Miss Gardner is a graduate of Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, with a B. S. N. degree in science, and secured training as a registered nurse at the Samaritan Hospital of Nursing, also located in Nampa.

Before leaving for the mission field in 1950, Miss Gardner served as surgery nurse and floor supervisor at the Samaritan Hospital for several years, and as director of nursing service at the Emmett Hospital in Emmett, Idaho, for a year.

While in Swaziland, Miss Gardner served as one of the hospital nurses at Memoriam for two years, and as nurse in charge of the station and dispensary at Pigeon Peak for four years. While in the states, Miss Gardner will travel extensively in deputational services, speaking about her experiences in medical mission work in Africa.

Slimming Down for Summer?

The recipe for this hot weather treat is:

Chicken Vegetable Salad
 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
 1 cup cold water
 1 can (1 1/2 ounces) condensed cream of celery soup
 1 can (8 ounces) baked chicken, sliced
 1 cup chopped celery
 1 cup chopped all purpose flour
 1 cup thinly sliced red radishes
 1 teaspoon grated onion
 Dash black pepper

Soften gelatine in 1/2 cup cold water; place container over boiling water and heat, stirring occasionally, until gelatine is dissolved. Blend in soup and remaining 1/2 cup water; refrigerate until slightly thickened. Fold in remaining ingredients; pour into 1-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve on crisp salad leaves. Serves 4 generously.

be another withdrawal from the
public domain very shortly, I sus-
pect.
The Secretary of Agriculture
may make a formal request for
withdrawal of some 26,000 acres,
which comprises the old Fort
Stanton Marine Hospital reserva-
tion in Lincoln County. This has
always been federal land, how-
ever.
The Department of the Interior,
to which I managed to get the fed-
eral land transferred when the
Public Health Service abandoned
the hospital, will turn it over to
the Department of Agriculture, ac-
cording to present plans, for joint
use by the Agricultural Research
Service of the USDA and New
Mexico A&M. The two would
conduct studies in sheep and cattle
breeding, wildlife management,
and range management for dual
use by game and livestock. This is
what has been desired by the ma-
jor livestock groups in New Mex-
ico.
The proposal overlooks the me-
morandum to the land by the Mes-
calero Indians and the interests of
livestock people who immediately
adjoin the land. Therefore, it is
probable that these people who
have a direct or indirect interest
in the land will not favor the gov-
ernmental proposal for use of the
reservation. I have insisted that
Department of the Interior sit
down with all interested parties
and go into the disposal, just as
it did in Santa Fe some two years
ago. This will be arranged once a
formal request from the Secretary
of Agriculture reaches the Inter-
ior.
There will be a meeting of a
relatively small group, to be made
up of one representative from the
Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Liv-
estock Associations, the State Game
and Fish Commission, the State
College and the Department of
Agriculture. If there is still dis-
agreement, I think the whole thing
should be thrown open to a pub-
lic hearing. I am quite sure there
is going to be no general agree-

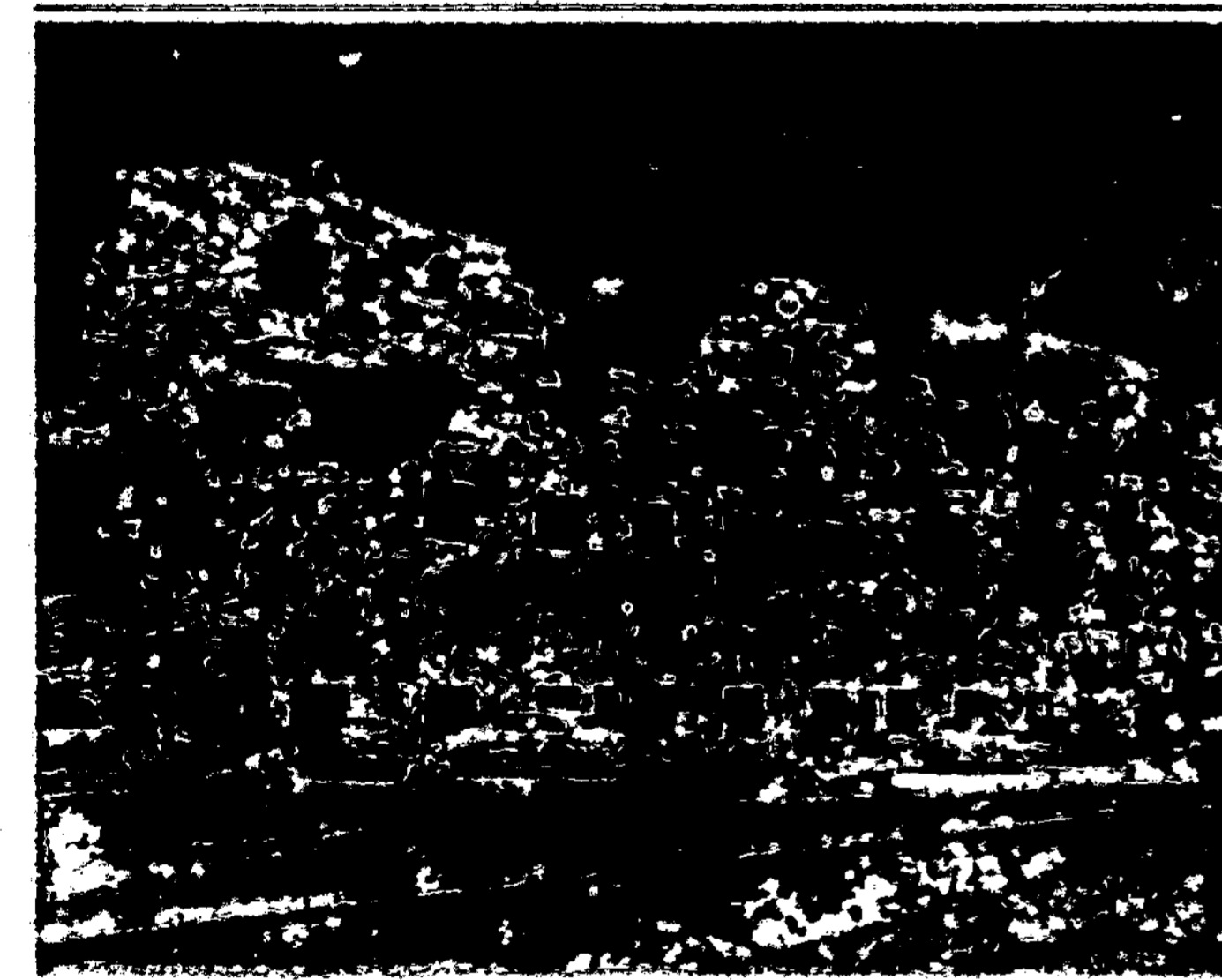

 Grasshoppers are again likely to be a menace on the rangeland in Lincoln County this year. Now is the time to start looking for the newly hatched hoppers; they will be small and extremely hard to find. The hoppers usually hatch in protected places such as canyon bottoms or old dead grass. If you have a small isolated hopper infestation, it will pay to spray them before they started before it is too late. The rancher, federal and state each share one third the cost of the control program.

Ernest McDaniel and Ralph Bonnell last week told me about the livestock marking system they have formed to sell their cattle. By these several ranchers grouping their cattle together, they can usually get a better price than any one person can get. The Juvenile Code Of New Mexico

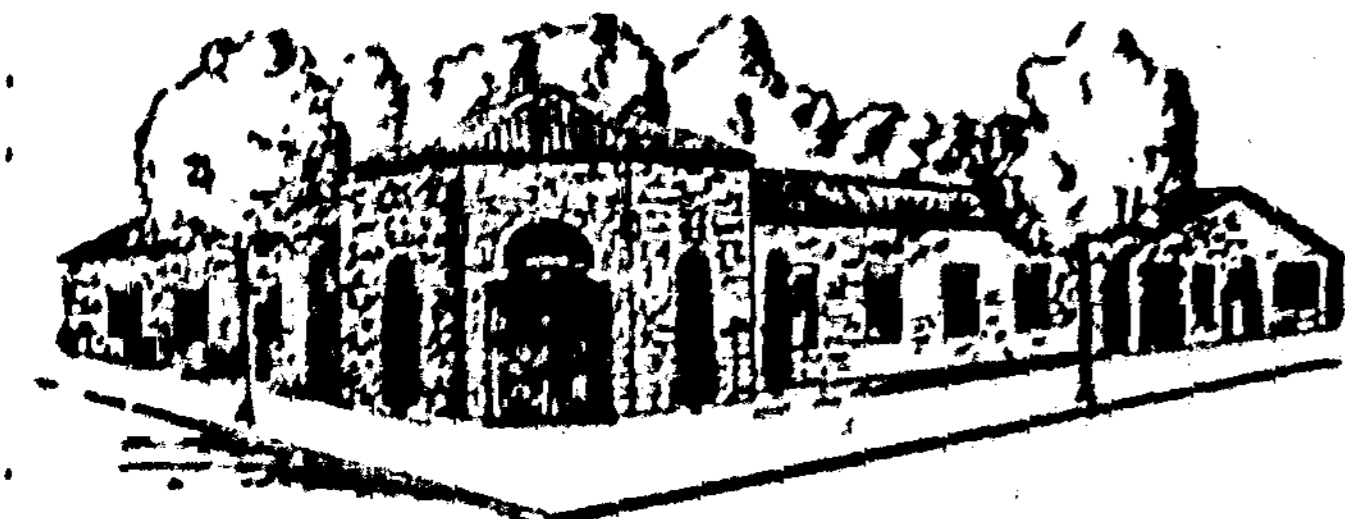
(Editor's Note: As space permits, the Ruidoso News will print a summary of the Juvenile Code of New Mexico, at the behest of District Judge W. T. Scoggin. The article below is one of a series to be printed in the next several weeks.

(SERIES IV)

Suppose that there is within your neighborhood, a child who habitually deports himself as to injure or endanger the morals, health or welfare of himself or others? For the sake of the child himself, for the sake of your family and the community, such a child should be brought to the attention of the juvenile court.

Who can do this? How is it accomplished? What happens after the child is reported to the court authorities? These questions are answered in the following sections of New Mexico's Juvenile Code:

A juvenile is within the purview of this Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73), said officer or attorney shall make a preliminary inquiry to determine whether the interests of the public or of the juvenile require that further action be taken. Thereupon said officer or attorney may make such informal adjustment as is practicable without a petition, or may file a petition with the court. The petition and all subsequent court documents shall be styled "In the matter of _____ a juvenile."

13-8-31. Petition to be verified.—Contents. The petition shall be verified by a responsible person over the age of twenty-one (21) years and may be made upon information and belief. It shall set forth plainly: (1) The facts which bring the juvenile within the purview of this Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73); (2) the name, age and residence of the juvenile; (3) the names and residence of his parents; (4) the name and residence of his legal guardian if there be one, or the person or persons having custody or control of the juvenile, or of the nearest known relative, if no parent or guardian can be found; if any of the facts herein are not known by the petitioner, the petition shall so state.

This section provides the method that a petition may be filed in court against a juvenile offender. First it has to be made by some responsible person over the age of 21 years of age, and has to be under oath. It also has to be a violation of what is described in the Code in Section 13-8-26. It must contain his name and his age and his residence of his parents, and if he has no parents it must contain the names and residence of persons responsible for him.

13-8-32. Who may file petition.—A petition may be filed with the clerk of the juvenile court by any responsible person in the event of the refusal by any person authorized under section 12 (13-8-30) heretofore to file same.

This section is a section that specifically states that because

somebody connected with the probation officer, the sheriff's office or the district attorney's office or any other person in any official capacity refuses to act, then any aggrieved person has a right to act himself and, therefore, cannot shrug the matter off by saying, so and so refused to act and nothing can be done.

13-8-33. No fee to be charged for filing petition under Juvenile Code. No fee shall be charged for giving information, or for making or filing such petition alleging a juvenile to be within the provisions of this Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73).

13-8-34. Citation to person having custody of juvenile.—Emergency custody. After a petition shall have been filed and after such further investigation as the court may direct, unless the juvenile and the person or persons having control of the juvenile shall appear voluntarily, the court shall issue a citation reciting briefly the substance of the petition and requiring the person or persons who have custody or control of the juvenile to appear personally and bring the juvenile before the court at a time and place stated. If the person so cited shall be other than a parent or guardian of the juvenile, then the parent or guardian or both shall also be notified of the pending case and of the time and place appointed for hearing, by personal service before the hearing, except as hereinafter provided. Citations may be issued requiring the appearance of any other person whose presence, in the opinion of the judge, is necessary.

If it appears that the juvenile is in such condition or surroundings that his welfare requires that his custody be immediately assumed by the court, the judge may order, by endorsement upon the citation, that the officer serving the same shall at once take the child into custody.

This section describes the manner in which the court may require persons interested or knowing something about

the case to come into court, also describes how to bring the mother and father and the juvenile offender into court.

13-8-35. Manner of serving process. Service of citation shall be made personally by the delivery of a certified copy thereof to the person cited. Service of citation required herein may be made by the sheriff or by any other person over twenty-one (21) years of age authorized by law to serve civil process.

13-8-36. Time of Service. Service of citation upon a juvenile and the person or persons having charge, custody, or control of said juvenile, shall be made at least forty-eight (48) hours before the time stated for the persons named in the citation to appear at the juvenile court hearing, provided that in the event of a rehearing of such matter, notice may be waived.

13-8-37. Service by registered mail and publication. If upon proper verified statement the judge is satisfied that it is impossible to serve the citation personally within this state upon any of the persons mentioned therein as provided for in the preceding section (13-8-36), he may order service upon such persons by registered mail addressed to the last known address, and by publication thereof, as in other cases of substituted service.

Service of citation outside of the state is complete at the time of deposit of such mailed notice which must be thirty (30) days prior to the time set for said juvenile court hearing.

This is a section that is used on non-resident juveniles. This means keeping the juvenile in detention for thirty days and in this district it means putting juveniles in a room provided for detention adjoining the jail. If the parent comes in sooner, and we try to contact them by telephone or telegram, naturally the case does not have to wait for 30 days, but they are legally entitled to this notice if they so desire.

13-8-38. Proof of service by clerk's affidavit. If the return receipt of registered mail is not returned to the clerk of the juvenile court, the clerk of the juvenile court shall make proof of such service by affidavit filed to the original copy of such notice, showing the date and place of deposit in the mail, and the name and address of the person as shown on the envelope, and also showing that the envelope was sealed and deposited in the mail with postage thereon prepaid, and that there is delivery service by United States mail at the place so addressed.

13-8-39. Service of citation upon relative. In the absence from the county of any such parent or guardian, and the presence within the county of some relative of a juvenile within the provisions of this Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73), whose address is known to the court, a citation to appear may issue to and be served upon such relative.

13-8-40. Appointment of guardian ad litem. In any case in which the clerk of the juvenile court is unable to serve a citation personally or by registered mail upon the parent, guardian or custodian of any juvenile coming under the provisions of this Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73), the court may appoint a guardian ad litem to act in behalf of the juvenile.

This section makes it possible for the court to appoint someone to represent the juvenile when his parents or legal custodian cannot be reached under the provisions of our Code, for that the authorities have not been able to locate a Guardian Ad Litem may be appointed, and this Guardian Ad Litem must be an attorney at law and an officer of the court.

13-8-41. Failure of person cited to appear.—Contempt. If any person cited to appear as herein provided shall, without reasonable cause, fail to appear, he may be

This section means that if a citation is properly served on any person to appear before the court, and he fails to do so, then the court may order contempt proceedings filed against this person and punish him for contempt of court.

Dewey is a Mescalero boy and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Shields of Elk District on the reservation.

An additional well at the Apache Summit Recreation Area is presently being drilled. The new well will supply water for picnickers in the recreation area as well as serve as a standby for the Summit Enterprise. Many new picnic tables are also being added to the recreation area.

Ralph Chee and Phillip Martine were recently employed by the Mescalero Tribe as rangers at the Ruidoso Recreation Area. The duties of these two men involve sale of fishing permits, sale of entrance tickets at the main gate, policing the recreation area and general maintenance men.

A graduation announcement was recently received by the writer and family from the Albert LaRose family, announcing the graduation of Rex LaRose, their son, from high school on May 20. The LaRoses are now residing in Ft. Duchesne, Utah.

The Bureau-wide Supervisors' Training Course was conducted by the Agency Administrative Officer, Edward Cata, at the Mescalero Indian Agency offices on May 15 through 17. Ten members of the agency staff participated in this training course. The highlight of the training period was a demonstration of how to conduct a conference presented by C. O. Talley, Ignatius Palmer and Bart Wetzel.

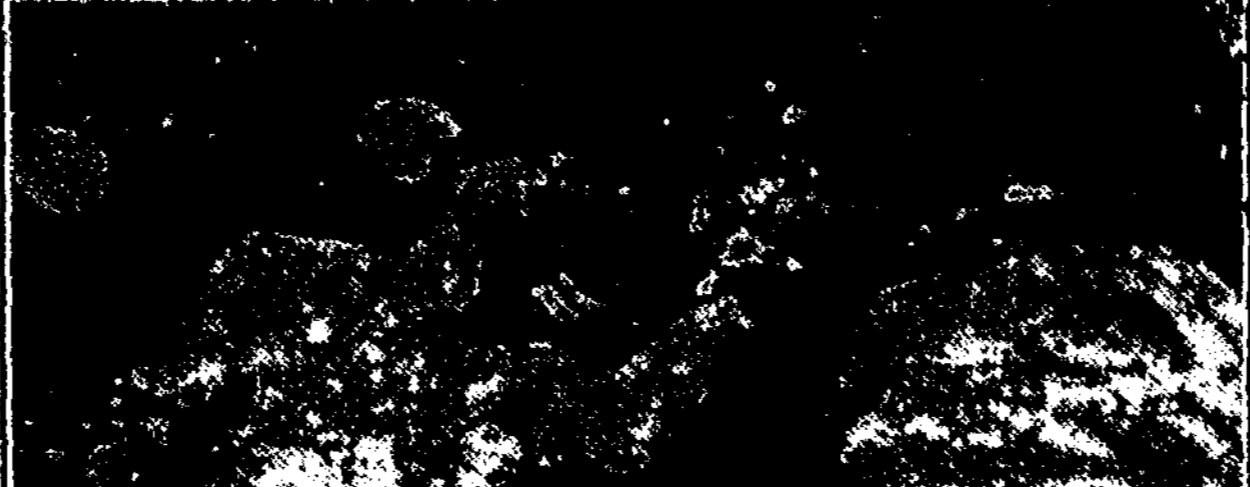

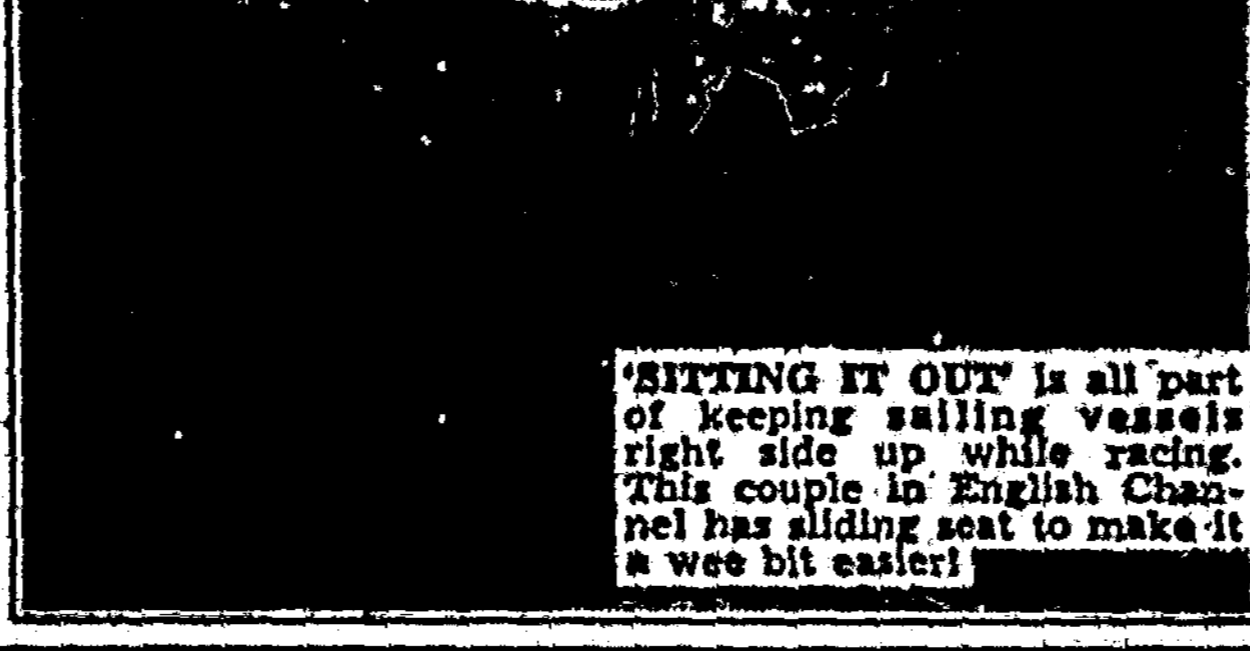

Fifty per cent of New Mexico's population under the age of 19 received at least one Salk polio vaccination as of April 1. Dr. John Mason, director of the polio program for the State Health Department, announced today. The 5 to 9 age group received the greatest number of first inoculations, 24,015 or 84 per cent of the total population in this age group. The report shows 673,898 inoculations have been administered by private physicians and county health departments from the beginning of the NEPS School Program in 1955 through March 31 of this year. Inoculations given by health departments as of April 20, totalled 210,370. A breakdown by counties shows Lincoln with a total of 2,820.

Of the 2,397 babies born in New Mexico during March, 1,256 were boys and 1,141 were girls, according to the State Health Department's Division of Vital Statistics.

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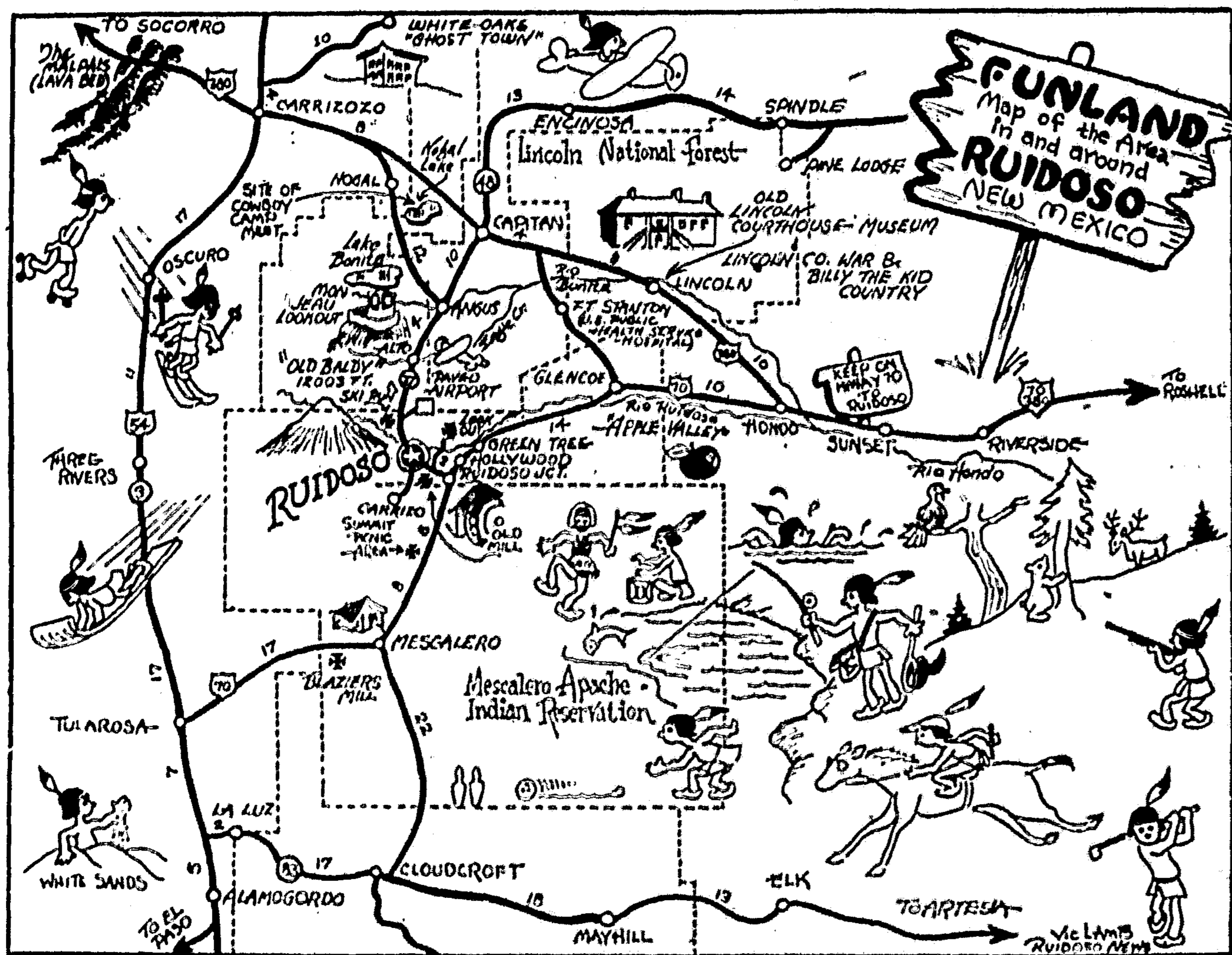

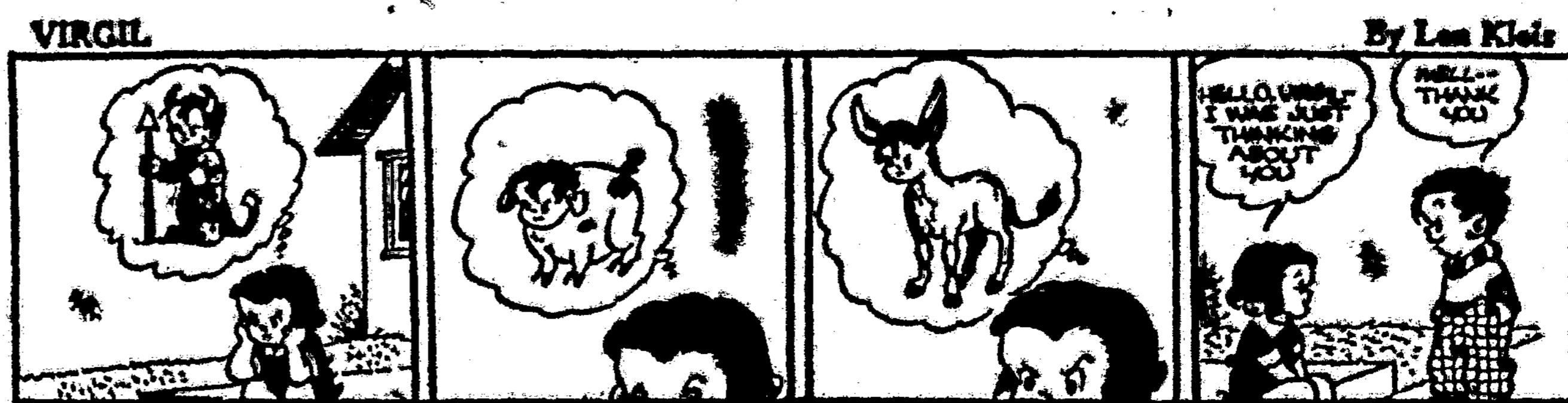
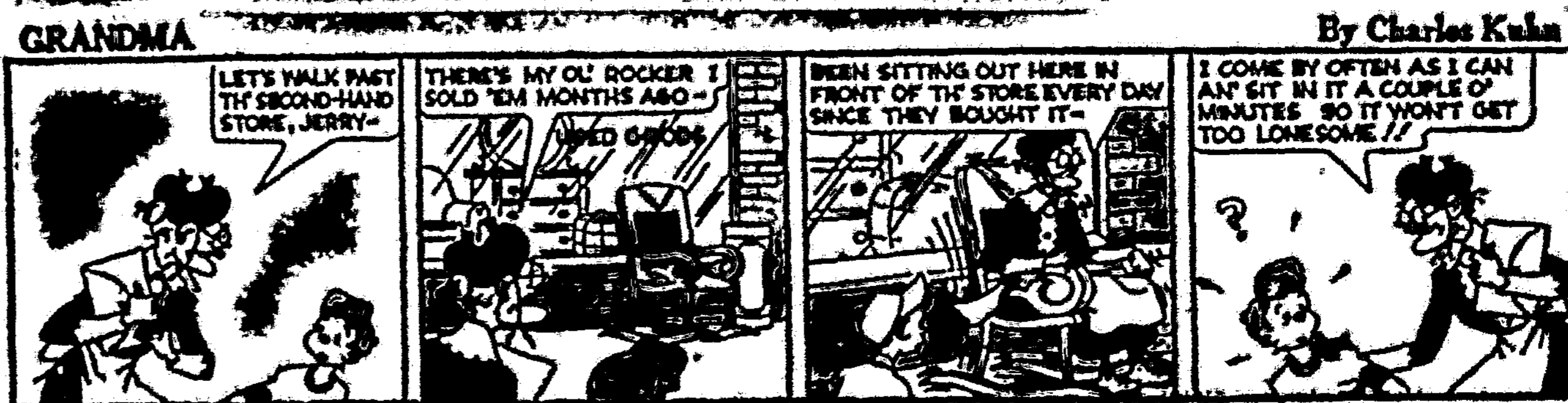
