Rotarians Hear Mescalero President Tell Of Tribe's Long Range Plans

Wendell Chino, recently elected by the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council as its president, an office he held for a term two years ago, brought to members of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Rotary Club an outline of a long range planning program for the tribe, most of which has already been put in motion.

He stressed there are four main aims of development: a social, health, economic and political. Under these four headings, he discussed in detail these problems which are being tackled:

Political Development: He said organizational structure changes were needed in the tribe's self governing system for effective and efficient operation. For instance, the constitution and by-laws, about a quarter of a century old, needed modernizing.

Health Development: Chino said this was one of the most pressing of the tribe's important phases of the long range program. Sanitation was stressed to include control of sewage disposal in individual homes; installation of indoor plumbing and garbage disposal; pure water supplies; ventilation and enough room in the homes.



Ike's Visit To Clovis Termed Red Letter Day For That City By Lincoln County News Editor

Last Monday was a red letter day for the citizens of Clovis, the occasion being a visit by President Eisenhower. For him it was strictly a business trip to get first hand information about the drought. There were no speeches, little hand-shaking and a minimum of conversation on his part. He asked a few questions but most of the time he was listening.

Between two and three thousand people were at the Air Base when the president's plane arrived. The air force base personnel

Force. Each person accompanying the president on his tour had been registered before hand and given an identification badge. But the sharp-eyed secret service men took no chances. Once when my topcoat happened to cover the badge on my coat an operative said "I don't see your badge." The secret service had a busy day and no doubt they would prefer it if the president never left Washington. They were very patient with the crowd on the tour but went into action promptly when two eagerness-beavers tried to pick up the conversation between the president and the Worrrells. One man carried a tape recorder and the other stretched out a microphone close to the president. They were promptly pushed back.

The president, with the Worrrells and Secretary of Agriculture Benson examined a pit silo, half filled with grain sorghum silage. The president was also interested in a breaking plow. Then he said "Let's take a look at the hogs." There were about fifty fine looking hogs inside a barbed wire enclosure. Secretary Benson wanted to get a closer look, so he parted the wires and crawled through. The fence was electrically wired and as the Secretary came out, the president laughed and said: "You went through a hot fence, did you know that?"

Secretary Benson soon made friends with the Worrrells' two girls, Terry 8 and Mary 4, and obligingly posed with them for photographers. "Children," he remarked, "are the great American crop." The Worrrells have three other children, Wade 17, Rex 15 and Jimmie 6. As he prepared to leave the farm, the president shook hands with the Worrrell family and thanked them for their hospitality. He told the older boys, "I wish you lived up by me. I'd give you a calf!"

The afternoon was warm. A stiff breeze was stirring the deep reddish soil. The plowed fields have not drifted and are ready to receive the moisture when and if it comes. I remarked to James Haggerty, presidential press secretary, that there were many areas in New Mexico that showed the effects of drought more than the land that the president had seen. He said that parts of Texas and Oklahoma looked worse, but he added with a laugh, "I'm no farmer." Asked if the president would make recommendations to congress for additional drought relief, Mr. Haggerty replied: "The president has already made some recommendations and he probably will make more, later."





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'I Have Had Polio,' Teen-Ager Tells Fellow Students in Article Published in Local School Paper

Editor's Note: Currently the nation is engaged in raising a fund for polio treatment and polio prevention in the annual March of Dimes. With the communities of Lincoln County engaged in this universal campaign, the article below, written for the local high school newspaper, "The War Whoop," should be of especial interest.

 This is the time of year that the March of Dimes polio drive is put on each year. Let us give generously to this cause for it is a very worthy one.

I would like to tell you how it feels to have polio. In the summer of 1950 when I was 11 years old, I was stricken with a light case of this dread disease. A few days before one of my friends had died from it.

My first symptom was a tired feeling, I would lie around or sleep most of the day. Next I could hardly move my neck. I would pretend around my mother that my neck wasn't sore, but I was taken to the doctor anyway. The test for polio then was having your spine tapped. This was done and the doctor told my parents that I would have to stay overnight. I not only stayed that night but also 20 others.

I was put in an isolation ward as all patients with polio are for at least a few days. This is the time that the germ is still catching, could have no visitors except my parents. In some hospitals even the parents aren't allowed to visit. Imagine how this would be for a child of 11 or 12 years.

One day the nurse would treat my back with hot packs. They were made from old wool blankets. The packs were steaming hot and placed on my back. This process was repeated for about 30 minutes. I considered this as one of the worst parts of having polio.

Another part that was especially painful and was perhaps really the worst was taking exercise. An exercise that seems very simple now was touching my toes, but then it was quite painful. The first time I tried to walk and stepped on the floor, it felt as though I were stepping on splinters of glass. The nurse swept the floor where I was standing and I tried it again. There was still the same feeling.

As I said before my case was light and I was only in the hospital for 3 weeks. I was fortunate for many children have to stay in the hospital for months. While I was there I met a lot of children my age, younger and older. One case that I remember is of a girl my age. She had been in the hospital for two or three weeks. Her first exercise was touching her little finger to her thumb. She played in the hospital from the first of June until the middle of October.

Even after being discharged from the hospital I also had to continue my exercises every day. To you, exercises might not sound so bad, but to a polio patient they are most painful.

Another person that I remember is a boy who would not turn over by himself or get up.

There were also some nice memories that I remember. One of them was receiving mail. I received from 6 to 10 cards a day. I have a scrapbook at home I fill with the cards that I received.

Another was that a girl had a birthday and we had a party. Of course we could not run and play, but we enjoyed it anyway.

After I could start going places again I had a feeling that everything was going to be all right. I was excited. But later I found that this was not true, and I realized that there was nothing wrong with having polio. I realized that it could happen to anyone at anytime.

Yes, it could happen to anyone even you. You can prevent being the victim of polio. The answer is Salk vaccine!

Great Granddaughter Of Victorio Elected To Apache Council; First Woman To Be Chosen

The great granddaughter of Victorio, one of the greatest of Apache chiefs, has been chosen as the first woman ever to serve as a member of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council.

She is attractive, raven-haired, jet-eyed Mrs. Narcisus Gayton, and is a nurse at the new, ultra-modern \$230,000 Mescalero-Bent county school on the reservation.

Mrs. Gayton, a Chiricahua Apache, was born on the 488,639-acre Mescalero Reservation, located in Otero County. She is the daughter of Tom Duffy, who resides at Mescalero. Her late mother was the former Christine Kozine, granddaughter of the famous Chiricahua Chief Victorio.

The Chiricahua, as well as the Mescalero Apache, are descendants of the Southern Athapascan people, who inhabited New Mexico and Arizona in ancient times. For it is known that following the last glacial period some types of modern man lived in the Southwest and left his chipped stone dart points embedded in fluvial deposits along with the bones of animals now extinct.

It was Victorio, who in 1897 led a band of Apache from the Mescalero Reservation to go on the warpath. Their foray was a continuation of raids begun by Cochise, another great Chiricahua chief, to drive all white men from

their lands. The raids of Cochise had always been friendly to the white Americans. Had he not been so regarded by the mismanagement of a party of U. S. soldiers. In 1883, Victorio was attacked and killed in Chihuahua by Mexican troops.

Mrs. Gayton's grandparents were among the band of Apaches sent with Geronimo to Florida, where the men were put in dungeons and the women kept several miles away at Fort Marion. In Florida many of the Apaches died of malaria, and other diseases. The remnants of the band later were sent to Alabama, and finally to Fort Sill, Okla. Both Tom Duffy and Christine Kozine were born at Fort Sill. Years later, when the Apaches there were given the opportunity to return to New Mexico, Tom Duffy and his family were among those who came back to Mescalero.

Mrs. Gayton attended the Indian School in Santa Fe and later took nurses training at Muskogee, Okla. Until this fall, when she resigned to accept a position with the school, she had served as a trained nurse for six years at the reservation hospital. Her favorite hobby is photography.

"I really was surprised at being elected to the tribal council," Mrs. Gayton says of her recent honor. "The council is similar to ancient ruling customs of the Indians. In 1598, rulers of the Pueblo Peoples, were given canes or 'rods of office' by Onate, the great Spanish explorer. Such a custom continued after the American occupation of New Mexico, when Abraham Lincoln in 1863 gave ebony canes to silver handles to the Pueblo governors. Pueblo or nomad, the Indians of the Southwest long have had certain groups of rulers among their people.

Mrs. Gayton says, at the present time, she has definite projects to work for in the council, with the exception of "a badly needed new hospital for the reservation."

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

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
