Aerial Tour Of Europe Outlined At Flying Farmer Meet Here

The prospects for a flying tour of six European countries by 90 members of the Flying Farmers of America, appeared doomed Friday with the far-reaching adjournment of Congress. The plans were revealed Friday in Ruidoso by Fred B. Triplett, president of the 36-state group, who attended a regional meeting of the organization. The flying tour was attended by 100 farmers and ranchers from Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. A bill is in Congress which Sherman was moved to an El Paso hospital after treatment here. District Attorney To Investigate Mystery Death On Mountainside

A mystery this week clouded the brow of Carrizo Hill with the discovery late Sunday afternoon of a skeletonized body of a human body. Early Monday morning an official party, headed by Sheriff Glen Bradley and Justice of the Peace Herbert Smith, toiled wearily up the mountainside for three-quarters of a mile to the grisly find, where an inquest was begun. Bones were scattered for an area of over 35 feet around the main trunk of the body, lying on a ledge overlooking the peaceful Palmer's Gateway and Skyland subdivision of Ruidoso.

The discovery was made by Ramsey Chastain, 21, an employee of Leon Salles' Big Shop, and Edwin Chavez, 13-year-old Ruidoso elementary school student, and Freddie Sweeney, 19. They did not disturb the body, they reported as soon as they contacted Village Marshal J. P. Bobo late Sunday.

The sheriff's party gathered all the remains to be found, including a portion of the backbone; some fragments of a purple plaid skirt, dress or shirt; a button or two, two wedgeshaped, a pair of men's socks, arm and leg bones, along with a skull and jawbone, in widely scattered places. The amount of long black hair also was found. The skull was not near the main part of the body—it had rolled about 25 feet down a steep bluff to rest on a lower ledge.

The remains, none bearing any sign of foul play, were placed in paper sacks and cloth sacks by Sheriff Bradley, who said he would have a physician examine them.

Ruidoso peace officers were speculating that the body might be that of Rose Martine, 33, wife of Ringling Martine, who once worked for Richards of Ruidoso when that firm was producing aluminum frames. It was while Ringling worked for Richards that he reported his wife missing, about a year and a half ago, and he, along with several friends, made numerous searches at that time among the hills to the south of Ruidoso, between this village and the Mesquero Indian Reservation. The Martines lived at Carrizo. Both have records of several arrests since 1932 for drunkenness and disorderly conduct. Martine was questioned at length, but she said she never disappeared, but there was no evidence produced then that he had any knowledge of what might have happened to her. Numerous Ruidoso residents, however, recall his searches for his missing wife among the hills.

Mrs. Salles, wife of the riding instructor and Sheriff Bradley, said that at one time Mrs. Rose Martine had broken into her home in fear of her life, reporting she had been threatened with a knife Mrs. Salles said no one could remember having seen the woman since that time, about a year ago. She said she was in linking the body found on Carrizo Hill to the missing woman was the fact the skull showed four upper front teeth missing. Many Ruidosans remembered Mrs. Martine had four front teeth missing. Her police record reports she was 33 years of age, was five feet and two inches tall, had brown eyes and black hair. The report said she had a scar under the left eye and was a housewife.

Upon reassembling the coroner's jury at the municipal building, Judge Smith recessed it until Friday morning this week, 10 a. m., when he said District Attorney C. C. Chase, Jr., would be on hand to delve further into the case. Members of the jury who made the trip up the mountain to the site were Sheriff Sweeney and a visiting friend from Los Angeles, M. R. Elmore, Clifford Ferguson, J. P. Bobo, Claude Peterson, Lowell Morgan and Vic Lamb. Others making the trip, some on horseback, included Smith, Swearingin and the three youths who found the body and Deputy Severo Gallegos. The jury members on the mountainside early Monday, instructed them to investigate the death and to determine identity of the body if possible.

News of Mrs. Martine's disappearance was first printed in the Ruidoso News on the issue of Jan. 14, 1955, winter before last. The news report said: Several persons here and from the Mesquero Indian Reservation have been carrying on a continuing search for an Apache woman, who disappeared in the snows of Carrizo hill, a few days ago while walking on a hill just south of Ruidoso. Some expressed the idea she might not have been lost as her husband feared, for she is said to have returned to her cabin late in the day and carried some blankets. The husband is still looking for any sign of her, however, in the area where she disappeared.

On Feb. 11, four weeks later, the News reported the husband had been arrested on suspicion for having had something to do with said woman's disappearance. The remains were to be turned over to authorities of the Mesquero reservation, investigating officers said Monday.


Ringling Martine, husband of the woman who was missing a year and a half ago, was brought in to Ruidoso Monday night by Sheriff Bradley and Marshal Bobo, with the Mesquero officer, C. C. Chase, Jr. He was brought here from his home in Carrizo, five miles south of Ruidoso. Bobo said he told the officers his wife has been missing

since Dec. 27, 1954. He declared he knew nothing of her death if she had died—and also declared he would submit to a lie detector test. Weather records show a four and a half inch snow fell in this region on Dec. 28, 1954. (In the last two years, in two separate cases, the bodies of Indians frozen to death have been found on trails in woods between the Mesquero reservation and Ruidoso.)

Martine accompanied officers to the scene of where the remains of the Indian woman were found shortly after he was brought to Ruidoso, and he assisted in a further search of the area for any clue regarding as to how she had met her death.

Second Annual Quarterhorse Derby Headlines Downs Card On Saturday

Racing at Ruidoso Downs will start on Friday again this week, featuring three days of outstanding racing. Friday's feature race will be the "Central Park Purse," followed by the second annual running of the Ruidoso Quarterhorse Derby on Saturday and the Governor's Handicap on Sunday.

Friday's card is headed by the eleventh and feature race, the "Central Park Purse," at five and one-half furlongs. Drawing the number two post position, Didiu-menow looms as a strong contender with this field. In his last start at the present meet, he ran second to Poppy's Cash Bar, always a stout campaigner, but with his early speed, may top this field of horses. Sierra should show improvement here as he has raced well his last two starts. Capella has had a race and could upset this

and should they win it would definitely be a surprise. Saturday's card shows a well balanced field of thoroughbreds and quarter horses. Shooting at a purse of \$7,500.00 goes a field of the best three year olds in the world at the present time for the quarter horse title. The two arch rivals of the quarter horse world will meet again, Go Man Go and Bob's Folly. Go Man Go, always a favorite with the bettors, won the Ruidoso Downs Quarter Horse Championship race three weeks ago, out running Bob's Folly, who recently broke the world record for 440 yards at the Denver meet. With a race under his belt over the local track, he may be able to reverse the decision this time. Also in the race is Sure Now, winner of the 1955 Hunter (Quarter Horse Futurity), who has defeated Go Man Go by a nose. Sure Now might repeat his victory of last year and out run Go Man Go again. Showing considerable competition will be Delta's Ace, winner of two at the present meet and runner up in the last year's three year old derby at Los Alamitos, California. This is a New Mexico bred horse, is the best of the race and would require a lucky break to defeat this band.

The race should prove to be one of the toughest races that the quarter horse bettors will ever experience. Sunday's card is headed by a 400-yard dash that brings out the world's fastest horses. Two handicaps and several well balanced races compose the final day.

The tenth and one of the featured races is the old favorite of Ruidoso Downs, Brigand Brandy and Go Man Go, and will try to redeem himself in this race. He is top weighted with 124 pounds but has won 12 races in the past that he could not have won if he had been a pound or two heavier. He should prove that he is as good as he looks by out running Ocean's Blue and a few others to take the top position in the race. Brigand Brandy, who was placed first in his last start after being out of the qualified Maroon, an old rival of Brigand, a 120 pound top weighted horse, will be a contender for the top position in the race.

You can easily adapt the recipe to the number of your guests. Allow at least one bottle of the beverage per person, and allow for plenty of refreshment.

To make your punch look extra festive, float a double-layer, decorated ice block on top. This keeps the last glass you serve as cold as the first one... and as delicious as the first, since the block also is made from the soft drink.

**Fresh-Up Sherbet Punch**  
1 quart sherbet (water base if possible)  
12 bottles 7-Up

Put the quart of sherbet in a punch bowl and let stand at room temperature. Just before serving, when the sherbet is mushy, add the 12 bottles of chilled beverage and stir several times.

**Floating Ice Block**  
Fill a refrigerator tray with 7-Up. Freeze to mush. Then place a strip of cardboard as a separator cross-wise through the middle. Freeze solid. Decorate one square with cherry slices, mint and/or lemon slices. Place this on top of the other square and let float in the punch bowl.



Photo Finish Races Decided In 30 Seconds

(Editor's Note: How does a photo-finish camera work? Many racing fans here for the Ruidoso Downs meet might be interested in the article below, which is reprinted from a New York magazine, which tells of the aid a photograph gives in determining close races.)

The photo-finish camera is quite a machine—precision accuracy. It settles all arguments and the judges are no longer roundly booed.

It is quite a machine at that. Combine it with a hat developer, rapid fix and a "two-story" enlarger and the judges can study negative images of photoed finishes and announce results 30 seconds after the end of the race. The special job looks something like a horizontal version of an old-fashioned motion-picture camera. Its focal length depends on the distance the camera is from the track; at some tracks its lens may be only five inches, at the large tracks 20 inches. It moves its film and has no shutter. The film moves across a non-moving slit.

It was explained that the only coverage needed by the camera is an area 1 inch x 1/50 inch. This opening, immediately before the film, is big enough to see a four-inch strip across the track. It takes in a mirror that's mounted on the opposite side of the track, and the mirrored reflection of the finish gives an inside-the-rail view of the horses.

Not only the winners but each horse is recorded as it crosses the finish line. The film in the camera moves as fast as the horses, or 52-55 feet per second, thus the horses pan themselves and on the

negatives they are sharply focused, with the track blurred. Matter Of Seconds

The 12-18 inch long exposed film is developed in a 92-degree metal-cast soda developer, something like D-88. This process takes 10 seconds. It is fixed and cleared in a fast hypo.

Then, in a matter of a few more seconds, the film is put between glass and placed in a slide projector and aimed through a hole in the dark-room floor to a white-topped table in the judges' room below.

The rest is easy for the judges. They have a projected image three feet square on which the horses are eight inches high. It is quite obvious who the winners are in even the closest race. For those in doubt after the photo board announces the winner, or dead-heat verdict, 10 x 12-inch enlargements are posted only five minutes after the race.

The daily double paid an unusually low \$12.80.

An outstanding Saturday crowd of 4500, poured \$144,674 through the pari-mutuel windows.



state welfare director and at some  
of his colleagues at the hospital.  
He is Dr. Henry C. Meyer, who  
took over last May 12.

He said he resigned because he  
"couldn't stand being interfered  
with" and because his requests for  
changes were denied by the Wel-  
fare Department.

He specifically charged the busi-  
ness manager at the hospital, Dan  
Kusanovich, with "interfering  
with things."

Hathaway Named  
Welfare Director Murray Hintz  
confirmed the resignation and said  
that Dr. George Hathaway, a  
member of the department's medi-  
cal advisory board, will head the  
hospital temporarily starting Mon-  
day morning.

Hintz declined to elaborate on  
Meyer's resignation, saying "I  
don't want to hurt anybody."  
He said he came to Fort Stan-  
ton this week while on a routine  
tour of Welfare Department insti-  
tutions. He said he and Hathaway  
and two other members of the  
medical advisory committee of the  
welfare board held regular medi-  
cal inspections of patients here  
and at Socorro's sanatorium.

Meyer's resignation came, he  
said, at the beginning of discus-  
sion Friday morning.  
Meyer, who said he has held  
hospital staff jobs in Tyler, Tex.,  
Florida and with the United Na-  
tions in Korea before coming to  
Ft. Stanton, said that he resigned  
after meeting with Hintz and the  
three members of his advisory  
committee.

Daniel Charge  
He said that he asked to have  
the business manager's office plac-  
ed under him, charging that Kus-  
anovich "controlled everything in  
the hospital."

Kusanovich termed the charge  
ridiculous, saying he handles only  
the budget and personnel. He said  
that Meyer "had a wonderful op-  
portunity here" but failed because  
"he tried to force his way."  
Meyer said that when he came  
to the institution three months ago  
"the whole thing was in a hope-  
less mess. They wanted to go on  
without improvements. Some peo-  
ple had been here 25 years. They  
think they own the place. They  
don't want changes. They are  
afraid of losing their jobs."

Meyer said that when he pre-  
sented his proposals, Hintz told  
him "we would lose all patients  
and all the staff." Asked what he  
thought Hintz meant by that, Mey-  
er said:

"I don't know what he meant.  
He must of had high blood pres-  
sure or something."

Hates To Leave  
Dr. Meyer said he thinks that  
with reorganization Fort Stanton  
"could be made into a first class  
hospital." He said he hates to  
leave, that he likes the state and  
feels the institution has potential-  
ties. But he said that it would  
have to be transferred to the State  
Health Department, instead of the  
Welfare Department, if it were to  
function most effectively.

He attacked Hathaway as a  
"puppet of Mr. Hintz."  
Hintz said that Hathaway will  
head the hospital and the El Mir-  
ador Home for the Aged in Las  
Vegas in a dual capacity until a  
permanent medical director is se-  
lected.




