SAVINGS DEPOSITS ARE DOUBLED IN YEAR'S TIME IN LOCAL BANK; LOANS, DEPOSITS SHOW BIG INCREASE

(Editor's Note: Below is the full text of the annual report given the fifth annual stockholders meeting of Ruidoso State Bank held Tuesday afternoon at the bank here by Executive Vice-President T. D. Hood.)

This is the fifth annual stockholders report, and reflects a satisfactory year for your bank. Comparative statements show a total increase of \$463,752.67 for the year, with an increase in deposits of \$443,339.48. Operating earnings increased materially, from \$38,156.80 to \$56,202.13. After reserves, taxes, losses on bond sales and dividends, the net addition to capital accounts amounted to \$20,413.19. This means that the book value of your stock now stands at \$275,300 per share, an increase of \$31.33, or 12.5% for the year, and an increase of \$100.20, or 51.3% over the original purchase price. In addition, of course, dividends of \$6.00 per share were paid during the year, giving stockholders a total increase of 15.5% for the year, and 60.8% on the original purchase price.

Building Permits Come Close To Half Million

Building permits in the village limits of Ruidoso came very close to half a million dollars in 1957, according to figures released this week by C. D. Weems, building inspector. The first half of last year saw a total of more than a quarter of a million dollars—\$266,357.00—while the last half was about \$40,000 under that figure—\$228,650.00. Weems declared: By months, 1957's permits were: January—\$49,660; February—\$38,200; March—\$47,797; April—\$39,260; May—\$30,250; June—\$36,200; July—\$37,800; August—\$28,700; September—\$46,250; October—\$43,600; November—\$32,750; December—\$23,300.

Tularosa Feels Boom In Year Just Ended

Another New Mexico town is feeling the impact of the Atomic Age. Tularosa, just north of Alamogordo, is feeling the effects of Holoman Air Development Center expansion. The building boom is changing the face and the tempo of the serene little agricultural town. Like Farmington, a peach orchard is giving way to a subdivision and home buyers get a bonus of blooming peach trees. In an article titled, "Tularosa—Town With Personality," Ruth K. Hall tells the story of this farming center that is on its way to becoming a city. "The 1950 census showed a population of 1700, which by 1955 had jumped to 3500—and today with its beautiful setting and ideal climate appeals to army and civilian personnel alike." The area produces high yield cotton, and the development of a new water basin has extended the irrigated area by 3,000 acres. 
