'Everybody Give A Dollar' Motto Of Girl Scout Financial Drive To Get Underway Here In December

"If everybody will give a dollar, we'll reach our goal of \$1,035 for the 1955 Girl Scout Financial Drive in Ruidoso this year," Mrs. Maudea Jones, chairman of the drive, said this morning. Ruidoso has had girl scouting for four years, and has had the help of the Southeastern New Mexico Council all of this time, contributing only a small amount last year to the cost of the assistance. Mrs. Jones said, "It's time we repaid them for their work and efforts in our behalf."

In 1954 V. Lamb served as financial chairman, and raised approximately \$300, of which \$180 went to the Southeastern Council office, the first time any contribution had been sent to the area headquarters. Of the balance of \$120, \$60 was used for special camp training for a Senior Girl Scout, and the rest for equipment and supplies for two years of day camping held for Brownies and Girl Scouts in the Green Tree, Hollywood and Ruidoso, and they march up the road, occupants of homes as well as business people can pin their contributions on the line. The line will be a long rope, with plenty of clothespins available, on which donations can be pinned. This is an incentive parade, and one which very few people can overlook. We can raise a great portion of our goal if everyone will contribute a reasonable amount," Mrs. Jones declared.

The line, to be carried by Girl Scouts, will be accompanied by various troop leaders and committee members here as it advances up the road—and we'll be making plenty of noise so the people will know we're coming," she said.

"We believe that lots of our people who cannot afford to give to other finance drives here can help with this program in which about 200 of our youngsters are interested. We recommend that children start saving their dimes and quarters now so they can have a dollar ready to pin on the line," she said.

Airman Shot On Hunting Trip Near Capitan

A-26 Walter R. Vukson of the 812th Supply Squadron, Walker Air Force Base, was hospitalized in Roswell following a hunting accident Sunday morning in the Capitan Mountains. He was shot in the side by a high-powered rifle.

The accident happened on the north side of the Capitan in Lincoln County when the airman was according to witnesses, mistaken for a deer and shot by E. J. Argenbright.

The 27-year-old Argenbright, who lives in Roswell, told base officers he had mistaken Vukson for a deer and fired his 257 Roberts in his direction. The airman was accompanied on the hunting trip by A-26 Orville R. Robbins, also of the 812th Supply Squadron.

Robbins and Argenbright, together with the injured man, were rushed to WAFB Hospital by a Frank Cross. Surgery was performed there upon Vukson's arrival less than two hours after the shooting.

Late Sunday evening, hospital sources reported Vukson doing "as well as can be expected."

Capt. J. E. Timbel reported Sunday that the bullet had hit Vukson in the left elbow, then was deflected into the man's abdomen.

Red Canyon Soldier Held For Killing Elk Illegally

Illegal killing of two elk near Corona led to the arrest of a soldier on a charge of illegal transportation of horns and partial possession of three other men, two of them soldiers.

Henry Belk, a soldier stationed at Red Canyon range camp, arrested by Conservation Officer Jim Dayton on the illegal transportation charge, was held for hearing last week before Judge of the Peace Clarence Shaw at Carrizozo.

Also under investigation, Clayton and another Red Canyon soldier, a soldier from Fort Bliss, were charged with the violation, possession of illegal elk meat.

The elk reportedly were killed on or near the Willis Lovelace ranch, about 20 miles outside of Corona, in the Gallinas mountains. Ray Bell, chief of law enforcement for the State Game Department, and Asst. Atty. Gen. Walter Kegeles, who led the hunt in connection with the investigation.

Four men were fined Saturday in Justice of the Peace Court in Carrizozo in connection with the killing of two elk on a ranch near Corona. All pleaded guilty.

Cpl. Henry Belk of Carrizozo, stationed at the Red Canyon Range Camp, was fined \$200 each on two counts of killing a cow and bull elk.

Three men who helped him dress out the cow were charged with aiding and abetting the violation, possession of illegal elk meat.

Sgt. Frank Marr of Carrizozo, also stationed at the Red Canyon camp, and Raymond Phares of Carrizozo were fined \$150 each. Charles White of Vaughn was fined \$250.

Fifth Man Fined
A fifth man, indirectly connected with the case, was fined \$250 for illegal possession of deer meat found in the locker of his home. The defendant was J. P. Aguilar of Tecolote, which is about 32 miles north of Carrizozo. The deer had been shot by his juvenile son, officers said.

The cases were heard before Justice of the Peace Clarence Shaw at Carrizozo, Walter Kegeles, assistant attorney general, presided.

The cow elk was killed last Sunday and the bull elk was wounded by Belk, according to testimony in the court. Belk was hunting for the first time. He became separated from the group, which included Marr, Phares and White, spotted the elk in a pasture on the Willis Lovelace ranch, shot the cow, and wounded the bull.

The bull elk chased Belk up a tree, but after the hunter had taken rocks at the bull elk it walked away and lay down beside the dead cow.

After wounding the bull, Belk had exhausted his ammunition. He went to Aguilar's home at Tecolote and borrowed the latter's rifle to kill the bull. When Belk returned he could not find the wounded elk. Lovelace found the animal dead last Tuesday.

The meat from the cow elk was dumped in the Carrizozo Cemetery.

The elk on the Lovelace ranch are owned by the State Game Department.

There is no open season on elk in Lincoln County.

300 Attend Hondo School Dedication

An estimated 300 persons attended the dedication and opening of the new Hondo gymnasium-auditorium and grade school last Thursday night. Costing \$120,000, the fine new structure has six new classrooms and offices for school executives, as well as a handily equipped gymnasium and auditorium.

In the program, which opened at 7:00 p. m., Fermin S. Montes, school superintendent, served as master of ceremonies. The Hondo band, under direction of Jess Lara, presented The Star Spangled Banner to begin the program. Invocation and dedication were given by Barton Pavey, a grade school teacher.

Montes gave a history of education in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley (which is printed elsewhere in today's News as a separate article) and introduced various persons seated on the stage with him. Particular tribute was paid Montes by the many speakers, including his one-time grade school teacher and pioneer educator in the Hondo Valley, J. W. Wilbreth, who also became the district's first superintendent. Mrs. William C. Gierke, who also served as a superintendent for the Hondo District, and Mrs. Azella F. Install, now of Socorro, who remembered Montes as a high school student during her term.

Former board members and teachers were recognized and introduced by Montes, as well as the present faculty, whom Principal John Hamilton presented. Bus drivers, building custodians and the architect for the plant, Kern Smith of Roswell, and the contractor, Mr. Ernie White of El Paso, who also served as a superintendent for the Hondo District, and Mrs. Azella F. Install, now of Socorro, who remembered Montes as a high school student during her term.

Apple Growers Of State Report Successful Season

New Mexico apple growers have had a successful year, according to W. A. Wunsch, supervisor of the Fruit and Vegetable Standardization Service at New Mexico A&M College.

Apple harvest was completed in all areas of the state by October 24, with the exception of a few late varieties, Wunsch says.

Two packing sheds in San Juan County reported over 34,000 bushels of apples, mostly Red and Golden Delicious and Jonathans. San Juan County fruit growers also packed out approximately 5,000 boxes of Rome Beauty and Staymans.

Sheds at Valarde in Rio Arriba County packed out 10,000 boxes, mostly Red Delicious and Jonathans.

The White Mountain Fruit Growers' Association at Hondo packed approximately 10,000 boxes, predominantly Red Delicious and Jonathans.

Finally all the Jonathans and Delicious apples were shipped out before the 20th of September, and the market price was strong, Wunsch says. Prices held these levels until Washington State growers began shipping at \$3.50 per carton, F. O. B. when packing sheds in New Mexico were forced to sell at comparable prices.

In addition, many growers sold their apples in bulk to truckers at prices ranging from \$1 to \$2.50 per bushel, field run.

Ruidoso Pilot IS APPOINTED ON COMMISSION

Revival of the State Aeronautics Commission, defunct for the last several years, was announced by Gov. John F. Simms.

The governor said he took the action in an effort to assure New Mexico of its fair share of federal money to be made available for airport purposes, recalling that several cities and their airports have suffered in recent years because of a lack of money.

The law requires the appointment to the commission of the adjutant general, Maj. Gen. C. Sage. In addition Simms named Ralph Brown of Ruidoso and Jacob A. Barth of Santa Fe. Brown is a pilot, holds a mechanic's license, is a member of the "Flying Farmers" and an airport operator. Barth, who will be executive secretary, is the State Corporation Commission's aviation division director.

Simms appointed a seven-member advisory board headed by James R. Wycott of Hobbs as chairman. Wycott is a business man and was a World War II flier. Other members of the advisory group are Jennings Doak, Espanola, business man and flier; Clayburn Wayne, Hatch, a crop duster; Robert Stubbfield, Albuquerque, a charter pilot; J. L. Eddy, Albuquerque, CAA employee; Jim Bieckle, Gallup, an officer of the Civil Air Patrol; and Lee Hobdy, Santa Fe, an airline employee.

Deer Hunters' Camp On Mon Jean Described As Typical Lay-Out

(Editor's Note: The article below appeared in a recent issue of the Roswell Daily Record, and was written by Al Stubbs, a frequent visitor to Ruidoso. Named as among the party in the deer hunting group is Walt Wiggins, operator of Gateway Courts here.)

Wives, all husbands don't say they are going on a hunting trip and then spend most of their time in camp playing cards, sleeping, reading and otherwise wasting good hunting hours. Most hunters hunt from daylight until dusk. For example:
When Deo McClung of Roswell goes on a hunting trip, he practically takes a caravan with him, and after a day's hunting, he's comfortable, and no one members of his hunting party. Running water is about the only "convenience" lacking in the McClung hunting camp. McClung, his brother, Cal McClung of Oklahoma, C. H. Chapman and Walt Wiggins, both of Roswell, set up camp Thursday, the day before deer season

being excellent cooks, there's no heat from the other two members of the party on that score. Washing dishes is the only chore which seems like work in an established hunting camp, and this job is shared by all.
The McClung brothers nearly had a big buck Sunday. They were hunting high up in the Bonito country when they spotted a buck about 300 yards off on the side of a mountain in an open area. The McClungs seldom miss when they have a clear shot, and they didn't miss this time. The wounded buck took off straight up the mountain, and the McClungs followed the blood trail, but it stopped and the brothers were without the big buck. Deo said he would have got another shot into the animal but that his gun jammed when a shell broke off at the neck in the chamber.

This party, representative of many hunting parties in every mountainous region in the state, is going to the area just north of Bonito lake, and one member of the party connected with a nice buck about 9 a. m. That meant a deer liver supper Sunday evening. Members of the party hunt from early morning until dusk each day with "jooing off" during the daylight hours. The two McClungs

Early Day Lincoln County Schools Described In Address At Hondo By Superintendent Fermin Montes

(Editor's Note: Below is a copy of an address given by Hondo School Superintendent Fermin S. Montes at the dedication of the Hondo gymnasium and school last Thursday night. Historical facts in the speech came from his own thesis on history of education in Lincoln County, which he prepared to receive his M. A. Degree.)

(By FERMIN S. MONTES) Superintendent of Hondo School
 The year 1861 was supposedly the beginning of education in Territorial New Mexico. Prior to 1861 many attempts had been made to provide some type of education for the boys and girls. After 1861 people felt that real progress had been made and they tried to provide education for the masses. To those early educators, we owe a great deal for their efforts in providing some type of schooling for their boys and girls.

It may be of interest to the people of Lincoln County to know that it was 1909 when the first high school course was inaugurated in Lincoln County in the town of Carrizosa. One teacher was employed to do high school work. In 1912 the legislature gave the counties the right to establish high schools.

the year 1923-24. His request was granted; this began the high school instruction in Hondo. For the first time the students were graded and the average daily attendance for the year 1924-25 was 17. By 1925-26, the average daily attendance had reached 24, and the one year of high school became a two-year accredited high school until 1930-31 when the high school became a four-year accredited high school. All the grades—one through twelve—were taught in the ten rooms which constitute the present old Hondo Elementary School, and in which classes were taught for the last time on Friday, Nov. 11, 1935.

In 1925-26 Picacho offered one year of high school work; but the average daily attendance was only seven. The school was not accredited, and was therefore dropped at the end of that year. One person who is still living in the Picacho community was a teacher in the early part of the 19th century, and taught school in lower Ruidoso, San Patricio, and Sunset. He is W. E. Kimbrell. Prior to his teaching, all of the instruction, except for private tutoring was done in Spanish. Kimbrell, however, started instruction in English.

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Two rooms of the old Hondo Elementary School were built with money from the state. The students were moved into the present high school building. During that year the enrollment was 69.

In 1931 the State Board of Education divided Lincoln County into five school districts, and did away with the superintendent of schools in Lincoln County. At that time our district became what is now known as the Hondo Valley Public Schools under the direction of a five-man school board. Our present school district, No. 20, includes Picacho, Arabela, Bluewater, Tinnie, Hondo and San Patricio.

At present there are 20 teachers, one librarian and one clerical assistant in the Hondo Valley Public Schools. At present there are six buses in operation in our district. The buses are owned and operated by Mrs. A. M. Kimbrell, Manuel Montoya, Ben Sanchez, Pedro Salcido, Eloy Torrez, and Tom Babers. Our buildings are cared for by four custodians; namely, Mike Mares, Mauro Sanchez, Pablo Montoya, Dan Salas.

How To Prepare And Roast A Turkey

 Turkey talk this holiday season will center around the ease of pre-
 paring this magnificent bird. In even greater supply this year will
 be the beautiful meaty quality turkeys which are "tucked" to give
 a plump, butterball appearance which make this bird even easier to
 prepare.
 The tucked turkey has a slit low on the breast through which the
 legs are held when purchased. After purchasing, allow to thaw ac-
 cording to the directions on the clear wrapper, pull the legs out of
 the tucked band and stuff with 3/4 cup of stuffing per pound of ready-
 to-cook turkey. After stuffing, slip the legs back into the slit and the
 turkey is ready for the oven without the difficult and time-consuming
 trussing operation.
 Brush the turkey with melted butter and roast breast side up in a
 shallow, open pan. Do not cover or do not add water. A light cover of
 aluminum foil or cheese cloth will prevent the breast and thighs from
 browning too rapidly.
 Roast in a 325° F. oven, according to the following schedule pre-
 pared by home economist Martha Logan:

Ready-to-cook Weight	Approximate Roasting Time
8 to 10 pounds	5 to 5-1/2 hours
11 to 13 pounds	5-3/4 to 6-1/4 hours
14 to 16 pounds	6-1/2 to 7 hours
17 to 19 pounds	7-1/4 to 7-1/2 hours
20 to 24 pounds	7-3/4 to 8 hours
