





Warriors Smash Bobcat Defense To Win Crown

A first down and then McCurdy got a break covering a Ruidoso fumble on the Ruidoso 41. The break tasted awfully salty in just a few seconds for Pope intercepted Quarterback L. Garcia a pass on the 38. Ruidoso earned a first down with some short passes through McCurdy's rock wall but the tribe was forced to punt. Once more the Warriors guardian angel helped out with a deflection of the pass. McCurdy fumbled 90 yards from the goal line where with four thrusts of two to three yard gains, Pope was able to snap over his fourteenth touchdown this year. A pass attempt for the spare point failed.

McCurdy just couldn't get out of low gear on receiving the kickoff on the Mission third quarter to start a pass on the third quarter.

Some old story. Ruidoso punted to McCurdy when the Warriors offense was stalled. But McCurdy made its telling drive for a score in their early seconds of the final quarter making a first down with a pass from Garcia to Leo Sarno. The pass caught a first down but a punter's deflection of the pass blocked down through in much Garcia's last pass attempt and McCurdy was back to defend. Fighting in desperation Garcia and McCurdy traded punts on an other pass and saw it fall short. Just as the game was tied 14-14 with Garcia throwing a 45 yard pass to Sarno who caught it in the end zone for the first time. Total yardage was 48 yards for the game. With fully two thirds of the final frame to go and with only a touchdown between them and victory, the Warriors' feet were wet and ragged. After their kickoff they recovered a Ruidoso fumble in Ruidoso's 30 yard line. An incoherent pass re-

ceiver, L. Martinez, caught a high flyer from Garcia, then fumbled it and Ruidoso recovered the ball in what must have been the most heart-breaking turn in the whole game for McCurdy supporters. With such a good break, the Warriors started on a terrific downhill march, piling up five first downs in succession with Wilson, Pior and Perry each carrying the ball on pichtouts, keepers and reverses. The final first down laid the ball ten yards away from the goal, where the Warriors tried three times to break through for a score that would insure the victory.

The Northern finalists, however, did not allow for any more spins by Ruidoso, recovering a fumble in one last defensive play with 30 seconds to go. McCurdy made two pass attempts, one to an end who was out in the open with nothing between him and the goal. The ball was tossed too short. The second pass, and final play of the game, saw it completed but the defensive action were Fullback Lando Aliso, Burch, Brown, F. Martinez, and of course, Quarterback Garcia.

The game Saturday rounded out a most successful season for many on the Warrior line-up. For playing in ten games this year, scored 14 touchdowns and punted for six. He made a total of 53 points personally, adding 4 PAT's to the touchdowns, and was responsible for 39 other points including 3 PAT's. Charlie Perry also played ten games, scored five touchdowns and 3 PAT's for a total of 33 points. Jan. Wilson punted in 10 games, scored a TD and 1 PAT for a total of 37 points. Harry Swanson scored three touchdowns with passes from Pior and 2 PAT's.

Others who have starred in one or more games include LE Hodger, Pope, Septa HB Wilson Howard, QB Sarno substitute back Brian Noker, Harvey Burnett, Ronnie Burt, George McQuire and Ben. Garcia. The Warriors' QB Jerry Cumply completed 8 of 10 passes in a 4-0 game against Hondo, including two for TD's.

LIST OF BRUCELLOSIS FREE COUNTIES GROWS; LINCOLN NOW INCLUDED
The accelerated program to stamp out brucellosis in New Mexico is making progress, according to Alfred E. Triviz, associate director of New Mexico A. & M. College's Agricultural Extension Service and chairman of the State Brucellosis Committee. Six additional New Mexico counties were recently classified as modified, certified, brucellosis-free, lifting the total to 17 which have been declared free of the disease. Counties certified recent were Catron, Lea, Lincoln, Sierra, Socorro and Torrance. The eleven counties originally classified as free of the disease in September this year were Bernalillo, DeBaca, Grant, Guadalupe, Harding, Hidalgo, Los Alamos, McKinley, Mora, San Juan and Taos.

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
