## State Candidates Visit In County

State candidates have been visiting Ruidoso more frequently the last several days as the May 8 primary election draws near.

Last week-end, three persons seeking nomination to state offices called in Lincoln County and in Ruidoso.

Among them was Murray E. Morgan, Alamogordo, at present a state senator from El Paso, who is seeking the nomination for State Land Commissioner. He was born 21 years ago in Alamogordo and has made that his home since. He is a veteran of World War II and had college work at the University of New Mexico. He owned and operated the Alamogordo News with his father and a brother from 1913 to 1954 and once served as president of the New Mexico Press Association.

He was a member of the State Legislature for 12 years, one of two men in the state to have been majority floor leader in both house and senate.

He has headed the penitentiary investment committee which wrote and gained passage of eight laws improving penitentiary procedures, along with probation and parole. He has spearheaded much highway legislation to ease county financing, along with legislation for promotion of state parks to secure matching federal funds for state road work.

Morgan is now a member of a Citizens Committee on Land Resources, seeking research in the most economical use of state and federal lands, a foundation to federal legislation of policies to the public domain. He said, while visiting here last week, he would bring his campaign to Lincoln County the last two weeks before the primary.

Timothy P. Woolston, candidate for Democratic nomination for lieutenant-governor, was a visitor here Sunday, reporting he hoped to be back in about two weeks to make a thorough canvass of the area to promote his campaign. He is a veteran of World War II and has had experience in state government, he said.

Also passing through here was Ingram B. (7-foot) Pickett, seeking nomination on the Democratic ticket for governor. He said he would visit every county in every county in the state prior to the primary. He expressed optimism over his prospects.

## 3 Hospitalized Here After Blast, Fire

Three persons in a family of four were hospitalized here following an explosion in Star Cafe in downtown Ruidoso at 6:30 a. m. Saturday morning. Most seriously burned were the small son and daughter and the mother, I. Seely, who with his wife, leased the cafe last fall. Seely, aged 27, said the family was preparing to get up for the day to begin work on preparing to open the cafe, which had been closed for about three months. He said the explosion apparently ignited from a cigarette he had lighted. The bedroom in which all the family was gathered flared into flames instantly and the explosive blast blew out a front window and the ceiling. The restaurant building is 20x20 feet in size and the family's living quarters are immediately to the rear in an annex. Fire which followed the blast gutted the interior of the cafe and destroyed the family's personal belongings.

In the hospital are Mrs. Betty Jean Seely, 25, Michael, aged two, and Sandra Jean, aged six, all suffering with severe burns on the body, arms and face. The father received burns on the arms.

Reports at midweek were the trio were doing very well. The children received special praise from hospital staff members for their wonderful behavior during the ordeal they experienced.

Investigation after the fire had been done revealed that a stove had been removed and no cutoff was on an open pipe to allow the building to be flooded almost immediately with gas when the father turned on a gas meter at the cafe. The pallet on which the two children were sleeping caught fire and the bed in which the couple had been sleeping also was ablaze. The family spent several terrifying minutes before they were able to escape the blazing building.

## 'Do Not Haul Trash To Sanitary Fill'

Ruidoso Sanitary Commissioner D. E. Snyder this week asked the Ruidoso News to issue the following notice to local residents:

"It is necessary to ask the cooperation of the residents of Ruidoso to refrain from hauling their own trash and garbage to allow for proper operation of the Sanitary Fill area and to prevent the possibility of fire in and around the area.

"The Village has entered into a contract with Cecil Jones to haul all the garbage and trash at a nominal cost to the businesses and residences.

"There is a Village ordinance prohibiting the hauling of garbage and trash by private individuals, so we ask the cooperation of the residents in this situation.

"On account of yard trash and larger debris an agreement is being worked out with the Forest Service to provide an area for such dumping. This area will be available for use in the very near future."

## County-Wide Spring Meeting Held For The Last Time At Mescalero For Otero School Pupils, Faculty

(Editor's Note: Virginia Chappell, writer for the Alamogordo Daily News, wrote a sprightly story, illustrated with nine photographs, for last Sunday's issue of the paper she works for, about the county-wide meeting of school children and teachers at Mescalero last Thursday—the last time it will be held at that school. Below is the article she authored.)

It was a colorful day of excitement and festivity for a crowd of 2,000 when the annual spring meeting of all Otero County schools was staged on the picturesque Mescalero Apache Indian reservation—yet the scene was underlain by a note of pathos for after this year there will no longer be a Mescalero Day School,

which was host for the event. The school this fall will be absorbed with Bent into a new county school.

The gathering Thursday was something of a swan song for the teaching personnel of the Mescalero Day School, who when this school year ends, will scatter to other posts. These teachers had worked diligently to make the assembling of the county schools at Mescalero a memorable one. They had given much of their talents and time to have their students appear to advantage in events of the day.

These teachers include Claude F. Taylor, principal; Mrs. Stella Lee, superintendent; Bill Cloghorm, athletic coach and physical education director; Mrs. Jeannette Martin, music teacher, and Mrs. Fieri Baldonado, kindergarten teacher.

Mr. Taylor gave the address of welcome to the crowd, which filled the school auditorium, where the events of the day took place. Mrs. Frances Godley, county superintendent of schools, then addressed the vast attendance.

From the time that the first spelling bee took place in the early morning, interest and applause of the thousands never lagged. Children sat wide-eyed, applauded wildly when students from their schools appeared on the stage.

After spelling bees, there was a recital of winter essays and awarding of football and basketball trophies.

At 11:30 a. m., the throng was disbanded for lunch. The man-size meal was free for all, and it was the first time in the five years these county school meetings have been held, that a meal had been provided by the host institution. It was provided with the compliments of the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Mescalero Day School.

The tribe furnished two beavers for the event. One hundred and fifty pounds of potatoes were served and 80 pounds of ranch beans. The hungry group ate 1,000 pieces of fry bread; drank 40 pounds of coffee and 1,200 doughnuts. There was a salad served in which 50 pounds of cabbage, 25 pounds of carrots and 30 pounds of raisins had been tossed together. Milk and fruit juices also were on the menu. George Parlier, head cook from the Mescalero cow camp, was on hand early to direct activities in the spotless kitchen, adjoining the school auditorium.

Steaming dishes were served outside and young and old were served heaping plates. Everyone ate where they wished. There were many Apache grandmothers on hand to care the young ones. Most of them kept a little aloof from the crowd and ate together in small groups.

Every child present, regardless of race and color, was dressed in his prettiest and newest clothes for this big day, which is the most important one in the school year for every Otero county school youngster. Black and blonde tresses alike had been brushed and freshly washed for this day. Curls and straight hair gleamed like satin. All day long, young faces were

## Well Known Musician, Frequent Visitor Here, Dies In Hollywood

Word has been received by Harris Shelton of the death, in Hollywood, of Captain Pierre de Callaux. Captain de Callaux passed away suddenly of an odd heart condition. In this country, as well as in many of the capitals of the world, he was known as a brilliant pianist, composer, conductor and arranger. In California he was the musical director of the Volunteer USO. A Captain in the Royal Air Force, he was well known and much beloved in musical circles everywhere. When quite young he was accompanist to the late Elsie Janis, who practically invented USO work in the first World War.

For 17 years Captain de Callaux was Professor of Musical Conducting at the Royal Academy of Music in London. 2 years musical director for the Paramount Theatres throughout the British Isles. He was conductor of the largest permanent theatre orchestra in the world at the famous Rex Theatre in Paris, where most of the top entertainers of the world followed the tempo of his baton. For 11 years he was guest conductor of orchestras in Scandinavia, and just before the last war had been chief Musical Director of the German Government. He had even been guest conductor at the Moscow Music Hall, by invitation. A remarkable person, he knew practically everybody, and the list of the talented he unearthed and fostered is staggering.
