



Ruidoso Newsman Makes Report On Raton Track Improvements

(Editor's Note: For the information of various turf fans who receive the Ruidoso News, this article concerning improvements at La Mesa race track at Raton is printed—Raton is the only other horse race track in New Mexico besides Ruidoso and the New Mexico State Fair. The story was written by Jim Lamb, associate of the Ruidoso News, now writing sports for the Albuquerque Journal.)

With an eye toward the future Raton's La Mesa racing park has started an improvement plan that many of the bigger tracks throughout the country could well envy.

Already underway is the addition of a new clubhouse for the followers of the sport of kings and the most attractive item about the addition is that it's not an "exclusive" hangout for the well-heeled.

Consisting of a dining area, mutual plant and box seats the clubhouse is to be joined to the general admission grandstand and is situated on the "clubhouse" turn.

Some 416 box seats are provided and 84 more fans can be accommodated on the dining terrace, just back of the box seats. A full meal can be ordered from the dining terrace and holders of box seats can order sandwiches and drinks and have a table before them to hold field glasses, racing forms and programs.

The price—for only \$2.50 more than general admission tickets for each of the 44 days would cost, a person can either have a box seat or a seat on the dining terrace. But a season ticket isn't necessary to enjoy the clubhouse. Seats will be available daily (if the demand for season tickets doesn't overtake the supply) but they'll run slightly higher than if purchased on a season ticket plan.

From the terrace and clubhouse seats every foot of the six furlongs track is visible.

The management is sinking some \$15,000 into the new clubhouse program, which also includes work in the horsemen's area. After a fire raced through the stable area in the summer of 1948 the track has been working on fireproof barns. At present there are 12 barns housing some 670 stalls—all fireproof. Two new barns will be built.

In a telephone conversation with Wood Erwin, track official, it was learned that the new clubhouse will probably be ready to open next May 29, opening date for the 44-day season.

Season tickets are also to be made available for the grandstands.

Officials of the track are going a long way to make the track more appreciated around Raton. Beneath the clubhouse is a special "committee" room that will eventually be used as a gathering place for the folks of Raton. During race days the big room (nearly the size of the 80x90-ft. clubhouse addition) will be used as a corral for children through the winter and on off-days the building will be thrown open for civic use and Erwin says that eventually some sporting equipment and maybe a tennis court or handball court will be added.

The \$15,000 is a pretty good size investment for the track stockholders, but if the track is going to continue to grow like it has in the past few years the money will probably be returned in short order to the stockholders—most of them residents of Raton and vicinity.

The 44 days of racing represents the longest season in the state.

Frosh Quintet Wins Third Place In Carrizozo

Ed Steiner scored 23 points Saturday night to lead Alamogordo to a 56-39 victory over Carrizozo in the final game of the second annual freshman invitational tournament at Carrizozo. It was the second time Alamogordo has won the championship.

Ruidoso defeated St. Peter's of Roswell, 45-24, in the third place final.

Alamogordo earlier defeated St. Peter's, 57-31, in the semi-finals, and Carrizozo beat Ruidoso, 38-25.

Brown Is Pilot Of Game Department Surveys, Trappings

A trapping and transplanting project is underway in the Department of Game and Fish, with antelope elk and turkeys as the subjects. Assisting in the work is Ralph Brown, Ruidoso pilot and operator of Ruidoso airport, who last week and this was making flying trips to aid in surveying for a census of elk, and also in running antelope into traps by herding them from the air. He said about 100 antelope had been found around Orogrande and about 200 in the area around Roswell.

Over \$15,000 is allocated as this year's budget for the three-year project. To assure value received for this outlay, the Department is selecting the trappable areas with extreme care. Not only suitability of the area is considered, but also the land-owner's attitude toward receiving the transplanted animals, and his attitude toward permitting public hunting on his land when the time comes.

Mescalero Apaches Join in Land Suits
Fifteen Indian tribes in New Mexico are seeking millions of dollars in claims for land taken from them by the white man as the frontier rolled from the East.
All have submitted claims for the land they lost.
The tribes are the Navajos, the Mescalero and Jicarilla Apaches, and the pueblos of Laguna, Acoma, Ileta, Jemez, Zia, Santa Ana, Cochito, Santo Domingo, Santa Clara, Nambe, Zuni and Taos.
They hope for the same success as the Utes of Colorado, Utah and New Mexico who received 2 million dollars from the federal government in 1950 for land seized by the pioneers.
In one joint complaint, Jemez, Zia and Santa Ana pueblos claim about 400,000 acres of land in Ojo del Espiritu Santo Land Grant in Sandoval County. They argue the King of Spain granted the land to them in 1590.
The claims were filed in compliance with a 1946 congressional act granting the nation's Indians five years in which to start legal action in such demands.
Indians of the United States have already won 25 such cases.
