



Friday night, 20 Dec. 1937

Dear Vic & Company,

Well, seeing as how it is about time to renew our subscription, I thought maybe I ought to let you know how we are getting along and just what goes on up here.

To begin with, we (the Trewwits) in partnership with the Ben Kellys of Roswell bought the T. C. Campbell cabin just above the second crossing and next to Doc Williams. All this happened in the late summer of 1935. So, as a result, we have pretty well decided on making Ruidoso our home when we part company with Uncle Sam's Air Force which we hope will be in about three years.

But, just to make things a little harder, this past April we received a notice to the effect that we will have to put in a tour overseas here at Harmon AFB, frequently referred to as the "Miami of the North." So, on 3 July we took off in our station wagon with a small trailer and headed northeast on an eleven day trip with a brief stop in Dallas and Boston. We utilized the turn-pikes wherever possible and consider the cost well worth it in view of the time and temper in which we were making the Mother Church of Christ, Scientist in Boston and must say that it is a most beautiful and impressive edifice. Our trip took us on up through New Brunswick and down to the Cape Fear River where we were scenic with their rolling hills and age-old farms. And, since we weren't equipped with poignets, we had to start thinking about finding a way to get across to our new island home. Well, it just so happens that the Canadian National Railway also operates a ferry (in addition to their national railroad system) from Sydney, Nova Scotia to Port Aux Bas, (see map other side). This ferry, the car and trailer in the hold we had to put our Boxer dog, in a crate. And then, to add to our misery, they put her down the hold with a shipment of fish and pigs. Fortunately, it was an overnight trip. We had a cabin with a double-deck bunk. You guess who slept on the top. It was Betty's first real boat ride and she was thrilled beyond words. Betty and her Siamese kid created quite a scene on the

wharf as none of dock workers up there had ever seen a cat of this breed. You just can't imagine her walking around on the dock with the kitten and dog, each on a leash. The two cats were sitting together and, at that time, the kitten was only three months old and every time they stopped, Chica would turn and lick the kitten and almost knock her over. And to top off the boat trip, we had breakfast aboard ship just as they were docking. Then, after the unloading formalities were over, we still had a stretch of 110 miles of the Queen's Highway (an extension of the Trans-Canada Highway) to traverse before we reached the Steeples and Harmon AFB. about 35 miles north of here just off the road to Corner Brook and on the end of Grand Lake. It can be reached by road. The other three have to be reached by boat, but are usually reached by boat plane. We have two Delatavand Beavers which are used for this purpose and we hope to have a float plane in our Aero Club by next summer. We are presently flying a Taylorcraft and a Beechcraft T-34 Mentor in the club and have plans for acquiring two more trainers and a Tri-Pacer four-place for cross-country trips. The family and I just might take the Tri-Pacer to New Mexico next summer.

The enclosed clippings are just to give you an idea of the local papers we take and to compare the weather. The lower we have had so far is a plus 15. We had a thaw last night and rainfall day today with the temp in the 40's and scheduled to get into the 50's tomorrow. Sitting here on the edge of the water has a decided stabilizing and moderating effect on the weather. Even in the summer the temp will vary only a couple of degrees day and night; usually in the 70's and only occasionally up to 80. Possibly the Gulk Stream has an effect on this climate too.
