Law Of Gravity Is Defied In New Mystery Spot Here

Visitors to the Playground of the Southwest this summer who visit a new entertainment attraction will be mystified by balls rolling uphill, people standing on the walls of a house, others leaning in a weird angle to keep their balance as they walk across the floor, and other such defiance to the law of gravity at the newly opened Mystery Spot near the old White Mountain Inn, down the hill east from Green Tree.

Construction was completed early this week on the Mystery Spot by C. W. and J. W. Stockley, brothers, and V. McCray, on acreage they purchased earlier this month. They have built a small two-room frame cabin on a slope to provide the illusion. The site was in a weird angle to keep their balance in accordance to the sloping walls of the cabin, thereby adding to the illusion.

The Mystery Spot is similar to three such places in California, another in Oregon, and some others in Utah. McCray, who has been associated with one in California for several years, holds a patent on the idea, and he saw his original one in California featured in a magazine of photographs in Life Magazine.

Admission to the Mystery Spot will be 50c for adults and 25c for children from 5 to 12 years of age. First visitors early this week came away from the house describing the sensation of walking across a floor that appeared level while all other persons in the place were leaning. That odd sight is coupled with many demonstrations, also, which all seem to defy gravity.

Stockley is of Roswell, and has been a piano tuner for 49 years. His brother has been in the construction business in Northern Oklahoma for many years. McCray is originally from Michigan.

The site has a big budget set aside for advertising the new attraction, including 40,000 folders, bumper strips and photo packets showing the different demonstrations.

CLUBS, CHURCHES UNITE TO STAGE ALL-OUT FIRE PREVENTION CAMPAIGN

A clear-up tornado is predicted to roar throughout Ruidoso next week in a concerted, all-out community fire-prevention campaign, sponsored by Ruidoso Woman's Club in the hopes of winning a Sears-Roebuck Foundation and Federated Women's Clubs big cash prize—and at the same time to promote safety, health and financial savings for the area. The fourfold object has fired the Woman's Club to seek, and secure, promises of assistance from almost every organization in the community.

In a kick-off coffee meeting last Friday at the Village Restaurant here, 33 persons were present to hear details of a thorough overall clean-up. The assistance of about two dozen organizations, including churches, civic and service clubs, private businesses and the Village Restaurant, was secured. U. S. Forest Service was pledged at the meeting, at which Evan Mahaney, Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce manager, presided.

The Woman's Club was represented by a panel of eight members, each of whom are in charge of a particular phase of the fire prevention program. To open the meeting, a roll call of organizations that had been contacted found a representative from almost all of the groups on hand in the Village Restaurant. U. S. A summer camp for crippled children of New Mexico again will be sponsored by the New Mexico Society for Crippled Children and Adults. The camp will be held at Carrizo Lodge in Ruidoso, and the dates have been set as June 2 to June 16, inclusive. It is expected that there will be about 60 children of ages 2 to 16 attending, and these will represent nearly every county in the state.

The camp was held for the first time last summer, and was highly successful and enjoyable about for the children taking part, and also for the adults who were helped out of the camp by the camp. In addition, the people of Ruidoso make available all of their facilities for the enjoyment of these handicapped children and here they are expected to enjoy all of these sports, games, and other activities, despite their crippling conditions.

Carrizo Lodge is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Herb Grogan. They donate all of their fine facilities and personnel for this camp each summer. The Lodge itself is most attractive, located high in the wooded mountains near Ruidoso, and with ample facilities.

This summer the camp program will be under the direction of Mrs. Lucille Maleske, who is a registered nurse and experienced in conducting such programs. She will also have a staff of eight counselors to aid her, as well as considerable volunteer help. Service of a local doctor will be available, as well as those of a qualified dietitian.

This is the second year for the Carrizo Lodge Summer Camp, and it promises to be even bigger, better, and more enjoyable than the first.


BUILDS OFFICE BUILDING



New Hunt Plan For State Okayed By Commission

The State Game Commission Monday approved an entirely new concept in the setting of the big game seasons for New Mexico.

The commission okayed, with but few changes, a set of regulations calling for continuous hunting starting Oct. 14 and extending nearly two months, through Dec. 8.

Under the regulation, hunting of deer will be permitted at different areas of the state at different times throughout the season.

Earlier State Game Department spokesman Fred Patton had said that such a schedule would "adjust the season to fit area and climatic conditions."

Generally, the early hunting will be in northern areas of the state, and the later seasons, extending into December, would be for the southern portion of New Mexico.

The following deer seasons were set in these local areas:

Southeast Nov. 9 through Nov. 18 for fork-antlered buck.
Sacramento-Guadalupe: Nov. 9



The Juvenile Code Of New Mexico

District Judge W. T. Scoggin. The article below is one of a series to be printed in the next several weeks.

(SERIES V)

Not every child who is brought before the juvenile court has committed a crime, even a small one. Children who are neglected, mistreated, or abandoned, are taken into the custody of the court. Runaways from other communities or states are cared for until their parents come for them.

It is because the juvenile court is used for such humane purposes that every effort has been made to take away from it the stigma of a criminal court. The term "arrest" is never used and whenever possible the child is detained in a detention home, not a jail.

This latter provision is too seldom possible in New Mexico. The best that can usually be done, because of a lack of finances and community interest, is to provide a separate area of the jail for the detention of juveniles.

The Juvenile Code, as you will see below, allows the Court to tax both the parents of the juvenile and his county of residence for costs incurred during his period of custody. Occasionally the parents are able to pay these costs, but New Mexico's counties are as poor as the courts and the juvenile court can expect little actual financial help from this source. Despite the provisions of the Juvenile Code

Sections of New Mexico's Juvenile Code follow:

13-8-42. Apprehension of juvenile not arrest—Release of juvenile to responsible adult—Report by officer. When any juvenile found violating any law or ordinance or whose circumstances are such as to endanger his welfare is taken into custody, such taking into custody shall not be termed an arrest. The jurisdiction of the court shall attach from the time of such taking into custody. When a juvenile is taken into custody, the parent, guardian or custodian shall be notified at the earliest possible time. Whenever advisable, such juvenile shall be released to the custody of his parent or other responsible adult who shall bring the juvenile to the court or probation office at a stated time or as such time as the probation officer or court may direct. If such a person shall fail to produce the juvenile as agreed, the court may take appropriate action.

Any officer detaining a juvenile shall immediately notify the probation officer or juvenile attorney, and shall file a written report of the arrest and his actions, with the probation officer or juvenile attorney.

This is an important section because this is one of the sections that take away the stigma of the criminal court from the juvenile court. In other words, the term arrest is not called arrest in juvenile court, but, the taking into custody. This section states that the jurisdiction of the juvenile court attaches when a person is taken into custody, therefore, anybody interfering can be in contempt of the court immediately thereafter. Here the police officer may release the offender to his parents, if they are responsible people. If he does not want to file this responsibility, he may contact

the probation officer, who may release the individual to his parents. If he thinks they are responsible; or, he may have him remanded to detention. A police officer may remand him to detention also, but he must immediately notify the probation officer, which in turn notifies the juvenile judge. After the probation officer and juvenile attorney are notified, the officer must then file a written report of what he has done in the case, the investigation he has made, who the witnesses are, what they have said and so forth. This report has to be detailed. This must be filed immediately with the probation officer, and if there be no such office, with the juvenile attorney. When such person is released to his parents, he can be released on certain conditions and these conditions can be set up by the officer or probation officer so releasing the offender.

13-8-43. Procedure when juvenile is not released. If the juvenile is not released as hereinabove provided, such juvenile shall be taken without unnecessary delay to the probation office, or to the place of detention designated by the court, and as soon as possible thereafter, the fact of such detention shall be reported to the probation officer or to the court, accompanied by a written report by the officer taking the juvenile into custody, stating: (1) The facts of the offense, and (2) the reason why the child is not released to the parent. Pending further disposition of the case, the probation officer or court may release such juvenile to the custody of the parent or other person, or may detain the juvenile in such place as the probation officer or court shall designate, subject to further order, but no juvenile shall be held in detention longer than forty-eight (48) hours, unless upon order of the court.

13-8-44. Juveniles not to be unduly detained in lockup or jail. Whenever reasonable, no juvenile shall at any time be unduly detained in any lockup or jail except that, by consent of the probation officer or judge, juveniles may be placed in a jail or other place of detention for adults, in a room or ward separate from adults confined therein. The provisions of this section shall not apply in those counties and municipalities

in which separate facilities are not available.

13-8-45. Provision for temporary detention of juveniles. Provisions shall be made for a detention home or homes for the temporary detention of juveniles, to be conducted and supervised by the court, or subject to the approval and supervision of the court, by other appropriate public agency; or the court may arrange for the use of private homes for such detention, subject to the supervision of the court, or may arrange with any institution or agency to receive for temporary care and custody, juveniles within the jurisdiction of the court.

This section sets up provisions for juvenile detention home or homes. This is impossible in our district, as we do not have the money to provide this type of facility.

13-8-46. Taxation of costs. No cost shall be taxed upon or concerning the commitment or control over juveniles properly before the juvenile court, excepting that the court may, upon motion, or in its discretion, order to appear, any parent or guardian of any minor charged to be within the provisions of this Juvenile Code (13-8-19 to 13-8-73), by a summary process to be served as the court may direct and tax the cost against for the care and maintenance against such parent or guardian.

This section provides that there shall be no taxation of costs except by a direct order of the court. This is a method in which the court is able to place juveniles on probation, as this is an expensive project and usually the court must assess probation costs in order to keep sufficient personnel in the probation office to accomplish the work of therapy and reformation of those placed on probation.

13-8-47. Allowance for care and maintenance of juvenile. The court, when necessary in its opinion, may order fixed and allow a sum not to exceed the amount of fifty dollars (\$50.00) per month for the care and maintenance of a juvenile, such sum to be paid by the county in which such juvenile resides.

13-8-48. Allowance for care and maintenance by county commissioners. Allowance of the juvenile court for such care and maintenance may be ordered to be paid by the board of county commissioners of such county of residence of the juveniles out of the current expense funds of such county upon the certification of the judge and the clerk of the juvenile court making the order, and in the manner in which other county dis-

bursements are made against said current expense fund.

The success of the 4-H program depends to a large extent upon the number of adult leaders. 4-H leaders have an important job in working with boys and girls, to help them grow into responsible members of the community. 


