The franchise granted the Community Television Service of Ruidoso a year ago has expired, Mayor Dan Swearingin said this week. A letter to the organizers of the company, which had planned to erect a tower here, and cables in all parts of the city to provide television reception where none could be received, was mailed out by Village Clerk Joe Dryden this week informing them that since their agreement to provide such service had expired, the franchise automatically expired. Refunds of cash, held in escrow at Ruidoso State Bank, was made during the summer months to those who had applied for the service here.

## DOWN TO COMPLY WITH COMMISSION'S ORDER ON STOCK SALE

Albuquerque (Sp.)—Speakers of Ruidoso Downs met Monday morning with the State Racing Commission and stated that the race park will follow a series of special commission recommendations. The meeting will allow the present manager of the track, Eugene Hensley, to continue operation of the park and to schedule racing next summer.

Hensley said recently he has asked for approval of 39 days of racing. The track will operate more than 100 days a year.

In order to continue operation of the track Hensley must sell all but 40 per cent of Downs stock. He now owns more than 60 per cent. No more than 20 shares of the stock will be sold to any one individual, and New Mexico residents will be allowed first chance to purchase the stock.

Other stipulations required by the racing board include an improvement and building program for the track. The present commission building program encompasses everything the commission asked for and much more.

The meeting with Hensley and his attorney Caswell Neal ended quickly after Neal informed the board that he would accept the recommendations and will comply in every regard.

Chairman of the racing commission, B. M. Keohane, Roswell, after hearing Neal's statement, said the commission appreciates your cooperation and will appreciate your efforts to improve the track.

Keohane then polled the commission members and all agreed that the track should be allowed to operate next summer.

Hensley mentioned in the announcement, thanked the members individually for their decision.

In other action Monday morning the commissioners reinstated Paul Hensley as public relations man at the Downs. His resignation had been suspended for premature release of race results, accepted Richard Azar as mutual auditor for the commission, directed racing secretary Ray Lewis to contact the state public relations man at the Downs. Hensley also instructed Lewis to apply for telephone credit cards and draw up a series of recommendations for La Mesa and Ruidoso race tracks.

The commission also touched on the licensing of mutual employees. One employee of the state fair mutual plant pending the question as to why a notary fee was charged when his license was submitted. The racing board stated that for the past three years such a fee has been in effect and that two employees of the commission are currently pending divorce proceedings, estimated at about \$20.

Attending the meeting with the track director and his attorney were Jim Derrick, Carlsbad, president of Ruidoso Downs; Jay Taylor, Artesia, member of the track's board of directors; Joe Riley and C. C. Cooke.

The commission approved lifting the ban on climate after Board Member Wootter said he talked with Clinite and that "his attitude is entirely changed."

Clinite's attorney, J. A. Vetter, Wootter's opinion and the board was unanimous in its decision to drop the ban barring the agent from the track.

It was pointed out, however, that the ban lifting allows him on race tracks only as a spectator.

"If he wants to go back to work, he'll have to be approved by the commission first," said Keohane.

Ray Lewis, racing secretary, earlier reported he intended to resign if the commission renewed the ban on climate. Monday, Lewis said he intended to stick around to see if the Downs officials "live up to their agreement."

## 39 RACING DAYS BOOKED FOR 1956

Thirty-nine racing days are booked for Ruidoso Downs in 1956, Gene Hensley, track operator, announced this week on his return from Albuquerque, N. M., where he attended the Monday meeting of the State Racing Commission.

The new dates allow the track to open a week earlier than usual and operate a week later—from Memorial Day, May 30, a Wednesday, through Saturday, September 2, a week after Labor Day.

In the 1956 racing calendar there will be two Wednesday race days, Memorial Day and July 4. In the week on which July 4 falls, there will be four days of racing, Sunday, Wednesday and Friday, Saturday.

The complete racing schedule is listed below:

May 30, June 3-3; 9-10; 16-17; 23-24; 30. July 4; 6-7-8; 14-15; 20-21-22; 27-28-29. August 4-5; 10-11-12; 17-18-19; 24-25-26. Sept. 1-2-3; 8-9.

Hensley said improvements for the 1956 season will include: entirely new grandstand plant, built in new location; removal of wooden posts in the area beneath the grandstands and new steel trusses installed to give more walk-way room; 20 new feed rooms in the barn area; 100 new stalls; new showers for the horses; new additional parking areas; new jockey quarters and new furnishings and redecorating and remodeling in the swank Jockey Club.

Hensley said this year's improvements and new equipment is being completed in time for the long-range program, which in time will include a new general clubhouse, an all-steel grandstand.

## HE'S A NEW MEXICAN

Gene Hensley said he objected to the Ruidoso News story last week which held him as a resident of Phoenix. "I am a registered voter of New Mexico, having registered in Lincoln County, and after three years living here almost all of each year, you can certainly call me a New Mexican," Hensley said. Reference to Hensley's Phoenix address was in last week's report of names of stockholders in the Downs. "With my holdings in the Downs, more than half of the stock owned, are in New Mexico," he declared.

"Our goal is to make the Ruidoso Downs the finest race track in the entire southwest. Some of our improvements are already the finest in the Southwest, including the new pari-mutuel plant and the Jockey Club," Hensley said.

Hensley said he was in full accord with the requirements laid down by the Racing Commission and that he has promised full cooperation to the board to bring to New Mexico the finest racing program available.

## TO PUT NEW SCHOOL INTO USE JANUARY 4

Upon recommendation of the architect, L. J. Wolgamood of Santa Fe, and a representative of the Housing and Homes Financing Agency, George Cowdery of Albuquerque, Ruidoso School Board members Monday accepted the new \$186,000 elementary school building, just completed atop Nob Hill by E. E. Anderson, contractor, of Roswell, N. M. Some minor repairs and changes were recommended before final acceptance, and the recommendations are to be made by the contractor, said Superintendent J. H. Morris in announcing the event.

The new school will be put in use Jan. 4, the day classes resume following the Christmas holidays which start Dec. 21, Morris said. Pupils in the first four grades in the new building will be taught in the new building.

Brand spanking new, the structure is probably the most modern school building in the state. It has ten classrooms, and a large all-purpose room which will be used primarily for cafeteria, and which almost double the size of the cafeteria in the present elementary school. Upon moving into the new building, school will not be held at the Stetson building in the Ruidoso valley, which was pressed into use as a second grade school last year.

Besides the classrooms and cafeteria, there are an office for the principal, a reception room preceding the executive's office, a child guidance room, to be used as a first aid station and for handling the work of the county health nurse on her regular visits here, storage rooms, rest rooms for boys and for girls, a rest room for the women faculty members. 


