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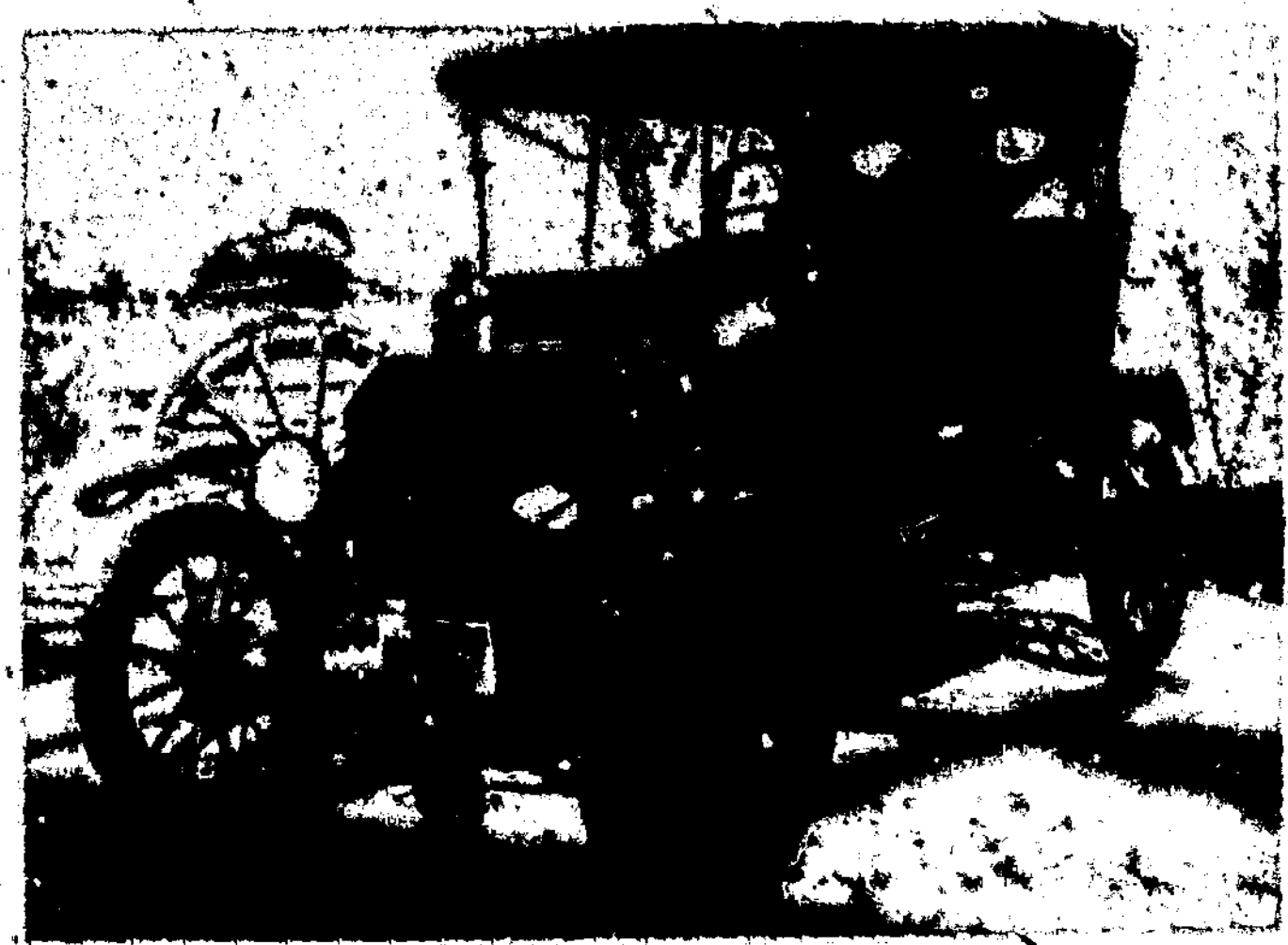
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Complete Draft Of Hondo Fiesta For Saturday

Wheeler's Museum And Antique Store Begins Fifth Season Here

Wheeler's Museum in Ruidoso, recently described as a miniature Smithsonian Institute, and which has some 25,000 objects on view, opens Saturday, April 27 for its fifth season in the Playground of the Southwest.

Featuring thousands of early American items including antique kitchen utensils, more than 100 dolls of all sizes and from many lands, ranging in age from a few years to more than 160 years; a large amount of Indian artifacts, including arrowheads, bones and fossils of that age, early American inventions, such as typewriters, phonographs, nickelodeons, etc.; collections of postage stamps, buttons, firearms, Valentines and greeting cards and other such articles that bring nostalgia to the viewer, the place has attracted tourists from every one of the 48 states and from many foreign lands. Mr. and Mrs. Verne Wheeler, who own and operate the place, reported 41 states were represented on their guest register in 1936 and nine foreign countries also had viewers make a trip through its aisles of interesting objects last year.

Housed in a building measuring 32x80 feet, the museum probably has the greatest privately owned collection of articles from the American home that were used during the 1800's than any besides the Smithsonian institute in the nation's capital. The grounds around the museum, which is located on U. S. Highway 70, also has on view many buggies and wagons of the pioneer days, wagon wheels, old cannon balls, farm implements of a long-gone era and kindred items.

The Wheelers have just returned from a visit in Texas, one of several they have made in recent months, where they heard a number of additional items for display in their museum. Last fall a tour they made took them to Indiana and back.

Thrift Shop Re-Opens May 1

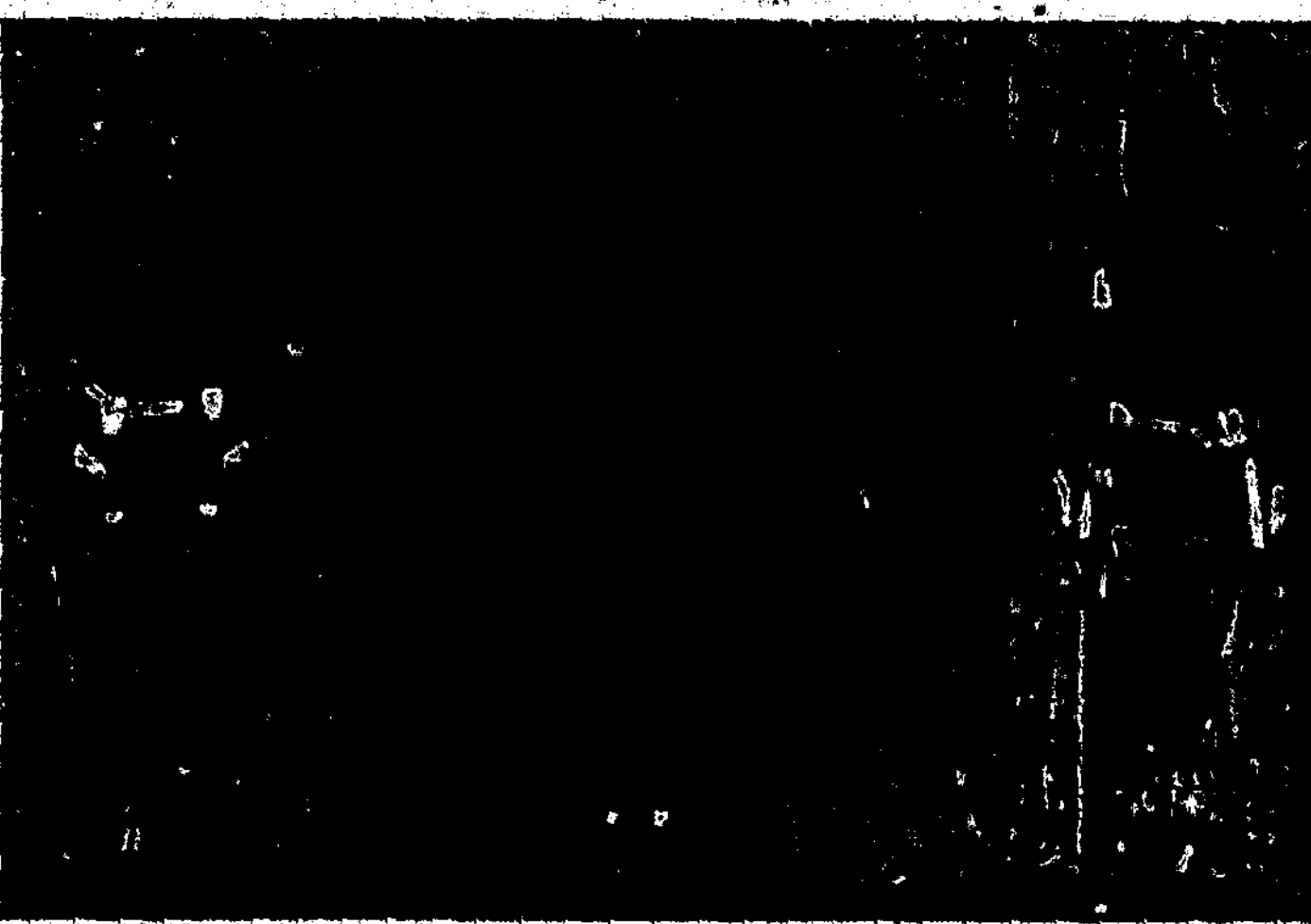

The Juvenile Code Of New Mexico
By GINA ALLEN, Executive Secretary

Editor's Note: As space permits, the Ruidoso News will print a summary of the Juvenile Code of New Mexico, at the behest of District Judge W. T. Scoggin. The article below is one of a series to be printed in the next several weeks.

(Series I)

Little more than a hundred years ago an eight year old boy was "hung by the neck until dead" Why? Because he had set fire to a neighbor's barn.

Such punishment was common in our recent past. Children were hung, burned at the stake, jailed, cast in irons, and starved for their misdeeds. The drastic treatment effectively did away with children, but not with juvenile delinquency.

Centuries of harsh punishment had done nothing to protect society from young criminals, but in the late 1800's juvenile crime was diminishing in certain areas. These were the areas where child labor laws had taken children out of the sweat shops and put them in schools; where church and social workers had improved home and neighborhood environments and offered help to families in trouble; where doctors, sanitarians, and psychologists worked to correct and cure physical and mental illnesses.

People began to understand that bad children were made, not born. The society that bred juvenile delinquency could work to prevent it, now that some of the causes were known. Moreover, children who got into trouble could be helped to become useful, law-abiding citizens of the future.

It was to give such help to children that the first Juvenile Court

Said juvenile court clerk shall keep a record of all juvenile court proceedings; shall keep a separate docket to be known as the juvenile court docket; shall enter all orders and decrees given by the court in a separate record to be known as the juvenile court record; and shall perform in a proper manner any other duties assigned by the court to said clerk.

VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, N. M.
ORDINANCE NO. 88
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS, REQUIRING THE IMMUNIZATION OF DOGS AGAINST RABIES, PROVIDING FOR THE CONFINEMENT, IMPOUNDING, QUARANTINE AND DESTRUCTION OF DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS IN CERTAIN CASES, PROVIDING METHODS OF ENFORCEMENT AND MAKING VIOLATIONS A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$100.00.

IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, as follows:

Section 1—Definitions. As used in this ordinance the following terms mean:

Owner: Any person, group of persons or corporation owning, keeping or harboring a dog.

Vaccination: Injection of a vaccine, approved by the state veterinarian, administered by a licensed veterinarian for the purpose of immunizing a dog against rabies.

Spayed female dog: A female dog certified by a licensed veterinarian to have been spayed.

Exposed to rabies: A dog has been exposed to rabies within the meaning of this ordinance if it has been bitten by any other animal or if it has been in contact with any animal known or reasonably suspected to be infected with rabies.

Section 2—Enforcement. The provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced by the Village Marshal.

Section 3—Licensing: (a) No person shall own, keep or harbor any dog within the Village limits unless such dog is licensed as hereinafter provided. Written application for the license shall be made to the Village Clerk and shall state the name and address of the owner and the name, breed, color and sex of the dog. The license shall be paid to the Clerk at the time of making application. The license shall be issued by the Clerk upon the owner's furnishing a current certificate evidencing the vaccination of the dog, and shall state the owner's name and address and the amount paid and shall describe the dog. (b) The yearly license fee shall be \$1.00 for each male dog or spayed female dog over the age of four months, and \$2.00 for each female dog not spayed and over four months of age. (c) All dog licenses shall be issued for one year beginning with the first day of January. (d) No person shall use for any dog a license, vaccination certificate or license tag issued for a different dog. If there is a change in ownership of a licensed dog, the new owner may have the current license transferred to his name upon payment of a transfer fee of \$1.00.

Section 4—Tag and Collar: (a) With the license shall be delivered to the owner a metallic tag stamped with the number of the license and the year for which issued. The shape of such tags shall be changed each year. (b) The owner shall see that the dog wears at all times a collar with attached such tag shall be attached. (c) If such tag is lost or destroyed, the owner may obtain a duplicate upon the presentation of the license and payment of a fee of \$1.00 for the duplicate tag.

Section 5—Restraint. The owner shall keep his dog under restraint at all times and shall not permit such dog to run at large off the premises or property of the owner.

Section 6—Vaccination. No person shall own, keep or harbor within the Village limits any dog over twelve months old unless such dog has been vaccinated within one year, or any dog over six months old and not over twelve months old unless such dog has been vaccinated within six months.

Section 7—Impoundment. (a) Dogs not licensed or vaccinated to the provisions of this ordinance, and dogs found running at large in violation of this ordinance shall be seized and impounded, and if not redeemed by the owner within 72 hours thereafter may be humanely destroyed or otherwise disposed of as provided in this ordinance. (b) All dogs found running at large may be seized or impounded. (c) Reasonable effort shall be made to promptly notify the known owner of any impounded dog, or the holder of the license on any licensed dog.

Section 8—Redemption of Impounded Dogs. (a) The owner shall be entitled to resume possession of any impounded dog upon payment of the impoundment fees set forth herein and compliance with the license provisions of this ordinance. (b) Any dog impounded under the provisions of this ordinance and not reclaimed by the owner within 72 hours shall be humanely destroyed or placed in the custody of some person deemed suitable who will agree to become the responsible owner thereof and comply with the provisions of this ordinance; provided, if the dog is one to which the provisions of this ordinance apply and the person in possession or custody are determined by state law, such law shall be complied with.

Section 9—Impoundment Fees. Any dog impounded hereunder may be reclaimed as herein provided upon payment by the owner to the Village Clerk of the sum of \$2.00 for the first day and fraction thereof and \$1.00 for each day thereafter.

Section 10—Confinement of Certain Dogs. The owner shall confine every fierce, dangerous or vicious every female dog in heat. The confinement shall be in such manner that the dog cannot come in contact with any person or animal, except for breeding purposes.

Section 11—Rabid Animals. (a) Every rabid dog or animal and every dog or animal exposed to rabies shall be immediately confined by the owner, who shall promptly notify the Police Department; which shall then immediately notify the County Health Officer where such dog or animal is confined and the reason therefor. The owner shall not permit such dog or animal to come in contact with any person or animal. The owner shall surrender possession of such dog or animal to the Police Department on demand for supervised quarantine. The owner shall pay the cost of such quarantine, or the owner may at his option and expense have such animal quarantined at the hospital of a licensed veterinarian. Such dog or animal shall not be released from quarantine without written consent of the Village Police, nor until it has been certified by a licensed veterinarian to be free of rabies. (b) No person shall kill a rabid dog or animal or a dog or animal exposed to rabies nor remove same from the Village limits, without permission of the Police Department, except when it is necessary to kill such dog or animal to prevent it from escaping or biting any person or animal. (c) The Village Police shall direct the disposition of any dog or animal found to be afflicted with rabies. (d) The carcass of any dead dog or animal exposed to rabies shall upon demand be surrendered to the Police Department. (e) No person shall fail or refuse to surrender a dog or animal for quarantine or destruction as required herein when demand therefor is made by the Police Department.

Section 12—Exemptions. (a) Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the care and treatment of animals are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance except the duty to report rabies cases and to comply with provisions specifically naming duties and responsibilities of licensed veterinarians in relation to animal regulation and rabies control. (b) The licensing and vaccination requirements of this ordinance shall not apply to any dog belonging to a non-resident of the Village and kept within the Village for not longer than thirty days, provided all such dogs shall at all times while in the Village be confined within a building, enclosure or vehicle, or be under restraint by the owner.

Section 13—Investigation. For the purpose of discharging the duties imposed by this ordinance and to enforce its provisions, any Police Officer is hereby authorized to enter upon any premises upon which a dog is kept or harbored and to demand the exhibition of the owner of such dog of the license or vaccination certificate for such dog.

Section 14—Interference. No person shall interfere with, hinder or molest any Police Officer in the performance of any duty of such Police Officer.

Section 15—Records. (a) It shall be the duty of the Village Marshal to keep or cause to be kept accurate and detailed records of the vaccination, licensing and impoundment of dogs. (b) It shall be the duty of the Village Marshal to keep or cause to be kept accurate and detailed records of all bite cases reported to him, and of

Section 16—Penalty. Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor or and punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00, and if such violation be continuing, each day's violation shall be a separate offense.

Section 17—Repeals. All other ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 18—Severability. If any part of this ordinance be held void, such part shall be deemed severable, and the invalidity thereof shall not affect the remaining parts of this ordinance.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Vic:

I am enclosing some interesting facts pertaining to the independent telephone companies in the U. S. today. I thought perhaps you readers would be interested in this due to the fact they are being provided telephone service by an independent company.

The 4,400 independent (non-Bell) telephone companies of America, of which the local telephone company is one, and which 11,000 communities and two-thirds of the geographical area of the country, now operate more than 9,000,000 of the 40,453,463 telephones in the United States, its territories and possessions and have a total plant investment of \$2,323,052,000.

According to L. J. Hitchens, manager of the Ruidoso Telephone Company, figures released by the United States Independent Telephone Association reflect the continuing growth and progress of the industry, which has been expanding at an accelerated pace during the past 11 years to meet the unprecedented demands for telephone service occasioned by population growth, increased usage, and a prosperous economy. While the country's population increased 33 percent during the 21-year period from 1935 to 1956, the number of independent telephones soared from 3,185,000 to 9,111,743 or 188 percent, the Association said.

The independent telephone industry, through its operating companies, equipment manufacturers, and suppliers, serves approximately 11,000 communities in the United States, which is twice the number served by the Bell System. However, because Bell companies operate in most of the larger metropolitan areas, they have by far the largest number of telephones (51,343,700).

The independent industry has introduced a number of major technical advances in the telephone field, including the first practical automatic switching system, which was invented by Almon Brown Strowger, a Kansas City undertaker. Its first commercial application was made more than 60 years ago in an independent exchange at La Porte, Indiana. A few years later, the independents introduced the first dial telephones in a number of exchanges in various parts of the country. Today, many independents are installing direct distance dialing whereby the customer dials his own long distance numbers without the assistance of an operator. About 70 percent of all independent telephones now are dial operated.

At the turn of the century, independents introduced automatic dial telephone systems in such large cities as Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Omaha, which cities are now served exclusively by the Bell system. Some of the cities in which the independents operate include Tampa and St. Petersburg, Florida; Lincoln, Nebraska; Rochester and Jamestown, New York; Long Beach, Santa Monica, and the entire suburban area of Los Angeles, California; Fort Wayne and Terre Haute, Indiana; Durham, North Carolina; Sumter, South Carolina; Erie, Pennsylvania; and Lexington, Kentucky.

The nation's long distance service is furnished primarily by the Bell System toll network. All long distance facilities are interconnected with independent telephone company lines. Long distance traffic over the toll network of the industry is freely interchangeable. Agreements are in effect covering routes and distances of service on the inter-connected business. Many independent companies themselves are operating a large volume of toll lines, mostly regional in character, all interconnected with the Bell network and with the toll facilities of neighboring independent companies.

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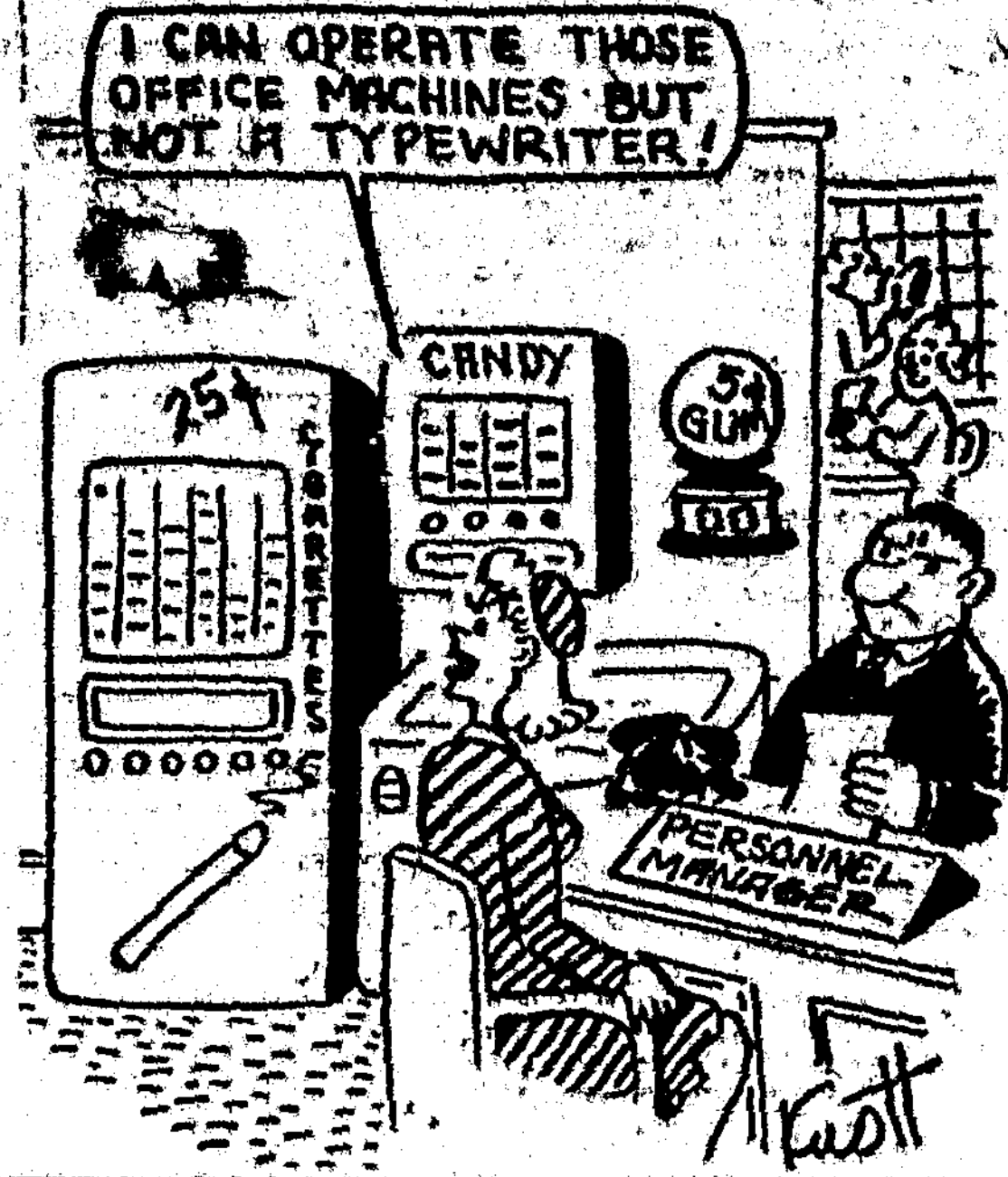

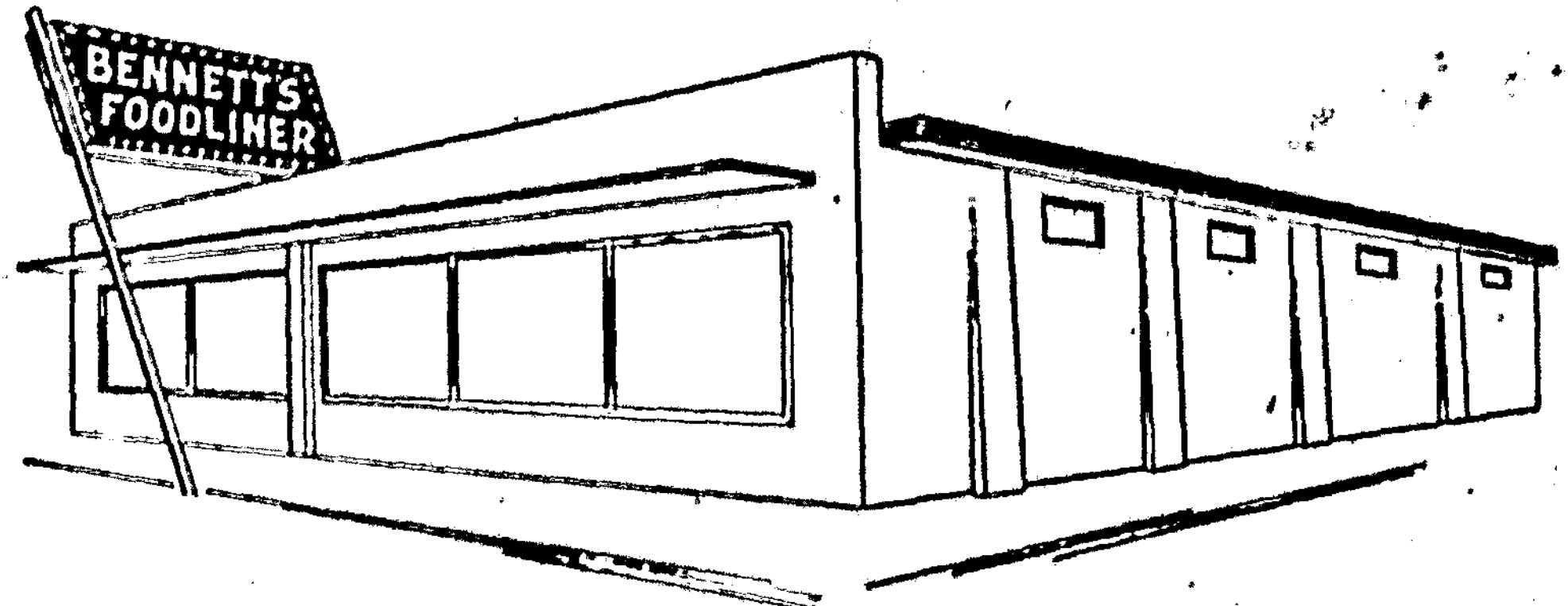
