Martin Luther Film To Be Shown Sunday

(By Church Reporter)

At 7 p. m. Sunday, March 11, the Community Methodist Church will feature the full-length religious motion picture "Martin Luther" during the evening worship service. This is the second such picture to be presented here in less than a month. Approximately 95 people attended the service Feb. 26, when the "John Wesley" motion picture was shown. The 11th will be the regular Family Night for the Methodist Church, with a covered dish supper at 5:30 p. m. Visitors will be most welcome to attend the supper as well as the 7:00 service.

Few men can claim to have had greater influence on the development of the Christian Church than Luther, a one time Augustinian monk and professor in a Catholic university. Luther is virtually the "father" of Protestantism in the sense that his teachings resulted in the rise and development of new Christian Churches which had no connection with the powerful Roman Catholic Church. Luther's preaching that man's salvation comes by faith in Jesus Christ—not by our good works or the prayers, gifts, or good works of others on our behalf after we are dead—is the keystone of Protestantism. Actually, Protestants insist that Luther's proclamation of the "five shall live by faith," far from being a minor disagreement with the Catholic doctrine, was a real return to the authority of the Bible and to the doctrine of the primitive, Apostolic Church. It is of particular significance that this reformer, who laid such emphasis on the authority of Scripture as superior to any decree of Church council or Pope, made a translation of the Bible from Greek, Hebrew, and Latin manuscripts into the German language. Luther's translation influenced the language of the German people in much the same way that English speech has been influenced by the King James Version, and holds a position of respect and attachment similar to that rendered to the King James Version by English speaking Christians.





was puzzled by this, and made it
a point to observe the daily actions

wise enough to see that he was on
the brink of great discoveries that

mind became more alert. Some of
the wise men, seeing in Romano a
serious student of the unseen, ar-
ranged it so that he had time for
thinking and mental unfoldment.



Alamogordo Names Committeemen To Work On Developing Bonito Watershed As Recreational Area

Possibilities that Bonito Lake and the surrounding acreage which Alamogordo is in process of purchasing from Southern Pacific Railroad might become a recreation area moved a step forward last Thursday. The city commission met with representatives of the State Fish and Game Commission and Lincoln National Forest to find out how far these agencies would go in aiding this project. Huidoso was also represented at the meeting.

Homer Pickens, director of the fish and game department for New Mexico, assured the commission he was vitally interested in stocking the lake with fish, and that his department would even clean out the "rough" fish to make it much better as a fishing spot when it was quiet to point out that funds of his department were allocated at the moment to areas where development already is underway. The commission discussed with suggestions from Pickens and Dean Cutler, superintendent of

Lincoln National Forest, the possibilities of fencing the lake area of charging fees for picnicking and fishing, and how best to obtain federal funds for the development of the area.

Result of the meeting was the appointment of a committee to make inspection of the area and return to the city commission with recommendations. Mayor John Rolland, in explaining that the city would receive final ownership papers when the pipeline to the lake is completed and that the completion of that pipeline would be at least a year away, assured Pickens that the city would welcome aid from his department in enforcing the game and fish laws. Mayor Rolland appointed a committee composed of Rolla Buck, city manager; Cutler, W. F. Turner, Santa Fe consulting engineer working on the Bonito project for the city; Frank Boyce, city attorney, and one representative each from the Fish and Game department and the local wildlife preservation organization.
