We understand there is little likelihood the memorial will ever come out of the committee on to the floor of the state house. Remembering the political remarks made to us by the one-time State Senator, Mr. Bays, now State Land Commissioner, who certainly is well acquainted with Bays and who likely works closely with him, we believe (knowing Bays as we do) the measure was introduced for political purposes. That's why, for many of last week, you found the store personnel covered up with canned goods stacked here and there.

But, be all that as it may, the memorial has a heart in it, and much merit. It certainly would have some influence if it is passed and sent to the U. S. Congress. It would be a fine thing to see the Indians in the U. S. habit of taking from many tribes of Indians their various lands, under treaty in later years, but never honoring a promise of doing better by them. It's the national disgrace (something we kept hidden in the closet) how we have treated the original Americans ever since the first invasion by Europeans.

In Lincoln County it is hereby for us to write this thought—that we honestly believe the Apaches have a right to the land they have been treated. It is unpopular for us to expound this belief, for there are many ranchers and others who would rather anything happen to the lush pastures now held by the government than to give it to the Apaches.

But, how could the U. S. better repay the many Indian tribes, the robberies, the crushing of a developing culture, the murder that were committed in the names of various motives in every state of this Union the last three to four hundred years.

Arthur Rank, one of the greatest industrialists, when asked once how he arrived at solving a problem—and he has many in his many enterprises in England, in Africa, in the U. S. and other countries—said that he studied each problem from every angle, that is RIGHT. When he had determined what was right normally, that was his decision. In the matter of returning Ft. Stanton lands to the Mescalero Apaches—it is RIGHT—because it is morally just.

Set July First For Brucellosis Test Deadline

At the county-wide meeting held at the Carrizozo Women's Club building last Saturday evening, the cattle growers present set July 1, 1957, as the date to have all cattle tested in Lincoln County and have the area declared a certified-free county. To set the program completed as fast as possible, the county was divided into 13 communities used in road planning work. The communities are as follows: Corona—Archie Perkins, Corbin Heister, Don Dean. Lone—Geo. W. Shanks, Ed Reynolds, Jr., Joe Crump. Apache—Walter Wilson, A. W. Gault. The Oaks—Pat Murphy, J. D. Gault.

As a note of interest, he stated that January 1957 was the heaviest testing month ever recorded in New Mexico.

A. C. P. Practices Carried Out In Soil Bank

Land which has been placed in the Soil Bank—either the Acreage Reserve or the Conservation Reserve—is not eligible for other land for federal cost-sharing in carrying out practices under the Agricultural Conservation Program.

But applications for cost sharing for conservation practices must be filed with the county ASC committee before any practices are undertaken. The county committee is also the best source of information about which practices are approved for ACP cost-sharing in the county this year. Since approved practices are not the same in every county, it is important to check with the local committee. The practices approved for each county include those that are considered most needed in that area.

Applications are now being received for the 1957 ACP at the county office at the courthouse in Ruidoso. All applications for approved practices that are received in time for consideration under this year's program will receive equal consideration.

If ACP practices are carried out on land placed in the Soil Bank, the Soil Bank provisions of no grazing and no harvesting of crops be met. Some practices which are not eligible for assistance under the Conservation Reserve are eligible under ACP, and may be carried out on Conservation Reserve land if approved by the county ASC committee. Assistance, however, cannot be given under both programs for the same practice on the same acres. See your local ASC committee today to find out what aid is available to you in conserving and building up your land.

Apaches Riled Over 'Insult' By Sen. Moore

Apache tribal leader Wendell Chino has voiced anger at the alleged case of the Mescaleros for the disputed Fort Stanton. He has drafted a reply to State Sen. J. G. Moore of Lincoln County for a recent alleged affront to the Mescalero people.

"Sen. Moore was quoted in remarks before the legislature as calling the Mescaleros shepherds." Chino grumbled. "We have no shepherders in our tribe, and base our claim to the Fort Stanton lands on historic occupation by the Apaches and on treaties concluded in past times," he continued.

The quote attributed to Sen. Moore appeared in an Albuquerque newspaper in a report of discussion following a move by State Rep. Herb Bays of Otero County to have the New Mexico legislature memorialize Congress seeking the return of the Fort Stanton lands to the Mescalero tribe.

"The Fort Stanton land title has never been successfully disclaimed by anyone," Chino declared, warning to his topic "We have records proving the rights of the Mescalero Apaches from time immemorial and that the land belongs to our people. We feel as a matter of fairness and justice and in the best public interest, the land should be returned to the Mescaleros."

"The tribe always made an effort to raise the wool and cattle. We do not have any sheep-herders in our tribe. Our people, in peaceful pursuits of life, have Americanized themselves and have become farmers, cattlemen, doctors, machinists, teachers, nurses, soldiers, and in other ways, they have become a part of our nation. We have learned to utilize well the resources we possess, and our cattle herds will prove the wisdom of our cattle operations. During the difficult drought years we have maintained our herds and cattle when other cattlemen have had such a difficult time. The Apaches cannot be considered anything but progressive American citizens, deserving of the return of the title of the Ft. Stanton lands."

"We further feel that before people make disparaging remarks about us that they should familiarize themselves with Indian affairs, particularly in the case of neighbors who are indigent citizens who want to contribute to the recovery of their state and nation," Chino concluded.

Moore Denies Calling Apaches 'Shepherders'

Sen. J. G. Moore of Lincoln County, in a telephone conversation with the Ruidoso News Wednesday morning, said he had not called the Mescalero Apaches "shepherders" as reported by Wendell Chino, Tribal Council President, in an article in the Ruidoso News. Moore said he had never used that word in any of his speeches.

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Blood Donor Listing Asked By Hospital

The Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital does not have a blood bank, therefore it must of a necessity depend on a "walking blood bank." In order to give the members of this community the maximum protection as well as emergencies involving out of town visitors and travelers, it is necessary for the hospital staff to keep a current list of blood donors (containing names, addresses, blood types and Rh factors) at all times to expedite locating and the qualifying of donors in the least time possible.

When practical it is the custom to obtain blood from a central blood bank. However, donors from outside the community don't have their local people. This can only be done as a matter of routine when time is not too important.

All those who are willing to donate blood upon occasion are requested to report to the business manager in the Ruidoso group March 1st through 15th on Monday, Tuesday or Thursday evenings between 5 and 8 p. m. to be typed for this purpose.

As an advantage to the donor, each whose blood is typed in this program will be given a wallet card denoting the blood type, thus making available to the donor an emergency service that could save time, and the donor's life at the time of need.

Apaches Given Superintendent From Montana

Clinton O. Talley, presently superintendent of the Fort Peck Indian agency at Poplar, Mont., has been designated to assume the position of superintendent of the Mescalero Indian agency, effective March 10.

Talley will succeed Walter O. Olson, who served as superintendent at Mescalero from Dec. 30, 1953 until Jan. 20 of this year when he was promoted to assistant area director of administration in the Interior Department.

The Interior Department statement said David Paul Weston would be transferred from the area office in Muskogee, Okla., to replace Talley in the Montana agency.

Harris, a young lawyer, who suggested the name "Rotary" was selected because the first meetings of the Club were held in rotation, in the office of its members. The Rotary plan of fellowship and service to others soon spread from city to city in the United States and Canada and then crossed the oceans to every continent.

For more than half a century, Rotary has grown in numbers and strength. In the last 12 months, for example, more than 400 new Rotary clubs have been organized in 50 countries, and six new countries have been added to Rotary's membership roster—Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Netherlands, New Guinea, and Ruanda-Urundi and Swaziland in Africa.

"Today, Rotary is a world-wide organization of more than 439,000 business and professional executives who are members of 9,286 Rotary Clubs on the six continents."

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



Ruidosians Make Fourth Try To Climb Baldy On Motorcycle

(Editor's Note: Below is a clipping from the Community Public Service Co. employees' magazine, The Communicator, which was illustrated with a couple of photos made by Cleo Roe of Ruidoso, and which tells of Roe and Lloyd Coe's attempt to climb Mt. Baldy by motorcycle.)

It may sound like plain hard work to some but it's fun as Serviceman Lloyd Coe of Ruidoso sees it. Trying to climb a 12,000-foot mountain on a motorcycle, that is. And after four tries, Lloyd almost made it in December.

The mountain in this story is Sierra Blanca, the majestic mass of earth and stone which is a landmark seen for many miles around the Ruidoso area. Residents of the area call the mountain "Old Baldy," since its crest is white with snow from early fall until late spring each year. Melting snow and mountain springs from Old Baldy form the source of the water in Rio Ruidoso, "Noisy Water," the picturesque river which winds down the mountainside and through the valley on which the Village of Ruidoso is built.

Lloyd made two unsuccessful tries to climb the mountain last summer, once on an Indian 250CC motorcycle and once on a Velocette English 350CC. In October he had another go at the climb, with a Harley Davidson 150CC, but had to turn back.

In December, however, he really "got warm." He rode the Harley Davidson again and reached a point just about a thousand feet below the crest.

Lloyd was accompanied on his adventure by a friend, Cleo Roe, who took the accompanying pictures. The two men installed special low gears in the motors of their vehicles in order to travel at the low speed necessary. Gas tanks of their machines held two and one-half gallons each, sufficient to make the trip to the top.

Lloyd and his friend travelled up along the south fork of the Rio Ruidoso on the trail used by horse-back riders. As they were their way up the mountain, they crossed the river 13 times. Ice formed on the wheels of their motorcycles after each crossing.

Fallen trees and great rocks on the trail were their biggest obstacles. As they climbed, their motors lost power due to lessening air pressure and more pushing and lifting became necessary.

At approximately 11,000 feet altitude, their motors had lost so much power that it was necessary to turn back. It was 10 hours from the time they set out on their project until they returned to their starting place. Part of this time was spent working on their machines en route and some time was accounted for by their losing the trail. Coe and Roe are undaunted, however. As soon as the snows melt and the ground dries, they expect to try again, by another route.

"Next time we feel pretty sure we can reach the top," says Lloyd.



Radar Island



More than 100 miles off the New England coast, this man-made "island" is the first open-sea radar tower in the nation's new Atlantic defense network against air attack. Costing \$13 million, it houses 60 Air Force personnel on its three decks, and enough electrical gear to supply a city of 100,000. Its three spherical "radomes" are designed to spot enemy raiders at distances which are a military secret. The 6,000-ton "island" is the largest structure ever to stand so far from land amid such hazardous sea conditions, according to Gulf Oil which supplied fuels and lubricants during the unprecedented erection job by Raymond Concrete Pipe Co. and DeLong Corp. (a joint venture).




