**Dr. Caylor Biography Is Reprinted**  
Editor's Note: We've had two telephone requests, another by letter and several verbal requests that we reprint the biography of Dr. H. C. Caylor, who died here Dec. 20 and was buried Dec. 22. We had press trouble the week the story was printed in our paper and a large portion of the column of type was unreadable. For his many friends we are glad to reprint the information about him.)  
Dr. Caylor was born in White-

wright, Tex., in 1882 and graduated as a doctor of medicine at the Central University of Louisville, Ky., in 1905.  
He did a considerable amount of postgraduate work—in research, completed a special study of histological microscopy in Chicago. He was interested in the field of malignant tumors, especially in the cytology of carcinoma, and spent years of study in this particular field. Later this interest led to the psychosomatic angle of the carcinoma problem and he studied the psychoanalysis of tape records of expressions of the human mind under certain conditions.  
In 1951 he became an active member of the New York Academy of Sciences, but shortly after that he became ill and suffered

Inconsiderate and Illegal  
Fires seem to bring out the best and worst in us. Men turn out and work like Trojans. Some women rush to put on the coffee pot to help keep the fire fighters filled with steaming black Java. Others are so intent on getting to the fire (ahead of the fire trucks) that they forget the trucks way to the scene of a fire should irritate every property owner. It might be his home or business place that is on fire.  
Another practice that is illegal, and hinders firemen, in their hurry to get to a blaze, is following too close behind a fire truck. A long string of private cars and trucks following close behind, might make it impossible for the firemen to turn a corner quickly, or cause rear end collisions all along the line, if they do turn unexpectedly.  
Once arrived at the site of the fire, what do our firemen often find? A car or truck, or several of them, parked right in front of the fire hydrant. One must be exceedingly color blind if they cannot see the bright yellow color of a fire hydrant. Even so they should be able to recognize one from its shape and size. It is illegal to park within 20 feet of a fire plug. There are yellow "No Parking" lines painted on the curb in front of most of them. Why do so many people park their vehicles in front of them?  
The fourth hindrance to efficient fire fighting is one that cannot be excused as forgetfulness.






