
AROUND TOWN

Biography Of Dr. James Warren Laws—

Pioneer Lincoln Physician Writes 'No Hobby Is As Interesting As The Practice Of Medicine'

(Editor's Note: Contributing much to the development of early Lincoln County was the late Dr. James Warren Laws, pioneer resident of Old Lincoln Town, who died while still engaged in active practice in El Paso on June 13 last month. The article below was written from an outline of his life, taken from a book he had written, and which was sent to Henry Thorne of Ruidoso by a daughter, Mrs. Mary G. Bailey, San Mateo, Calif.) Dr. James Warren Laws was born Oct. 12, 1873, in Bethlehem, Mississippi, located in the northern part of that state in Marshall County. He was educated in Memphis Hospital Medical College, receiving his degree as Doctor of Medicine in 1895. He came to New Mexico in 1902 for his health and served as assisting surgeon at the U. S. Merchant Marine Hospital and Public Health Sanatorium at Ft. Stanton. Here he first began private practice among the New Mexico natives. He was married to Grace Austin in 1904 at her father's fruit ranch at Bonito, N. M., a community now lying on the floor of picturesque Bonito Lake. He left Ft. Stanton, he served as a doctor for mine workers at Coalinga, N. M., from 1904 until 1906. In the latter year he purchased a ranch at Lincoln, N. M., known as the Ellis ranch. It was producing fruit and alfalfa, and had a part in the Lincoln County War history. The rambling adobe house served as a hostelry to Billy the Kid while waiting for a conference with Lew Wallace, then the appointed governor of the Territory of New Mexico. Dr. Laws established a sanatorium at the old Ellis ranch, which operated from 1906 until 1917. While a resident there he repaired and remodeled the old adobe house, putting in more windows and building a rustic porch across the front, which still stands. He used to grow walnut trees growing along the Bonito river which ran through the ranch. Other improvements included digging a new water well, building a cottage on either side of the house for patients, and maintaining a large staff, including a cook, waitress, nurse, porter, farm and ranch help. He built up a fine blooded Jersey herd, raised chickens, horses, dogs, planted grass, flowers, a vegetable garden, corn, cabbage and pumpkins, and maintained a fruit orchard. The horses he raised were for the two-horse buggies he drove to take care of his calls throughout all of Lincoln County. His general practice was to cover every part of the county, since the only medical service available was 65 miles away at Roswell, or even further to El Paso. Trips to his emergency surgical cases were made with the two-horse buggy or across mountains on horseback, with a folding operating table and sterile instruments, and bandages strapped to a lead horse. His friends along the route often had fresh horses ready for him to change to. Among his honors and achievements were appointment in 1908 by Governor Curry as a delegate to the International Congress of Tuberculosis held at Washington, D. C., where he met many famous people of that era. Brighter Days For The Fruit Growers

Members and supporters of the White Mountain Fruit Growers Association expressed high hopes for the future of the fruit industry of the Three Valleys at a meeting of the organization held last Monday night at the Bonnell Ranch.

Plans for handling a better than ordinary fruit crop this fall in the modern packing, grading and processing plant of the association at Hondo were outlined by the board of directors and other key members.

A T "Bert" Pringsten, chairman of the board and pioneer rancher and fruit grower of Lincoln County expressed his meeting with interesting insights on agriculture and fruit growing, and a brief history and a look into the future of the local fruit association.

Mr. Pringsten revealed that the farm families of the nation are dwindling and that the percentage of families engaged in producing the nation's food and fiber are now only thirteen percent of the nation's total.

"This throws a bigger and bigger burden on those of us who are left in this field of work to produce for the rest of the folks of our country," the speaker said. "And also the farmer's share of the food dollar is declining as we advance in processing, packaging, trimming and decorating of merchandises. All the people engaged in these operations, which are the result of the strict demands of the American people for better and better merchandise put up in more and more attractive and convenient style, are entitled to their share of the total price."

Mr. Pringsten remarked further: "The fruit association of ours is nothing but a necessary machine

Lincoln County, New Mexico offers a greater variety of entertainment and interest to the tourist and newcomer than most counties in the Southwest. There are Apache Indian dances, rodeos, horse races, Billy the Kid pageant, and many local community festivities. The panorama of majestic mountains and colorful plains, fruitful valleys and spacious stock ranges form a lure to even the most adamant by-passer. But the most unique attraction of Lincoln County is an opportunity for a spiritual experience, awe inspiring, and good—the Cowboy Camp Meeting.

This year, for the sixteenth consecutive year, ranchers, residents, and visitors will gather on Nogal Mesa for a four-day encampment, beginning Wednesday evening, July 16, and ending Sunday night, July 22. Speakers this year will be Rev. Bob Goodrich of Dallas, Texas, who has been at many Nogal Mesa Camp Meetings, and Rev. Glenn Harris of Birmingham, Michigan.

The Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting is interdenominational, run by the ranchmen of the county under the direction of Rev. Ralph Hill and Rev. Roger Sherman and assisted by cattlemen, Joe Evans, with 23 acres of camping space under the pines and junipers, there is ample room for everyone caring to bring their camping equipment and stay the full time.

Meals are served cafeteria style, three times daily with plenty of barbecued beef and cowboy chuck. Collection plates are not passed, money is not solicited, it is only asked that all partaking of the ranchmen's generosity attend all the religious services which are held in the tabernacle three times daily at 10:30 a. m., 2:30 p. m., and 7 p. m. Group meetings are held at other hours. The men have their own services without the aid of a preacher, out in the open beside their Prayer Tree, each at-

ternon at 4:30. Donations are gladly accepted if you feel like giving, for many expenses are incurred, but no record is kept of the giver or the amount, he donates.

A large pine tabernacle seats the many hundreds who attend services, with open sides in the building to allow a view the Tularosa Basin, the distant Magdalena Mountains, and the nearby White Mountains and Sacramento. Chimes have been installed in the church at the little town of Nogal, which is perched half way down the mountain from Nogal Mesa, and as they ring through the country, visitors to the Camp Meeting will enjoy their music. Rev. Bill Lytle of Corona will again have charge of the choir and welcomes all volunteers who wish to sing.

Each year improvements are added to the grounds. A new extension has been built to the kitchen to afford protection to the dishwashers, and those wishing a cup of the ever-brewing coffee. With Jim Valdez as cook, the ranchmen leading the food, and the facilities of the long dining hall, a thousand people can be fed in 45 minutes.

Altitude at the camp is 7,000 feet, and there has never been an encampment without some rain which chills the air and makes jackets mighty comfortable. A new bridge will be completed by the Highway Department at the turn-off from Highway 350, five miles west of Capitan, and fifteen miles east of Carrizozo. The camp grounds may also be reached off State Road 37 by turning at Nogal Lake.

Roswell Firm Given Conservation Work Contract In County

Jenson Construction Co. of Roswell was successful bidder and has been awarded a contract by the Soil Conservation Service for construction and channel widening on the Rio Hondo and Rio Bonito in Lincoln County. State Conservationist R. A. Young announced that four re-arrangements and one channel widening would be completed on the two rivers with the cost to run approximately \$16,220. The cost of the work covered in the contract is being shared by landowners who will receive the benefits of the work and by the federal government.

The project is a portion of the watershed program sponsored by the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation District and is entirely contained in the Rio Hondo watershed.

The Jenson Co. has 100 days to complete the construction which is covered by the contract. This includes approximately 2,668 linear feet of revetment and tie-back reflectors consisting of piling, wire and cable, as well as 3,000 cubic feet of channel excavation.

62,000 acres of range land are slated to be sprayed in Lincoln County in the near future. After signing the contract and putting the money in the Picacho Grasshopper Control Fund the ranchers were told by Mr. Fulkerson to expect it to take about 15 days for the contract to be let and the airplanes to start spraying the area. Those pledged to spray are: A. S. Patterson, Curtis Hill, Frank Peters, Fuller Ranch and Charles Fuller.

There is a possibility of another 20,000 acres being added in the Tinnie area—it will depend upon one individual, as the grasshopper contract has to be let in a block. Control work will be done with airplanes flying 2 oz. aldrin in a gallon of diesel per acre.

After surveying the area for 3-4 days last week, it is felt that the hatch is not yet complete as the rains have been spotted. Moisture is required before the eggs will hatch. If the area has a good rain, the ranchers will notice a tremendous number of grasshoppers about a week after the rain.

At present, the grasshoppers are between one and three weeks old, with a few adults that are 5 weeks old or older.

Spraying is done within a short time after the grasshoppers become adults, or they will start laying eggs in the present rate, a large number will become adults during the last of July or the first part of August.

**Ruidoso Trailer Court Program
Of Continually Improving
Proves Popular With Visitors**

Growing in popularity every year with the people who love to rove and yet have the comforts of home with them in the form of the modern auto trailer, the Ruidoso Trailer Court, operated here on Main Road by Mrs. and Mrs. J. M. Fowler, although the court is only three years old this summer, and has grown from 12 units to 29, it is becoming widely known throughout the southwest by those nomads and retired people who enjoy stopping in the Playground of the Southwest.

Many of the customers of Ruidoso Trailer Court come back year after year, like the B. F. Coxes of Abilene, Tex., the Jack Hoopers of Hialeah, Fla., and the F. W. Winkler of Ruidoso and Portales; the George Stralays of Ancho, and Joe Riley of Ruidoso Downs, who comes here from Mesa, Ariz. Joe is manager of the Jockey Club at the Downs.

The recently retired Indian service worker, Bert Shields, and his wife, after trying other spots around the country, drove in with their trailer not long ago and told the Fowlers, "We're going to make our home here."

The beautiful setting of the courts, among the tall pines and beside the Rio Ruidoso, proves restful to those people who like to pause in their travels for rest and relaxation. To make the folks who stay there feel more at home, the Fowlers have just completed a large lounge, measuring 20x32-feet in size, in which they have a television set, tables for card and domino games, an indoor shuffleboard, a radio set and other gadgets for entertainment. Throughout the day and early night the lounge is a beehive of fun for the trailer court residents. The Fowlers estimate some 100 people make use of the lounge, for that many are at home in the trailers there. The units are designed to accommodate any size trailer, from 46-foot in length down to the smallest. Electricity is furnished, and water, of course, Fowler plans to build shade over the various parking spots for the trailers, similar to car ports. A miniature children's playground is provided, and among further improvements planned are some rock retaining walls for both beauty and utility, and at least a couple of more trailer sites.

The Fowlers themselves are easy to get acquainted with, being friendly Texans from Balmorhea, where they farmed, ranched, had dairy cattle and chickens. They've been in Ruidoso long enough to be labeled old-timers. Visiting them at present is Mr. Fowler's mother, Mrs. Mary Fowler, from Armiillo.

Among recent visitors checking in at the court with trailers were three owned by the Fowlers, one from Phoenix, who has just entered in the Downs race, and who has with him his trainer, Blain Larsen, and a jockey, Oest Topham. Also staying at the court now are the E. C. Fuchers of Big Springs, fast becoming acquainted up and down the canyon.

A graveled driveway, a concrete outdoor shuffleboard court, a neatly trimmed lawn as a border for the whole length of the court all present an inviting welcome to trailer owners as they drive up the Ruidoso playland.



Dear Vic:

Today I was convicted of moving buildings without having secured the permit and paying the fee. The evidence in the case clearly proved that I did not own the buildings in question. In finding me guilty the City Police Judge completely disregarded the evidence and based his conviction on his own personal opinion and on what he had heard. It has always been my belief that a judge should base his judgment on the evidence and certainly not allow his personal feelings to prejudice him, and above all he should not pass judgment on a lot of gossip. Now to keep the record straight and for the information of the "gossips," the permit fee was paid to the city on the buildings moved into Palmer Gateway. The City Clerk testified under oath that I was arrested to stop the moving of buildings without the payment of the fee. There have been MANY different people who have been involved in moving buildings into the area, yet I am the only one to be arrested and for the moving of buildings I did not own.

My conviction was the most flagrant violation of American justice I have ever seen or heard of. My arrest and conviction has proven to me that any usefulness
