

The extent of the infestation in the Capitan Mountain area and around Tinnie is unclassified, but covers considerable area. From the Tinnie area, the hopper infestation probably connects with the infestation found around 13-mile draw in Chaves County. Estimates of 100,000 acres were given for the Capitan and East Carrizozo areas last year.

It would be to the ranchers' advantage to now note the hoppers in his area and be ready to participate in a control program next year if the need arises.

Janet Salyers Is Aspencade Queen; 650 People Eat Chuckwagon Dinner To Highlight Annual Observance

Miss Janet Salyers, petite Sophomore class candidate, reigned as queen of the 1955 Aspencade this year when her classmates did a job of selling that put her class out in front of four others in the number of advance tickets sold for the chuckwagon dinner and highlight of the annual observance here.

Her class sold \$101.75 in tickets. Second place went to the Seniors, who had Marvella Struve as their candidate, and who sold \$70.50 in advance tickets. Third place was the Eighth Grade with Dana Carter as its candidate, selling \$46. Fourth place was a close decision, with the Juniors selling \$27.50 for their candidate Arbra Goodson, and the Freshmen selling \$27 for their candidate, Gail Sherry.

In the parade to start the Aspencade four Sunday morning, Ruidoso's uniformed school band, directed by LeRoy Gooch, led off the long line of marchers, followed by the Aspencade Queen, escorted in a Pontiac convertible driven by Mrs. Ogden Carroll, who second carried the other queen candidates.

Riding groups here, in their order in the parade, included the Hockley County Sheriff's posse, with 20 riders; Cochran County Sheriff's posse, with 20; the Roswell Mounted Patrol, with 16, and the Slaton Rangers, with 7. There were 128 mounted riders in the parade, as compared with 112 last year.

As the horseback riders, and auto caravans converged on Eagle Creek, about three miles from Alto for the chuckwagon dinner, the Rev. Walter L. Brian, Ruidoso Baptist minister, spoke in interdenominational worship services.

W. A. Harris' food committee served 650 meals in 35 minutes without a hitch. The following are the Hockley County Sheriff's posse Captain Kenneth Harper, was presented a revolving trophy, to keep since his group had won it three years straight, for having the best riding group in the parade. The posse also carried a small miniature of the larger, revolving cup.

Second place went to Cochran County Sheriff's posse, of which J. T. Holliman was captain; and third place went to Roscoe County Sheriff's posse, captained by T. H. Carmichael. Slaton's Rangers placed fourth, and Charles M. Yates represented the group as its wagon boss when recognized at the dinner.

The winning posse came from Loveland, Tex., a three-man posse, which was awarded a trophy. Cochran County's group came from Morten, the Roswell patrol from Portales, and Slaton's gang from Slaton, Tex.

Judges of the riding groups' contest were by Carl Brown and Charles H. Brown, both of El Paso, and Will Ed Harris, Carrizozo.

The motorcade during the Aspencade rode to the top of Mon Jean to view the autumn scenes in the Lincoln County Forest. Horseback riders went a different route, through the rolling woods.

Mrs. Madeline Ruchels, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, said the Aspencade dinner grossed \$610.15 for the organization which sponsored it, and that the C. of C. likely would net about \$400 profit.

This year's crowd was by far the largest ever attending. The weather was perfect, and the autumn foliage was just beginning to reflect the colors of the season.

President Bernard Rooney said this week he wanted to express appreciation on behalf of the C. of C. to the more than sixty persons who assisted in planning the affair. "I particularly want to thank Ruidoso Downs for their loan of the different riding groups. Defeat NMMI 'B' 40-0 To Amalgamate 175-0 Record

The unbeaten Ruidoso Warriors chalked up another game in the win column last Friday in Roswell in defeating the NMMI Ponies 40-0. The Warriors are now the only team in the State unbeaten, untied and unscored-upon. They have rolled up 175 points in five games.
