### State Policeman Gives Talk, Film On Safety

Ruidoso Business and Professional Women's Club, meeting at Edith Johnson's Cafeteria on Monday evening, Nov. 19, at 7:30, was well attended by members and guests.

Mrs. C. V. Cunningham was in charge of the program on Safety. She introduced R. W. Driggers, State Policeman of Green Tree, who presented a film, "The Midnight Killer."

He also emphasized that six drunk drivers were involved in fatal accidents in October. New Mexico State Police arrested 80 drunk drivers this month. There were nine persons killed on a Friday during the month and ten persons killed were from age 21 to 30. He said 34 states had an increase in fatal accidents in 1955. Idaho had a 41 per cent increase. New Mexico had a 11 per cent increase.

The travel on U. S. 70 north of Alamogordo is 5,464 cars in 24 hours an increase of 44 per cent over the same day in 1955, he said a test showed. Of the 32 persons killed on New Mexico highways in October 25 were males and eight were females.

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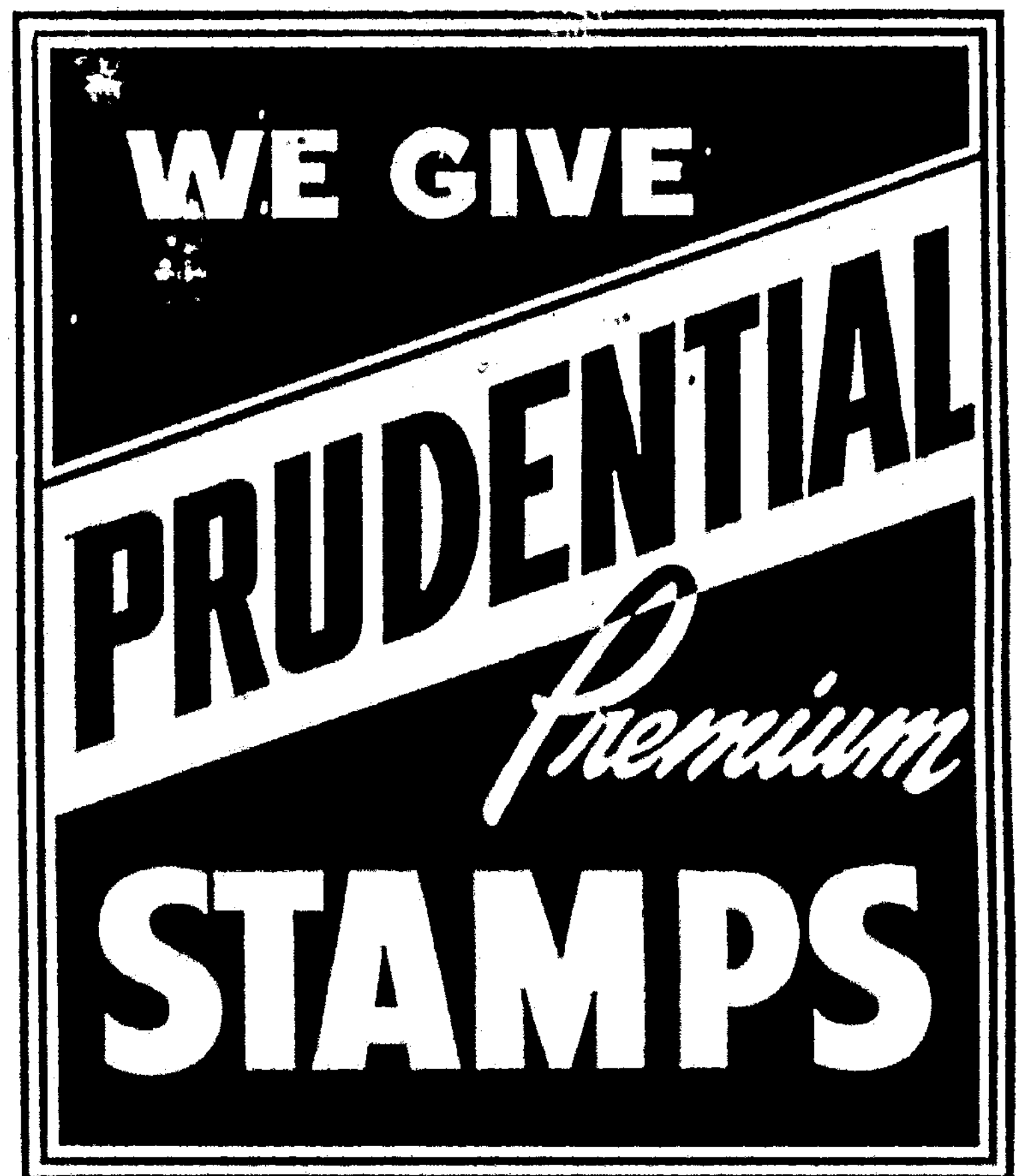

## Tales From The Woods WITH THE RED SHIRTS

An estimated 5,000 hunters got a 45 per cent kill in the regular big game hunting season ending Nov. 18. Game Conservationist Marion Embrey of Capitan reported here last week-end. He said the deer kill probably reached a total of 2,000, with at least six bear killed. He added that violations this year of game regulations were not any more than average.

Bobby Watkins, a senior in Ruidoso High School and an end on the Warrior football team, used his grid training to good advantage in his deer hunt. He had failed to get his buck in several shots during the season and as it drew to an end, he had to look for either a doe or a buck in the either-sex period. He shot six times at a doe, and finding he had no more ammunition, took out after her when he noted he had broken one of her legs. He hemmed her up in a fence

corner and finished her with his hunting knife. Veterans hunters say that is a very risky business, and several reported to see of serious injuries they had heard hunters had received in approaching too closely to an injured deer.

On the second day of the season, D. R. Salas killed a 10-point buck on the north side of town, we just learned last week-end. A general meeting of the Mescalero Tribe was held on Saturday, Nov. 24, at the community hall.

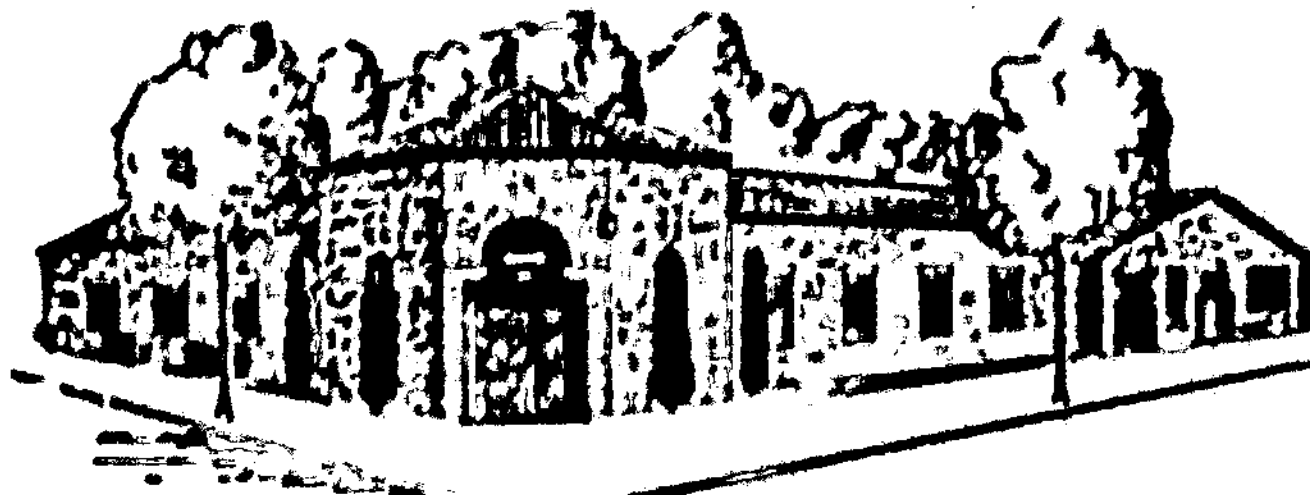
