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## Rules Are Given For New Contest At County Fair

(Editor's Note: From the office of the county extension agent for women's work last week came this announcement of interest to girls about an apple pie baking contest to be staged in connection with the 1958 Lincoln County Fair in Capitan on Sept. 12. The announcement is given below.)

By LOIS JASPER (County Extension Agent)

There is going to be an Apple Pie Contest at the County Fair September 12. The following rules will govern the contest.

Apple Pie Contest

1. The contest shall be open to anyone who has passed their 14th birthday by January 1, 1958, but who will not have passed their 21st birthday by January 1, 1958.

2. The contestant must be unmarried.

3. The contestant may use any recipe wanted, must be written out, giving separate recipe for crust and filling in standard form. The recipe is for one pie only, and must be given to judges at beginning of the contest.

4. No recipe may be changed after it has been submitted.

5. Must use fresh apples.

6. Decision of the judges shall be final.

7. Apples shall be furnished if contestant will notify Lois Jasper, or Mrs. Bill Shreveaux by September 1st, if variety is available.

8. The contestant will bake one pie at the contest, and will be observed by the judges during the entire process.

9. Scoring on contest will be 50% on finished product, 25% on method of preparation, and 25% on personal qualifications.

10. All contestants will receive a ribbon, either blue, red or white.

11. The first place winner will receive a \$20.00 gown dress or savings of equal value.

You will not have to explain the steps while you are making your pie, but should be able to answer any questions which the judges may have.

This \$4,000 estimated purse attracted the top route runners stabled here with Bill Bach, belonging to Miera Savell of Sonora, Tex., and No Gal owned by W. L. McDonald of Artesia, N. Mex., the probable favorites. The former just recently captured the "Cree Meadows Allowance" of this distance while the latter is a much improved horse this season—is a winner of three in a row and finished second to Carlos in his last start—has been coming off the pace in a manner, suggested the "Shorty" Hornbuckle. ## MR. BAR NONE CAPTURES QUARTER HORSE DERBY

Mr. Bar None, world champion two-year-old Quarter Horse in 1957, in a driving finish Sunday afternoon at Ruidoso Downs won the annual running of the rich Ruidoso Quarter Horse Derby for three-year-olds.

Fleeting into the lead at the halfway mark of the 400-yard distance, the handsome dark chestnut colt outran Spanish Fort and Diamond 2 Bar, which finished second and third, respectively.

Mr. Bar None, with jockey Ken Chapman up, carried \$270,000 of the fat purse for his owner, Oscar Jefferson Jr. of Waggoner, Okla. It was the colt's fifth win in a row.

Ruidoso Downs enjoyed its greatest non-holiday party as 300 fans wagered \$135,231 at the pari-mutuel windows. Both the crowd and the handle were the largest on record for a non-holiday Friday afternoon.

Elfinch, ridden by Bruce Brinkley and owned by Miera Savell of Sonora, Texas, captured the one mile featured 11th race, but the four-year-old brown gelding here.

Carlos, a six-year-old brown gelding, owned by J. B. Fitch of Monahans, Tex., captured the featured 11th race at Ruidoso Downs Saturday and in doing so set a new track record of 1:12.3 for six furlongs.

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### Our Community Can Profit More From THE TOURIST BUSINESS

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles being printed in the Ruidoso News as a public service to Ruidosians. The articles are from a book issued by the U. S. Department of Commerce, Office of Area Development. The series was suggested by A. J. Gates, operator of Whispering Pines Cabine here.)

Who Is the American Tourist?  
The American tourist is anybody and everybody ready to travel away from home and spend personal savings or income to do it. To these should be added the 7 million or more individuals or families who take business trips each year. People in the tourist business recognize that the business traveler usually spends his money in the same way as does the vacationing tourist, and has about the same requirements. While on route, or once at his destination, he will often make pleasure excursions and visit various tourist attractions. Moreover, if he likes a community, he may return later for a full-blown vacation, or make arrangements to hold his company's annual convention there. Business conventions, incidentally, are becoming an important source of income for many smaller and medium-sized communities.

Who Owns the Tourist Business?  
In this country, the tourist business is almost entirely owned and operated by private interests. There are, of course, official tourist organizations at the community, state, and regional level, designed to assist their respective areas in developing the tourist trade, and financed, in part at least, from taxes. But the main components in the tourist business are privately owned. Representing or cooperating with these private interests are such trade associations as the National Association of Travel Organizations, which is primarily concerned with the development of the tourist business in the United States and in encouraging foreign citizens to visit; the American Society of Travel Agents, Inc., which provides services for tourists traveling in the United States and abroad; and such specialized trade groups as the American Hotel Association, American Motor Hotel Association, Association of American Railroads, Air Transport Association of America, National Association of Motor Bus Operators, American Automobile Association, and American Merchant Marine Institute.

One important segment of the tourist business is publicly owned: State and National parks, and State and National forests. Last year, 50 million tourists visited the national parks, and the present administration has organized a project to modernize them by 1961 at a cost of over \$900 million.

What Are the Major Trends?  
First among the major trends in the extension of the tourist season. The tourist business has become a year-round business. Because of health promotion, price adjustments, and planned attractions, Florida has succeeded in develop-

ing a substantial tourist business during the summer, once regarded as a dead season. In northern areas, skiing and winter sports events compete with the traditional summer season. The so-called "big season" in many areas has not yet disappeared, but many communities have broken through the weather barrier.

Secondly, jet transports will increase interregional tourist traffic, carrying 140 passengers from New York to San Francisco in about 4 hours, or from Chicago to New York in roughly 100 minutes. They will also increase foreign competition for the American tourist by "drinking the earth" 40 percent and placing every United States community 12 hours or less away from most major cities of the free world. This likely increase of our tourists going abroad, however, may be at least partially offset by the development of faster, cheaper highways, and by the fact that United States official tourism promotion agencies (regional, State and local) spend about three times more than the rest of the world put together in bidding for domestic tourist trade. In addition, low-cost jet transportation should enable more and more foreign tourists to visit the United States.



Fruit Growers On Aug. 10 there will be a Fruit Growers meeting at the packing shed in Honda at 7:30 p. m. Everyone is invited. Packing for the 1958 season will be discussed and H. E. Baxter will show the group new equipment that he has installed for a quicker and easier handling of the fruit. There will also be a film on apple packing.

County Fair Lincoln County Fair work days are doing well. The bleachers have been moved from the rodeo grounds east of Capitan and have been installed on the south side of the roping arena in the fair grounds. Aug. 21 is the next work day and anyone who has some free time that day is welcome to come and help with the fair.

Orchard Visits Monday I noticed a late brood of codling moths just hatching. Growers who have not applied a spray for codling moth within the last 10 days should do so immediately if they expect to have clean fruit. Insecticides you can use are DDT, if not within 21 days from harvest, or if you plan on picking before then use either TEPP or Parathion.


Beef Cattle Lincoln County ranches need to test 1900 cattle to be recredited for tuberculosis for a six-year period. Aug. 1 was the date for the needed recreditation. If we do not recredit cattle from Lincoln County can be held up for 3 days during shipment and testing.

To test your cattle you need a small crowding pen or chute. Three days after injection you will need to get your cattle up again. If you are working or spraying your cattle between now and November, let me know and I will try to work out a schedule so that several can be tested at the same time. It would be preferred to test the first part of the week and read the test the last of the week.

Dog Killing or Injuring Livestock As many of you know the law pertaining to dogs was changed last year. Here is a copy of the amendment.

Dog Killing or Injuring Livestock—Damages Dog to be Killed—If any dog shall kill or injure any livestock, the owner or keeper of such dog shall be liable for all damages that may be sustained thereby, to be recovered by the owner of the livestock so killed or injured and an average of only 7.5 percent per square mile.




