

Patent Granted Ruidosoan's Lie Detector
A news story in last week's issue of the New York Times mailed to Til Thompson of Ruidoso, brought him information he has been granted a patent on a new lie detector machine he invented several years ago. The article is given below: "So-called lie detectors are used in police and personal work to test the reactions of subjects to a series of questions asked by an investigator, increased perspiration, changes in the electrical conductivity of the skin and shows on a recorder. A psychogalvanometer invented by Til Thompson of Ruidoso, New Mexico, contains circuits designed to make allowances for the limited response of phlegmatic persons and the much greater reflex of those who are hyperactive. It also provides a photographic record so that the questions can be played back while an observer watches the needle on a dial. The advantage, according to the inventor, is that a novice can conduct the examination and the results can be interpreted by an expert. Mr. Thompson has been assigned United States Patent No. 2,270,638."



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
