Clown Cake Has Coconut Topper!

Planning a Circus party? Well here's a delightful and amusing centerpiece and dessert combined.



You'll need: 1 8-inch square cake
Fluffy frosting
Red food coloring
1 can Baker's Angel Flake
Coconut
Large gumdrops
Blue crystal mints
Small crab apple (optional)

Steps to follow:

1. Make the cake from any instant cake mix, or follow a recipe of your own. Cool cake and place it on a large plate or tray.
2. Cut a triangle from the cake by cutting one corner off... cutting from center of one edge to center of nearby edge. (See Figure #1.)
3. Place this triangle at one of the short edges of the cake to make peak of clown's hat. (See Figure #2.)
4. Tint about 1/3 of the frosting pink with the red food coloring. Spread this on face area (Figure #2), making deep swirls for cheeks. Spread the remaining white frosting over hat area.
5. Sprinkle flaked coconut over hat and place large gumdrops along slanting edge for mouth. Use blue crystal mints for eyes, and use small crab apple or a large round red gumdrop for nose. (See finished photo at top.)

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



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New Mexico Town Was Invaded By Only Foreign Troops Ever To Cross United States Border

(Editor's Note: An unusual period in U. S. history is recounted in the article below, written for the Ruidoso News by Paul Matthews, son of Mrs. Frank Matthews of this city. He is attending McMurry College in Abilene, Tex.)

The attack on Columbus, New Mexico at 2 a. m. March 9, 1916, by Pancho Villa and his renegade army, shocked the nation and rocketed the little town into national limelight. As suddenly as it reached fame the little town was forgotten—a ghastly casualty as the victim of the only attack of a foreign army on American soil.

Little concern or fear of attack was evidenced among the small population of three hundred civilians and twenty soldiers of the 13th cavalry. The presence of Pancho Villa nearby was known to all and could mean but one thing—an attack on Palomas, a small Mexican town just three miles from Columbus.

Little did anyone suspect that one of the local merchants had short-changed the Rebel general \$2,500 worth of war supplies, and that he was there to square the account in a horrific way.

Old residents will remember the sight of smoking ruins and the smell of burning flesh all through the next day. No account of the dead Villistas were ever determined, but there were no less than a hundred and twenty-five left on the battle field. These were piled in stacks along with brush and dead cattle, soaked with coal oil and burned within sight of the village.

Unforgettable is the night of terror spent, barricaded in the sturdy, thick walled adobe school house where everyone too young or too old or weak to fight fled when the cry rang out in the night, "Villa is coming! Villa is coming!"


A small number of Villa's soldiers had staged a fake raid on Palomas, drawing the soldiers from Columbus and leaving the town virtually unprotected, except for a skeleton crew of soldiers and a few old men. All available men had gone with the soldiers to ride against Villa.

Villa is now a name in history, but the town of Columbus has never recovered, some of the old walls of the burned buildings still stand, grim reminders of the fateful invasion forty years ago. Our casualties were seventeen dead, nine civilians and eight soldiers.



Original Cathedral Of The Pines Reported On In Parade Magazine

(Editor's Note: The following article, with a photo to illustrate, appeared in Parade Magazine in the El Paso Times several months ago. It gives a summary of what it is hoped can be accomplished in Ruidoso by a board of trustees to be named to push such a project at a meeting in the city hall tonight.)

Ridge, N. H.—Rain or shine, more than 25,000 people from all over the U. S. will make a Memorial Day pilgrimage to a piney shaded knoll near this small New Hampshire town. There, in America's most unusual place of worship, each in his own way will pay tribute to the country's war dead. Indirectly, they also will be honoring the memory of the young man whose death was responsible for the creation of the Cathedral of the Pines.

His name was Sanderson Sloane. He died 12 years ago, when his bomber crashed in Germany. Before going overseas, Sandy Sloane had chosen this knoll as the site of the home he and his wife planned to build. Originally, giant pines sprouted upon the hill that led to the brow of the hill. Then the great hurricane of 1938 toppled most of them.

But one spring afternoon Sandy and his father climbed the trail again. With the trees gone, they could look out across the valley and its glittering necklace of lakes to Mt. Monadnock miles away, and the whole brilliant, rolling Wachusett Divide. It was, Sandy said, "the most beautiful view God ever put together."

After their son's death, Douglas and Sibyl Sloane often visited "Sandy's knoll," eventually they were moved to build a modest memorial to him. Boughs and rock were cleared away, and a cross of New Hampshire granite erected. But the first small memorial service awakened such a widespread response that the Sloanes felt perhaps the Cathedral of the Pines could become a symbol of the sacrifice made by all—women as well as men—who gave their lives in America's battles. And so it has.

First, an Altar of the Nation was built; then a lecture hall, a baptistry, a dining room, a retreat for visiting clergymen. Uniquely, each structure is built of stones contributed from all over the world, many from famous personalities.

President Eisenhower, for example, sent two stones, one from the Normandy and where U. S. forces landed on D-Day, and one from his Kansas home. General MacArthur's stone comes from Japan's Aizugi airfield, where he landed to occupy that country; Adm. William Halsey sent coral from the Pacific Islands his forces conquered.

From the Parthenon—

Forge, Plymouth Rock, the Parthenon in Athens, ground zero at Hiroshima—from historic sites in every American state and virtually every country in the world.

By 1948 a few pastors were asking to hold special services at the Cathedral. The Sloanes, who by now had set up a trust to oversee their efforts, installed benches, a small organ, a public-address system, a parking area.

Soon, on Sundays and special holy days, various religions were holding services in this outdoor cathedral. All told, 35 different denominations have conducted over 600 ceremonies in the past decade. In addition, countless civic, fraternal, patriotic and youth organizations have held religious and patriotic services there. The Cathedral, incidentally, is maintained entirely by voluntary donations.

Today it is not unusual for as many as 60,000 people to make the pilgrimage to the Cathedral of the Pines on a single week end. Many come to worship; but even those who come just to gaze in awe with a new sense of reverence for things spiritual.

"Outdoor churches," says Douglas Sloane, "exert a subtly different sort of influence. Many who come to the Cathedral are non-churchgoers who are troubled because they cannot find a real faith. For many of them, a few services at the Cathedral of the Pines are a stepping-stone to new religious inspiration."

One couple, who came merely to sight-see, agree.
"My husband and I aren't formally religious," the young wife says. "But we walked through the arches of pines, and heard the delicate organ music, and then suddenly we came to the brow of the hill and saw the cross hanging in what seemed like mist-air, surrounded only by the sky, and the mountains in the distance. My husband and I looked at each other, and we both had tears in our eyes. 'It was as close to Heaven as we'll ever get in this life.'"

The Cathedral, says Adm. Chester Nimitz, is "truly a memorial to all those who gave their lives in the service of our country." And by next Memorial Day this may be a literal as well as spiritual fact. New Hampshire's Sen. H. Styles Bridges and Rep. Perkins Baas have introduced a resolution in Congress to have the Cathedral designated as a National Shrine. The legislation is now in committee.

Meanwhile, the Cathedral of the Pines remains a spiritual haven for every American.
