Parents Allowing Juveniles To Violate Traffic Laws Stand Chance Of Losing Auto Liability Insurance

As a public service to parents of children driving vehicles on streets and highways of this state, Juvenile Probation Officer, T. J. Thompson this week issued a warning regarding certain violations, which, in some cases, can cost the parent the loss of public and property liability insurance on the family car. Thompson said that because of the continually rising number of accident cases in the Third Judicial District involving juveniles—officials of the district are issuing warnings concerning the several violations that can bring about cancellation into court. Juveniles, who have drivers' training in school, and are issued a driver's training permit, may be allowed to drive a car only when a parent accompanies them or a licensed operator is with them. To drive without either one is a violation. Thompson also stressed that parents should notify their insurance agent carrying their automobile insurance when their child begins a driver's training course. Juveniles, 18 years of age or under, must be cited into juvenile court if they are found violating safety laws by driving while intoxicated, or driving recklessly. Any violation of the training permit, also must be cited into court. Thompson said these warnings were issued in the public interest, and that he was sure, as are other state traffic officials, that most parents will obey the laws if they know them. The entire movement on the part of Third Judicial District officials, naturally, is to point up safety on our streets and highways—also to prevent, if possible, the citing of any youth into court. A change in the state income tax law by the 1955 legislature now makes it a felony to attempt to evade the tax. Persons failing to file are liable for interest and penalty charges ranging up to 100 percent in addition to all back taxes due, April 15 date, the deadline for filing New Mexico income tax returns.

Ruidoso Votes Bonds, 267 To 18

Ruidoso voters favored the issuance of \$350,000 in water bonds in city election here Tuesday, 267 to 18. An unopposed Citizens' ticket swept Dr. D. E. Snyder in as mayor with 305 votes; Jack Little, re-elected as trustee with 290; T. B. Hood, trustee, with 298 and Jack Hutchens, trustee, with 285. The only race in which there was a contest was for police judge, with the unofficial totals showing Herbert Smith, insurance man, had unseated incumbent C. D. (Uncle Charlie) Weems, 131 to 125, a six vote lead, Earl Strachan, third independent on the ticket, received 67 votes. The water bonds were voted to give the village money to develop a new water source from Eagle Creek to finance about eight miles of pipeline, a filter plant, an earthen reservoir to hold an estimated 30,000,000 gallons of water, and an extension of the present system within the village limits.

Apple Prospects Good Despite Late Cold Snap

Apple prospects are still good after the freezing weather Monday night. Other fruit did not do so well, as many peaches, apricots, plums and other early fruit were in full bloom. Temperatures dropped close to 20 degrees above in some parts of the county. The apple trees are starting to show green, with full bloom expected in the lower part of the Hondo Valley during the week of April 9-14. As miles are likely to be as troublesome as last year, the apple grower should get enough lead arsenate for the calyx spray. Lead arsenate is a very good colling moth control, especially for the calyx spray.

Of Grasshoppers**

Lincoln County ranchers indicated interest in grasshopper control by attending a meeting held in Capitan last week. After George Fulkerson had explained to the group the control program and the possible infested areas, a committee of ranchers was appointed to act in relation to grasshopper control if the need arises.

Ralph Pearson and R. W. Floyd; Albert and Farrell Watson; Grady Eldridge and George Sisneros. These members were asked to help keep up with the grasshopper situation in their areas.

Also, in the Ancho and Corona areas, if grasshoppers develop and interest is shown in control, Corbin Heister of Corona and Mr. Straley of Ancho were asked to talk over the grasshopper situation with the ranchers in their area.

Heavy grasshopper infestation indicated by 1955 adult surveys were indicated in the Fort Stanton area, Encinosa area, Tiniebla-Arabela area and the area east of Carrizozo, as well as a considerable portion along the east county line extending into Chaves County.

Mr. Fulkerson indicated that from interest shown they would be in the area from time to time throughout the summer.

Cost is still estimated at 20c an acre.

Mr. John Durkin, Extension Entomologist, was also at the meeting.

Representatives from all infested areas in the county were at the meeting.

Zuni Indians' Legend Is Stronger Than Their Personal Need For Salt

(Editor's Note: The article below proved so interesting to the Ruidoso News editor, we decided to pass it along to our readers. It was illustrated by several old photographs.)

(In The Socorro El Defensor)
For centuries Navajo and Pueblo Indians have come to Zuni Salt Lake to harvest their own supply of salt. Great ceremonies of praying, singing, dancing and racing on the edge of the basin honor Minacoya, the Salt Mother, and the Indians cleanse themselves before entering the water, for it must not be polluted. Minacoya would be displeased since the salt is part of her body.

The Indians carry away in their trucks and wagons only enough salt for their own needs and return to work at mining the salt commercially. Only as good a friend to the Indians as is Loraine Morley Reynolds (Mrs. Tom Reynolds of Datti) could have learned from them why they will not commercialize salt from this lake. According to the Zuni Legend, Minacoya will vanish if they ever mine the salt for sale. Mrs. Reynolds had thought of the lake as a good source of income for the Indians. They have rights to the salt and feel assured they will never be cut off from its supply, but they will not sell it.

According to the Zuni Legend, Minacoya came down from the north many centuries ago hunting for a home. She stopped at Laguna first, but too many people had built their homes and cultivated the earth around her. She continued to Zuni where the Parrot Clan treated her as an honored guest. In return she promised to put the clan in charge of rites on the salt journey.

Finally she found the bleak isolated spot, some 20 miles north of Quemado, where she made her home. Here in tumbled, volcanic, malpais lies the Zuni Salt Lake. Here when the long dry season has kept fresh water from entering the old craters, heavy salt crystals join together in slicks. They are mined by scraping them from the bottom of the lake.

Centuries ago before Minacoya came there was no salt for men or sheep. After Minacoya created her home amid a great eruption of the earth there was salt in abundance. In gratitude the Zunis obeyed the injunction of Old Salt Mother, and sacrificed a maiden to her. They threw a lovely maiden into the crater, in which nothing could sink because of the density of the salt. The spirit caught the maiden and drew her down into the crater. They have had salt ever since.

Coronado's men are supposed to have stopped at Zuni Salt Lake some four hundred years ago. Other strangers have come here also. It has now become one of New Mexico's unique sight-seeing spots. Some twenty years ago J. N. Curtis of Quemado started mining the salt, our most essential mineral. Now there are storage bins

and other buildings of his salt works on the edge of the lake and much activity during the dry season. Stockmen and lettuce growers buy the product. A few years ago Mr. Curtis sold out his interest in the business to a relative, and he is now State Senator from Catron County.


