HUNTERS HEAD FOR THE HILLS

All over Lincoln County this week, hunters were getting their gear in shape for the big game season which opens today for deer, turkey and bear (to be hunted without dogs concurrently with deer and turkey). Deer and turkey season ends Nov. 20.

Prospects are for another big season this year, although not as extensive as last fall when a new record kill was reported with both sexes being hunted.

Out-of-county and out-of-state hunters were beginning to pour into the canyon this week with many of the accommodations in Ruidoso filling up.

Deer hunting should be mighty good in New Mexico this year, with an estimated total of 210,000 deer, the State Game Department estimates. To hold the herds at a stable population would require a harvest of 62,500 deer, since the normal expected increase would be 25 per cent of the total.

It is foreseeable that if the number of hunters does not increase, there will be areas for the taking of two deer in the not distant future, the department says. This is not the ideal answer, as other states experience confirms. Most hunters are not meat hunters; they are out for the sport. Therefore, good game management must depend on getting more hunters into the field, it declared.

CARLSBAD WOMAN DIES IN HIGHWAY CRASH

'Nothing Startling' In Downs Report. Official Declares

The final report of the "investigation" of Ruidoso Downs, race track at Ruidoso, was on the desk of Gov. John F. Simms Tuesday but was not available to the public.

Richard Everett, administrative assistant to Simms, said that copies of the report were being mailed out to members of the State Racing Commission and that it would not be made public until mid-week.

He said the commission was contacted by telephone and that they indicated that they felt the report should be held until Wednesday. In Roswell Commission Chairman B. M. Keohane said he had been told by C. R. Sebastian, state budget director who made the investigation, that he didn't "think there is anything startling in it."

Keohane at the same time announced that he has called a meeting in Albuquerque on Nov. 22 for discussion of the report. He said that the commission has been waiting on the report before allowing the present license holders at Ruidoso Downs to go ahead with improvements at the track.

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

OLD MAC SAYS


Since the 1955 hunting season is starting us in the face think that it won't only be well to heed the following: The Ten Commandments of the Trail—



5. Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
6. Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
7. Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
8. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
9. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your back stop is adequate.
10. Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

Game Wardens, County Agent Issue Hints On Safer Hunting

Game Wardens Give Advice "Leave your blood at the Red Cross banks, not splattered all over the hunting grounds," New Mexico conservation officers cautioned at the onset of the 1955 big game season.

They sounded their warnings as practically 75,000 hunters in the state were expected to stalk deer when the season opens today.

Conservation officers called for less hunting accidents by exerting more caution.

Check firearms before shooting them, they said. Leaving loaded guns around in cars or houses wasn't a particularly healthy pastime, they said.

If the hunters "left their liquor at home during the hunting season," they stood a lot better chance of getting back in one piece, the game officials added.

They pointed out that hunting accidents were not necessarily limited to novices. More experienced hunters get shot because of their own carelessness than amateurs, they stated.

In addition to listing safety measures, the officials said that acts of vandalism were committed by hunters during the buck season.

A sporting trip, to some hunters, was to take pot shots at windmills. It ain't legal, the officers warned.

Last year some 1,000 men were killed by their fellow hunters and since 1947 the nation's toll has averaged 900 deaths annually.

County Agent Gives Warnings "Most accidents caused by firearms occur during the fall and early winter hunting season," County Agent Ralph Dunlap reminded. You can help make this a safer hunting season, he says, by observing and influencing others to observe, these safe hunting points:

Never carry an assembled gun in your car!
Always keep the safety catch on when carrying a gun!
Carry gun with barrel pointed down toward ground, or up to sky!
Be sure you know what it is you're shooting at!

If you must cross a fence, break the break, or hand the gun carefully over to a companion, or lay it under the fence before climbing through!

Never pull a gun through a fence after you!
When through hunting be certain that the gun is unloaded. Take it apart and lock it away from children!

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

(Editor's Note: Various matters handled by the Village Board of Trustees in the last two months are included in this periodical report from the Village Mayor, following up his promise before election of giving a written account of procedures of the village's administration to the people via the press.)

(By Mayor Dan Swearingin) This report covers the period September 8, 1955, through the meeting of October 27, 1955. Inspection report on fire insurance rating was received from the Mountain States Inspection Bureau covering the inspection of Ruidoso in June of this year. Numerous recommendations are made in this report. Ruidoso was re-rated as an eighth class town. This rate classification is most gratifying inasmuch as the Village, insurance rate wise, had been in a very precarious position for several years.

the current fiscal year the Village has budgeted \$150,000 per month salary and \$25,000 per month allowance for a total of \$175,000 for a man and car. M. R. Mort stated a willingness to accept the job on a basis of the salary available with understanding that he would be a merchant policeman and attempt to create sufficient income in this manner to make a living wage. It is hoped that the businessmen of the community will support Mort in this undertaking because the Village does not have sufficient income to pay a night man's complete salary. The 30 watt Motorola two-way radio unit obtained for the police department last summer has been installed in Mort's car.



NEW SCOUT MAN—Thomas C. Cochran has been elected Scout Executive of the Conquistador Council, Boy Scouts of America, with headquarters in Roswell, to succeed Howard Brown who was recently transferred to Portland, Oregon. Cochran comes from Albuquerque where he has been assistant Scout Executive for the past five years.

Dec. 9, 1955, will mark the 10th anniversary of the incorporation of the Village of Ruidoso, for one has been given credit for the progress that the Village has made during this 10 year period. Much has been done but far more remains to be done. I trust that in the next ten year period at least as much more may be done as has been done in the last decade.

Lookout Subdivision was annexed to the Village of Ruidoso upon presentation of the proper petition and maps. A special meeting was held Oct. 26, 1955, to discuss changes in the ordinance license ordinance. This ordinance will be prepared and passed and go into effect Jan. 1, 1956. A special ordinance was necessary because the regular meetings are of such duration that it was impossible to put this involved item on the agenda.

The difficulty the Water Department is encountering with its multitudinous ramifications was again discussed. Some of the possible remedies, all unpleasant, are: (1) ready to serve charge. This charge would be a charge per front foot levied against the lots in the Village facing streets where water mains are installed but where no water is consumed—in short the department is ready to serve. (2) No turn off. \$3.00 per month, \$36.00 per year with a turn off for any reason. This problem must be answered prior to Jan. 1, 1956.

The operation of the Village for the quarter ending Sept. 30, 1955, brought very graphically to the fore the need for a regular meeting. The police department reports that this is the result of quiet law abiding citizens and violators. That is a very good report.



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

'This Island Earth' Shows At Pueblo



Mayor Appoints S-D Day Leader

Pledging the full support of the city government, Mayor Dan Swearingin has named a resident of Ruidoso to join in making a success of the nation's second annual "S-D Day"—Safe Driving Day—Thursday, December 1.

Mayor Swearingin announced his appointment of Editor Vic Lamb as S-D Day Director for Ruidoso.

The program has the endorsement of President Eisenhower, Governor John Simms, and every other Governor in the United States. It is sponsored by the President's Commission for Traffic Safety in cooperation with scores of national organizations.

The goal this year will be to cut down on traffic accidents, not only on S-D Day, itself, but for the 31-day period beginning November 21—"S-D minus 10"—and continuing through December 11—"S-D plus 10."

Last year, S-D Day did, in fact, produce a reduction in the Nation's death and injuries, and in the number of accidents. This year, the urgency is even greater, because the nationwide death toll has been climbing again. It is a chance to demonstrate that, if we can hold down accidents for one day, or three weeks, we can do so every day."

'Posted' Signs Above Bonito Lake May Be Misleading To Hunters
Due to the many inquiries of local people, specifically hunters and other folks reading out of the immediate area concerning the recent posting of the main Bonito Creek drainage, above Bonito Lake, Forest Service and Game Department officials made an on the spot investigation, had a local photographer take pictures of the situation and have the following to report as to the legal status of the posting:
Private land is not concerned here, regardless of the wording of the signs. The property in question is an unpatented mining claim. Most of the entire area from the mouth of Argentina Canyon on up the main canyon of the Bonito, west of this mining claim, is all National Forest land which is always open to public use.
It is unfortunate that this string of mining claims which extends from the mouth of Argentina Canyon on up to the old "Silver Spoon" claim straddles a network of recognized Forest Service trails. However, these trails are currently being maintained by the Forest Service and are open for all legitimate public use.
In light of the fact that the land which is posted is not private property and the fact that the
