THE SILVER LINING

Signs of a late Spring
There are a few little advance guards in the leaf and blossom world that you can watch to see whether Spring is going to be late or early. The Weeping Willow is the first leaf to come out. We can see its delicate green drapery already standing out almost like a dream up and down the valleys while all the other leaf trees are deep in Winter sleep.

Every year the brave Apricot blooms way ahead of all the rest of the fruit trees. It ventures out first as if to test the weather for the others that follow: the plum, peach, pear and apple. Sometimes the white blossoms of the apricot are blooming while the snowflakes fall, and the clusters of blossoms become tufted with snow, making a Spring-in-Winter scene.

Down at San Patricio there is an apricot tree that is exceptional, early to bloom, even for an apricot. Every year for quite a while I have been watching this tree. It is the first tree to blossom in the valley, that I know of, and is a kind of pace setter for the whole parade of spring blossoms. During the last few dry and warm winters this tree has blossomed out as early as the middle of February. The last time I saw this tree this year it had not come out yet. It ought to be just about ready to get blossoming now.

The track storm and the cold weather that followed made a big difference. The apricot in my yard started to come out just before the last cold snap, but when the north wind started blowing, they put their guard back up, tightened their petals back and got under cover.

It seems to me that the blossoms of all the fruit are from a tree that blossoms late, but when they have been the last few years. This is a wonderful advantage. So even if this late cold weather is a little uncomfortable, it may mean a record fruit crop. Let us keep our fingers crossed.

The Apricot Tree
I have been noticing the apricot trees quite a bit the last few years. Although they hardly ever bear a crop of fruit up here in the mountains on account of their nature to bloom early, they are very hardy, vigorous, and long lived trees. In many old abandoned orchards where all the other fruit trees have died for lack of water and care, you can still see the apricot tree growing right along full of life. Sometimes you can see them growing on a rocky hillside. Several times when I have cut down a cedar back there has been a tiny apricot tree growing in amongst the low-spreading branches. I don't know why it is there unless it is seeking protection from browsing animals, and is willing to wait there until maybe the cedar grows up and finally falls away, or to cut down. There are two apricot trees on our place that I have discovered this way, and they are growing strong. And there are several other scattered about here and there, growing and thriving by themselves.

In other words, the apricot is kind of half wild or native to this region. Now, sooner or later, if it

Quiet, Restful Vacation Enjoyed By Mr. And Mrs. Warren Barrett Deep In Interior Of Old Mexico

(Editor's Note: Their first written account in the Ruidoso News several months ago of a trip to Mexico brought so many appreciative comments that when the Warren Barretts headed for another junket through that land recently, we asked them to again report on their experiences. Their letter below tells of many interesting experiences in the land below the border.)

Balneario, Comanjillo (Near Leon) Mexico March 3, 1956

Dear Mr. Editor,

Warren tells me that you would like some letters from Mexico and that he can't write them because he didn't bring his typewriter—too bad he doesn't understand long-hand! You may use excerpts from this if there is anything you consider worth printing. If you just throw it in the waste-paper basket, we would like, in some manner, to share our trip with our friends.

Our first interesting stop, in new territory, was at Guajuatilo. This is one of the oldest towns in the area—some old mining towns nearby are now in ruins. This was a prosperous mining country centuries ago, but as the amount of ore decreased the towns were deserted.

A sculptor from Phoenix has purchased the ruins of an old hacienda de beneficio, the name given to the establishments where the patio process of refining was conducted, and is rebuilding it into an extraordinarily different type of home with a thousand feet of floor space. All floors are of tile, on which he has used an abrasive to "age" it, then polished it with wax. He has a fireplace in each room, made with a straight brick chimney and a little stove of tile built up around a room.

Guajuatilo, itself, is a quaint old city with steep, narrow streets (reminiscent of Taxco), some of them built on stairways on the side of steep cliffs. Pasada de la Fresa, the inn where we stayed, is a large, old, typically Mexican parador, built of adobe around a patio, and opening directly onto the street through a big heavy door, which has always made them seem prison-like to me. However, we found this Inn (with its typocratic decorations, hand-crafted flowers growing in the patio, with flowers growing in the patio, its interesting guests and our charming host and hostess, Manuel and Felicitas; a delightful change from the ordinary tourist court or hotel.

We have very much enjoyed the variation in type of accommoda-

tions which Warren so carefully chose before we left home. They have all been clean and comfortable, and we have found good, wholesome food everywhere.

The second place that we especially enjoyed was Hotel Penafiel, perhaps the most popular of all the many spas in Mexico. This is the most fabulous place we have ever seen. The grounds are extensive and beautiful. Besides the 200 room hotel, there is a large bath house (complete with steam baths, showers, and massage rooms), a barber shop, and beauty parlor which are closed at present. They have their own bottling plant where they bottle their own mineral water (which is supposed to be of great curative value) and also ginger ale and various other soft drinks. There is a golf course, tennis courts, bowling alley, swimming pool where people soak their troubles away in mineral water, and a wading pool with slides, swings, seesaws, etc., for the children.

The Hotel itself is delightful—spacious and comfortable. The lobby is beautiful with much tile trim and wrought-iron light fixtures. Off either side of the lobby is a writing room with floor and walls entirely of tile. The dining room, which will seat perhaps 200 people, has something like 30 chandeliers made of solid brass and about 25 large windows all trimmed with stained glass. There are stained glass windows in other parts of the building, also. The food was delicious. The amazing part of it is that we found this delightful restaurant practically deserted except for week-ends, while Mexico City with its crowdedness, its smoke, hustle and bustle is so crowded that after spending a half day looking (in vain) for a comfortable place to stay, we moved on to a better atmosphere.

From Penafiel we went to Fortin de Flores where we found probably the most charming place we have been on our travels to Mexico, at "Pasada Loma," a beautiful, clean, and comfortable court. The setting for this delightful place is exquisite. Ernesto and Blanca Alvarez, a most interesting and affable couple, own this nice orchard. They grow papayas, zucchini (a black plum), bananas, oranges, grapefruit, lemons and pineapples—and the most gorgeous flowers we have ever seen—orchids, gardenias, cape jasmine, hibiscus—and many others whose names I do not know. Nestling in among all this profusion of color and waxy green leaves is the Alvarez home where they serve the most marvelous food to their guests and where they display and

sell the wood blossoms of which they are the sole originators and growers. Here and there you will find (sometimes almost hidden from view) a cottage where they house their guests. When we arrived, Mr. Alvarez met us in the drive-way and escorted us to our cottage where we found a bowl of garbanzo (more than a dozen) and pitcher of ice water awaiting us. The place is so beautiful, pleasant, restful and fragrant, that we were loathe to leave, but since we had decided to spend most of our vacation at sea level we decided we'd better go on so we drove on to

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of New Mexico provide that the village councils shall appoint judges and clerks of municipal elections and direct and designate the places for holding such elections.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, that the following voting place be designated; the following persons be, and they be appointed, by the village board as judges and clerks of election, to conduct said election in all respects as required by law.

Vera Cruz next day. We spent one night at the Mocambo, a very beautiful hotel facing the Gulf, then spent a half day looking (in vain) for an apartment. We finally returned to Pensionses, a court on the beach where we had looked the day before. In the office, after much "parlotear y gesticulacion" (chatter and gesticulation) we finally made them understand which room we wanted, and that we'd like permission to use our charcoal grill on the beach when we felt like it, and our hot plate in our room occasionally. They were most accommodating so we soon were settled in our "home for a week," a few steps from the beach. We found Vera Cruz a nice little city of more than 100,000 clean and friendly. It really was fun broiling our fish and baking potatoes down on the beach. We also enjoyed the view of the ocean once or twice daily. One of the highlights of our visit in Vera Cruz was a two hour boat trip up the river. We also had a thirty minute ride on a motor launch on the Gulf one morning.

Stationed there in Vera Cruz to Hacienda San Miguel de Reglan, another spa. Triple A describes this place as an "ideal family resort." When we finally arrived there about 7:00 p. m., after eight miles of the roughest road ever (almost impassable) and after passing through the most primitive village we have seen, imagine our surprise (when the heavy gate to the high wall, behind which this resort is situated, was opened by a boy who apparently had been stationed there to watch for us) as we walked in the gate and heard the manager's wife saying to a guest, "Well, he's a heck of a nice fellow, but—" The manager, a middle aged Mexican, explained to us in very good English that the place is a club belonging to a group of doctors from the U. S. and Mexico City, and that at present all the guests are American, perhaps 50 of them. Incidentally, they are glad to have tourists drop in because it helps to support the place. This was the most cordial group or doctor we have met. They all have dinner at 8:00 o'clock and are served at two long tables. Mrs. Palmer, whom we had met in the office an hour earlier, took us "under her wing" and introduced us to the other guests at dinner, whereupon they all insisted that we eat at the table with them (reserving the best place near the fireplace for us) instead of at a small table set for two, which we thought had been prepared for us. Most of these doctors and their wives (we learned that the wife of the club was first organized they have taken in other professional and some business-men) were extremely thoughtful for our comfort and happiness the entire time we were there.



Judge Scoggins Appoints Youth Panel Members

"It is Therefore Ordered, Adjudged and Decreed that Kenneth B. Leiby and W. Earle Cline, Las Cruces, New Mexico, be and he hereby is appointed Chairman of the District Youth Commission; Mrs. Gina Allen, Las Cruces, New Mexico, Executive Secretary; Mrs. Carmen Freudenthal, Las Cruces, New Mexico, member; W. Earle Cline, Alamogordo, New Mexico, member; Ruthena King, Tularosa, N. M., member; Mrs. Valentin Sanchez, Alamogordo, N. M., member; Edward Penfield, Lincoln, N. M., member; Truman Spencer, Jr., Carrizozo, N. M., member; and Mrs. E. S. Sauer, Ruidoso, N. M., member; until the further order of this Court.

"The Court further orders that Lloyd Hufstetler, Las Cruces, N. M., Mrs. Catalina Smith, Las Cruces, N. M., and Mrs. Howard Klein, Las Cruces, N. M., shall be consultants of the District Youth Commission; that Rev. W. Almon Babbitt, Alamogordo, N. M., Mrs. W. H. Carmichael, Alamogordo, N. M., and Mrs. Miguel Madrid, Alamogordo, N. M., shall be Chairman and Co-Chairmen respectively; that in East Lincoln County Paul Vance, Ruidoso, N. M., Mrs. Till Thompson, Ruidoso, N. M., and Fernin Montes, Hondo, N. M., shall be Chairman and Co-Chairmen respectively.

"It is Further Ordered That Dr. Sigurd Johnson, Sociologist, State College, N. M.; Dr. L. L. Camlin, Sociologist, State College, N. M.; Dr. Claude C. Dove, Psychologist, State College, N. M.; and Dr. Murrel Thompson, Psychologist, State College, N. M., be and they hereby are appointed consultants of the District and County Youth Commissions of the Third Judicial District."



Sixth Of A Series Of Seven Articles—

Development Of Eagle Creek As Water Supply For Three Lincoln County Communities Is Declared Feasible In Engineers' Study

(Editor's Note: The Ruidoso News this week is printing the sixth of seven articles to give the citizens a complete report from engineers who have studied the feasibility of developing Eagle Creek's water resources for use for the fast growing Ruidoso community, and for Capitan and Ft. Stanton, who have banded together in an Inter-Community Water Supply Association to purchase rights in the Southern Pacific Railway line held in that watershed over a quarter of a century. Ruidoso will be offered a bond issue to vote on this spring to finance piping the water in this city, and for other attendant costs, and the News is publishing the entire engineers' report in full in this series for public information.)

SECTION II—NECESSITY FOR ADDITIONAL WATER SUPPLY GENERAL: The entire supply for the Village is secured from the Rio Ruidoso at the present time. The amount of water flowing in this river has decreased materially since 1950 due to less than normal precipitation over the drainage area during recent years. The amount of water used by the Village has increased enormously due to increased population, more customers resulting from completion of the waterworks system, and a greater water storage capacity since a larger supply of good qual-

ity water is available from the new system. For instance in 1955 the Village added 144 new connections. As a result, the Village is now faced with an inadequate supply of water, unless an additional supply can be obtained from some

source other than the Rio Ruidoso. The future growth and advancement of the village depend upon the immediate development of a plentiful supply of good quality water. **POPULATION:** Since the Village of Ruidoso has been incorporated only 10 years, there is not sufficient information available to develop a long-range population trend, but it is common knowledge that the Village has enjoyed a steady and continuous growth over recent years and has now become a well-established community with a promising future. The population of Ruidoso varies greatly during the different seasons of the year, since it is a resort city. The winter population, consisting principally of permanent residents, is about 2,500; but during the summer months, the population exceeds 12,000 persons; and during week-ends of the racing season, the population reaches many more than 12,000. Of the summer population about 4,000 can be classified as "home owners" and their families, and the other thousands are tourists living in hotels and motels and as guests of resident owners. During recent years, the permanent population has been increasing at the rate of about 300 persons per year. Therefore, in developing an additional water supply, it behooves Ruidoso

to obtain all the water available at the earliest possible date to assure the future development of the community. **WATER USAGE:** There are two means which can be used to determine the probable future water consumption of the Village; one method is to multiply the estimated future population, determined in the preceding paragraph, by the normal water usage per capita and the second method is to estimate the number of connections in the future, based on past records, and multiply this by the amount of water known to be used per connection. By comparing the results from the two methods, a reasonably accurate estimate of future water usage can be made. At some time during the future, it is quite certain that a sewer system will be constructed in Ruidoso. After sewers are provided, the water usage will again show an increase. **2. Future Water Usage Based on Past Records:** A master meter has been in use at Ruidoso since June 1949. There are accurate records of the number of water services connections since the Village began operating the system in 1949. Also, since a large percentage of the connections have had individual water meters in recent years, there is a record of the amount of water used per connection.

Amount of Water Available from Rio Ruidoso: The Village has water rights on Rio Ruidoso which permit the withdrawal of 218.64 acre feet per year (an average of 195,000 gallons per day), with a maximum daily withdrawal of 300,000 gallons per minute (433,000 gallons per day) at times of excess flow, and the rate of diversion must never exceed 48 percent of the available flow of the river in the lower valley. Experiences have proved that during dry periods, the total
