
Dear Vic:
Last week's paper Mayor Little outlined the necessity for a sewer system and some of the aspects of financing the system. I thought it might be appropriate at this time to give your readers some further information regarding this proposed sewer system. There is no doubt, of course, in anyone's mind that a sewer system and disposal plant are vitally needed here, nor that the lack of such a system and plant would hinder our growth of Ruidoso very materially.

As to the financing, Mayor Little gave a very complete rundown on the matter, but a little repetition would be in order. The estimate employed by the Village estimate the cost of the system and plant at approximately \$504,000.00. This money can be raised as follows: A Revenue Bond issue of \$250,000.00; a General Obligation Bond issue of \$250,000.00 from the United States Government of \$104,000.00. The General Obligation bonds will be paid through a property tax assessment, and at the present assessment valuation the additional taxes would be about \$2.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation. I believe that the average parcel of property in Ruidoso is assessed at around \$2,000.00, which means extra taxes of about \$4.00 per year on an average from each property owner. The Revenue Bonds will be paid out of the revenue from the sewer system. This matter has been gone into quite thoroughly, and it is felt that the assessment for the single family dwelling will be in the neighborhood of \$2.00 and for business concerns will be an average of about \$3.50.

Our engineers estimate that the cost of connecting a single family dwelling to the sewer system would not exceed \$500.00. If the connections are made while the sewer line is in the process of construction, the cost would be less than \$250.00, and many business concerns and other structures that need a completed connection to the sewer line are a long distance from the street would involve a cost of somewhat more than \$500.00. In this connection, the cost of connecting a structure to a sewer system is eligible for F. H. A. Title I financing, and any cost of connection in excess of \$100.00 could be arranged through the F. H. A. Title I program at a very low monthly payment providing the credit of the property owner is in good standing.

The proposed system will be so designed that additions to the line could be made at low cost from time to time as necessary. grower this year. Both of these thrive on moist conditions, the dormant and delayed dormant sprays are the two most effective kinds to control them. For control of dormant and delayed dormant per 100 spray, it is very good. Others that you might use are gentle 923, at 1 1/2 pints per 100 gallon, and liquid lime sulfur, at 7 1/2 gallons per 100 as a delay dormant spray or as a cover at 3 1/2 to 4 gallons per 100. Other chemicals to control powdery mildew are Katothane at 1 pound or sulfur at 4 pounds per 100. Remember when applying lime sulfur it will mix with very few other insecticides, so it is generally applied alone. Recommendations for these tests as well as many others are contained in the booklet "Fruit Sprays for New Mexico," which may be obtained from the County Agent's office.

Assembly Of God Church At Ruidoso Downs Shows Growth

Statistics released in the 1958 Yearbook of American Churches indicate the Assemblies of God in the 10th ranking denomination in Sunday School enrollment in the United States.

The revised church ranks also placed the denomination eighth in number of ministers, ninth in churches, 26th in church membership, seventh in Sunday School workers and teachers, and eighth in number of Sunday Schools. The Assemblies of God is the fifth largest missionary denomination in the world and stands first in number of foreign Bible Schools.

Included in the national release of statistics was The Assembly of God, Ruidoso Downs, local congregation of the denomination. According to the Rev. W. M. Perry, local pastor, the church has current Sunday School enrollment of 25. Growth of the Assemblies of God can be credited to an active home missions and Sunday School program, according to the Rev. Perry. The denomination has averaged opening one church a day for the past 5 years.

Churches of the Assemblies of God number 1,929 in the U. S. and some 8,747 abroad. Membership of the American Assemblies of God is approximately 471,116. Although the number of churches placed the denomination eighth, membership-wise it is 28th. However, many of the churches have no roll and others place little emphasis on membership, the Rev. Perry stated.

The Sunday School enrollment of the Assemblies of God is more representative of the state of the denomination. The Rev. Perry indicated, as of 1958 Sunday Schools had 876,080 members and 58,298 workers and teachers. A drive is underway to boost enrollment to one million by 1960.

Statistics in the 1958 Yearbook of American Churches were compiled by the National Council of Churches in Christ. The publication includes all denominations of the U. S., including those not a member of the National Council. The Assemblies of God is a member of the National Association of Evangelicals, and does not hold membership in the National Council of Churches.





Snowfall Total Sets New Record This Winter

Continuing snow storms here have brought a new record winter total for 1957-58 in the history of weather records in Ruidoso. Although old-timers can remember some dillys in years past, weather records have been kept for only 14 years here by C. A. Culver, co-operative observer for the U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau.

But the measurement of snow in the last five months here has totaled a new high for Culver's records of 70 inches. A wet, heavy snow fell here late Monday to add to the winter's total. The continuing inclement weather has delayed numerous construction projects, and has crews runcing in many of the canyons that haven't had water in them for several years. Snow avalanches and glaciers have been observed in the White Mountains to the west by many persons in recent weeks as the unusually heavy snowfall there has far outdistanced the amount received in Ruidoso proper.

Red Cross Aided 6,000 Victims Of NM Disasters

General Alfred M. Gruenther, President of the American Red Cross, today advised General J. P. McFarland, fund vice-chairman for New Mexico, that the Red Cross disaster cost during the 30-month period ending Dec. 31, 1937 averaged \$1,392 each day.

"The huge relief expenditures during this period—\$46,000,000—has caused a critical financial problem for Red Cross," General Gruenther wrote.

General Gruenther stated that during that period the organization was active in 850 disasters in forty-six states, besides the District of Columbia, Alaska, Guam, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Emergency food, clothing, medical care, and shelter were given to 860,000 persons. Long-term rehabilitation was given to 127,000 families, including the rebuilding, repair, and refurnishing of 30,000 homes.

"During the same period," General McFarland said, "2,076 New Mexico families were affected by disaster, and Red Cross spent \$261,162 assisting 976 of those families."

General McFarland pointed out that since 1928, sixteen major disasters occurred in eleven New Mexico counties affecting 3,500 families. There were twelve floods, three tornadoes, a snowstorm, a fire, and a plane crash in which the Red Cross gave emergency care to almost 8,000 persons and spent a total of \$337,898.

Bernalillo County had seven Red Cross disaster operations costing \$308,567. The major disaster was the summer floods of 1905 costing \$21,422.

During the last five years Socorro, Rio Arriba, Chaves, and Valencia counties each experienced two disasters. Dona Ana, Curry, Quay, Eddy, McKinley and Sandoval counties were struck by one disaster each.

"If New Mexico is to carry its share of the disaster load and also secure funds for its own relief in case disaster strikes here, it is imperative that each one does his share in the present Red Cross fund campaign," General McFarland said.
